1 Presupposition

Presuppositions

- A speaker has presuppositions
- An utterance has entailments

Differences

- Entailment
 - Whenever A is true, B is true
- Presupposition
 - B must be taken for granted or assumed in order to interpret A

Entailment Test

- If there is any situation where A can be true, and B might not be true, then A does NOT entail B.
- If there is no such situation, then A entails B.

Entailment Test

- 1 Assume that A is true.
- 2 Assume that B is NOT true.
- 3 Check for contradiction.
 - If there is a contradiction, then A entails B.
 - If not, then A does not entail B.

Presupposition Test

- A presupposes B if it is inappropriate (odd, anomalous, out-of-place) to assert A without assuming that B is true.

Presupposition

Presupposition, unlike entailment, survives under...

- Negation
- Subordination (under modals, antecedent of if clause)
- Questioning
- Factive Verbs

Presupposition Triggers

- Some words trigger (imply) a presupposition
- Conventional Implicature

Presupposition Triggers

- Definiteness of a noun presupposes the nouns existence
- Possessives, Proper Names
- Existential Presupposition

Presupposition Triggers

- Possessives >>> Possession
- Like >>> Know
- Answer
- Only, again, manage, third, continue, win, another, lie

Presupposition Triggers

- Meaning of certain verbs
 - stop >> used to
 - know that
 - regret
 - forgot to >> supposed to
 - scare X >> X is animate

Presupposition Cancellation

- the presupposed statement can be denied or canceled.
- Presupposition cancellation often feels extremely odd, but it is not a total contradiction.
- entailment cancellation impossible: results in logical

Entailment and Presupposition

Does A presuppose/entail B?

A. Jorge sees a boy

B. Jorge sees a person

Entailment and Presupposition

Does A presuppose/entail B?

A. Karen steals a car.

B. Karen takes a car.

Entailment and Presupposition

Does A presuppose/entail B?

- A. The shah of Iran doesn't play tennis.
- B. There is a shah of Iran.

Entailment and Presupposition

Does A presuppose/entail B?

- A. Does every Tejana in the room smoke?
- B. There is a Tejana in the room.
