4	WHEREAS, According to the United Nations, Sanskrit has influenced
5	97 percent of world languages; and
6	WHEREAS, Sanskrit is one of the proto-Indo-European languages,
7	similar to Latin and Greek; and
8	WHEREAS, Sanskrit has a unique origin, not created by man, but the
9	language of Rigveda more than 3,500 years ago, making Sanskrit
10	the oldest language of ancient India; and
11	WHEREAS, Sanskrit is the mother of all languages because it is elegant
12	and influential; and
13	WHEREAS, Sanskrit is one of the most systematic, technical, highly
14	versatile, and innovative languages; and
15	WHEREAS, Sanskrit has precision, clarity, and complex grammar; and
16	WHEREAS, Sanskrit uses Devanagari for writing and has a
17	sophisticated structure comprising well-organized, structured
18	letters; and
19	WHEREAS, Sanskrit has the largest vocabulary of approximately
20	102,000 words; and
21	WHEREAS, Learning Sanskrit can improve brain functions and
22	increase memory power; and
23	WHEREAS, Sanskrit was the classical literary language of the Hindus
24	who consider Panini as the founder of the Sanskrit grammar and
25	literature; and
26	WHEREAS, Panini was a Sanskrit grammarian who gave a
27	comprehensive and scientific theory of phonetics, phonology, and
28	morphology; and
29	WHEREAS, Panini's Ashtadhyayi, meaning eight chapters, provides
30	Sanskrit's grammatical adherence, which removed the need for
31	Sanskrit's evolution; and
32	WHEREAS, Sanskrit is perfect for expressing subtle philosophical
33	teachings; and
34	WHEREAS, Sanskrit has 2,500 years of literature of Vyasa, Vedas,
35	poetry of Kalidasa Ramayana, writings of great philosophers such
36	as Adi Shankaracharya, and saints such as Narada, known in the
37	Hindu traditions; and
38	WHEREAS, Vyasa is a revered sage portrayed in most Hindu traditions
39	as writing epics like the Mahabharata and the Bhagavadgita; and
40	WHEREAS, NASA scientist, Rick Briggs, reported Sanskrit is one of
41	the most suitable languages for computers because of its efficiency
42	in developing algorithms; and
43	WHEREAS, Sanskrit is known in the Hindu traditions as the language
44	of the gods; now, therefore,
