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World Sees Gaza as 'US Genocide' Not Just Israel's

On Tuesday, four critical care doctors who recently returned from Gaza spoke to the UN. "I saw the most appalling atrocities, and I saw things I never would have expected to have seen in any healthcare setting," Dr. Nick Maynard said, adding that he saw "mass indiscriminate bombing" and targeting of healthcare workers.

Americans do not understand how badly the United States' reputation has been damaged across the world, which sees Gaza as "a US genocide" and "not just an Israeli genocide," Mohammad Marandi, a professor of English literature and Orientalism at the University of Tehran told Sputnik's The Critical Hour on Thursday.

"It's revealing the reality of [the US] empire in a way that not even [author of 'A People's History of the United States, Howard Zinn] could do because it's being done in front of our eyes, it's being done in front of a global audience. We've never seen such a thing before," Marandi said, adding that he suspects that is why the US is attempting to ban TikTok.

"The United States has lost credibility across the world. I don't think many Americans understand how bad this has become for the United States. People across the world see this as a US genocide, it's not just an Israeli genocide."

Co-host Wilmer Leon asked about a recent freeze on Canadian arms shipments to Israel, which Marandi said showed that "public opinion is shifting" but that ultimately "stopping Canadian exports of weapons is nothing." Marandi said Canada needs to take a much tougher approach.

"They sanctioned Syria... they've imposed sanctions on Cuba, on Venezuela, on Iran, on Yemen. Why don't they impose sanctions on Israel? They're carrying out a holocaust. Why don't they hit the economy?" Marandi asked, noting that Israel will, unlike Russia, be allowed to participate in the Olympics. "No one takes this seriously. And, of course, the bulk of the weapons come from the United States anyway."

"In any case, there is no reason to believe that the Canadian government cares about Palestinians, that they oppose the genocide because they've done absolutely nothing to stop it," Marandi added.

Ultimately, Marandi believes that Israel has laid the path for its destruction through its actions in Gaza. "I believe that the Israelis have made a fatal mistake and that what they've done in Gaza will be the beginning of the end of the Zionist project," he asserted. "The real catastrophe for the Israeli regime is the fact that it's been carrying out the genocide for almost six months in front of the world and it has demolished the facade that the regime had created for itself... about it being a democracy... All that is gone now and across the board the regime is despised and the image of the United States has been destroyed."

Marandi noted that he has been to China twice and public opinion there has shifted as well. He noted that he does not think China will ever invest in Israel again.

"They see on their own social media networks what you and I are seeing," he noted.

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EU Has 'No Way' to Replace US Funding Ukraine Without Tanking Euro & Economy

On Wednesday, US National Security Adviser Jake Sullivan visited Ukraine, saying that he is confident that the US will pass the roughly \$61 billion in aid for Ukraine that has languished in Congress since October. Sullivan did not provide a timeline on when he expects the bill to pass, but stressed there was no need to “speak today about plan B.”

However, the EU has already started contingency plans. On Tuesday, EU foreign policy chief Josep Borrell proposed a plan to send the interest accrued on frozen Russian assets to Ukraine, estimating that it could provide the Kiev regime around €3 billion a year, a far cry from the roughly \$113 billion the US has provided since the special operation began.

“The only way that Europe could possibly make up [for the lack of US aid to Ukraine] that is needed to support the Kiev regime is by stealing all of Russia’s frozen assets, possibly tanking the Euro and crashing the EU’s reputation as a reputable place to store currency reserves for transactions,” Mark Sleboda, a security and international relations expert told [Sputnik’s Fault Lines](#) on Thursday. “And they are very loath to do that, particularly Belgium and Switzerland, where most of Russia’s frozen assets, some \$200 billion worth, is stored.”

Outside of that “nuclear option” Sleboda said that the only other path for Europe would put “a much more severe drain” on their national budgets and economies.

“Unless all Europeans are willing to forgo their social benefits and other perks of life in the European Union that they have become accustomed to, to prop up this regime in Kiev, there’s simply no way,” Sleboda explained, noting that the recent €50 billion aid package approved by the EU is spread out over four years.

Of the plan to send the interest accrued on Russian frozen assets to Ukraine, which co-host Jamarl Thomas described as “theft,” Sleboda said he doubts Borrell’s legal justification.

“They’ve basically waved a magic wand and said ‘it’s legal,’” he began. “You can always find one lawyer. 100 of the most reputable lawyers may say ‘This is against international law, this is against every principle of capitalism that we’ve ever erected at Bretton Woods,’ but there’s always one guy that [if you] say ‘Hey, if we give you \$10, will you say this is legal?’ ‘It’s legal.’”

Russia, Sleboda argued, is “in the driver’s seat” in the conflict. “[Their military-industrial complex](#) is out producing all of NATO put together in the key types of munitions... the Kiev regime is also suffering [enormous manpower losses](#) at this point that they don’t seem to be able to replace, and then the economic problem. The money that they need to support the government, much less the military, because—economically—the regime at this point, depends entirely on NATO member state money as well.”

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## US 'Grand Plan' is to 'Reoccupy' Africa

On Saturday, the Niger's military leadership told the United States, which has three bases in the country, including one controlled by the CIA, that it is no longer welcome in Niger. On Monday, US officials insisted that they wanted to continue their "partnership" with Niger and confirmed that troops remain in the bases.

The United States' "grand plan" with its drone base in Niger is to "reoccupy" Africa with "its vassal friends" like France, Koffi Kouakou, an African analyst and senior research fellow at the Center for Africa-China Studies at the University of Johannesburg [told Sputnik's Fault Lines](#) on Thursday.

"The US [isn't] going to leave easily. The US is not going to cut and run because there's this big ego at play [in] geopolitics [and] geoeconomics, but also hegemony," Kouakou explained.

"Those who haven't been paying attention should pay attention."

"The key issue is [the] US's grand plan to get [Africa] back, with its vassal friends to reoccupy this place."

Kouakou asserted that top US officials in Africa, including Africa Command General Michael Langley, US Ambassador to Niger Kathleen FitzGibbon and Assistant Secretary of State for African Affairs Molly Phee meeting with Nigerien leaders shows that the US is seriously concerned about its interests in the region.

But Niger is capable of facing "the American bulldog" and "raising its sovereignty" because it has somebody backing it, that "could be Russia."

"We already know that Nigerien Prime Minister Ali Lamine Zeine was in Russia last week cutting deals with the Russians. [That is] showing that Niger [has] a brother or somebody backing it up," Kouakou explained. "These are the most important geopolitical issues."

Nigerien officials have "no clue" of what is going on in US bases in the country, the two official ones base 101 and base 201, or the unofficial CIA base outside of Dirkou, Kouakou said.

However, they won't take on the US directly, Kouakou argued. "They'll do very small [actions], slowly digging into the US' powers. And then, the best attack is [against their] reputation, as they've done to the French. They will do it again to the Americans."

Kouakou noted that the US delegation didn't inform the Nigerien government what it wanted to talk about before arriving or give them an opportunity to adjust the agenda. "[The] hubris that the US has and this sort of 'we are the big dog in place, we're going to tell you what to do and agenda item one we're going to be discussing so and so, agenda number two we're going to discuss so and so and you have nothing to say about it,'" Kouakou said, describing the American attitude. "Of course, the Nigeriens didn't agree."

"In fact, [the US] wanted to sort of renew this partnership, especially about the bases, without even telling the Nigeriens," Kouakou explained. "But now, this government is saying 'we now want to have our sovereignty. We want to deal with different partners as we wish. And even if we were to sell anything or partner with Iran, Russia, China or anybody else, it's our business. You don't have to tell us what to do.' But of course, the US officials didn't like that. Molly Phee didn't like it, she threatened the delegation and said 'If you don't retract what you said in public, you're going to be in big trouble in the next coming months.'"

Kouakou listed the tools in the US playbook that are typically used against governments they oppose. "There are a couple of things that all of us are looking forward to seeing: an increase in terrorism in Niger, a potential 'color revolution' or coup d'état, or potential assassination of the leaders of Niger."

"The big bully doesn't threaten people just by chance," he said.

There are concerns that Niger could turn into another Vietnam for France and the US, serving as another proxy war against Russia.

"[The US] invested a huge amount of money in this place. They're not going to leave easily. However, where the Nigeriens have a point is 'You've been there since 2012, but terrorism is still there. What have you done for us to deal with terrorism, if terrorism was really the reason for your presence on our occupied ground?'" Kouakou said, noting that Mali has done "a fabulous job" with the Africa Corps in combating terrorism. "There was no terrorism in the area until 2011 when the US and, now let's say NATO, bombed Libya to smithereens and destroyed it. Now this whole place is running amok with terrorist groups."

"I think Niger is now winning the information war," Kouakou concluded, "but this is exactly our concern because the US is going to retaliate one way or another."

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"I believe that the Israelis have made a fatal mistake and that what they've done in Gaza will be the beginning of the end of the Zionist project," he added. "It's been carrying out the genocide for almost six months in front of the world and it has demolished the facade that the regime had created for itself... about it being a democracy... All that is gone now and across the board the regime is despised and the image of the United States has been destroyed."

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The EU has been looking for alternative methods to fund Ukraine with US aid stalled in congress, including using interest from frozen Russian assets to fund Ukraine. However, they will be unable to make up the huge amount the US provides without stealing all of Russia's frozen assets, which would tank the Euro, or by devoting far more of their national budgets to Ukraine, which would tank the economy, Mark Sleboda, an international relations and security expert told Sputnik's Fault Lines on Thursday.

"The only way that Europe could possibly make up [for the lack of US aid to Ukraine] that is needed to support the Kiev regime is by stealing all of Russia's frozen assets, possibly tanking the Euro and crashing the EU's reputation as a reputable place to store currency reserves for transactions," Mark Sleboda said. 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‘Losing a War is No Fun’: West Ignores Their ‘Biggest Political Disaster’

Russia’s economy has survived Western sanctions “far better” than predicted, recent reports show. Meanwhile, the European Union’s (EU) economy has been suffering drastically, causing working class voters to turn against aid for Ukraine.

The Greenville Post published an [article](#) on Tuesday which claims the European Union has become the site of the 21st century’s “biggest political disaster”. The article writes that Paris, France—which once saw leftist planning agendas filled with “protests, gatherings and strikes”---now seems to be a city where there is little talk of the “economic, political and confidence collapse” of the biggest economic bloc in the world.

Daniel Lazare, an independent investigative journalist and author, sat down with [Sputnik's The Critical Hour](#) on Tuesday and discussed the recent piece.

"Well, I think Europe is losing the war," said Lazare. "And losing a war is no fun. The situation in Ukraine is going very poorly. Russia clearly is winning, its economy is doing very well. The European economy, by contrast, is stalling. And if [Russia does make progress in the war](#), if the Ukraine government breaks in some way, then the results for Europe will be devastating."

"I mean, this is not a faraway war for [the EU]. It's a faraway war for America. But it's a war on the doorstep of the EU. And the prospect of a Ukrainian collapse would cause panic in Poland, but also in Berlin and Paris, and [Macron has been making crazy noises](#) about sending troops to Ukraine, which is completely nuts. But then again, the guy is desperate and doesn't know quite how to respond. And, the same kind of desperation is evident in other capitals as well," he added.

Sputnik's Garland Nixon noted that European governments have not done a "good job" of trying to convince their public that they have to suffer and sacrifice for the "democracy of the neo-Nazis".

"The US is also quite confident that, as you said, the ruble will be turned to rubble, the Russian economy would be smashed, that they'd be, you know, they'd be closed out of the energy market and would be crying for mercy very soon," said Lazare of the West's attacks on Russia's economy. "But that didn't happen. [Quite the reverse](#). Russia was able to find outlets for its oil and gas. It developed markets with China and other nations. The US has wound up shooting itself in the foot. And the amazing thing is that this keeps happening again and again."

Sputnik's Wilmer Leon added that the reason French President Emmanuel Macron and German Chancellor Olaf Scholz don't want to address the collapse of their biggest economic bloc in the world is because it was done at the "behest of the United States".

"The US really engineered this war," said Lazare. "I don't want to let France and Britain off the hook because they were solidly behind US efforts, but this is an American-led effort which really installed a nationalist government in Kiev, which was itching for a fight with Russia, which got one and then, followed by a full scale military invasion in February 2022."

"The US thought it would win that war easily," he continued. "But now the war is going very poorly. And it turns out that the US really had a very poor idea of what it was getting into. Now, the problem is that the US will not suffer the consequences anywhere near to the degree the Europeans will."

"So, it's a case that they followed the US, they tag along happily behind it, and now they've got to pay the price for their own behavior. It's crazy, and I do agree that there's going to be a reckoning."

The EU's working class is growing increasingly opposed to conflict with Russia as their economy suffers from Western imposed sanctions which saw them lose access to cheap and reliable Russian energy. The economic growth forecast for Germany, for instance, was cut down to 0.2% in 2024 from a previous projection of 1.3%, according to a recent [report](#). Robert Habeck, Germany's Vice-Chancellor, has said the country is performing "dramatically bad."

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Progressive Democrats to Boycott Netanyahu's Potential Address to Congress - Reports

WASHINGTON, March 22 (Sputnik) – Israeli Prime Minister Benjamin Netanyahu will face a boycott from progressive members of the Democratic Party on the Capitol Hill should he accept an invitation to address Congress, Axios reported on Friday.

US House Speaker Mike Johnson said on Thursday that an invitation will be extended to Netanyahu to address Congress. It came soon after US Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer called for new elections in Israel and said that Netanyahu's government no longer fits Israel's needs. Schumer stated that the United States must bolster its efforts to work actively for peace if Netanyahu remains in power after the conflict.

Democratic Congressman from New York Jamaal Bowman told Axios that his constituents are "pissed" at the Israeli war on Gaza.

"I'm not going," he said, referring to Netanyahu's possible address.

Another House Democrat, Maxwell Frost from Florida, said that he is going to skip Netanyahu's speech. He called the Israeli prime minister a "bad person."

Several other congressional Democrats have also confirmed that they plan to boycott the event because of Israel's "conduct during the war." They expressed concerns that the country now has "the most extreme government" in its history, according to the report.

Last October, Hamas launched a large-scale rocket attack against Israel from the Gaza Strip and breached the border, killing 1,200 people and abducting around 240 others. Israel launched retaliatory strikes, ordered a complete blockade of Gaza, and started a ground incursion into the Palestinian enclave with the declared goal of eliminating Hamas fighters and rescuing the hostages. Almost 32,000 people have been killed so far in the Gaza Strip, local authorities said.

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Russia Will Not Allow Resolutions on Gaza That Do Not Call For Ceasefire - Envoy

UNITED NATIONS, March 22 (Sputnik) - Russia will not tolerate another 'pointless' resolution on Gaza which does not call for real ceasefire, Russian Ambassador to the UN Vassily Nebenzia said on Friday ahead of a Security Council vote on a US-drafted resolution on Gaza.

"We have already stated that we will no longer tolerate pointless resolutions which do not contain a call for a ceasefire and which lead us to nowhere," Nebenzia said, adding that US-led negotiations on the draft were aimed at "dragging out the time."

Russia and China vetoed the US-drafted resolution, which stopped short of calling for a ceasefire in Gaza, a Sputnik correspondent reported. Algeria also voted against the draft.

Nebenzia said if the resolution were to be adopted, it would close the door on discussions about the need for a ceasefire in Gaza and free the hands of Israel, forcing the people of Gaza to face destruction, devastation or expulsion.

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Russia, China Veto US-Drafted Resolution That Stops Short of Demanding Ceasefire in Gaza

UNITED NATIONS, March 22 (Sputnik) - Russia and China on Friday blocked a US-drafted UN Security Council resolution that stopped short of calling for a ceasefire in Gaza, a Sputnik correspondent reported.

Eleven UNSC members voted in favor, three against and one abstained.

The draft "determines the imperative of an immediate and sustained ceasefire" but falls short of demanding it.

It also "unequivocally supports ongoing international diplomatic efforts" to secure a ceasefire in connection with the release of all remaining hostages. In addition, it condemns "all acts of terrorism, including the Hamas-led attacks of October 7, 2023."

Russia criticized the draft for its failure to clearly call for a ceasefire in Gaza. The document contains "all the past distortions and unacceptable one-sided 'condemnations'," representing "standard American deception," the Russian mission to the UN said on Thursday.

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Texas Governor Says State Will Arrest Migrants Involved in El Paso Border Surge Thursday

EL PASO, March 22 (Sputnik) - Texas Governor Greg Abbott said in a statement that state authorities will arrest every illegal migrant involved in an illegal breach of the border on Thursday.

"About the surge of illegal immigrants in El Paso: The TX National Guard & Dept. of Public Safety [DPS] quickly regained control & are redoubling the razor wire barriers," Abbott said on Thursday. "DPS is instructed to arrest every illegal immigrant involved for criminal trespass & destruction of property."

Earlier in the day, a New York Post correspondent captured video showing hundreds of illegal migrants breaching a border barrier and pushing past several Texas National Guard troops in the US southern border town of El Paso, Texas.

The migrants broke through concertina fencing state authorities installed along the border and rushed towards the main border wall, which was sealed off and guarded by several other national guardsmen, media footage showed.

Abbott's directive comes amid a controversial court battle between Texas and the Biden administration over a state law known as SB4, which provides the state authority to arrest and prosecute migrants suspected of entering the United States illegally from the US southern border and return them to Mexico regardless of their country of origin.

The US Supreme Court temporarily granted the state of Texas authority to execute SB4 earlier this week but hours later a federal appeals court froze the law.

House Republicans have been advocating for the Biden administration to impose meaningful border policy changes that will deter the record surge of migrants that have overrun the southern border over the last three years under President Joe Biden.

Republicans want Biden to use executive action to deal with the border crisis instead of trying to work something out in Congress, which is currently at an impasse on border policy due to partisan differences.

US Appeals Court Orders Probe Of Potential Jury Bias in Boston Marathon Bomber Case

WASHINGTON, March 22 (Sputnik) - A district court in the United States must determine whether there was jury bias in a criminal case involving Boston Marathon bomber Dzhokhar Tsarnaev before finalizing his execution, the US First Circuit Court of Appeals said in a ruling. "When Tsarnaev presented the district court with plausible claims of juror bias, the court was obliged to investigate those claims. And we conclude that the district court's investigation fell short of what was constitutionally required... we remand this case to the district court to determine whether either juror should have been stricken for cause on account of bias," the ruling, filed Thursday, said.

If the district court finds that any juror should have been stricken on account of bias, Tsarnaev will be entitled to a new penalty-phase proceeding in the case against him, the ruling said. The court noted that the only question is whether Tsarnaev will face execution for his crimes, and that he will, regardless of the outcome of the probe, spend the rest of his life in prison.

In April 2013, Dzhokhar Tsarnaev and his brother Tamerlan Tsarnaev bombed the Boston Marathon, killing three people and injuring hundreds of others. Tamerlan was killed by police while on the run, while Dzhokhar was arrested the following day and sentenced to death by lethal injection in May 2015.

#### US Imposes Sanctions on Nicaragua's Attorney General - Treasury Dept.

WASHINGTON, March 22 (Sputnik) - The United States has imposed sanctions on Nicaragua's Attorney General Wendy Carolina Morales Urbina, the US Treasury Department Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) said in a statement on Thursday.

"Today, the Department of the Treasury's Office of Foreign Assets Control (OFAC) sanctioned Wendy Carolina Morales Urbina, Nicaragua's Attorney General, for being complicit in the Ortega-Murillo regime's oppression," the statement said.

The US authorities stressed that Morales Urbina is responsible for confiscating real property formerly belonging to independent media outlets, international organizations, and political prisoners.

"Morales Urbina has also seized property from thousands of non-governmental organizations under law explicitly to suppress freedom of association. Morales Urbina carried out the dispossession of all properties of the 222 political prisoners who were banished from Nicaragua," the statement added.

The US Treasury pointed out Nicaragua's Attorney General became a key figure who was formulating the strategy to designate Nicaraguan opposition members as terrorists. She used an existing anti-terrorism law to block their financial resources, according to the statement.

"The Attorney General of Nicaragua, in concert with the Ortega-Murillo regime [Nicaragua's President Daniel Ortega and Vice President Rosario Murillo], has exploited her office to facilitate a coordinated campaign to suppress dissent by seizing property from government political opponents without a legal basis," Under Secretary of the Treasury Brian Nelson said.

The US reminded that anti-government protests erupted in Nicaragua in 2018. However, the authorities suppressed demonstrations and incarcerated political activists, the statement added.

#### Wall Street Extends Record Highs, Looking Beyond Apple Lawsuit

NEW YORK, March 22 (Sputnik) - US stocks hit record highs for a second day in a row as Wall Street looked beyond a sweeping lawsuit against Apple and focused instead on prospective interest rate cuts that could fatten corporate profits.

The New York Stock Exchange's S&P 500 index, which tracks stocks of the top 500 US companies, hit on Thursday an all-time high of 5,261 before closing at 5,241 - up 17 points, or 0.3%, on the day.

The Dow Jones Industrial Average, Wall Street's broadest equities indicator that tracks the

stocks of 30 large US corporations, touched a record high of 39,889. The Dow settled at 39,781, up 269 points, or 0.7%.

The technology-laden Nasdaq Composite Index, which comprises marquee tech names such as Google, Amazon, Apple, and Netflix, hit an all-time peak of 16,539. It finished at 16,401, up 32 points, or 0.2%.

Tech stocks rallied with the broader market despite the Apple lawsuit, where the US Justice Department accused the iconic iPhone maker of carving a monopoly for itself from an operating system that created "astronomical valuation" at the expense of rival phone makers, consumers and software developers.

Apple vowed to vigorously defend against the court action, which it said was wrong on the facts and the law. A company spokesman added that the lawsuit threatens the principles that set Apple products apart in fiercely competitive markets.

Analysts said that should Apple be broken up by the government under the suit, it could be the biggest blow against a tech giant since the late 1990s action against Microsoft, which was forced to unbundle the Internet Explorer browser from its Windows operating system.

Even so, many did not seem too perturbed by the threat hanging over Apple, saying it would be years before a judgment was reached.

"We do not expect any business model changes for now, but Apple clearly is going to have to find a way to eventually settle this case, pay a hefty fine, and ultimately find some compromise with developers on the App Store structure down the road," analysts at Wedbush said.

Apple's stock closed down \$7.30, or 4% on the day, at \$171.37.

The broader market focused on the likelihood of three US interest rate cuts this year despite the Federal Reserve not committing to any timing on these.

Policy-makers at the Fed projected on Wednesday a 75-basis point cut for each 2024 and 2025. Typically, the central bank makes 25-basis point revisions at a time, meaning there could be as many three cuts for each year.

The projection on cuts came after the Fed left rates unchanged for March in a range of 5.25%-5.5%. It was the fifth time the central bank had paused on rates since July, citing uncertainties over inflation.

"We're likely to cut rates at some point this year," Fed Chairman Jerome Powell told reporters after the decision. But he also said the central bank needs "greater confidence that inflation is moving sustainably down" and there remains "tremendous uncertainty about that."

The US Consumer Price Index, a key gauge for inflation, grew 3.2% in the year to February, remaining stubbornly above the Fed's long-term annual 2% target that could expedite a cut.

Voting on Second UNSC Resolution on Gaza May Take Place on Friday - UN Diplomat

UNITED NATIONS, March 22 (Sputnik) - Another vote on a draft resolution calling for a ceasefire in Gaza by the UN Security Council could happen on Friday, if the American draft is not adopted, French Ambassador to the UN Nicolas de Riviere told reporters.

At the moment, there are two draft resolutions in the UN Security Council - one from the US and one from the ten non-permanent members of the Security Council.

The draft from the non-permanent members of the Security Council "demands an immediate ceasefire for the month of Ramadan, respected by all parties, which would lead to a permanent ceasefire."

Meanwhile, the US document does not contain a direct demand for a ceasefire. It said the Security Council "identifies the urgent need for an immediate and sustainable ceasefire... and unequivocally supports ongoing international diplomatic efforts to achieve such a ceasefire in conjunction with the release of the remaining hostages."

"We will probably vote tomorrow morning on the US draft. And then there are two options - either the American text is adopted. If the text is not adopted, then the draft of elected members will be put to a vote, and I hope it will be adopted," de Riviere said.

Following the French ambassador's remarks, the first deputy permanent representative of the Russian Federation to the UN, Dmitry Polyansky, made it clear to journalists that Russia was not satisfied with the current wording of the American project.

"We will not be satisfied with any language that does not call for an immediate ceasefire. Nobody is satisfied with that. 'Identifies urgent need' is not a call for an immediate ceasefire," he said.

Earlier, Blinken, during a visit to Saudi Arabia, said that the US draft resolution calls for an immediate ceasefire related to the release of the hostages. Polyansky noted that Russia would prefer wording that the Security Council demands a ceasefire, or at least calls for one.

#### Resupply Mission to Space Station Successfully Launched From Cape Canaveral - SpaceX

WASHINGTON, March 22 (Sputnik) - The latest unmanned cargo resupply mission to the International Space Station was successfully launched on schedule from Cape Canaveral in Florida, SpaceX announced in a press release.

The Dragon Spacecraft was successfully launched on a reusable Falcon 9 booster carrying the 30th Commercial Resupply Services (CRS-30) from Space Complex 40 (SLC-40) at Cape Canaveral Space Force Station at Florida at 4:55 p.m. EDT, SpaceX said on Thursday.

CRS-30 marked the sixth flight of the Falcon 9 first stage booster that previously launched the Ax-2, European Space Agency Euclid, Ax-3 and two Starlink multiple communications satellite missions, SpaceX said.

The first stage booster successfully landed back in its landing zone 1 at Cape Canaveral Space Force Station, SpaceX said.

The mission is carrying three tons of supplies and equipment to the ISS crew including citrus, apples and cherry tomatoes and two coffee kits, SpaceX added.

Pentagon Says Can't Confirm Reports of Russia Using Satellite Images From US Companies

According to the report, the two biggest US companies that provide satellite imaging services are Maxar and Planet. The latter reportedly stated that it "did not find evidence of misuse or abuse" by Russia and Maxar declined to provide any comments.

Ukraine has reportedly used Maxar services on many occasions, including to get detailed satellite images before conducting terrorist attacks on the Crimean Bridge in 2023, damaging the roadway and killing civilians.

### CHINA-RUSSIA COOPERATION

\* Russia and China have the necessary potential to overcome all arising difficulties on the path of trade and economic cooperation, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said on Thursday.

\* The European Union and the United States continue to exert unprecedented pressure on China, but this cannot become an obstacle to the development of trade and economic relations between Moscow and Beijing, Peskov said.

\* Russia and China have reached an agreement with the Houthis in Yemen that their ships can sail through the Red Sea and the Gulf of Aden without being attacked, Bloomberg reported.

### PUTIN-SISI TALKS

\* Russian President Vladimir Putin and Egyptian President Abdel Fattah Sisi discussed by telephone the situation in Ukraine and in the zone of the Israeli-Palestinian conflict, the Kremlin

said on Thursday.

\* Sisi congratulated Putin on his victory in the presidential election, the Office of the Egyptian President said.

#### CONFLICT IN UKRAINE

\* Russian air defense systems have destroyed three Ukrainian aircraft-type drones over the territory of Crimea, the Russian Defense Ministry said.

\* The dispatch of foreign military personnel to Ukraine is fraught with negative consequences, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said.

\* The Russian armed forces continue to prevent the penetration of sabotage and reconnaissance groups of Ukraine in the border regions of Ukraine in the Belgorod direction, the Russian Defense Ministry said.

\* The Russian aerospace forces launched a missile strike on the decision-making centers of the Ukrainian troops, including with hypersonic Kinzhal missiles, the Russian Defense Ministry said.

\* Income from Russian assets does not belong to anyone, so it can be used for military assistance to Ukraine, German Chancellor Olaf Scholz said.

\* Russia will use all judicial mechanisms and will choose other methods to respond to the European Union to prevent the bloc from using Russian frozen assets to help Ukraine, Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said.

## US House Minority Leader Says Lawmakers Must Vote on Ukraine Aid Before Break

There is a possibility that the situation in Ukraine could dramatically change for the worse by the time lawmakers return after a two-and-a half-week break, Jeffries said.

## Yellen Says US 'Strict' On Iran Oil, While Dozens of Tankers Reportedly Escape Sanctions

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The United States remains "strict" with sanctions on Iran, Treasury Secretary Janet Yellen said Thursday, dismissing any knowledge of the Islamic republic exporting its oil freely despite reports that billions of dollars worth of crude was being carried out of the country by dozens of tankers.

"We have very strict sanctions on Iran and I'm not aware of anything that we do that is compromising in terms of Iranian oil exports," Yellen told US senators hearing her testimony on the nation's 2025 budget.

The Times reported last month that at least 27 tankers have transported oil from Iran over the past year and used liability insurance obtained from the New York-based American Club.

US authorities could have disrupted the shipments by advising the insurer to revoke coverage for the tankers, the Times noted.

Yet, the tankers were allowed to proceed, making at least 59 trips since 2023, said the paper, which even published publicly available satellite images of the vessels and their timelines of travel.

The revelations, if true, would be particularly embarrassing for the Biden administration, which

for months hailed its efforts to restrict Iran's oil revenue and ability to fund proxy militias while rebels sympathetic to Tehran's cause attacked US forces and allies in the Middle East.

Since last year, Yellen has been telling Congress that her Treasury teams were "doing everything that they possibly can to crack down" on illegal Iranian oil.

The Treasury secretary looked annoyed on Thursday when a Republican senator questioned her about the Times story.

"I'd be happy to look at it," she replied, maintaining, however, that Biden was "very focused on trying to impose the strictest possible enforcement" against Iran.

She also refuted suggestions that Iran had been given a pass to export oil in a similar way to Venezuela.

Since October, Biden officials have allowed Venezuela to bypass sanctions on its energy after the government in Caracas signed with the opposition the Barbados Accord, which included a roadmap toward holding competitive elections. That accord is supposed to expire in April.

#### Hundreds of Migrants Rush Border Barrier in Texas Border Town - Reports

EL PASO, March 21 (Sputnik) - Hundreds of illegal migrants broke through a border barrier and pushed past several Texas National Guard troops in the US southern border town of El Paso, Texas, on Thursday, according to media footage from a New York Post correspondent.

According to the New York Post, the Texas National Guard has pushed the migrants back to Mexico following the breach.

Republicans want Biden to use executive action to deal with the border crisis instead of trying to work something out in Congress, which is currently at an impasse on border policy due to partisan differences.

#### Kiev Now Has to Make Decisions to Leave Some Areas to Fortify Defensive Lines - Pentagon

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - Kiev is currently having to make strategic decisions about pulling out of some areas in order to strengthen their defensive lines in the conflict with Russia, Deputy Pentagon Press Secretary Sabrina Singh said on Thursday.

### 2001 Memo From US Embassy in Moscow Details Reasons for Putin's Popularity - Archive

The US concluded that Russian President Vladimir Putin's popularity in the early days of his presidency was due to his ability to maintain economic stability and renew respect for the Kremlin, according to a January 2001 memo from the US Embassy in Moscow to the Secretary of State.

"While many of our contacts question just how much Putin's popularity rests on substance, they agree that he has adroitly focused on the bread-and-butter issue of paying pensions and salaries, as well as restoring the strength of and respect for Russia's leadership," the memo said.

The memo was published in The George Washington University National Security Archive. Putin's popularity was in part based on his direct rapport with average Russians, the memo said, citing embassy contacts. Russian public opinion experts told US officials that Putin's popularity also reflected a "very weak" crop of contenders on the national political scene in Russia, the memo said.

Putin's poll numbers tended to be weakest in the major urban centers of Russia, such as Moscow and Saint Petersburg, the memo said. However, support for Putin was strong enough overall to withstand possible economic problems, the memo said.

"It is clear, both from polling data and anecdotal evidence, that many Russians want a break after 15 years of turmoil... In that light, they understandably place a high premium on political stability and economic security. On that count, Putin and Co. are ready and willing to deliver," the memo said.

The 2024 Russian presidential election was held from March 15-17. Putin won the election as

the incumbent candidate with 87.28% of the vote.

Cairo hosted Blinken, as well as five Arab diplomats, earlier in the day.

Blinken arrived in Egypt on Thursday for his ongoing Middle East trip. While in Cairo, he is also scheduled to meet with the foreign ministers of Egypt, Jordan, Saudi Arabia, the United Arab Emirates, and Qatar.

Last October, the Palestinian movement Hamas launched a large-scale rocket attack against Israel from the Gaza Strip and breached the border, killing 1,200 people and abducting around 240 others. Israel launched retaliatory strikes, ordered a complete blockade of Gaza, and started a ground incursion into the Palestinian enclave with the declared goal of eliminating Hamas fighters and rescuing the hostages. Over 31,900 people have been killed so far in the Gaza Strip, local authorities said.

### US Ship With Materials for Temporary Pier for Gaza Aid Departs Homeport - Pentagon

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - A US ship with essential materials for constructing a temporary pier to support the delivery of humanitarian aid to the Gaza Strip departed from its homeport in the US state of Virginia, the Defense Department said on Thursday.

"The Bob Hope-class MV Roy P. Benavidez (T-AKR 306), a large, medium speed roll-on, roll-off ship, departed its pier in Newport News, Virginia, March 21, carrying heavy equipment and material needed to construct a temporary pier to support the flow of multinational humanitarian aid into Gaza," the Defense Department said in a statement.

The ship is transporting components for a floating modular pier system, which will be delivered to the US Army's 7th Transportation Brigade, who is tasked to construct the temporary pier in the Mediterranean, the statement added.

"MV Roy P. Benavidez is crewed by contracted merchant mariners and is dry cargo surge sealift carrier capable of transporting up to 380,000 square feet of containerized cargo and rolling stock between developed ports," the statement also said.

The United States started humanitarian airdrops into Gaza in early March amid Israel's efforts to effectively slow down or block the supply of food, water and other necessities to the Palestinians in the enclave. A significant number of Palestinians are experiencing famine and starvation in Gaza, according to international organizations.

US President Joe Biden, however, said the volume of humanitarian supplies to Gaza was insufficient and vowed to build a temporary port to deliver more aid.

Aid will be first supplied to a floating pier and then delivered to shore by small vessels, according to the Defense Department.

### UPDATE - Russia to Hold UNSC Meeting About Sanctions Impact on Fight Against Terrorism - Nebenzia

UNITED NATIONS, March 21 (Sputnik) - Russia will organize early next week an informal UN

Security Council meeting to discuss the impact that unilateral sanctions have on the ability of countries to combat terrorism, Russian Ambassador to the United Nations Vassily Nebenzia said on Thursday.

"On Monday, the 25th of March, we will be holding an informal Security Council Arria formula meeting on the subject of their [sanctions] impact on the ability of states to combat terrorism and we invite all members of the Security Council and other interested countries to participate," Nebenzia said.

The Russian ambassador made the comment during a UN Security Council meeting on Syria. Nebenzia reiterated Russia's long-held position that it disagrees with sanctions being imposed on Syria.

Syria has been under sanctions from the United States, the European Union and a number of other states since the start of the conflict in that country in 2011. In 2020, the Caesar Act expanded US sanctions against Syria.

The Caesar Act is designed to deter support for reconstruction efforts by the Syrian government. It imposes sanctions on anyone who provides funding or assistance to the Syrian government and the country's central bank. The legislation imposes sanctions on those providing aircraft or spare parts to Syrian airlines or who are involved with government-controlled construction and engineering projects.

In February 2024, the US House passed the Assad Regime Anti-Normalization Act. If passed by the Senate and signed into law by the president, the bill would extend the existing authorities under the Caesar Act through December 31, 2032, and expand sanctions on those providing financial and technological support to Syrian groups and enterprises.

All NASA Science Discovery Missions to Bust \$500Mln Spending Caps - US Congressman

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - All of NASA's currently approved and developing science discovery missions are going to be far more expensive than the agency promised when they were approved and all of them will break through the \$500 million per project spending cap that Congress has mandated, US House Space and Aeronautics Subcommittee Chairman Brian Babin said.

"None of the Discovery class missions are under the \$500 million spending cap," Babin said in a congressional hearing on Thursday.

Congress has a responsibility to weigh the cost of a mission with its scientific value and cannot

simply rationalize cost overruns and schedule delays by stating the end result of these missions will be worthwhile, he said.

"That is unacceptable to our constituents and should be unacceptable to us all," Babin said. Former Goddard Space Flight Center Director and former Martin Marietta President and CEO A. Thomas Young confirmed Babin's statement. "That will happen," Babin added.

#### Idaho Police Say Searching for 'Armed and Dangerous' Men Involved in Attack on Officers

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - Law enforcement authorities in the state of Idaho are searching for two men involved in an attack on corrections officers as part of an effort to free one of the men from custody, the Boise Police Department (BPD) said in a statement.

"Boise Police detectives have identified the man suspected of being involved in the overnight shooting of IDOC [Idaho Department of Correction] officers as Nicholas Umphenour," the statement said on Wednesday. "Officers continue to warn that the suspect, Nicholas Umphenour, and the escaped inmate, Skylar Meade, are considered armed and dangerous, so if you come in contact with them, do not approach."

Earlier on Wednesday, Umphenour allegedly struck two IDOC officers with gunfire when they were transporting Meade from medical treatment back to custody, after which the duo fled the scene.

Three IDOC officers were injured in the incident: one shot by the suspect who is in critical but stable condition, another shot by the suspect who has serious but non-life-threatening injuries and a third who received non-life-threatening injuries during gunfire from a responding BPD officer, the statement said.

Umphenour and Meade fled in a gray 2020 Honda Civic with license plate 2TDF43U, the statement said.

Police continue to investigate the case, the statement added.

#### NASA 'Culture of Optimism' Causes Huge Delays, Costs in Science Programs - Congressman

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - NASA's science discovery missions are repeatedly many years behind schedule and cost vastly more than their originally projected and promised costs because the US space agency suffers from an excessively unrealistic can-do mindset and culture of optimism, US House Space and Aeronautics Subcommittee Chairman Brian Babin said on Thursday.

"We cannot ignore this now-familiar pattern of schedule and cost overruns for many NASA programs," Babin said in a statement. "When missions are delayed, costs increase as a result." Ripple effects then reverberate throughout NASA for many years as timelines shift and unrelated programs are delayed or canceled to accommodate the troubled project, Babin said. "Just three weeks ago, NASA's Office of Inspector General released an audit of the Mars

Sample Return mission - commonly known as MSR - that NASA hopes to launch in partnership with the European Space Agency before the end of the decade. Anyone who has read prior reports on NASA's science missions from the Inspector General, GAO, or other independent review bodies will see familiar themes in this audit," Babin said.

Project management challenges, including over-optimism on technology development, evolving architectural requirements, and underestimating costs, were all familiar themes from previously long-delayed and enormously expensive NASA projects that were once again identified in the new report, Babin also said.

Even the eventually successful James Webb Space Telescope now operating a million miles from Earth had been plagued by years of delays and billions of dollars in cost overruns, Babin added.

#### Chinese President to Meet With US Executives in Beijing to Woo American Firms - Reports

#### US Hails UNGA's Adoption of Resolution That Puts 'Guardrails' on Artificial Intelligence

#### US Concerned About Tanker Emergency Capacity in Indo-Pacific - Commander

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The US Indo-Pacific Command expressed concern on Thursday about its ability to deliver enough KC-46 tankers to the Indo-Pacific theater if there was a crisis.

"I'm confident it's the right tanker to fill our holes, but I am concerned about the magnitude and our ability to deliver enough tankers in this theater in time of crisis," Admiral John Aquilino, commander of the US Indo-Pacific Command, testified at a US Senate Armed Services Committee hearing.

Aquilino also said that he was "absolutely concerned" about the increasing gap in fighter capacity with China, with the US Air Force planning to divest twenty-six F-15 Strike Eagle jets and buying fewer than expected F-35, F-15EX and other fighter jets in its fiscal year 2025 budget.

Additionally, Aquilino said the \$3.3 billion budget request for military construction in the Indo-Pacific was "absolutely" key to deterring China. It covers 212 projects across the region for infrastructure projects such as runways, seaports, and munitions storage.

#### UPDATE - US Justice Department Sues iPhone Maker Apple for Creating 'Smartphone Monopoly'

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The US Department of Justice filed a lawsuit on Thursday against Apple, accusing the iconic iPhone maker of carving a monopoly from its operating system that created "astronomical valuation" for itself at the expense of rivals, consumers and software developers.

"Each step in Apple's course of conduct built and reinforced the moat around its smartphone monopoly," one of the Justice Department's contentions in the suit said.

The iPhone has created a stranglehold for Apple both in terms of competition and fortune. The company captured the top seven positions in the global list of best-selling smartphones in 2023, with a 64% US market share alone in the final quarter of last year versus 18% for Samsung, data from Counterpoint Research showed.

On the New York Stock Exchange, Apple's market capitalization of \$2.679 trillion makes it the world's second most valuable company.

The Justice Department's suit took aim at this dominance, with Attorney General Merrick Garland saying the free and fair markets the American economy was built on were being threatened by Apple and other giants violating US antitrust laws. "They stifle innovation, hurt producers & workers & increase costs for consumers," Garland said in a press conference. "If left unchallenged, Apple will only continue to strengthen its smartphone monopoly."

Apple isn't the only technology giant facing government scrutiny. The Justice Department has also been fighting an antitrust case against Google since 2020 over that company's dominance in web search and advertising business. The US government's most famous battle against the tech sector remains its suit against Microsoft in the 1990s, when it forced the firm to unbundle its Internet Explorer browser from the Windows operating system.

The suit against Apple, filed in the District of New Jersey, was supported by 16 attorneys general who said the company's anti-competitive practices extended beyond the iPhone and Apple Watch, into its advertising, browser, FaceTime and news offerings.

The Justice Department alleged that in order to keep consumers buying its iPhones, Apple blocked cross-platform messaging apps, limited third-party wallet and smartwatch compatibility and disrupted non-App Store programs and cloud-streaming services.

"For years, Apple responded to competitive threats by imposing a series of 'Whac-A-Mole' contractual rules and restrictions that have allowed Apple to extract higher prices from consumers, impose higher fees on developers and creators, and to throttle competitive alternatives from rival technologies," Assistant Attorney General Jonathan Kanter said in a statement illuminating the government's case.

Users say Apple has made messaging from Android to iPhones difficult and shut down applications created by developers to circumvent such complications.

The Justice Department suit highlighted comments from Apple CEO Tim Cook that mocked people who tried to get around the iPhone using other devices.

"Not to make it personal but I can't send my mom certain videos," one user told Cook, referring to a 2022 interview at a media event.

"Buy your mom an iPhone," the CEO responded.

The sweeping action against Apple, the biggest in its near five-decade history since being co-founded in 1976 by technology revolutionary Steve Jobs, could shake up the IT industry as a whole, analysts say.

Aside from being a significant risk to its walled-garden business model, the company fears that complying with regulations would not just cost it money but also prevent it from introducing new products or services, ultimately hurting customer demand.

Apple is facing action in Europe too. It was fined \$2 billion in the EU over a dispute with music service Spotify. It is also being probed by the European Commission over whether it is complying with a new Digital Markets Act that forces Apple to open up the iPhone app store to rivals such as Microsoft or Epic Games. Apple plans to charge major rivals that eschew its app store 50 cents per download.

## State Department Says US May Double LNG Capacity By 2030

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) – The US may more than double its liquid natural gas (LNG) capacity by 2030, Under Secretary of State Jose Fernandez said on Thursday.

“We have right now projects that will increase our capacity to 26 billion cubic feet per day by 2030,” Fernandez said during a hearing at the House Foreign Affairs Committee.

He pointed out that LNG accounts for almost one-third of US gas exports. “Today, we export 12 billion cubic feet per day,” he said, adding that this level may grow up to 14 billion cubic feet per day.

Fernandez also expressed confidence that LNG projects are not being affected by the decision of the Biden administration to stop permitting the exports of LNG to other countries.

In January, the Biden administration paused the approval of new LNG exports, pending an Energy Department review of the underlying analyses used for authorizations. US Energy Secretary Jennifer Granholm said later that this will not impact the United States’ relationships with allies.

However, US Senator Dan Sullivan said this week that American allies in Europe expressed major concerns over the matter on the margins of the Munich Security Conference last month.

## CENTCOM Commander Says 5 US Citizens Left Alive in Hamas’ Captivity

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - Hamas still holds hostage five US citizens following the announcement last week of the death of a US and Israeli citizen, Central Command chief Gen. Michael Kurilla said in a congressional testimony on Thursday.

“It’s five Americans that are left alive right now with the death of one announced two weeks ago,” Kurilla told the US House Armed Services Committee hearing.

On March 12, Israel announced that US and Israeli citizen Itay Chen, who was thought to have been held hostage by Hamas, was killed during the Palestinian organization’s attack on Israel on October 7.

On that day, Hamas attacked Israel from Gaza and killed more than 1,100 Israelis - military personnel and civilians - and abducted 240 others. Israel imposed a complete blockage of Gaza, launched massive strikes and then a ground invasion of the Palestinian enclave with the declared goal of eliminating Hamas and rescuing the hostages.

Some 32,000 Palestinians have been killed during Israel’s operations and more than 76,000 have been wounded. Nearly 1.9 million residents of Gaza out of the 2.3 million have been displaced and a significant number are facing hunger and starvation, according to the local authorities and international organizations.

On November 24, Qatar mediated a deal between Israel and Hamas on a temporary truce and the exchange of some of the prisoners and hostages, as well as the delivery of humanitarian aid into the Gaza Strip. The ceasefire was extended several times and expired on December 1. More than 100 hostages are still believed to be held by Hamas in Gaza.

### CENTCOM Commander Says He Does Not Recommend US Troop Withdrawal From Iraq

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) – US Central Command chief Gen. Michael Kurilla said in congressional testimony on Thursday that he would not recommend to US President Joe Biden to withdraw American troops from Iraq until it can handle the existing regional threats by itself.

"I would not until the conditions are met that Iraq can handle that fight by themselves," Kurilla told a House Armed Services Committee hearing.

US Assistant Secretary of Defense for International Security Affairs Celeste Wallander agreed with Kurilla's statement on the issue during the hearing.

In January, US Secretary of Defense Lloyd Austin announced that the United States and Iraq

had agreed to launch working group meetings to discuss the future of the US-led international coalition and its military presence in the country. The Department of Defense, however, said that launching the commission did not mean the start of negotiations between the two countries about the eventual withdrawal of US forces from Iraq.

The Iraqi prime minister told the Wall Street Journal in mid-January there was no need for the presence of the US-led coalition in Iraq anymore to fight the Islamic State (ISIS, a terrorist group banned in Russia), adding he was no longer worried that the departure of the coalition forces would undermine Iraq's military capabilities.

US Gaza Resolution 'Standard American Deception,' No Call for Ceasefire - Russian Mission

UNITED NATIONS, March 21 (Sputnik) - A new US draft UN Security Council resolution contains no call for a ceasefire in Gaza and represents "standard American deception," Russian deputy ambassador to the UN Dmitry Polyanskiy said on Thursday.

"I want to clarify: this is standard American deception. First, the draft is still the same, with all the past distortions and unacceptable one-sided 'condemnations,' of which there are many. Second, it did not and does not contain any call for a ceasefire. Only a philosophical phrase about its importance has appeared, and even then in connection with the release of the hostages," Polyanskiy wrote on Telegram.

The draft resolution actually gives a green light to Israel's military operation in Rafah, Polyanskiy said.

The new US draft resolution "determines the imperative of an immediate and sustained ceasefire to protect civilians on all sides, allow for the delivery of essential humanitarian assistance and alleviate humanitarian suffering, and towards that end unequivocally supports ongoing international diplomatic efforts to secure such a ceasefire in connection with the release of all remaining hostages," according to the text seen by Sputnik.

Since the onset of the Israel-Hamas conflict last October, the United States has blocked several resolutions calling for an immediate ceasefire in Gaza.

Russia Seeking Port Facility in Sudan Goes Against US Global Plans – AFRICOM Commander

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) – Russia is seeking to have a port facility in Sudan and that goes against US global campaign plans and is a concern for Washington, African Command

(AFRICOM) Commander Gen. Michael Langley said in congressional testimony on Thursday. "I'm talking about the Russian Federation. They would love a warm water port. They'd love to have the port. They are in Sudan as their own. That's against our global campaign plans. I can talk with a higher level of specificity in closed session, but that is a concern," Langley told a House Armed Services Committee hearing.

In 2020, Russia and Sudan signed an agreement that will allow Moscow to locate its naval base in Port Sudan for 25 years. However, to date, Sudan has not ratified the agreement amid a political and security crisis in the country that started in 2023.

In April 2023, clashes broke out between the Sudanese army and the Rapid Support Forces paramilitary group. The parties to the conflict have since introduced several temporary nationwide ceasefires, but none has helped settle the conflict. In late October, the parties to the conflict resumed negotiations, mediated by Saudi Arabia in Jeddah, but the hostilities have continued.

US Senator Says Requesting More Time for Lawmakers to Consider \$1.2 Trillion Funding Bill

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - US Senator Mike Lee said on Thursday that he is requesting more time for members of Congress to consider and amend a \$1.2 trillion government funding bill.

Earlier on Thursday, the US Congress unveiled the legislation, which provides fiscal year 2024 funding to six unfunded federal government appropriations areas. Lawmakers must pass legislation to fund the six portions by March 22 or face a partial government shutdown.

"I'm about to speak about the 1,000-page omnibus spending bill in the Senate and propose a measure [to] give members of Congress more time (until April 12th) to review, amend, and debate the bill," Lee said in a statement via social media platform X.

Numerous other Republican members of Congress have also come out in opposition to the legislation, including members of the US House Freedom Caucus.

Lawmakers would have to maintain a reading rate of 112 words per minute to finish reading, let alone analyzing, the legislation before it is brought to a vote, the House Freedom Caucus said in a statement on X.

The bill provides \$5.5 million for every word it includes, the statement added.

US Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer has said that senators will act swiftly on the legislation as soon as it passes the House of Representatives.

#### UN Special Envoy Urges Syrian Government to Engage in Political Dialogue

UNITED NATIONS, March 21 (Sputnik) - The United Nations calls on parties to engage in dialogue on Syria, as otherwise the situation will continue to develop in a negative direction, the UN Special Envoy for Syria Geir Pedersen said on Thursday.

"In Damascus, I urged the Syrian Government to engage in a deepened and concrete dialogue, which would be essential to developing joint reciprocal and parallel steps from different parties. Syria has been under sanctions from the United States and the European Union since the start of the conflict in that country in 2011. US sanctions imposed on Syria include an embargo and they affect third parties. US secondary sanctions were restricted until 2020 when the Caesar Act, signed by then-US President Donald Trump in 2019, went into effect.

The Russian ambassador made the comment during a UN Security Council meeting on Syria. Nebenzia reiterated Russia's long-held position that it disagrees with sanctions being imposed on Syria.

Syria has been under sanctions from the United States, the European Union and a number of states since the start of the conflict in that country in 2011. The US sanctions include an embargo and affect third parties. US secondary sanctions were restricted until 2020 when the Caesar Act, signed by then-US President Donald Trump in 2019, went into effect.

The Caesar Act is designed to deter support for reconstruction efforts by the Syrian government. It imposes sanctions on anyone who provides funding or assistance to the Syrian government and the country's central bank. The legislation imposes sanctions on those providing aircraft or spare parts to Syrian airlines or who are involved with government-controlled construction and engineering projects.

In May 2023, US lawmakers also submitted the Assad Regime Anti-Normalization Act to the parliament to amend the Caesar Act and further expand sanctions on those providing financial and technological support to Syrian groups and enterprises. The US government now has the authority to introduce sanctions until the end of 2025, while the new legislation, if adopted, would extend this power through 2032.

## US Should Be 'Extremely Concerned' by Growing Role of Russia, China in Africa - AFRICOM

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The United States should be extremely concerned about the increasing presence of Russia and China in Africa, the US Africa Command commander said during a House Armed Services Committee hearing on Thursday.

"We should be extremely concerned," Gen. Michael Langley said, when asked how concerned Washington should be about Russia's and China's growing footprint in Africa.

Langley argued that Russia and China are trying to replace the West, and particularly the United States on the continent.

US President Joe Biden's Fiscal Year 2025 budget proposal requests \$25 million for a new fund to suppress Russia's influence in Africa.

Western countries on multiple occasions have expressed their concerns over Russia's expanding diplomatic and military ties with Africa.

In response to such claims, Russian officials have said that the history of colonialism prevents the West from seeing Africa as an independent geopolitical player. Moscow, in contrast, views

African nations as sovereign countries that decide on their own with whom they want to develop ties, the officials said.

#### Risk of Attack Emanating From Afghanistan 'Increasing' - CENTCOM

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The risk of an attack coming from Afghanistan is increasing, US Central Command chief Gen. Michael Kurilla said in a congressional testimony on Thursday.

"ISIS [Islamic States terror group, banned in Russia] surged their attacks in Iraq and Syria earlier this year, and the risk of an attack emanating from Afghanistan is increasing," Kurilla told the US House Armed Services Committee.

The ISIS-Khorasan branch of the Islamic State retains the capability and the will to attack US and Western interests abroad in as little as six months with little to no warning, Kurilla said.

The Taliban came to power in Afghanistan in the fall of 2021 amid the withdrawal of US troops from the country and the collapse of the US-backed government there.

The Taliban takeover has heightened fears in some Central Asian nations and elsewhere concerning the spread of radical Islamic fundamentalism as it happened in 1996 when the Taliban first came to power in Afghanistan for five years.

#### US, Allies Plan to Back \$50Bln in Bonds With Frozen Russian Funds to Aid Ukraine - Reports

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The United States is in talks with allies to support Ukraine using \$50 billion in bonds backed by revenue from frozen Russian assets, Bloomberg reported on Thursday.

The plan suggested by the US involves creating a special purpose vehicle to issue at least \$50 billion in bonds supported by frozen Russian assets and using the funds to support Ukraine, the report said, citing sources familiar with the matter.

The plan also involves pooling \$280 billion in Russian central bank assets frozen in Group of Seven and European Union countries in the special purpose vehicle, from which profits would be put towards backing "freedom bonds," the report said. EU leaders will discuss how to utilize revenue from the frozen Russian assets to benefit Ukraine during a meeting in Brussels on Thursday, the report added.

Kremlin spokesman Dmitry Peskov said earlier on Thursday that Russia will use all available judicial mechanisms and other means to prevent the EU from using frozen Russian assets to aid Ukraine.

## US Lawmaker Says Would Be 'Incredibly Unwise' to Try to Push Russia, China Out of Africa

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - US Congressman Adam Smith said on Thursday that the United States should not try to push out Russia and China from Africa as it would be "incredibly unwise" and advocated instead the maintenance of US presence on the continent.

"I do want to dispel the notion that somehow the US should just come in by force and push out China and Russia from having influence in Africa. A - that's not going to happen, B - would be incredibly unwise to do it. Russia and China are global powers, they are going to be present but we have to make sure is that we maintain our presence," Smith said during a House Armed Services Committee hearing.

Smith urged the United States not to view Africa as some sort of a chip in a broader geopolitical game, but rather to try to balance its interests with the national interests of the African countries to reduce the allegedly malign influence of Russia and China there.

In September 2023, the leaders of Mali, Burkina Faso and Niger signed a charter establishing the Alliance of Sahel States to create "a collective defense architecture" following coups in Mali in 2020, Burkina Faso in 2022 and Niger in 2023.

In the aftermath of the coups, Russia declared its readiness to develop constructive bilateral relations with each of the countries and also expressed support for their territorial integrity and sovereignty amid Western threats to impose sanctions and send troops to restore regimes

friendly to Europe and the United States.

US Congress Unveils \$1.2Trln Funding Package for Fiscal Year 2024

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) – US Congress has unveiled a \$1.2 trillion package to fund the six remaining departments in the federal government in the fiscal year 2024, including national defense.

The House and Senate Appropriations Committees published the document overnight or less than 48 hours before a looming partial shutdown as soon as this weekend if Congress fails to pass the package.

Commenting on chances to avoid a partial government shutdown this weekend, Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer said that it would be a "tight squeeze" to pass the package before the deadline.

At the same time, Schumer pledged on Thursday to act swiftly and put the package on the Senate floor as soon as House lawmakers pass the funding measure.

Schumer thus shifted responsibility for the delay in passing the bill onto the shoulders of the House of Representatives and their Speaker Mike Johnson, continuing the confrontation between the Democratic-controlled Senate and the Republican majority in the House.

On Tuesday, the White House and congressional leaders agreed on the remaining six appropriations bills for the Departments of Defense, Financial Services, Homeland Security, Labor, Health, and Education, the Legislative Branch, and the State and Foreign operations.

US Doubles Security Funding for Taiwan, Increases Spending to Counter China - Bill

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The US Defense Appropriation Act for fiscal year (FY) 2024 provides additional funding for security cooperation with Taiwan and increases spending to counter China, the US House Appropriations Committee said on Thursday.

"Defense Appropriation Act, 2024, provides a \$27 billion increase over the FY23 enacted level, and directs that funding to critical national defense efforts, including countering the PRC," the House Appropriations Committee said in a summary of the package.

The Act doubles security cooperation funding for Taiwan, the committee said.

"The Act also rejects tens of billions of dollars in waste included in the President's Budget Request and redirects those resources to activities that counter the People's Republic of China

(PRC) and other near-peer adversaries," the committee added.

The United States would counter China by maximizing its production of critical munitions and by spending more than \$66 billion for the US Indo-Pacific Command capabilities, including \$42 million to bolster its military capabilities in the region, according to the committee.

In addition, the bill prohibits funding for China's Wuhan Institute of Virology - the laboratory at the center of investigations into the COVID-19 origins - and the EcoHealth Alliance, the committee said.

"[The bill] counters the People's Republic of China by ... rejecting the Biden administration's inadequate shipbuilding plan by denying the request to divest four ships prematurely and funding the construction of eight battle ships," the committee said.

The document also increases investments in 5th and 6th-generation aircraft, like the F-35 jet, and next generation air dominance, the committee added.

### US House Panel Advances Bill to Sanction Chinese Communist Party Members

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The US House Foreign Affairs Committee advanced a bill on Thursday to impose sanctions on members of the National Communist Party Congress of the People's Republic of China.

The panel advanced the bill, dubbed the Sanctioning Tyrannical and Oppressive People within the Chinese Communist Party Act (STOP CCP Act), in a vote of 28 in favor and 22 opposed.

The legislation expresses the sense of the US Congress that the CCP has committed numerous human rights violations against people in Hong Kong, Taiwan and the Xinjiang Uyghur Autonomous Region.

The bill directs the US president to impose sanctions on members of the CCP Central Committee or any successor organization.

The legislation provides an exception for some sanctions if it is necessary to comply with the United States' obligations as the home of the United Nations headquarters.

### UPDATE - US FY2024 Spending Package Provides \$3.3Bln for Israel, Prohibits UNRWA Funds

(Clarifies which funds are allocated as part of State, Defense budgets, swaps quote, minor edits throughout)

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) – The newly released US spending package for fiscal year 2024 includes \$3.3 billion in aid to Israel while excluding funding for UNRWA, among various new restrictions on assistance for Palestinians, according to a summary released by the House appropriations committee early Thursday.

"The Act [State, Foreign Operations, and Related Programs Act] also continues our commitment to Israel, fully funding our annual security commitment of \$3.3 billion, prohibiting any taxpayer funding from going to the United Nations Relief and Works Agency (UNRWA), and eliminating funding for the United Nations Commission of Inquiry against Israel," the summary

said.

The bill also includes new conditions on any assistance to Gaza, including mechanisms for coordination with Israel, prevention of diversion to Hamas or other terrorist entities, and a requirement for third-party monitoring.

It also requires unprecedented conditionality on funds to the UN, including new requirements on anti-Israel bias, transparency, and terrorism vetting for every UN entity and international organization funded in the bill. The UNRWA exclusion will be in effect for FY2024.

Funding for the Defense Department will fully cover Israel's Cooperative Missile Defense Programs, which include Iron Dome, David's Sling, and Arrow. It also includes \$300 million for research, testing, and evaluation, and \$200 million for procurement.

The Senate and House appropriations committees agreed on the \$1.2 trillion package early Thursday. The bill is expected to be passed by Friday midnight in order to avoid a shutdown of several government agencies. The legislation provides funds for the departments of State, Defense, Homeland Security, Labor and Health and Human Services.

US House Panel Advances Bill to Sanction People Tied to Russia-Crimea Tunnel, Bridge

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) - The US House Foreign Affairs Committee advanced legislation on Thursday to impose sanctions on people connected to work on any bridge or tunnel that is connecting the mainland Russia to the Crimean Peninsula.

The House panel advanced the bill, dubbed the No Russian Tunnel to Crimea Act, in a vote of 49 in favor and 1 opposed.

The legislation is sponsored by the panel's top Democrat, US Congressman Gregory Meeks. The bill is cosponsored by Congressmen Joe Wilson, William Keating and Michael Lawler.

The bill requires the imposition of sanctions with respect to any foreign person who knowingly participates in the construction, maintenance or repair of any tunnel or bridge connecting Russia's mainland with the Crimean Peninsula.

US FY2024 Spending Package Boosts Baltic Security Initiative by \$20Mln to \$228Mln – Senate

WASHINGTON, March 21 (Sputnik) – US Congressional negotiators agreed to increase funding for the Baltic Security Initiative by \$20 million to \$228 million as part of its spending package for fiscal year 2024, according to a release published early Thursday.

“The bill provides \$92 million above the budget request to improve US Indo-Pacific Command’s

deterrence. It adds \$20 million for the Baltic Security Initiative, for a total of \$228 million,” the Senate Appropriations Committee said in a summary of the bill text.

The Baltic Security Initiative provides military aid to the Baltic countries of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania.

The Senate and House appropriations committees released the text of the bill early Thursday ahead of a Friday deadline to fund the government.

Lawmakers must pass the legislation — which provides budgets for the departments of State, Defense, Homeland Security, Labor and Health and Human Services — before the end of the day on Friday to avoid a partial government shutdown.
