8 PROHIBITION ON USE OF FOR-PROFIT COMPANIES IN "PART VII-C. 9 **OPERATION OF CHARTERS** 10

SECTION 7C.1. G.S. 115C-218.15(b) reads as rewritten:

11 "(b) A charter school shall be operated by a private nonprofit corporation that shall have received federal tax-exempt status no later than 24 months following final approval of the 12 13 application. A charter school shall not contract with any for-profit entity for operation or 14 management of the school. The board of directors of the charter schools shall adopt a conflict of interest and anti-nepotism policy that includes, at a minimum, the following: 15"

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SECTION 7C.2. G.S. 115C-218.3 reads as rewritten:

18 "§ 115C-218.3. Fast-track replication of high-quality charter schools.

19 Upon recommendations by the Office of Charter Schools and the Charter Schools Advisory 20 Board, the State Board of Education shall adopt a process and rules for fast-track replication of high-quality charter schools currently operating in the State. The State Board of Education shall 21 not require a planning year for applicants selected through the fast-track replication process. In 22 23 addition to the requirements for charter applicants set forth in this Article, the fast-track replication process adopted by the State Board of Education shall, at a minimum, require a board 24 of directors of a charter school to demonstrate one of the following in order to qualify for 25 26 fast-track replication:

- 27 28 (2)The board of directors agrees to contract with an a nonprofit education 29 management organization or nonprofit charter management organization that can demonstrate both of the following: 30
- The majority of the charter schools in this State managed by the 31 a. nonprofit organization has student academic outcomes from the three 32

9	unless granted a waiver by the State Board of Education, the following:		
10	a. Children or grandchildren of persons (i) employed full time by the		
11	charter school or (ii) working full time in the daily operation of the		
12	charter school, including children of persons employed by an-a		
13	nonprofit education management organization or nonprofit charter		
14	management organization for the charter school."		
15	SECTION 7C.4. G.S. 115C-218.90(a)(1) reads as rewritten:		
16	"(1) An employee of a charter school is not an employee of the local school		
17	administrative unit in which the charter school is located. The charter school's		
18	board of directors shall employ and contract with necessary teachers or		
19	contract with an <u>a nonprofit</u> education management organization or <u>nonprofit</u>		
20	charter management organization to employ and provide teachers to perform		
21	the particular service for which they are employed in the school; at least fifty		
22	percent (50%) of these teachers shall hold teacher licenses. All teachers who		
23	are teaching in the core subject areas of mathematics, science, social studies,		
24	and language arts shall be college graduates.		
25	The board also may employ necessary employees who are not required to		
26	hold teacher licenses to perform duties other than teaching and may contract

34	SECTION 7D.1. G.S. 115C-218.10 reads as rewritten:		
35	"§ 115C-218.10. Charter school exemptions.		
36	Except as provided in this Article and pursuant to the provisions of its charter, a charter school		
37	is exempt from subject to the statutes and rules applicable to a local board of education or local		
38	school administrative unit."		
39 40	SECTION 7D.2. G.S. 115C-218.40 reads as rewritten:		
40	"§ 115C-218.40. Charter school transportation.		
41 42	The charter school <u>may shall</u> provide transportation for students enrolled at the <u>school.school</u>		
42 43	as provided in this section. The charter school shall develop a transportation plan so that transportation is not a barrier to any student who resides in the local school administrative unit

The charter school is not required to provide transportation to any 2 student who lives within one and one-half miles of the school. G.S. 115C-562.5(a) reads as rewritten: 13 "(a) A nonpublic school that accepts eligible students receiving scholarship grants shall 14 comply with the following: 15 (1)Provide to the Authority documentation for required tuition and fees charged to the student by the nonpublic school. 16 Provide to the Authority a criminal background check conducted for the staff 17 (2)18 member with the highest decision-making authority, as defined by the bylaws, 19 articles of incorporation, or other governing document. Information provided 20 to the Authority in accordance with this subdivision is privileged information 21 and is not a public record but is for the exclusive use of the Authority. 22 Provide to the parent or guardian of an eligible student, whose tuition and fees (3) are paid in whole or in part with a scholarship grant, an annual written 23 24 explanation of the student's progress, including the student's scores on 25 standardized achievement tests. 26 (4) Administer, at least once in each school year, a nationally standardized test or 27 other nationally standardized equivalent measurement selected by the chief 28 administrative officer of the nonpublic school to all eligible students whose 29 tuition and fees are paid in whole or in part with a scholarship grant enrolled 30 in grades three and higher. For grades three through eight, the nationally 31 standardized test or other equivalent measurement selected must measure 32 achievement in the areas of English grammar, reading, spelling, and 33 mathematics. For grades nine through 12, the nationally standardized test or 34 other equivalent measurement selected must measure either (i) achievement 35 in the areas of English grammar, reading, spelling, and mathematics or (ii) competencies in the verbal and quantitative areas. Test performance data shall 36 be submitted to the Authority by July 15 of each year. Test performance data 37 reported to the Authority under this subdivision is not a public record under 38 39 Chapter 132 of the General Statutes. 40 Provide to the Authority graduation rates of the students receiving scholarship (5) 41 grants in a manner consistent with nationally recognized standards. 42 Contract with a certified public accountant to perform a financial review, (6) 43 consistent with generally accepted accounting principles, for each school year

13		n. The board of directors of the charter schools shall adopt a conflict of interest interest,
14	criminal h	istory exclusions, and anti-nepotism policy that includes, at a minimum, the following:
15		(1) The requirements of Chapter 55A of the General Statutes related to conflicts
16		of interest.
17		(2) A requirement that before any immediate family, as defined in $C = 115C = 12.2$, of any member of the board of directors or a charter school

17			relevant to the employee's resignation or dismissal.

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5 SECTION 7G.9. Section 7G.6 of this act becomes effective July 1, 2023. The 6 remainder of this act is effective when it becomes law. Sections 7G.1 through 7G.5 of this act apply beginning with the 2023-2024 school year. A nonpublic school enrolling a student 7 8 receiving a scholarship grant for the 2023-2024 school year shall provide the Authority with data 9 on grade retention required pursuant to G.S. 115C-562.5(a)(4b), as enacted by this act, for the

2019-2020, 2020-2021, 2021-2022, and 2022-2023 school years.". 10
