TEXAS CONGRESSMAN WILL HURD TO OPEN THE 2019 TEXAS TRIBUNE FESTIVAL

AUSTIN, TEXAS (EMBARGOED UNTIL 6 AM CST AUG. 26 2019) – U.S. Rep. Will Hurd, R-Helotes, who rocked the political world this summer when he announced he'll retire from Congress, will kick off the 2019 Texas Tribune Festival in conversation with Evan Smith, CEO of The Texas Tribune, the event's organizers announced today. The opening session of the ninth annual Texas Tribune Festival begins at 7 p.m. on Thursday, Sept. 26, at the historic Paramount Theatre in downtown Austin.

Hurd has represented Texas' 23rd Congressional District, which has the most miles contiguous with the Mexican border of any in the country, since 2015. He's a member of the House Appropriations Committee and sits on the Military Construction & Veterans Affairs and Transportation, Housing & Urban Development subcommittees. He's also on the House Permanent Select Committee on Intelligence, where he serves as ranking member of the Subcommittee on Intelligence Modernization and Readiness. Previously, Hurd spent nine years

working for the CIA and served as a senior adviser with a cybersecurity firm. He is a graduate of Texas A&M University, where he was president of the student body.

The Festival, which runs through Saturday, Sept. 28, has also added an array of speakers to a lineup that is already more than 400 strong, including **Nikole Hannah-Jones**, staff writer for The New York Times Magazine and the architect of the groundbreaking 1619 Project; Mayor **Nan Whatley** of Dayton, Ohio; California Secretary of State **Alex Padilla**; **Wesley Lowery**, national correspondent for The Washington Post; **Jonathan Martin**, national politics correspondent for The New York Times; and **Shannon Watts**, founder of Moms Demand Action.

 of The New York Times, Wesley Lowery of the Washington Post, and Errin Haines,
 national writer on race and ethnicity for the Associated Press.

#TribFest19 will also feature a one-on-one with **General John Murray**, commanding general of the United States Army Futures Command; a live recording of the "Politics with **Amy Walter**" podcast with New York Times journalists who cover politics in this extraordinary moment for their industry and our democracy; and a conversation about the trajectory of the U.S. space program 50 years after Apollo 11, with panelists including the best-selling author and historian **Douglas Brinkley** and former NASA deputy administrator **Lori Garver**.

Attendees can look forward to hearing from hundreds of speakers who bring perspectives that span the political spectrum. They will also hear from people based at the U.S.-Mexico border, inside public school classrooms and on the ground in some of the United States' fastest-growing cities. The Festival's lineup will also tackle issues of national security, technology and innovation, international trade, the 2020 elections, urban and rural challenges, solution seeking, public and higher education, criminal justice, immigration, health care, energy, the environment, transportation and more.
