## **SYNOPSIS**

Expands authority of pharmacy technician in administering drugs and vaccines and permits pharmacists and pharmacy interns, externs, and technicians to administer COVID-19 vaccine.

## **CURRENT VERSION OF TEXT**

As reported by the Senate Health, Human Services and Senior Citizens Committee on October 28, 2024, with amendments.



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AN ACT concerning pharmacists and pharmacy interns, externs, and
 technicians, COVID-19 vaccines, and amending P.L.2003, c.280.

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**BE IT ENACTED** by the Senate and General Assembly of the State of New Jersey:

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7 1. Section 24 of P.L.2003, c.280 (C.45:14-63) is amended to8 read as follows:

9 24. a. No pharmacist shall administer a prescription medication 10 directly to a patient without appropriate education [or certification] 11 and training, as determined by the board in accordance with the 12 requirements set forth in the rules jointly promulgated by the board and the State Board of Medical Examiners. Such medication shall 13 14 only be for the treatment of a disease for which a nationally 15 certified program is in effect, or as determined by the board, and 16 only if utilized for the treatment of that disease for which the 17 medication is prescribed or indicated or for which the collaborative 18 drug therapy management permits.

(1) Notwithstanding any law, rule, or regulation to the 19 b. 20 contrary, a pharmacist, pharmacy intern, [or] pharmacy extern, or 21 pharmacy technician may administer drugs to a patient 18 years of 22 age or older, provided the pharmacist, pharmacy intern, [or] 23 pharmacy extern, or pharmacy technician is appropriately educated 24 and qualified, as determined by the board in accordance with the 25 requirements set forth in the rules jointly promulgated by the board 26 and the State Board of Medical Examiners, and provided the drugs 27 are administered under any one of the following conditions:

(a) pursuant to a prescription by an authorized prescriber for avaccine and related emergency medications;

30 (b) in immunization programs implemented pursuant to an
31 authorized prescriber's standing order for the vaccine and related
32 emergency medications; or

(c) in immunization programs and programs sponsored by
 governmental agencies that are not patient specific <sup>1</sup>; provided,
 <u>however</u>, that a pharmacy technician shall not be authorized to
 administer any medication pursuant to such programs unless the
 medication is related to the immunization and necessary to respond
 to an emergency<sup>1</sup>.

39 (2) A pharmacist, pharmacy intern, [or] pharmacy extern, or
40 pharmacy technician may administer an influenza vaccine, a
41 COVID-19 vaccine, or both, to a patient who is [seven] five years
42 of age or older. For a patient who is under 18 years of age, a
43 pharmacist, pharmacy intern, [or] pharmacy extern, or pharmacy
44 technician shall not administer a vaccine except with the permission

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of the patient's parent or legal guardian. [For a patient who is under 10 years of age, a pharmacist, pharmacy intern, or pharmacy extern shall not administer a vaccine unless pursuant to a prescription by an authorized prescriber. Nothing in this subsection shall be construed to require a patient 10 years of age or older to obtain a prescription for an influenza vaccine.]

7 (3) A pharmacy intern [or], pharmacy extern, or pharmacy 8 technician, as defined by regulation of the New Jersey State Board 9 of Pharmacy, may administer immunizations, as provided in this 10 subsection, to patients by injection or by other delivery method, 11 provided that the pharmacy intern [or], pharmacy extern, or pharmacy technician is acting under the direct supervision of a 12 13 licensed pharmacist who is pre-approved by the New Jersey State 14 Board of Pharmacy to administer vaccines and related emergency 15 medications, and who is in compliance with the rules jointly 16 promulgated by the New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy and the 17 State Board of Medical Examiners.

c. <sup>1</sup>[An immunization] <u>All doses of a vaccine</u><sup>1</sup> administered to
a patient by a pharmacist, pharmacy intern, [or] pharmacy extern,
<u>or pharmacy technician pursuant to this subsection</u> shall be reported
<sup>1</sup>[by a supervising pharmacist]<sup>1</sup> to the New Jersey Immunization
Information System established pursuant to section 4 of P.L.2004,
c.138 (C.26:4-134) as required pursuant to N.J.A.C.8:57-3.16, for
inclusion in the patient's registry.

The New Jersey State Board of Pharmacy and the State 27 28 Board of Medical Examiners may adopt regulations necessary to 29 effectuate the purposes of this act, which regulations shall be 30 effective immediately upon filing with the Office of Administrative 31 Law for a period not to exceed 18 months, and may, thereafter, be amended, adopted or readopted in accordance with the provisions of 32 33 the "Administrative Procedure Act," P.L.1968, c.410 (C.52:14B-1 et <u>seq.).</u><sup>1</sup> 34 35
