Here is what we’ve been up to since Fall 2025...

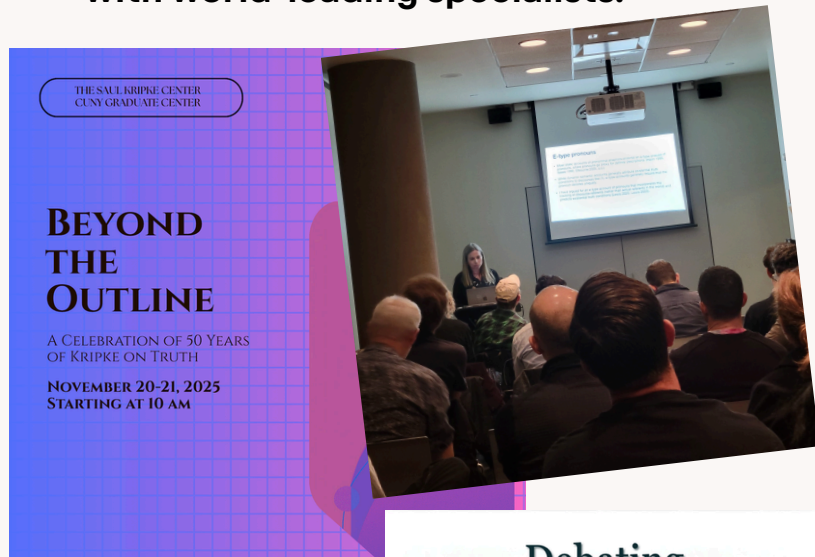
- **Stewarding the archive:**

We continue to digitize, systematize, and curate the archive, which includes:

1. Digital audio produced from the original reel-to-reel tape recordings of the Naming and Necessity lectures given by Kripke at Princeton University on January 20-29, 1970.
2. Transcripts of three lectures on truth that Kripke delivered at Princeton University on June 3-6, 1975, which constitute a longer version of his seminal paper, “Outline of a Theory of Truth.”
3. Transcripts of lectures given by Kripke on “Time and Identity” at Princeton University in Fall 1978.
4. “Lessons on Functionalism and Automata,” an address given at the Wittgenstein Symposium in 1984.
5. Correspondence with Alan R. Anderson, Alonzo Church, David K. Lewis, Arthur N. Prior, and others.

What it is: A focused effort to record and transcribe first-person accounts about Saul Kripke—from students, colleagues, interlocutors, and family.

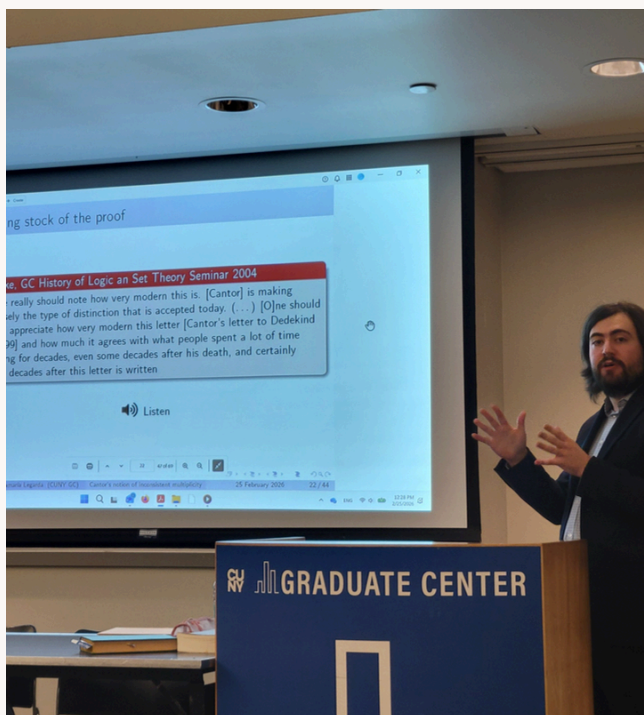
This project is conducted in collaboration with the Mina Rees Library.

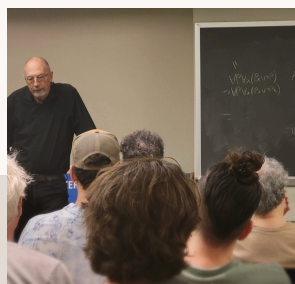
And even more...
