HOUSE BILL NO. 5475

October 21, 2021, Introduced by Reps. Hood, Weiss, Tyrone Carter, Thanedar, Pohutsky, Haadsma, Brabec, Sowerby, Cavanagh, Stone and Kuppa and referred to the Committee on Education.

A bill to amend 1976 PA 451, entitled "The revised school code,"

by amending sections 1169, 1507, and 1507b (MCL 380.1169, 380.1507, and 380.1507b), sections 1169 and 1507 as amended and section 1507b as added by 2004 PA 165.

THE PEOPLE OF THE STATE OF MICHIGAN ENACT:

- 1 Sec. 1169. (1) The principal modes by which dangerous
- 2 communicable diseases, including, but not limited to, human
- 3 immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immunodeficiency

- 1 syndrome, are spread and the best methods for the restriction and
- 2 prevention of these diseases shall must be taught in every public
- 3 school in this state. Subject to subsection (3) and section 1507b,
- 4 the teaching under this section shall must stress that abstinence
- 5 from sex is a responsible and effective method for restriction and
- 6 prevention of these diseases and is a positive lifestyle for
- 7 unmarried young people. Factual information included in the
- 8 teaching under this section must be medically accurate and
- 9 objective.
- 10 (2) Except for licensed health care professionals who have
- 11 received training on human immunodeficiency virus infection and
- 12 acquired immunodeficiency syndrome, each person_individual who
- 13 teaches K to 12 pupils about human immunodeficiency virus infection
- 14 and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome pursuant to under subsection
- 15 (1) shall must have training in human immunodeficiency virus
- 16 infection and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome education for
- 17 young people. The superintendent of public instruction, in
- 18 cooperation with the department of public health and human
- 19 services, shall train trainers to provide the teacher training
- 20 required by under this subsection and shall provide for the
- 21 development and distribution to school districts of medically
- 22 accurate material on the teaching of human immunodeficiency virus
- 23 infection and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome to young people.
- 24 (3) The choice of curricula to be used for human
- 25 immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immunodeficiency
- 26 syndrome education required to be taught under subsection (1) shall
- 27 must be approved by the appropriate school board and implemented in
- 28 the school setting. not later than October 1, 1990. Before adopting
- 29 any revisions to the curriculum implemented under this section,

- 1 including, but not limited to, revisions to provide for the
- 2 teaching of abstinence from sex as a responsible method for
- 3 restriction and prevention of disease, a school board shall hold at
- 4 least 2 public hearings on the proposed revisions. The hearings
- 5 shall must be held at least 1 week apart and public notice of the
- 6 hearings shall must be given in the manner required under section
- 7 1201 for board meetings. A public hearing held pursuant to under
- 8 this section may be held in conjunction with a public hearing held
- 9 pursuant to under section 1507.
- 10 (4) As used in this section:
- 11 (a) "Factual information" includes, but is not limited to,
- 12 medical, psychiatric, psychological, empirical, and statistical
- 13 statements.
- 14 (b) "Medically accurate" means information that is verified or
- 15 supported by research conducted in compliance with scientific
- 16 methods and published in peer-reviewed journals, where appropriate,
- 17 and recognized as accurate and objective by professional
- 18 organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field,
- 19 such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- 20 Sec. 1507. (1) The board of a school district may engage
- 21 qualified instructors and provide facilities and equipment for
- 22 instruction in sex education, including family planning, human
- 23 sexuality, and the emotional, physical, psychological, hygienic,
- 24 economic, and social aspects of family life. If the board of a
- 25 school district provides instruction in sex education under this
- 26 section, the instruction must include comprehensive sexuality
- 27 education that is medically accurate and age-appropriate.
- 28 Instruction may also include the subjects of reproductive health
- 29 and the recognition, prevention, and treatment of sexually

- 1 transmitted disease. infection. Subject to subsection (7) (6) and
- 2 section 1507b, the instruction described in this subsection shall
- 3 must stress that abstinence from sex is a responsible and effective
- 4 method of preventing unplanned or out-of-wedlock pregnancy and
- 5 sexually transmitted disease infection and is a positive lifestyle
- 6 for unmarried young people. Factual information included in the
- 7 instruction under this section must be medically accurate and
- 8 objective.
- 9 (2) The class described in subsection (1) shall be elective
- 10 and not a requirement for graduation.
- 11 (2) (3) A pupil shall must not be enrolled in a class in which
- 12 the subjects of family planning or reproductive health are
- 13 discussed unless the pupil's parent or guardian is notified in
- 14 advance of the course and the content of the course, is given a
- 15 prior opportunity to review the materials to be used in the course,
- 16 and is notified in advance of his or her right to have the pupil
- 17 excused from the class. The state board shall determine the form
- 18 and content of the notice required in this subsection.
- 19 (3) (4) Upon the written request of a pupil or the pupil's
- 20 parent or legal quardian, a pupil shall must be excused, without
- 21 penalty or loss of academic credit, from attending a class
- 22 described in subsection (1).
- 23 (4) (5) A school district that provides a class as permitted
- 24 by subsection (1) shall offer shall provide the instruction under
- 25 this section by teachers qualified to teach health-sexuality
- 26 education. A school district that provides the instruction under
- 27 this section shall not offer this instruction unless establish a
- 28 sex education advisory board. is established by the board of the
- 29 school district. The board of a school district shall determine

- 1 terms of service for the sex education advisory board, the number
- 2 of members to serve on the advisory board, and a membership
- 3 selection process that reasonably reflects the school district
- 4 population, and shall appoint 2 co-chairs for the advisory board,
- 5 at least 1 of whom is a parent of a child attending a school
- 6 operated by the school district. At least 1/2 of the members of the
- 7 sex education advisory board shall must be parents who have a child
- 8 attending a school operated by the school district, and a majority
- 9 of these parent members shall must be individuals who are not
- 10 employed by a school district. The board of a school district shall
- 11 include pupils of the school district, educators, local clergy, and
- 12 community health professionals on the sex education advisory board.
- 13 Written or electronic notice of a sex education advisory board
- 14 meeting shall must be sent to each member at least 2 weeks before
- 15 the date of the meeting. The advisory board shall do all of the
- 16 following:
- 17 (a) Establish program goals and objectives for pupil knowledge
- 18 and skills that are likely to reduce the rates of sex, pregnancy,
- 19 and sexually transmitted diseases.—infections. This subdivision
- 20 does not prohibit a school district from establishing additional
- 21 program goals and objectives that are not contrary to this section,
- 22 section 1169, or section 1507b.
- 23 (b) Review the materials and methods of instruction used and
- 24 make recommendations to the board of the school district for
- 25 implementation. The advisory board shall take into consideration
- 26 the school district's needs, demographics, and trends, including,
- 27 but not limited to, teenage pregnancy rates, sexually transmitted
- 28 disease infection rates, and incidents of student sexual violence
- 29 and harassment.

1 (c) At least once every 2 years, evaluate, measure, and report
2 the attainment of program goals and objectives established under
3 subdivision (a). The board of a school district shall make the

resulting report available to parents in the school district.

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- 5 (5) (6) Before adopting any revisions in the materials or 6 methods used in instruction under this section, including, but not 7 limited to, revisions to provide for the teaching of abstinence 8 from sex as a method of preventing unplanned or out-of-wedlock 9 pregnancy and sexually transmitted disease, infection, the board of 10 a school district shall hold at least 2 public hearings on the 11 proposed revisions. The hearings shall must be held at least 1 week apart and public notice of the hearings shall must be given in the 12 manner required under section 1201 for board meetings. A public 13 14 hearing held pursuant to under this section may be held in 15 conjunction with a public hearing held pursuant to under section 16 1169.
- (6) (7) A person shall not dispense or otherwise distribute in
 a public school or on public school property a family planning drug
 or device.
- (7) (8)—As used in this section, "family planning" means the 20 use of a range of methods of fertility regulation to help 21 22 individuals or couples avoid unplanned pregnancies; bring about 23 wanted births; regulate the intervals between pregnancies; and plan 24 the time at which births occur in relation to the age of parents. 25 It may include the study of fetology. It may include marital and genetic information. Clinical abortion shall not be considered a 26 27 method of family planning, nor shall abortion be taught as a method 28 of reproductive health.
 - (8) (9) As used in this section and sections 1506 and 1507a:

(a) "Board of a school district" means the board of a school district or board of directors of a public school academy.

- 3 (b) (a) "Class" means an instructional period of limited
 4 duration within a course of instruction and includes an assembly or
 5 small group presentation.
- 6 (c) (b) "Course" means a series of classes linked by a common7 subject matter.
 - (d) "Factual information" includes, but is not limited to, medical, psychiatric, psychological, empirical, and statistical statements.
 - (e) "Medically accurate" means information that is verified or supported by research conducted in compliance with scientific methods and published in peer-reviewed journals, where appropriate, and recognized as accurate and objective by professional organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field, such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- 17 (f) "School district" means a school district or a public 18 school academy.
 - Sec. 1507b. (1) Instruction under section 1507 in sex sexuality education and instruction under section 1169 on human immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome shall emphasize must be age-appropriate, medically accurate, and objective, and must emphasize that abstinence from sex is a positive lifestyle for unmarried young people because abstinence is the only protection that is 100% effective against unplanned pregnancy, sexually transmitted disease infection, and sexually transmitted human immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome.
 - (2) Material, factual information, and instruction in the sex

- 1 sexuality education curriculum under section 1507 that discusses
- 2 sex shall must be age-appropriate, shall not be medically
- 3 inaccurate accurate, and objective, and shall must do at least all
- 4 of the following:
- 5 (a) Discuss the benefits of abstaining from sex until marriage
- 6 and the benefits of ceasing sex protecting oneself if a pupil is
- 7 sexually active, and provide the tools to make informed and
- 8 responsible decisions.
- 9 (b) Include a discussion of the possible emotional, economic,
- 10 and legal consequences of sex.
- 11 (c) Stress that unplanned pregnancy and sexually transmitted
- 12 diseases infections are serious possibilities of sex that are not
- 13 fully preventable except by abstinence.
- 14 (d) Advise pupils of the laws pertaining to their
- 15 responsibility as parents to children born in and out of wedlock.
- 16 (e) Ensure that pupils are not taught in a way that condones
- 17 the violation of the laws of this state pertaining to sexual
- 18 activity, including, but not limited to, sections 158, 335a, 338,
- 19 338a, 338b, and 520b to 520e of the Michigan penal code, 1931 PA
- 20 328, MCL 750.158, 750.335a, 750.338, 750.338a, 750.338b, and
- 21 750.520b to 750.520e.
- (f) Teach pupils how to say "no" to sexual advances and that
- 23 it is wrong to take advantage of, harass, or exploit another person
- 24 individual sexually.
- 25 (g) Teach refusal skills and encourage pupils to resist
- 26 pressure to engage in risky behavior.
- (h) Teach that the pupil has the power to control personal
- 28 behavior. Pupils shall must be taught to base their actions on
- 29 reasoning, self-discipline, a sense of responsibility, self-

- control, and ethical considerations such as respect for self andothers.
- 3 (i) Provide instruction on healthy dating relationships and on4 how to set limits and recognize a dangerous environment.
- (j) Provide information for pupils about how young parents can
 learn more about adoption services and about the provisions of the
 safe delivery of newborns law, chapter XII of the probate code of
 1939, 1939 PA 288, MCL 712.1 to 712.20.
- 9 (k) Include information clearly informing pupils that having
 10 sex or sexual contact with an individual under the age of 16 is a
 11 crime punishable by imprisonment and that 1 of the other **possible**12 results of being convicted of this crime is to be listed on the sex
 13 offender registry on the internet for up to 25 years.
- 14 (3) In addition to the requirements under subsection (2), all of the following apply to the sexuality education instruction under section 1507:
- 17 (a) Instruction and materials must be appropriate for use with 18 pupils of all races, genders, sexual orientations, and ethnic and 19 cultural backgrounds; pupils with disabilities; and English 20 language learners.
- 21 (b) Instruction and materials must affirmatively recognize 22 that individuals have different sexual orientations and, when 23 discussing or providing examples of relationships and couples, must 24 be inclusive of same-sex relationships.
- 25 (c) Instruction and materials must teach pupils about gender, 26 gender expression, and gender identity, and must explore the harm 27 of negative gender stereotypes.
- 28 (d) Instruction and materials must encourage pupils to
 29 communicate with their parents, guardians, and other trusted adults

- 1 about human sexuality and provide the knowledge and skills
- 2 necessary to do so.
- 3 (e) Instruction and materials must teach the value of, and
- 4 prepare pupils to have and maintain, committed relationships, such
- 5 as marriage.
- 6 (f) Instruction and materials must provide pupils with the
- 7 knowledge and skills they need to form healthy relationships that
- 8 are based on mutual respect and affection and that are free from
- 9 violence, coercion, and intimidation.
- 10 (g) Instruction and materials must provide pupils with
- 11 knowledge and skills for making and implementing healthy decisions
- 12 about sexuality, including negotiation and refusal skills to assist
- 13 pupils overcoming peer pressure and using effective decision-making
- 14 skills to avoid high-risk activities.
- 15 (h) Instruction and materials must not teach or promote
- 16 religious doctrine.
- 17 (i) Instruction and materials must include information about
- 18 the effectiveness and safety of all contraceptive methods approved
- 19 by the United States Food and Drug Administration in preventing
- 20 pregnancy, including, but not limited to, emergency contraception.
- 21 (j) Instruction on pregnancy must be an objective discussion
- 22 of all legally available pregnancy outcomes, including parenting,
- 23 adoption, abortion, and the surrendering of a child, and the
- 24 importance of prenatal care.
- 25 (k) Instruction and materials must include information about
- 26 sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human
- 27 trafficking, and information and strategies to reduce the risk of
- 28 sexual harassment, sexual assault, sexual abuse, and human
- 29 trafficking.

- 1 (*l*) Instruction and materials must include information about 2 resources related to sexual and reproductive health care, how to 3 access those resources, and pupils' legal rights to access those 4 resources, including resources for assistance with sexual assault 5 and partner violence.
 - (4) (3)—This section does not prohibit a public school from offering sex education with behavioral risk reduction strategies, as defined by law, that are not 100% effective against unplanned pregnancy, sexually transmitted disease, infection, and sexually transmitted human immunodeficiency virus infection and acquired immunodeficiency syndrome.
 - (5) As used in this section:

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- (a) "Factual information" includes, but is not limited to, medical, psychiatric, psychological, empirical, and statistical statements.
 - (b) "Medically accurate" means information that is verified or supported by research conducted in compliance with scientific methods and published in peer-reviewed journals, where appropriate, and recognized as accurate and objective by professional organizations and agencies with expertise in the relevant field, such as the federal Centers for Disease Control and Prevention.
- 22 Enacting section 1. This amendatory act takes effect 90 days 23 after the date it is enacted into law.
