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Nhs self certification form northern ireland

If you work off for seven days or less you do not need a medical certificate from your doctor. However, you'll need a self-certification form. If you are employed, you need form SC2; If you are self-employed or unemployed, you need form SC1. The seven days include days you don't normally work. So when you work out how long you've been sick, you have to include weekends and bank holidays. If you need a certificate from your doctor for illness between 1-7 days, this service is not covered by the NHS. We can issue a private sickness certificate, but a levy will be made. Please see our private services and fees for up-to-date costs. You can form SC2 at If you've been off work for more than seven days, your employer will usually ask you to prove you were sick. They would normally ask for a fit note from your GP. A fit note is the informal name for the Med3 declaration of fitness for work. Download a sick line request form If illness should cause you to be absent from work for a period longer than seven days, you should call and talk to a FAMILY doctor or book an appointment to see your GP to obtain a medical certificate confirming your illness and inability to work. It will be necessary to receive company sick pay or statutory ill pay (SSP) from the government. The only exceptions to this can be to hospital inpatient or outpatient treatment or for long-term illness. If you are sick for 7 days or less you do not need to see a doctor. You can complete a Self-Certification form yourself. However, some employers insist on a doctor's note regardless. A doctors note under these circumstances involves a charge of £17. Many employers have their own self-certification forms. If your employer does not have its own form, you can download this Self Certification Form (PDF). Please print it, fill it in and hand it in to your employer. You don't have to see a doctor. It is paid by your employer and can be paid up to 28 weeks. There is temporary removal of the three day waiting period if you claim statutory ill pay. If you need to isolate yourself for medical reasons to protect others you will be treated as ill. You don't have to go to a GP because there's a seven day allowance for self-statement. If you can't work while self-isolating because of the coronavirus (COVID-19), you can get SSP for every day you're in isolation from day one. You must self-isolate for at least four days to be eligible. If you self-isolate before March 13 because you had symptoms, your SSP will start from the fourth day. If you self-isolate before March 13 because someone in your household had symptoms, you can't get SSP. Information for employees if you report ill, ask your employer to pay your Statutory Sick Pay (SSP) while you're sick. You don't have to fill out a form to do that. Your employer can offer a sick salary scheme that is more generous than the legal minimum (SSP). Your employer can offer any scheme that does not fall below the legal minimum. If your employer can't pay you, or your SSP will end soon, they'll give you a form SSP1 to tell you that. If you're given an SSP1, you can claim Employment and Support Allowance.
