From the President

Dear ABC Members:

your ABC President! This year has truly flown by, but I have been so blessed and honored to serve you in this role. I consider myself privileged to be a part of this body of educators, consultants, and practitioners who sometimes live for--or feel like they are dying over--the art and craft of business communication.

For the past 30 plus years, I've followed the path of an educator, and my writing has been a major piece of my travels. As you can imagine, this path is now pretty worn and trodden after years in the classroom as well as years at my keyboard as a writer. I'm not a novelist, nor a journalist, or a screenwriter-- any of whom strives to perfect the art of expression of ideas through the craft of word choice. Instead, my path as a writer has been to educate others to become better business writers and speakers, to become better team members, and to become better leaders.

I feel passionate about the role of the writer in our society, no matter what kind of writing we do. Writers are in a powerful position, compared to any other role in business or community service, to shape the views of the culture. The power of the written word is without measure. Words can build or break a relationship. They can enhance or diminish a reputation. Words can declare war or encourage peace. As an educator, I have learned that words can shape the lives of students who leave our classrooms to join the work force and who become our future ethical leaders.

I believe that writers hold a tremendous responsibility to use their platform to deliver ethical messages— words that build up the world, words that emphasize what is good in humankind, and words that inspire us to achieve our full potential. I believe writers, including myself, should be accountable for what we publish—because the words we leave behind become our legacy. As writers who desire to be highly published, we want to leave our mark on the world. Poet Joseph Addison wrote in his work, *The*

generation to generation, as presents to the posterity of those who are yet unborn.”

The great American novelist, William Faulkner, received the Nobel Prize in 1950 for his works. In his acceptance speech, Faulkner said, “The writer wants to leave a scratch on the wall—Kilroy was here—that somebody a hundred or a thousand years later will see.”

Faulkner also said something in his acceptance speech that I disagree with. He said “The writer’s only responsibility is to his art. He will be completely ruthless if he is a good one...If a writer has to rob his mother, he will not hesitate; the ‘Ode on a Grecian Urn’ is worth any number of old ladies.”

I must disagree as every writer must be accountable for his or her words and the effects those words create on others. As writers, we have a platform to shape the world, and I choose to put my efforts toward shaping the world into a great civilization that helps others become the best that they can be. I want to leave a legacy that makes a positive difference in the life of others.

I agree with novelist Joseph Conrad who wrote these words in 1898: “A work that aspires, however humbly, to the condition of art should carry its justification in every line.”

As a business communicator, I need to identify my justification—why I am writing what I am writing, who I am trying to influence, and what kind of legacy I want to leave because of my work.

In my own life’s work, I will share with you that I answer up to the God of my faith in regards to the work I do, and especially in my words. I can best share my feelings about this with you through Psalms 19:14, which says, “Let the words of my mouth and the meditations of my heart be acceptable in your

God. This is my choice, and this is my source of inspiration and to whom I am accountable.

I encourage each of you to use the power of your words to leave a legacy to build the world into a better place, for the sake of all generations to come. So that we can continue the legacy of "All for One, And One for All!"

Silent Auction at Annual Conference



For the fifth consecutive year, ABC will partner with a nonprofit organization in the city that is hosting us. This year our partner in Dublin is [Suas](#), an organization that creates "Development Education Programmes that are driven to educate, engage and inspire children."

In Ireland, one in ten children has serious literacy difficulties. In designated disadvantaged schools (DEIS), this figure can increase to one in three. Studies show children who do not learn to read, write, and communicate effectively at the primary level are more likely to leave school early, be unemployed or in lowskilled jobs, and have poorer emotional and physical health. They are more likely to end up in poverty and in prison. The impact is powerful and cumulative: Children do not achieve their full human potential, leading to an overall diminishment of society.





University of Texas Project on Conflict Resolution

Montreal's *Charter of Citizen Rights and Responsibilities*. The translation which was done by postdoctoral student Henrison Hsieh under Archibald's supervision follows upon a number of other translations including the Italian version published in cooperation with another ABC colleague, Giuliana Garzone from the University of Milan. As Lionel Perez, member of the City's Executive Committee put it during the ceremony held in the presence of Montreal's Philippine community at City Hall on June 13th, Archibald is "not only an ambassador for the *Charter*, but also an ambassador for the City". Beta Tester Opportunity for New Writing Assessment Application

Heidi Schultz and Mike Meredith are professors of management and corporate communication at the University of North Carolina's Kenan-Flagler Business School, and are looking for beta testers for a new writing assessment application called GradeOn!. They are using it for a research project that quantifies student writing improvement. They like the software because it combines the best of qualitatively-based, human-conducted assessment and quantitatively-based, software-conducted assessment.

faster, easier, and more consistent. The software allows instructors to create and share customized rubrics, quantifies improvement allowing instructors to validate students' progress, and automatically identifies areas for improvement by tracking writing trends for each student.

They used the software in their classes last year, analyzed writing improvement, and will be presenting those results at this year's conference in Dublin in October.

They would like to extend the research and invite beta testers to join them. By participating, you'll streamline the grading process, your students will get metrics-based reports that show them where their writing has opportunities to improve, you will be contributing to important research in our field, and we'll be asking you to provide feedback to help improve the software.
