### Introduction

The City College of New York embodies the city's diversity through its students and with many students in the numerous programs the college holds. Despite being diverse and dynamic, the college does not have a strong space where students can connect with one another, relax in between classes, and enjoy activities with other students. As a commuter school many students find themselves with no place to go and long breaks, leading to students feeling bored and discontent. This sentiment does not bolster a sense of community within CCNY, but rather it feels like a mere destination as opposed to a friendly college environment. A student center would fulfill the needs of many students, allowing them to enjoy their time at campus.

Currently, there are little spaces for students to socialize, collaborate, and relax leaving missed opportunities for students to build relationships and reduce stress. In a recent survey we conducted on campus, the vast majority of students felt that a student center was needed and would benefit them.

Many students responded that the student center would allow them to do fun activities besides just studying and catching up on work. Students favored a food court, lounges, and a gym/weight room that should be included in the student center.




Fig. 2 Student preferences in a student center

Further research has been done highlighting the importance of a student center and how beneficial they can be to a student's wellbeing and academic success. A study done by Leah A. Barrett, "The College Union and a Sense of Community for Students in Public Higher Education: Is there a Relationship?", examined the importance of student centers and how students who were active and visited these centers experienced greater satisfaction with their college experience. Barrett writes "This study found that satisfaction with the college union has the strongest impact on student satisfaction with a sense of community than any other physical space on the college campus. These results suggest that the college union needs to be included in the conversation related to retention and persistence" (162). Barrett expresses how vital the student center is for a student's sense of belonging based on the Third place concept, where this concept describes where people choose to spend their time in a place that is neither work or home to build community, relax, and engage with others daily. Having a student center within CCNY would allow many students to have the center to become their 'Third Place' leading to a community being built. Without this student center, many would not nearly enjoy their time at campus. The center is more than an amenity, it improves the students' wellbeing and academic performance which is why CCNY needs to invest in this beneficial space.

## **Action Plan**

The reason behind the student center is to listen to the students and get what they want. We want to provide entertainment and also help students have a better place to spend their time, as well as a better place to study. Our current student center is very outdated and it does not have up to date technology to support student entertainment and education. When it came to deciding what would be in each floor we relied on the previously mentioned data from the survey. In the floor plans below you will be able to see the overview of each of the floors and what they will include. The overall student center is about 50,000 sq ft. We will be replacing Jacob H. Schiff Playground which is behind the NAC building.

When it comes to the flooring we will mainly be using hardwood flooring for the first and third floor.

When it comes to the second floor we will be installing laminate + Attached Pad as the flooring. This will help us reduce the noise that will come from the gym so that it does not affect the floor below which is the study rooms.

### **First Floor:**

The first floor will consist of a food court and also study rooms. The idea behind this is that we want students to have easy access to food while studying. We feel like having food near the students is important since they will need energy after hours of studying and putting in the work. We know that the food court can be a bit loud this is why we will make sure to add some noise cancellation walls to the study rooms. Furthermore we have decided to have a buffet so that we can have more healthy foods and also have a variety of foods instead of serving the same thing over and over again. We will look into having some chefs to help out so that we can have different foods. The computer area is something we felt was very important as there are some students that might not have the capability to own a computer, so providing some computer service can help students achieve more in their education. We also have a meeting room where groups of people can meet for a project or presentation. In order to use the meeting room you will need to go to reception and make a reservation. We will also have a reception at the entrance of each floor in order to gather data when it comes to the student center and make sure

that we accommodate students' needs.




Fig 3. Floor plan for first floor




Fig 4. Floor plan for second floor




Fig 5. Floor plan for third floor




Fig 6. Construction time table

The proposal to construct a student center at CCNY presents both considerable costs and promising long-term benefits. The direct costs of the project include construction, labor, materials, and ongoing maintenance. Based on data from similar public college projects in New York State, the average cost of building a student center ranges from \$400 to \$600 per square foot (National Center for Education Statistics, 2022). Assuming a 50,000-square-foot facility, the initial construction cost would range from \$20 million to \$30 million. Additional expenses include furnishings, IT infrastructure, and permitting fees. Operational costs, including staffing, utilities, and maintenance, are estimated at \$1.5 million annually (SUNY Capital Program Plan, 2021). These figures are outlined in the table above.

While the costs may be substantial, the benefits of a student center are numerous and long-lasting. A dedicated student space would promote engagement, wellness, and community-building activities that are directly linked to student retention and academic success (Astin, 1999; Tinto, 2012). A modern student center could house academic support services, student clubs, lounges, and event spaces, centralizing campus life and reducing commuter fatigue. According to a report by the Association of College Unions International (ACUI, 2020), campuses with robust student centers report a 7–10% increase in student satisfaction and retention rates. Moreover, the center could generate revenue through event rentals, food vendors, and campus retail, potentially offsetting annual operational costs. With CCNY's large commuter population, a student center would serve as a vital hub that enhances the college experience and contributes to long-term institutional prestige and student outcomes.

Ultimately, while the initial investment is significant, the long-term educational, social, and economic benefits of a student center make it a worthy addition to the CCNY campus. Funding could be secured through a combination of CUNY capital funding, state support, student fees, and alumni donations.
