2022 NATIONAL SHOW





Eleven families who breed registered Normandes entered forty-two of their animals for the 2022 National Normande Show held at the Iowa County Fairgrounds in Mineral Point, WI on October 1, 2022. They represented the states of Missouri, Kansas, and Wisconsin. There were fourteen dairy show entries and twenty-eight beef show entries listed in the show catalog.


Breeders/exhibitors listed in the show catalog were Nine Mile Farm from Linwood, KS. The Brockhoff family owns Nine Mile farm and family members are Wally, Anne, Lucien, Eliza, and Marie. Crick Ridge Farm from Spring Valley, WI and owned by Jeff and Nona Bock. High-Gem Normandes from Neosho, WI, made up of the Conley family which includes Chris, Brenda, Makayla, and Paige. Vosberg Valley View Farm Inc. from South Wayne, WI. Their prefix is Rudan and Dan and Ruth Vosberg are the owners. Double Creek Ranch LLC is from Leavenworth, KS, and Isaac Austin was the exhibitor. Both judges provided thorough reasons for the placings they made, and were especially good in explaining to the youth what was expected of them in their showmanship classes.

The theme of this year's show was tropical in nature as evidenced by the decorations of the picture taking area and some of the tropical accessories worn by one exhibitor and the NANA board members for their board picture. The decorations and fun accessories were provided by NANA board member Alison Patry of Arundel, ME.



In the adult showmanship competition there were four adult exhibitors competing against one another. They were Wally and Anne Brockhoff from Linwood, KS, Beth Mueller from Rewey, WI, and the most senior of the adults, Mike Mueller also from Rewey, WI. It was quite obvious to everyone that Mueller was attempting to sway Judge Koch's decision making process by sporting a white shirt that had red and brown spots on it to

resemble a spotted Normande, and he was wearing a grass skirt that was not that all revealing-fortunately. Judge Koch really tested the beef cattle knowledge of the adult competitors when she asked them: "How many of the calves born each year are born as steers?" Mueller, being a very quick thinker while standing on his feet replied "50% of them." It became obvious to everyone that Mueller thought too quickly while on his feet and had had a very serious senior moment as he answered Koch's question. When Mueller was placed fourth in the class he insinuated he was a victim of age discrimination. The other placings in the class were Wally Brockhoff was first, Anne Brockhoff was second and Beth Mueller was third.

Because there was a distinct difference in birthdates for the bull calf class it was split into an older and younger class. There were five bulls in the older Junior Bull Calf Class. Placing first in the class was CLN Melvin Harold 814. He was exhibited by Cedar Lane Normandes from Greentop. MO. He is 87% Normande and sired by CLN Nick Melvin 787. His dam is CLN Chester Cherry 649. Standing in second place was Crick Ridge Mr. Klean. His exhibitor was Crick Ridge Farm from Spring Valley, WI. 92% Normande, he is sired by Crick Ridge Gargoyle and



his dam is Crick Ridge Dolly Diva. In third place was 9MF Mercury 2215, a 94% Normande sired by Crick Ridge Dunkin Donut. His dam is Crick Ridge Everyday Sasafras 16E-17, and he was shown by

the Brockhoff family. In fourth place was Crick Ridge Krypto, exhibited by Jeff and Nona Bock. He is sired by Crick Ridge Gargoyle, is 92% Normande, and his dam is Crick Ridge Boo Hoo. And standing in fifth place was 9MF Donut Lad 2220. A son of Crick Ridge Dunkin Donut and out of PDM Ellie 323C. 93% Normande he was exhibited by the Brockhoff family



Three bulls were shown in the younger group of Junior Bull Calves. K & J Kenworth 22K took first place. He was exhibited by Kim and Jeanine Radel. He is a 95% Normande sired by Circle D Foolerman 51R and his dam is K & J 18D Dito 570 First Lady 818F. In second place was DMCC Rocky Kid Rock 24K. A 97% Normande, he was shown by the Mueller family. His sire is HN Chief Rocky 53J and his dam is DMCC Creole Cassie 3C. And placing third for the Mueller family was DMCC Demitri Kool Whip 55K. Sired by DMCC Foolerman Demitri 17D and out of MW Lapousnoz Torelle 12T, he is 94% Normande.



The Beef Summer Yearling Bull Class had two yearling bulls in it. Standing in first place was PDM Red Bull 2119. Exhibited by the Brockhoff family, he is a 91% Normande. His sire is Crick Ridge Deputy Dawg and his dam is PDM Hawk Trail 337E. Placing second was DMCC Captan Jigsaw 2J. 97% Normande, he is sired by Captan and his dam is MW Lapousnoz Torelle 12T. He was shown by the Mueller family.

When it came time to select the Grand and Reserve Grand Champion

bull, judge Koch went with youth. K & J Kenworth 22K was named the Grand Champion Beef Bull for Kim and Jeanine Radel, and CLN Melvin Harold 814 was chosen as the Reserve Grand Champion Beef Bull for Bruce and Connie Bolen.





The female Beef show began with a split by age Junior Heifer class. Six older junior heifers were exhibited in the older age class. Placing first was Crick Ridge Kookie, a 92% Normande. Exhibited by Jeff and Nona Bock, she is sired by Crick Ridge Gargoyle and her dam is Crick Ridge Hallie Lulah. The Bocks had the second placing heifer in the class as well. She was Crick Ridge Kukla. Also a 92% Normande and sired by Crick Ridge Gargoyle, her dam is Crick Ridge Frenchy. In third place for the Brockhoff family was 9MF Geneva 2210. A 75% Normande, she is sired by Brockhoff's herd bull Crick Ridge Dunkin Donut. Her dam is PDM Ellie 323C. Fourth place was occupied by CLN Ned Dottie. Exhibited by Bruce and Connie Bolen, she is 90% Normande, sired by CLN Nick Ned and her dam is CLN Simon Madelyn. Fifth place was occupied by 9MF lo 2210. Also exhibited by the Brockhoff family, her Normande percentage was 93%. Her sire is Crick Ridge Dunkin Donut and her dam is PDM Rocket Celeste 328E. And standing in sixth place was CLN Ned Cora 818. A 96% Normande, she is sired by CLN Nick Ned and her dam is CLN BS Conqueror Constance 669. She was shown by Bruce and Connie Bolen.







Cami 48C, she is 94% Normande. Placing second was DMCC Oblong Korella 6K. 95% Normande, she is sired by the French bull Oblong and her dam is DMCC Trek Corella 112C. Third place was occupied by DMCC Eoli Korelle 19K. Sired by DMCC Callisto Eoli 9E, her dam is DMCC Zoland Corelle 38C. Her Normande percentage is 95%. And in fourth place was DMCC Norman Keli 18K as a 97% Normande. Sired by Normand The First, her dam is DMCC Polled Chief Feliciaty 38F.



The Beef Summer Yearling Class had one entry from the Mueller family and that was DMCC Fukrain Jubilee 42J. Her sire is Fukrain and her dam is DMCC Polled Chief Feliciaty 38F. Her Normande percentage is 97%.

Two yearling heifers were shown in the Beef Junior Yearling Heifer class. Placing first was 9MF Deputy Lass 2118. She was exhibited by Issac Austin o Leavenworth, KS. She is sired by Crick Ridge Deputy Dawg, is 95% Normande, and her dam is PDM Hawk Alice 336E. Placing second for the Brockhoff family was 9MF Wendy 2107. Crick Ridge Dunkin Donut is her sire and her dam is RVR Little Blackie 1622. Her Normande percentage is 92%.

And placing third was DMCC Polled Chief Feliciaty 38F. A 94% Normande, she is sired by SGF Polled Chief 20U and her dam is DMCC Samson Xelebrity 69X. Her heifer calf, DMCC Norman Keli 18K, was beside her. Her calf is 97% Normande and is sired by Norman The First.



Callie Zubke of Watertown, WI was a new exhibitor at the NANA show. Earlier in the year she and her family had purchased a Normandy bull calf from Bruce and Kristina Kopf of Baraboo, WI. Callie made her purchase to have a show steer and she chose a Normande. Her calf was registered as a steer named KA August K7. He is 88% Normande and is sired by DMCC Buccaneer Gopher G6. His dam is KA Ruby. Callie exhibited her steer, August, in the Beef Feeder Calf Class and placed first.

There were two entries in the Pen of Three Heifers class. The entry by the Brockhoff Family placed first and the entry by the Mueller Family placed second.

The Parade of Champions for the female part of the Beef Show was a delightful sight for the eyes. After looking all the first place winners over judge Koch selected 9MF Deputy Lass 2188 as the Grand Champion Beef Female. As noted



above, she was the winner of the Junior Yearling Heifer class. She was bred by the Brockhoff Family and exhibited by Isaac Austin. Judge Koch selected Crick Ridge Kookie as the Reserve Grand Champion Female. She had won the older Junior Heifer Calf class and was exhibited by Jeff and Nona Bock.





The dairy segment of the NANA show began with Showmanship classes. In the Youth Showmanship Paige Conley of Neosho, WI, was in first place. And Everett Vosberg from South Wayne stood second. In the Teen Dairy Showmanship Landon Holewinski from Pulaski, WI stood first. In second place was Makayla Conley from Neosho, WI. The Adult Dairy Showmanship competition was the largest dairy showmanship class and featured two husband and wife teams. Chris Conley, Neosho, WI, placed first. Derek Vosberg, South Wayne, WI, stood second. Placing third was Brenda Conley, Neosho, WI. And in fourth place was Sarah Vosberg, South Wayne, WI.

The dairy show classes started with the Spring Heifer Calf class. Paige Conley stood on top of the class with her heifer, High-Gem Licorice Shakira. Sired by Licorice and out of High-Gem Jeolaval Stacy, she is 94% Normande. Placing second was Rudan Lamier Candi 1422. Shown by Dan and Ruth Vosberg, she is 88% Normande, sired by Lamier and a daughter of Rudan Infinity Celeste 1133. The Vosbergs had the third placing heifer in the class as well. She was Rudan Orno Rushco 1413. A fullblood heifer, she is sired by Orno and her dam is Rudan Camembert Rosette 976-ET. Placing fourth for the Vosbergs was Rudan Loky Callalily 1418. 97% Normande, she is a daughter of Loky and her dam is Rudan Lithium Chaelyn 992. And placing fifth in the class was Derrah Orio Juno 1462. A 99% Normande sired by Orio and out of Derrah Jorino Jinger 980. She was exhibited by Derek and Sarah Vosberg.

Landon Holewinski brought Land-Ho Jorino Calliope into the show ring for the Winter Heifer Calf class and she took first place. A 50% Normande sired by Jorino, her dam is Land-Ho UR Normande Cracker.

The Fall Heifer Calf class saw another entry from Landon Holewinski and she placed first as well. She was Land-Ho Landel Saltani. 50% Normande, she is sired by Landel and her dam is Ri-Jul Defiant Sage-Red.

In the Spring Yearling Heifer class, Makayla Conley led her heifer to first place. The heifer is High-Gem Maanou Luck Star who is sired by Maanou. She is 75% Normande and her dam is High-Gem Infinity Lucky. Placing second in the class was Derrah Loky Jurnee 1349 shown by Derek and Sarah Vosberg. Sired by Loky, she is 98% Normande and her dam is Derrah Halias J-Robbie 1008.



Chris topped the class with the heifer he was leading, High-Gem Honess Isy Pepper. 75% Normande, she is sired by Honess Isy and her dam is High-Gem Jeolaval Prickle. Second in the class was High-Gem Licorce Sapphire, 94% Normande. Her sire is Licorce and her dam is High-Gem Jeolaval Stacy.







When it came to the selection of the Junior Champion and Reserve Junior Champion Dairy Female, it was time for the class winners of Landon Holewinski to shine. Selected as Junior Champion Dairy Female was Land-Ho Landel Saltani, the winning Fall Heifer. Named Reserve Junior Champion Dairy Female was Land-Ho Jorino Calliope, the winning Winter Heifer Calf.





For a number of different circumstances the dairy cow show ended up with just two cows actually being shown. Derrah Aubray Jolene 933-ET was shown by Derek and Sarah Vosberg and was first in the Four Year Old in Milk Class. She is 94% Normande and is sired by Aubray. Her dam is Rudan Royal Jasmine 233.

Rudan Heroes Roxy 741 is a full blood six year old cow and was first in the Five & Older in Milk Class. Her sire is Heroes Isy and her dam is Rudan Uvray SS Roxanne 517-ET. Roxy is a granddaughter of Car-Bon N Nivea Rosemarie-ET who was the Reserve Grand Champion Dairy Cow of the 2010 National NANA Show.

Judge Riley made Rudan Heroes Roxy 741 the Grand Champion Dairy Cow and she made Derrah Aubray Jolene 933-ET as the Reserve Grand Champion Dairy Cow.

ANNUAL MEETING

NANA's Annual Membership meeting was held on September 30th in the Schimming Building on the Iowa County Fairgrounds. A total of thirty adults and youth enjoyed a delicious meal provided by the Wallace and Anne Brockhoff family. The meal included KC style Normande beef barbecue, pulled pork, potato salad, coleslaw, chips, cookies, bars (provided by Kim and Jeanine Radel), and water/soda (provided by Derek and Sarah Vosberg).

Following the meal NANA President Chris Conley called the Annual Meeting to order. The minutes from NANA's previous meeting were read and approved. The treasurer's report and the association's registry report were presented by Mike Mueller. The treasurer's report showed the association is on firm financial ground, and the registry report informed the members present that the number of registrations completed by the registry office were down slightly from the previous year, but have been well over 300 per year for the past three years. Mueller's reports were accepted and approved as presented.

Mueller gave a brief report on NANA's exhibit in the Beef Tent at the Wisconsin Farm Technology Days. It was reported the foot traffic through the Beef Tent was very steady all three days of the show and NANA had made a number of contacts with visitors to the Beef Tent. Members present were told the 2023 Wisconsin Farm Technology Days was going to be held in Sauk County near Baraboo, WI.

Following Mueller's reports members were invited to visit NANA's booth at the World Dairy Expo during the following week. It was reported NANA would be sharing a booth with Normande Genetics, after an agreement between NANA and Normande Genetics had been made in the spring. The decision for sharing a booth was made for two reasons. The first reason was to share the cost of a booth area. The cost of a booth in the building NANA was in was \$1950. By sharing a booth the cost increased by \$100, but the total cost was split by NANA and Normande Genetics for individual costs of \$1025. The second reason for sharing a booth was to assist one another in manning the booth. World Dairy Expo regulations require booth exhibitors have someone present in their booth all the time during each day's show hours. By sharing a booth NANA and Normande Genetics were able to ease the burden of having someone in the booth at all times.

In a change of how it has been done in the past, President Chris Conley presented NANA's Distinguished Service Award to Ken Rabas of Cedar Rapids, IA. Rabas was unable to remain in Mineral Point for NANA's show the next day. So he received his award during the Annual Meeting. Ken was recognized for his many years of service and leadership to NANA.

Following Ken's award, a lengthy discussion was held regarding NANA developing a Classification Program for the breed. The impetus for such a program was NANA has a member who is having their Normandes classified in Novermber and a classifier for the Brown Swiss Association will be doing the classifying. The Brown Swiss Association had contacted the NANA office to seek approval of doing the classification and it was given. The breeder had also spoken to a NANA member who had extensive experience with classifying dairy cows through her participation in the classification program of the Holstein Association. As a result of being approached by another breeder about classifying Normandes, Barb Wogsland was given approval by the members present to develop a classification program for NANA and present it to the Board of Directors for their spring 2023 Board meeting.

Members present then discussed the fact that NANA is receiving many requests about A2A2 animals and the desire to have the breeders listed on NANA's Website Breeder's Page be designated as dairy or beef breeders. Members present directed the NANA office to contact Webit and to identify breeders as dairy or beef. This matter has been completed and if you visit NANA's Breeders Page on our Website you will see each breeder listed as Dairy or Beef. Regarding the issue of A2A2, members were informed NANA does not have a designated company for testing for A2A2 and if breeders desired such testing it would be their responsibility to secure the testing. Members were informed by Mueller that the registry office can put the A2A2 information in the data base for individual animals AND that information can be printed on an animal's registration paper as long as it is submitted to the NANA office. It is the owner's responsibility to submit the genetic information.

After no other matters were brought before the meeting, elections for the Board of Directors were held. Following the counting of mail in ballots and ballots cast by those present at the meeting, the three individuals nominated for the board were elected. Those elected were Lexa Miller-Buening, Bruce Bolen and Mike Mueller. They will serve a three year term.

The meeting was adjourned after the election results were announced.

KEN RABAS AWARDED NANA'S DISTINGUISHED SERVICE AWARD



Ken Rabas of Iowa City, IA, was awarded NANA's annual Distinguished Service Award. Rabas breeds dairy Normandes under his prefix Tomorrow Trust (TT), and since he himself does not actively farm, his animals are milked and cared for by individuals he has an agreement with. Ken is very knowledgeable about organic dairy production and farming, dairy product processing, and French Normande pedigrees.

Rabas became involved with the Normande breed and NANA in 1999. His involvement with NANA included serving on the Board of Directors for numerous terms. He has served as NANA's Vice-President and President while he was on the Board of Directors. He represented NANA at one of the Cinors held in France

in the 2000's and while there he personally met French President Jacques Chirac. He has assisted with manning NANA's booth at the World Dairy Expo every year since our association began having a booth during the dairy show. Ken has shown some of his Tomorrow Trust bred animals at NANA's National Show. And he has consistently performed the unglamorous task of making sure exhibitors got their animals into the show ring in a timely manner during the National Show. 





