3 "SALUDA GRADE RAIL CORRIDOR

4 SECTION 14.5.(a) Findings and Purpose. - The General Assembly finds that the 5 Saluda Grade Railroad was constructed in the 1870s to link Spartanburg, South Carolina, to 6 Asheville, North Carolina, and holds a special place in American rail history as the steepest 7 standard-gauge mainline railroad in the United States, located where the line crosses the dramatic 8 Blue Ridge Escarpment. The General Assembly further finds that the 31-mile portion of the 9 Railroad proposed for acquisition stretches from Inman, SC, to Zirconia, NC, with 16 miles in 10 South Carolina and 15 miles in North Carolina, and would pass through downtown Inman. Gramling, Campobello, Landrum, Tryon, and Saluda, as well as the picturesque Piedmont 11 countryside, the Pacolet River valley with its plunging waterfalls, and the spectacular scenery 12 13 around the Green River and Lake Summit. The purpose of this section is to take advantage of an unprecedented opportunity for the citizens of North Carolina to celebrate 2023 as the Year of the 14 15 Trail and enhance the reputation of North Carolina as the Great Trails State by acquiring the 16 Saluda Grade rail corridor for conversion into the Saluda Grade Trail.

17 SECTION 14.5.(b) Definition. – For purposes of this section, the Saluda Grade rail 18 corridor means the portion of the Norfolk Southern W-Line railroad between milepost 26 in the 19 unincorporated community of Zirconia in Henderson County and the boundary between North 20 Carolina and South Carolina.

21 SECTION 14.5.(c) Funding. - Notwithstanding any other provision of law or the Committee Report referenced in Section 43.2 of this act to the contrary, funds appropriated in 22 this act from the projected interest in the State Fiscal Recovery Reserve shall be increased by six 23 24 million dollars (\$6,000,000) in the 2023-2024 fiscal year, and eleven million dollars 25 (\$11,000,000) in the 2024-2025 fiscal year. These funds shall be transferred to the Department 26 of Natural and Cultural Resources to provide grants in each year of the biennium to Polk County Community Foundation, Inc., a nonprofit corporation (Foundation), to be allocated in the 27 following amounts and for the following purposes: 28

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(1) \$5,000,000 in the 2023-2024 fiscal year and \$11,000,000 in the 2024-2025 fiscal year for the purchase of the Saluda Grade rail corridor in Henderson and Polk Counties and related transaction costs.



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1 \$450,000 in the 2023-2024 fiscal year to conduct an assessment, conceptual (2)2 design and preliminary engineering of the Saluda Grade rail corridor. 3 (3) \$550,000 in the 2023-2024 fiscal year to study the potential of a multipurpose active tourism rail and hiking corridor from the City of 4 5 Hendersonville to either the Town of Tryon or the Town of Saluda, and if such 6 a multi-purpose active tourism rail and hiking corridor is determined to be 7 feasible, to develop a conceptual plan and preliminary engineering for its 8 implementation. 9 SECTION 14.5.(d) Council Established. – The Foundation shall establish a Saluda 10 Grade Conservation Council to oversee the disbursement of funds provided by this section to the 11 Foundation as provided in this subsection: 12 Membership. -The Council shall include two members appointed by the (1)13 General Assembly, upon recommendation of the Speaker of the House of 14 Representatives in accordance with G.S. 120-121, two by the General 15 Assembly, upon recommendation of the President Pro Tempore of the Senate in accordance with G.S. 120-121, one member of the Polk County Board of 16 Commissioners, elected by that body, one member of the Henderson County 17 18 Board of Commissioners, elected by that body, one member of the City of 19 Saluda Board of Commissioners, elected by that body, and one member of the Town of Tryon Board of Commissioners, elected by that body. The Chair of 20 21 the board of the Saluda Historic Depot and Museum Board or the Chair's designee shall serve as an ex officio member of the Council, and shall vote 22 only in the case of a tie. 23 24 Disbursement of Funds. - The Foundation will disburse funds allocated by (2)subdivision (c)(1) of this section at the direction of the Council, and the 25 Council shall cease to exist when the funds allocated by this section have been 26 27 disbursed and all reports, audits, and other documentation required by the State Budget Act (Chapter 143C of the General Statues) have been submitted. 28 Funds allocated by subdivisions (c)(2) and (c)(3) of this section may be 29 30 disbursed directly by the Foundation prior to the appointment of the Council. SECTION 14.5.(e) Memorandum of Understanding. — No later than September 1, 31 32 2023, the Department of Natural and Cultural Resources shall enter into a Memorandum of 33 Understanding with the Foundation regarding the long-term ownership structure, management, and improvement of the rail corridor. The Memorandum shall provide, at a minimum, the 34 35 following: 36 That not later than July 1, 2027, the corridor will be conveyed to the State to (1)37 be added to the State Trail system. That the conveyance and other provisions of the Memorandum are structured 38 (2)39 to ensure that the acquisition of the rail corridor and the conversion to an interim use as a State trail is consistent with the requirements of federal law 40 41 necessary to preserve established railroad rights-of-way for future activation of rail service as set forth in the railbanking provisions of the National Trails 42 43 System Act Amendments of 1983.

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SECTION 14.5.(f) Report. – The Foundation shall provide an interim report no later than March 1, 2024, and a final report no later than October 1, 2025, to the Department of Natural and Cultural Resources, the Joint Legislative Oversight Committee on Agriculture and Natural Economic Resources, and the Fiscal Research Division regarding the acquisition of and improvements to the Saluda Grade rail corridor funded by this act. The Department shall include a summary of its actions to promote and support the establishment of the Saluda Grade Trail as a part of the report required by G.S. 143B-135.102.

8 SECTION 14.5.(g) Authorization. - Upon completion of the acquisition of the 9 Saluda Grade rail corridor funded by this act, the General Assembly authorizes the Department 10 of Natural and Cultural Resources to add the trail established on the Saluda Grade rail corridor 11 to the State Parks System as a State trail, as provided in G.S. 143B-135.54(b). The Department 12 shall support, promote, encourage, and facilitate the establishment of trail segments and 13 connecting trails on State parklands and on lands of other federal, State, local, and private 14 landowners. On segments of the trail that cross property controlled by agencies or owners other 15 than the Department's Division of Parks and Recreation, the laws, rules, and policies of those 16 agencies or owners shall govern the use of the property. The requirement of G.S. 143B-135.54(b) 17 that additions be accompanied by adequate appropriations for land acquisition, development, and 18 operations shall not apply to the authorization set forth in this section; provided, however, that 19 the State may receive donations of appropriate land and may purchase other needed lands or 20 finance improvements and amenities for the trail with existing funds in the Clean Water Management Trust Fund, the Parks and Recreation Trust Fund, the federal Land and Water 21 Conservation Fund, and other available sources of funding." * 22

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"EDUCATIONAL OPPORTUNITIES PILOT PROGRAM

27 SECTION 8.8.(a) Program; Purpose. – The Board of Governors of The University of North Carolina shall establish a College of Educational Opportunities Pilot Program (Program) 28 29 for eligible students with intellectual and developmental disabilities. North Carolina State 30 University shall develop the Program in the 2023-2024 fiscal year and operate it for each year of the 2023-2025 fiscal biennium. North Carolina Central University shall adapt and operate the 31 32 Program as developed by North Carolina State University for use in the 2024-2025 fiscal year. 33 The purpose of the Program is to provide postsecondary opportunities for eligible students, 34 including the following:
