An act to amend Section 8692 of the Government Code, and to amend Section 9120 of the Welfare and Institutions Code, relating to emergency services. disaster preparedness.

LEGISLATIVE COUNSEL'S DIGEST

SB 352, as amended, Reyes. California Emergency Services Act. *Disaster preparedness*.

The California Emergency Services Act generally prescribes duties with regard to various types of emergencies and disasters. The act requires the Office of Emergency Services, in consultation with specified persons and entities, including the access and functional needs community, to develop guidelines for alerting and warning the public of an emergency, as specified, and then to provide those guidelines to each city, county, and city and county. If a state of emergency is proclaimed, the act authorizes an eligible private nonprofit organization to receive state assistance for distribution of supplies and other disaster or emergency assistance activities resulting in extraordinary cost, as specified.

This bill would require eligible area agencies on aging and independent living centers that provide transportation and evacuation services to individuals with access and functional needs during a state of emergency to be prioritized for the state assistance described above.

Existing law establishes an Aging and Disability Resource Connection (ADRC) program, administered by the California Department of Aging, to provide information to consumers and their families on available

long-term services and supports (LTSS) programs and to assist older adults, caregivers, and persons with disabilities in accessing LTSS programs at the local level. Existing law requires ADRC programs to provide specified services, including, among other things, enhanced information and referral services and other assistance at hours that are convenient for the public.

This bill would further require ADRC programs to provide disaster and emergency preparedness training specifically designed to help older adults and people with disabilities prepare for emergencies and ensure their safety before, during, and after natural disasters and other emergency events, as specified.

Existing law requires a county, including a city and county to, upon the next update to its emergency plan, integrate access and functional needs into its emergency plan by addressing, at a minimum, how the access and functional needs population is being served by emergency communications, evacuations, and sheltering, as specified.

This bill would state the intent of the Legislature to enact legislation relating to evacuation plans for individuals that have access and functional needs.

The people of the State of California do enact as follows:

1 SECTION 1. The Legislature finds and declares all of the 2 following:

3 (a) When a natural disaster occurs, certain individuals may have needs that cannot be effectively addressed through traditional 4 5 emergency response and recovery methods. These needs, referred 6 to as "access and functional needs" within the emergency 7 management community, arise from a variety of factors, including, 8 but not limited to, developmental or intellectual disabilities, physical disabilities, chronic health conditions, injuries, limited 9 10 English proficiency, age, including older adults and children, institutional living, low income, homelessness, transportation 11 12 challenges, including reliance on public transportation, and 13 pregnancy. Emergencies impact individuals in distinct ways 14 depending on their specific needs. 15 (b) While all individuals are vulnerable during a natural

15 (b) while all individuals are vulnerable during a natural 16 disaster, those with access and functional needs face heightened

1 vulnerabilities due to their unique circumstances. Historical 2 evidence demonstrates that these individuals are disproportionately 3 affected by disasters. According to a 2019 report conducted by 4 the California State Auditor, people with certain access and 5 functional needs are two to four times more likely to perish in a 6 natural disaster compared to the general population. These individuals can constitute a significant portion of the affected 7 8 population, underscoring the importance of incorporating 9 strategies into emergency plans that specifically address the 10 protection and assistance of these vulnerable groups.

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(c) Despite the critical importance of this issue, emergency
agencies have often faced challenges in adequately supporting
individuals with access and functional needs during natural
disasters. Notably, alerting and warning, evacuation, and
sheltering have historically posed significant obstacles in meeting
the needs of these individuals.

17 SEC. 2. Section 8692 of the Government Code is amended to 18 read:

19 8692. (a) If a state of emergency is proclaimed, an eligible
20 private nonprofit organization may receive state assistance for
21 distribution of supplies and other disaster or emergency assistance
22 activities resulting in extraordinary cost.

(b) A private nonprofit organization is eligible for assistance
under this section if it is eligible for disaster assistance under the
federal Robert T. Stafford Disaster Relief and Emergency
Assistance Act (42 U.S.C. Sec. 5121).

(c) An organization is not eligible for assistance under this
 section if it employs religious content in the provision of
 emergency assistance.

30 (d) Area agencies on aging and independent living centers shall
31 be prioritized for the state assistance provided pursuant to this
32 section if both of the following apply:

(1) The entity provides transportation and evacuation services
 to individuals with access and functional needs during a state of
 emergency.

36 (2) The entity is an eligible private nonprofit organization

39 (e) Any grant of assistance under this section shall comply with
 40 Section 4 of Article I and Section 5 of Article XVI of the California

Constitution, state and federal civil rights laws, and the First 1 2 Amendment to the United States Constitution in regard to the 3 funding of religious organizations and activities. These legal 4 constraints include prohibitions on the discrimination against 5 beneficiaries and staff based on protected categories, on the use of public funds for proselytizing of religious doctrine, religious 6 7 instruction, or worship, and on the use of other religious means to 8 accomplish programmatic goals. 9 (e) 10 (f) The Office of Emergency Services shall adopt regulations 11 to implement this section. SEC. 3. Section 9120 of the Welfare and Institutions Code is 12 13 amended to read: 14 9120. (a) There is hereby established an Aging and Disability 15 Resource Connection (ADRC) program to provide information to consumers and their families on available long-term services and 16 17 supports (LTSS) programs and to assist older adults, caregivers, 18 and persons with disabilities in accessing LTSS programs at the 19 local level through ADRC programs operated jointly by area 20 agencies on aging and independent living centers. 21 (b) This article shall be administered and implemented by the 22 California Department of Aging, in collaboration with the Department of Rehabilitation and the State Department of Health 23 24 Care Services. 25 (c) Area agencies on aging and independent living centers shall 26 be the core local partners in developing ADRC programs. The 27 California Department of Aging shall assist interested and qualified 28 area agencies on aging and independent living centers in completing an application to be designated as an ADRC program. 29 30 (d) An ADRC program operated by an area agency on aging 31 and an independent living center shall provide all of the following: 32 (1) Enhanced information and referral services and other 33 assistance at hours that are convenient for the public. 34 (2) Options counseling concerning available LTSS programs 35 and public and private benefits programs. (3) Short-term service coordination. 36 37 (4) Transition services from hospitals to home and from skilled 38 nursing facilities to the community. 39 (5) Disaster and emergency preparedness training specifically 40 designed to help older adults and people with disabilities prepare

for emergencies and ensure their safety before, during, and after
 natural disasters and other emergency events.

3 (A) The training shall utilize emergency preparedness and

4 response tools developed by the Office of Emergency Services, the

5 California Department of Aging, the Department of Rehabilitation,6 and other relevant community partners.

7 (B) The training shall raise awareness of existing available 8 resources and guidance, including, but not limited to, local alert 9 systems, local emergency plans, information from the local fire 10 department, and information related to utility services during 11 emergencies and natural disasters.

(e) An ADRC program operated by an area agency on agingand an independent living center shall do both of the following:

14 (1) Provide services within the geographic area served.

(2) Provide information to the public about the services providedby the program.

17 (f) (1) The California Department of Aging, in consultation 18 with the Aging and Disability Resource Connection Advisory 19 Committee within the California Department of Aging, shall 20 develop a core model of ADRC best practices. These best practices 21 shall be implemented by July 1, 2022, by all ADRC programs 22 operated by area agencies on aging and independent living centers. 23 To the extent feasible, the best practices shall be considered in the 24 development and continued updating of the master plan on aging. 25 In the development of these best practices, the department and 26 advisory committee shall consider, at a minimum, all of the 27 following practices:

28 (A) A person-centered counseling process.

29 (B) Public outreach and coordination with key referral sources,

30 including, but not limited to, caregiver resource centers, the medical

31 centers of the United States Department of Veteran Affairs, acute

32 care systems, local 211 programs, local multipurpose senior service

33 programs, Programs of All-Inclusive Care for the Elderly (PACE),

34 adult day care services, and LTSS providers.

35 (C) A formal followup procedure to ensure that services for 36 which a person received a referral were received and methods for 37 correcting service provision if needed.

38 (D) A model for the best ways for area agencies on aging and

39 independent living centers to share necessary data and client

40 information.

(E) A model for the collection and reporting of data to the
 California Department of Aging, which shall include, but not be
 limited to, the demographic information for each individual
 counseled, the number of consumers served by category of service,
 and the number of caregivers served.
 (2) The California Department of Aging shall review

7 implementation of the ADRC Infrastructure Grants Program 8 described in Section 9121 for consideration in developing and 9 updating the best practices model.

10 (g) The implementation of this section is contingent on an 11 appropriation in the annual Budget Act, or another act, for that 12 express purpose.

13 SECTION 1. It is the intent of the Legislature to enact

14 legislation relating to evacuation plans for individuals that have
 15 access and functional needs.

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
