The 17th Asian Asian Football Federation (AFC) will host the Asian Fourth Grade International Men's Football Championship and the AFC Asian Cup. It was held in the United Arab Emirates from January 5 to February 1, 2019. The Asian Cup finals will be the first competition between 24 teams and expanded from 16 teams from 2004 to 2015 [in this new format, the finalists will compete for a group stage consisting of six groups of four teams, followed by a knockout stage for 16 teams.] The host country automatically qualified for the finals, and the remaining 23 locations were determined among the AFC's other 45 national teams throughout the qualifying tournament from 2015 to 2018, some of which were configured as part of the 2018 FIFA World Cup qualifiers. Qatar, who beat Japan 3-1 in the final, won their first title. This was Also Qatar's first top-four finish. The defending champion (Australia) was eliminated by the host (UAE) in the quarter-finals and the final champion in the semi-finals. Host Selection Main Article: Bidding instructions and timelines for the 2019 AFC Asian Cup Bid 2019 AFC Asian Cup were approved at the AFC Conference on November 28, 2012. [5] The winning bid was originally scheduled to be announced at the AFC conference in November 2014. However, at the 60th anniversary ceremony at the end of 2014, the AFC announced the Summer 2015 date on the day of the announcement. In January 2015, AFC Secretary General Alex Sussai said Iran and the United Arab Emirates were the remaining two bidders for the 2019 Asian Cup and that the final host would be announced in March 2015. Organized by the United Arab Emirates at the AFC Executive Committee meeting in Manama, Bahrain on March 9, 2015. [9] It was the second time the country had held a tournament after the 1996 edition. The team that qualified for the Asian Cup is not the main article on disqualification or withdrawal AFC members: the 2019 AFC Asian Cup Qualifiers 2019 AFC Asian Cup Qualifiers have determined 24 teams to participate in the tournament. In 2014, a proposal to merge the provisional versionThe fifa World Cup round with the AFC Asian Cup was ratified by the AFC Competition Committee. The new qualifiers were held in three stages, with the first two merged with the 2018 FIFA World Cup qualifiers.[10] In the first round, the lowest teams played home-and-away with two legs, reducing the total number of teams to 40. In the second round, 40 teams were divided into eight groups of five teams to play a home-and-away round-robin match, with eight group winners and four best group runners-up advancing to the 2019 AFC Asian Cup final. In the third round, the next 24 best teams eliminated in the second round were divided into six groups of four and competed for the remaining slots in the 2019 AFC Asian Cup. The first qualifying round was held on March 12, 2015, and the final round of the third round was held on March 27, 2018. [12] Qualifying teams from India, Syria, Thailand and Turkmenistan entered the tournament after participating in the Asian Cup tournament from 2004 to 2015. Lebanon and Vietnam passed the qualifiers for the first time after hosting tournaments in 2000 and 2007, respectively. In Vietnam, it was the first time for South Vietnam to participate in the second edition (1956 and 1960) other than hosting the 2007 edition, and to qualify for the AFC Asian Cup as a unified country. This was also the first time That Yemen had qualified for the AFC Asian Cup as a united country, as FIFA and the AFC classified South Yemen's participation as a clear record unrelated to Yemen, which took over from Northern Yemen in 1976. In addition to Yemen, the Philippines [15] and Kyrgyzstan [16] also marked this edition as the first tournament to qualify for the Asian Cup. Tajikistan, along with fellow CAF member Afghanistan, was the only two members of the federation that were expected to qualify for the Tournament. Iran beat the first CAF member to play in the Asian Cup and previously qualified as part of the WAF. Malaysia and Indonesia were the only co-organizers of the 2007 edition that failed to qualify for the Asian Cup because Malaysia ended the campaign with only one point out of six games. Indonesia, on the other hand, was banned from signing qualifications due to internal PSSI tensions that led to FIFA's suspension. Kuwait was the only Arab country that failed to qualify for the Asian Cup because FIFA sanctions prohibited it from qualifying. India remained the only team in South Asia to qualify. On 13 November 2018, the Asian Football Federation warned the Iranian government to stop issuing to the country's football association. The draw Burj Khalifa, the final draw place The draw for the final tournament was held on May 4, 2018 at 19:30 (USA) at the Armani Hotel in Burj Khalifa, Dubai. [18] The FIFA rankings for April 2018 were used as the basis for seeding. The 12 teams that secured a spot in the final tournament by the end of the second round of qualifying were placed in Pots 1 and 2, and the remaining teams who passed the qualifying round in the third round The rest of the Pot. As a host, the United Arab Emirates was seeded in Pot 1. The 24 teams were divided into six groups of four teams and the host was placed in the A1 position. Four Asian athletes, Ali Deei, Sun Jihai, Sunil Chetri and Phil Young, were selected. On 5 December 2018, the AFC released a list of 30 CONCACAF referees, 30 assistant referees, two standby referees and two standby assistant referees, including one CONCACAF referee and two assistant referees. [23] Video Assistant Referee (VAR) will be used after the quarterfinals. In each match, the referee and assistant were accompanied by two additional assistant referees next to each team's goal post. The six stadiums were The Zayed Sports City Stadium and Mohamed bin Zayed Stadium, Hazza bin Zayed Stadium and Khalifa Bin in Abu Dhabi.Al Ain Stadium, Dubai's Al-Ahrai Stadium and DSC Stadium. The two stadiums in Dubai were then dropped due to financial problems and replaced by al-Maktoum and Rasid stadiums located in Dubai. After the 2015 Asian Cup, the AFC agreed to increase the number of 24 teams from 16 teams following UEFA Euro 2016. Therefore, as more stadiums were being chosen and rebuilt, Sharjah and Abu Dhabi won the right to have more stadiums for the tournament. Sharjah Stadium and Al Nahyan Stadium were selected in the aftermath, confirming the number of stadiums to eight. The eight venues used are Zayed Sports City Stadium, Mohamed bin Zayed Stadium, Abu Dhabi's Al Nahyan Stadium, Hazza bin Zayed Stadium, Khalifa bin Zayed Stadium in Al Ain, Al Maktoum Stadium and Rasid Stadium in Dubai, Sharjah Stadium Sharjah Stadium. [10] Only the host will qualify for the automatic qualifying round, and the other 23 teams will pass the qualifying tournament. In the final, 24 teams will be divided into six groups of four teams each. Each group's team will do a single round robin. After the group stage, the top two teams and four of the best three teams will advance to the knockout stage from round 16. For the first time since the knockout stage was added in 1972, there has been no third-place playoff. Schedule AFC announced its official match schedule on May 7, 2018. [29] One of Abu Dhabi's three stadiums, Zayed Sports City Stadium, played both the opening and finals [each venue was assigned at least five games and each ground held at least one match in the knockout stage. The semi-finals were held on different days in Abu Dhabi and Dubai. No city held two matches on the same day, except for the final match of the group stage, which required simultaneous kick-off. Group Stage The top two teams in each group and the best four teams in third place advanced to round 16. All times is local GST (UTC +4). The UAE and Thailand ended in a 1-1 draw at Hazza bin Zayed Stadium, placed in the group's top two, while Bahrain came in third with a 1-0 win over India. [33] India recorded their first Asian Cup title in 55 years against Thailand in the opening round and finished last in the group after losing two games remaining. In the first-place match, Qatar beat Saudi Arabia 2-0 because of Almoez Ali's brace. Qatar launched a debably comfortable campaign before defeating Lebanon 2-0 and then defeating North Korea 6-0 to qualify for the knockout stage. Ali scored a decisive goal in both games, scored 50 against Lebanon and four against North Korea. Meanwhile, Saudi Arabia opened an account with a 4-0 victory over North Korea before defeating Lebanon 2-0 to advance to the next round. In the final fixture, Lebanon defeated North Korea 4-1 in the brace of Giral El Herwe. The victory was Lebanon's first competition. [54] But Lebanon missed the next round at fair play points. The color used in the logo is derived from the flag of the United Arab Emirates. The seven hexagons formed by colored ribbons represent the seven emirates of the host country. The hexagonal pattern of the logo interlaced was inspired by the tradition of the old Emirati, which uses palm leaves known as saff locally in weaving as well as Islamic art. The outer circle and the geometric design in it symbolize the sport of football. The slogan Asia together (Arabic: جمع آسيا معاً) was announced on January 5, 2018, one year before the start of the tournament. Melted Asentec Football Main Article Used in Tournament Matchball: Melted Asentec Official Matchball was provided by Melting Corporation. According to the AFC, matchballs are called melted asentecs. Mascot At the final draw on May 4, 2018, two mascots, Mansour and Jala, were announced (Mansour is a typical Arab football child, but Jala is an Arabian habubasa with lightning speed.) On the day of the draw on May 4, 2018, all new trophies by Thomas Wright were announced. She is 78 cm tall, 42 cm wide and weighs 15 kilograms of silver. The trophy is modeled on lotus flowers, which are symbolically important Asian plants. The five petals of the lotus symbolized the five subcon federations under the AFC. The name of the trophy is engraved around the trophy base, which can be separated from the body of the trophy. Prizes The total prize money for the tournament was USD 14,800,000. The champion will receive 5 million U.S. dollars, the runner-up will receive 3 million U.S. dollars, and the loser will receive 1 million U.S. dollars. All 24 participating teams will receive USD 200,000. [71] Team Bus Slogan The Iranian National Bus Tournament Organizers selected and voted for the slogans used in the team buses of the 24 participating national teams. Broadcast on about 80 television channels covering the world, the tournament was broadcast live [800 million people were expected to watch the game], and the tournament reached more than 2.5 potential television viewers.People. ESPN5 has made a competitive bid to broadcast the event on free-to-air television in the Philippines, but it has not been accepted by the AFC. [75] In the Middle East, where Qatar-based BeIn Sports has the right to broadcast the Asian Cup, BeoutQ (which is said to have been supported by Saudi Arabia) also illegally broadcast the games as part of a proxy dispute over a diplomatic crisis between Qatar and various Arab countries. The AFC pointed out BeoutQ's broadcast and condemned it for persistent and illegal screening. [77]
