The FD&C act does not specifically require the use of animals in the testing of cosmetic products for safety, nor does the law make cosmetic products subject to fda premarket approval. However, the Agency has consistently advised cosmetic manufacturers to use any testing is appropriate and effective to justify the safety of their products. Before marketing, it is still the responsibility of the manufacturer to justify the safety of both ingredients and finished cosmetic products. Animal testing by producers wishing to market new products may be used to determine product safety. In some cases, after considering the alternatives available, undertakings may establish that animal testing is necessary to ensure the safety of a product or ingredient. The FDA supports and adheres to applicable laws, regulations and policies governing animal testing, including the Animal Welfare Act and the Public Health Service Policy on the Care and Use of Laboratory Animals. In addition, in all cases where animal testing is used, the FDA claims that research and testing obtain the maximum amount of useful scientific information from the minimum number of animals and use the most humane methods available within the limits of scientific capacity. We also believe that, before the use of animals, the use of scientifically valid alternative methods for whole animal testing. In 1997, the FDA joined thirteen other federal agencies in forming the Interagency Coordination Committee for the Validation of Alternative Methods (ICCVAM). ICCVAM and its Support Centre, the National Centre for Inter-Agency Toxicology for the Evaluation of Toxicological Methods (NICEATM) coordinate the development, validation, acceptance and harmonization of alternative toxicological testing methods throughout the US federal government. alternatives to whole animal testing, as well as adherence to the most humane methods available within the limits of scientific capacity when animals are used for testing the safety of cosmetic products. Look at what you've gotThe first exercise I recommend is to go into the bathroom, look at your makeup bag, gym bag, diaper bag, and where you store their cleaning products. Look at the bottles. Do you see any mention of animal testing or without cruelty? A good rule of thumb: A company that is truly cruelty-free will be like a person in love; They'll call her from the rooftops. They have worked hard to legitimately receive such names (we'll talk about those in a second), and they want to promote this factor. A company that conducts animal testing will be silent with the jargon. - don't exactly make the products fly off the shelves, when something like dozens of dogs have died to bring you bulky waves is emblazoned on the label. Having been in the cruelty-free game for a long time, there are only a few symbols I trust personally. Jump Bunny and PETA Bunny symbols are not only cute, but also ensure that in no production phase the item you own has been tested on animals. Companies are rigorously monitored to receive these names, and those who have them will present them on the packaging or, at the very least, on their websites. It is also a great idea to visit the Looping Bunny website and people for the ethical treatment of the animal site to access the databases of cruelty-free companies. And, the National Anti-Vivisection Society has a wonderfully sought-after database to point you in the right direction. If you are vegan or simply want to avoid animal ingredients in cosmetics and home care, look for the Vegan Certified symbol, which guarantees no animal testing and no by-product. Win, win. Who's your father? Let's talk about parents for a second - parent companies, that is. Many green companies are subsidiaries of larger companies that conduct animal testing. Tom's From Tomorrow is owned by Colgate-Palmolive. Burt's Bees is owned by Clorox. Body Shop is owned by L'Oreal. Companies that own companies is a normal event in our capitalist world, but if you are deeply concerned about what money activities support, it is the duty to get weak on owning, and make purchasing decisions accordingly. Shanghai, and ByePerhaps most buzzed-about going on in the vivisection field was the decision of some previously cruelty-free companies to sell in China. Why is this buzz-worthy? Well, China requires animal testing on any products sold in the country, even if the company touts the hard line on cruelty-free. This means that, in order to expand the Chinese market, companies without cruelty must carry out animal tests before marketing on their products not manufactured in mainland China, and the Chinese government conducts animal tests on these products after marketing. It is estimated that more 300,000 animals die in China for testing cosmetics only every year. Visit the company's websites and frequently asked questions, give them a friendly jingle to tell them that you are concerned about animal testing, or visit some of these fantastic sites with the love of people who really care about cruelty-free: involve yourself if you're itching to take action beyond supporting cruelty-free companies, there are a lot of ways to support legislation, participate in lab rescues and promotion , and spread the word about why cruelty-free issues.
