The secret behind remarketing's efficiency as an advertising strategy is in how it can help you to reengage leads that have shown an interest in your business not only by clicking on your ads but also by visiting your site while browsing organically.

That is why remarketing is used by many online marketers as a complimentary advertising strategy, as it allows them to send people to the business website that they are promoting through ad units and then to retarget those same users through retargeting ads.

What Makes Facebook The Perfect Remarketing Platform?

As you might already know, Facebook is one of the most effective advertising platforms around, and one that is often preferred by agencies and professional marketers thanks to its cost effectiveness, its wide ad inventory and because of its 2 billion active monthly users.



And it so happens that one of the most lauded features of the Facebook advertising platform is Facebook Remarketing, which offers advertisers better audience targeting options than any other remarketing platform.

Chapter 5: Facebook Walkthrough



Unless you have been living under an internet rock for the last 10 years, it is statistically a given that you already have a Facebook account and that you know how to use it for basic social networking, but we consider that in order to teach you all about Facebook Remarketing we need to show you the basic structure of your entire Facebook account first.

Let's start from the very beginning, right after you sign in to your Facebook account and land on the home page, from where you will have access to several tabs and buttons that will take you to every feature offered by your Facebook account.

The most notable feature is Facebook's Newsfeed, which is where all updates and posts from friends and pages will be shown to you. This is perhaps the part of Facebook that you are the most familiar with, so let's move on from here.

It is here in the Newsfeed where most Facebook Remarketing Ads are served. They are also served on the right-hand column, so you can expect your remarketing adverts to appear on both placements. Now, right on top of the timeline is the "compose post" section, from where you will be able to create your Facebook posts and updates.

Other types of posts that you will be able to set up from this section include "photo or video album" posts. You will also be able to launch live video sessions using the "live video" feature.

Now moving to the upper panel you can access your profile by clicking on the profile tab with your name and your picture. On your profile menu you will be able to use the "profile" button to go your profile, to "add accounts" or to "switch accounts". On your profile you will find your own timeline, an "about" tab to add and modify your personal info, a "friends" tab to manage your contacts, a "photos" tab to manage your pictures and your photo albums, and a "more" tab to discover detailed information about your Facebook likes.

You can also easily change your profile picture by clicking on the "update your profile picture" button under your current profile picture and to add a cover photo by clicking on the "add a cover photo" button.

By clicking on the "home" tab you can go back to Facebook's home page. By clicking on the "find friends" tab you can see your friend requests, your friend recommendations, and to look for Facebook friends using the filtering options available in the "search for friends" section.

The icons in this panel represent your notifications, and from left to right they are "friend requests", "messages", and general "notifications". The question mark icon is a "quick help" shortcut.

Now, by clicking on the drop-down menu icon you will be able to access "your pages", to view your activity log, to set up news feed preferences, to access your account settings and to log out of Facebook.

You will be able to use the "search" bar on top to use Facebook as a search engine. You will simply have to enter a keyword in the search bar and then to either click on the search button or to click on any of the search bar suggestions based on the keyword that you entered.

Once in the search results page you will be able to refine your search by "posts", "people", "photos", "videos", "shop", "pages", "places", "groups", "apps", "events", and you can filter your results according to criteria that is unique to each type of result.

Now, on the lower right corner you will find the Facebook messenger, which is the platform's chat feature. You can click on it to see your online contacts and to click on them to start a chat.

Let's now look at the menu on the home page's left-hand column. This menu features shortcuts to basically every feature available on Facebook, including "groups", "events", "games", "live video", "pages feed", "saved" posts, "buy and sell groups" and the "explore feed", among many others.

Lastly, under this menu you will find the options to "create" an "ad", a "page", a "group" or an "event", all right from your Facebook home page.

As you can see, Facebook is a powerful platform that will allow you to do more than basic social networking and browser gaming, with powerful features such as search filters and an advertising dashboard, which is from where you will be doing your Remarketing. We are going to take a detailed look at this Facebook advertising dashboard in the following chapter, so make sure to tune in!

Chapter 6: Facebook Ads Manager Walkthrough



Hey there Folks! Just like we promised, we are going to walk you through the Facebook advertising dashboard in this chapter, so let's continue right where we left on our previous chapter by clicking on the “ad” shortcut link on the “create” section located under the left-hand column menu to go to the Facebook ads manager.

Now you will simply have to wait for Facebook to prepare your ad account, to connect to your pages, and to finish getting everything ready for you.

You will then land in the Facebook ads manager main dashboard, from where you are going to access all of Facebook's advertising features, including remarketing. One thing that we would like to highlight is that the ads manager is pretty much optimized to make it easier for you to create ads right from the get go.

The main dashboard is organized in a way that will allow you to create an ad right when you feel like it. The first step is outlined above in the “campaign” section, where you can start by choosing to either “create new campaign” or “use existing campaign” by clicking on each corresponding tab.

Right below the campaign selection section you will find the “what's your marketing objective” section, where you will be able to select your advertising

objective. On the left hand menu you have an outline of the steps involved in the ad creation process.

From top to bottom these are “campaign”, “ad account”, “ad set”, and “ad”. We are going to go through these steps in detail in our remarketing campaign set up chapter, so let’s simply continue checking out the ads manager. Let’s proceed by taking a look at the options in the top panel.

From right to left the first thing you will find is a “help” tab, which you can click to get a condensed help summary with tips about using your Facebook ads manager. Right next to it is the “settings” tab, and clicking on it will take you to the “settings” section.

In the “settings” section you will be able to configure your “ad account setup” from the “ad accounts” tab. Your account setup includes your “ad account id”, which can’t be changed, your “ad account name”, your “time zone” and your “currency” configurations. Your “advertising purpose” can be either set as “yes, I am buying ads for business purposes” or as “no, I am not buying ads for business purposes” depending on how you are operating.

Lastly, you will be able to configure your “business address”, “business country” and “tax id number”. Now, in the “ad agency” menu you will need to specify whether you are an agency buying ads on behalf of an advertiser or not. In this tab you will also be able to configure your account’s “attribution” and to add “ad account roles” if more people besides you are managing this ad manager account.

Now on the “pages” tab you will be able to check and manage your Facebook pages. On the “payment settings” tab you will be able to see your current bills, to “add a payment method”, and to “set up your account spending limit”, which

is a useful feature in case that you are on a tight budget, and you will simply need to set your limit amount in the “account spending limit” box and then to click on “set limit”.

Finally, in the “notifications” tab you will be able to activate or deactivate “all ad account notifications”, to specify which “ad email notifications” you want to receive and what type of ad notifications you would like to receive directly on Facebook.

Back on the top panel you will find two notification icons. The first one to the right is the “pages” notification icon, and the next one is the general “notifications” icon. Now, the account icon with your profile picture will allow you to switch between ad accounts in case that you are managing more than one, to log out of your ad account and to simply go back to your newsfeed.

You will be able to use the “search” bar to find information and help topics about your ads manager, your Facebook ads account as well as your own set ups such as campaigns by simply entering a keyword or set of keywords.

Now by clicking on the hamburger menu tab to the left you can access the rest of the ads manager features. Section shortcuts in this menu include “plan”, “create and manage”, “measure and report”, “assets”, and “settings”.

Finally, you can click on the Facebook icon to the far left to simply go back to Facebook’s home page, which is a helpful shortcut once you have finished setting up your campaigns or managing your advertising account. Chapter 7: Creating A Facebook Remarketing Pixel



Hey there my good friends! We are pretty sure that you are more than eager to start creating your first remarketing campaign on Facebook by now, especially after seeing the ads manager in action, but you won't be able to create the most basic type of remarketing campaign on Facebook unless you create your Facebook pixel first.

Thankfully, this is a pretty easy to implement task, and we are here to guide you through it the right way, step by step. But first things first.

What Is A Facebook Remarketing Pixel?



A Facebook remarketing pixel is simply an HTML element that Facebook uses to track visitors of a website back to Facebook so it can show them targeted ads on their newsfeeds and on the right-hand column on their home pages. What a Facebook pixel does is to add a tracking code to a specific website page, which in turn reports an action taken by visitors on that

specific page back to Facebook, where such visitors are traced and shown ads to.

Have you noticed that when you go to certain websites, such as ecommerce sites, and then go back to Facebook, you start seeing ads promoting products or services offered by those websites on your Facebook home page? That is the Facebook pixel at work. What the pixel did was to track you from the websites that you visited back to Facebook, where ads are shown to you according to the actions that you took on the pages that you visited.

Creating Your Own Facebook Remarketing Pixel

Creating a Facebook Remarketing Pixel is easier than you think, and we are going to show you how right away. First, you have to start by logging in to your Facebook account, and from there go to the



ads manager by clicking on the “ad” shortcut link located in the “create” section under the left-hand column menu.

Once in your ads manager dashboard click on the hamburger “tools” menu. Now locate the “measure and report” section and click on the “pixels” shortcut link. You will be taken to the “Facebook Pixels” page. Once there simply click on the “create a pixel” button. A pop up window will appear with your account’s pixel information, and you will simply have to click on the “create” button to finish.

Awesome! Your new Facebook Remarketing pixel is ready to go. Please note that you will only be allowed to create one Facebook Remarketing pixel per ad account, so you won’t have to go through this step after setting it up unless you decide to create additional ad accounts.

Now that you have created your Facebook Remarketing Pixel you can start using it on your website to track your visitors for remarketing. And in order to use your pixel on your website you have to install it there first, and we are going to show you how in our following chapter, so make sure to tune in!

Chapter 8: Adding The Facebook Remarketing Pixel To Your Business Website



Hey there my friends! Let's continue setting up all the necessary stuff so you can start creating remarketing campaigns like a pro. In this chapter you will be learning how to add the Facebook Remarketing Pixel to your business website, which is pretty easy.

To get started you will simply have to navigate to the hamburger tools menu on your ads manager dashboard, then to click on the "pixels" shortcut link under the "measure and report" section to go to the "Facebook Pixels" page, and then to click on the "set up pixel" button once there.

As you can see, there are three ways to install your Facebook remarketing pixel on your page. You can "use an integration or tag manager" such as the "Google tag manager" and other third party integration platforms. You can "manually insert the code yourself" by copying the pixel code and inserting it on your

website, and you can “mail instructions to a developer” that can take care of installing the pixel for you.

Just as promised, we are going to teach you how to add your new Facebook remarketing pixel to your business website on your own. Start by clicking on the “manually install the code yourself” option. Now scroll down until you find your Facebook Pixel code, and then click on it to copy it to your clipboard.

Once you copy your Facebook pixel code go to your website’s main dashboard. Now, what you will have to do is to paste your pixel code in the header section of your website, between the “<head>” and “</head>” tags, as per Facebook’s instructions. To do that you have to access your site’s header code.

In this chapter we are going to use our own WordPress website to show you how to install the code the easiest ways possible. There are two ways to add this pixel code to a WordPress site. The easiest method is by using the “insert headers and footers” plugin.

To use this plugin to add your pixel to your site you will simply have to hover over the “plugins” tab on your WordPress dashboard, and then to click on the “add new” option. Now type “insert headers and footers” in the “search plugins” search bar.

Locate the plugin in the search results and click on the “install now” button, then click on “activate” once it installs. Now hover over the “settings” tab on the dashboard left-hand menu and click on the “insert headers and footers” option. Now simply paste your pixel code in the “scripts in header” field and click on “save”. Awesome!

The second method is by actually adding it to the header section of your site's code yourself. Hover over the "appearance" tab on the left-hand menu and click on the "editor" option. Now go to the "templates" menu on the right, locate "theme header" and click on it. Now paste your code between the "<head>" and "</head>" tags, and then click on "update file".

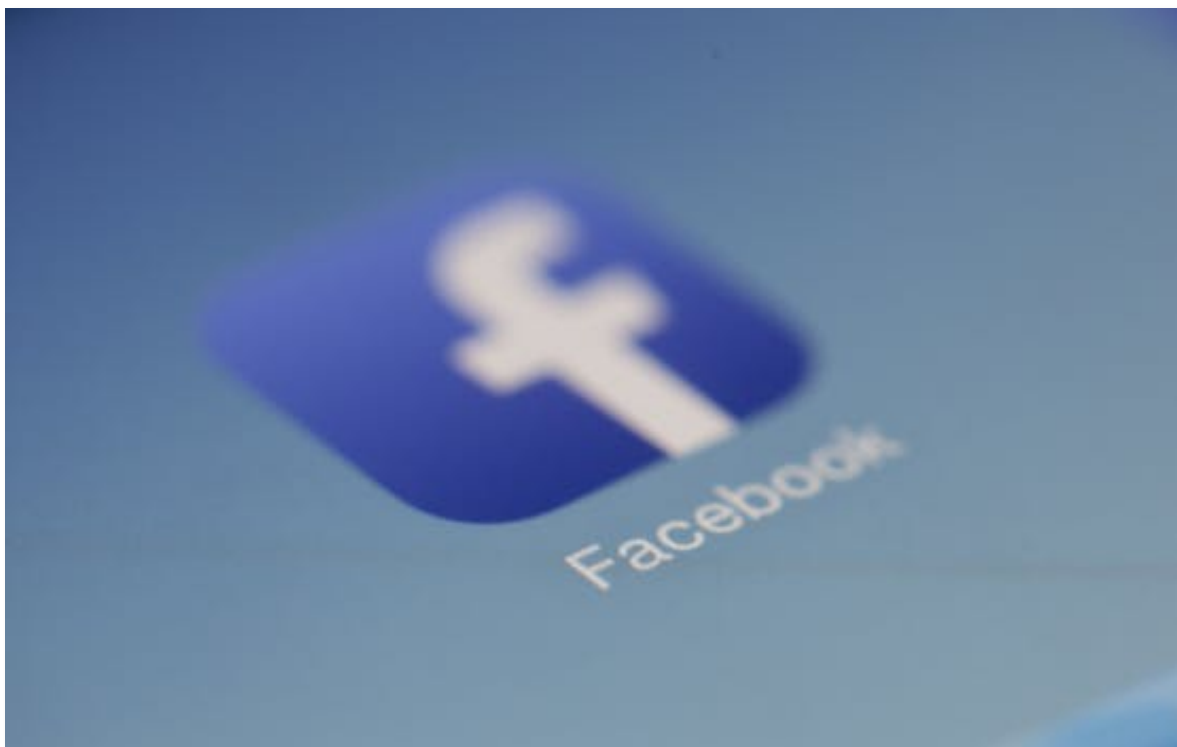
Once you add your pixel code by using either method go back to where you left on Facebook and enter your website's URL in the "send test traffic to your pixel" field and click on the "send test traffic" button.

Awesome! Your Facebook pixel is now active on your site, so simply click on "continue". In the following step you will simply have to "add your events". This means that you have to specify what types of actions you want your Facebook pixel to track on your site.

The Facebook pixel will allow you to track actions such as purchases, generated leads, registrations, payment info added by customers, items added to a shopping cart or wish list, initiated checkouts, searches and content views.

Once you have selected which actions to track on your site simply click on "done". And that's it! You will start seeing activity from your pixel once it starts tracking your website visitor's actions on your site, so keep an eye on it!

Chapter 9: Custom Audiences



Hey there again folks! We are one step closer to teaching you how to set up your first Facebook remarketing campaign, and because remarketing campaigns require you to first find leads whom to remarket to, you will need to learn to set up custom audiences before creating remarketing campaigns.

In this chapter we are going to teach where to locate your custom audiences in the ads manager and how to create a basic custom audience to retarget the website visitors that you are tracking with your remarketing pixel.

Start on the Facebook ads manager dashboard and click on the tools hamburger menu icon in the top left corner. Now go to the “assets” column in the display menu and click on the “audiences” shortcut link. You will be taken to the

“audiences” page, where you will be able to check, create and edit your target audiences.

To manage and create custom audiences you will simply have to click on the “create audience” drop down menu and then to click on the “custom audience” option. So before we get started, let’s quickly discuss what is a custom audience all about. A custom audience is simply an audience made of people that have an existing connection or relationship to your business.

Such an audience can be made of people that have bought from your online store before, people in your email lists, people who have visited and viewed content on your website, or simply people who have engaged with your business before in one way or another, and that you can retarget ads to on Facebook.

As you can see here, there are several interesting ways to remarket to people in a custom audience. You can retarget people in a “customer file”, which will allow you to target people according to customer or subscriber information saved in a file.

You can retarget “website traffic”, which means that you can remarket to people that have visited your website. You can retarget people by “app activity”, which are people who have used your Facebook apps. You can retarget people by “offline activity”, such as people that have bought from your offline store or that have provided you with a phone number for doing business. Finally, you can retarget people by “engagement”, which are people that have interacted with your content on Facebook.

Now we are going to give you an example of how to create a basic custom audience by selecting the “website traffic” remarketing objective to create a list of who have visited our website using our Facebook pixel.

Once you select the “website traffic” objective you have to start by selecting whom to add to your new custom audience based on your retargeting criteria. You can either include people who meet “any” of your retargeting criteria or people who meet “all” your retargeting criteria.

Now you have to select your retargeting criteria. You can retarget “all website visitors” and enter how many days after they have visited your site you will keep retargeting them.

You can retarget “people who have visited specific web pages” on your site to enter a specific URL from your site from where to track your visitors. This will allow you to qualify interested visitors according to content or actions taken by visitors on those pages. Lastly, you can retarget “visitors by time spent” and select a percentile of time spent by visitors on your site.

You can click on “include” to include additional retargeting criteria, or on “exclude” to add criteria that excludes visitors from being retargeted if they take actions on your excluding criteria.

After you finish selecting your retargeting criteria name your custom remarketing audience in the “audience name” field and then click on “create audience”, then click on “done”.

Awesome! You are now ready to use this new remarketing audience on a new Facebook remarketing campaign. Tune in to the following chapter so we can show you how!

Chapter 10: Creating A Facebook Remarketing Campaign

Hey there everyone! Finally, you are now ready to launch your first Facebook remarketing campaign. We know that you have been anxiously waiting to get to this chapter, so let's get started now.

Start on your ads manager dashboard. Please note that you will always land on the “campaign” selection screen by default every time that you open your ads manager account, as you can see here, which greatly simplifies the process.



Now, before creating a campaign you will be able to either “create a new campaign” or to “use existing campaign” in case that you already have campaign set ups saved to use. For this example case we are going to show you how to create a remarketing campaign from scratch.

To create a new remarketing campaign you have to start by selecting your marketing objective. Your marketing objective is what you want to see as a result of creating a Facebook remarketing campaign, such as driving more sales from existing website traffic, or getting more leads to your affiliate pages to increase affiliate profits, among others.

Now, the remarketing objective that you will have to select to leverage existing traffic retargeted by your Facebook remarketing pixel is the “conversions” objective. Once you have selected your objective you will simply have to scroll down and name your new remarketing campaign in the “campaign name” field, then click on the “set up add account” button.

In the next page you will simply have to specify your account country, your currency, and your time zone if you haven't done so already. Then click on "continue". Now you will be taken to the "ad set" page, where you will need to select the page you will be using to promote your ad, to set up your audience, your ad placements, your budget and your schedule. Here you will have to start by naming your new ad set in the "ad set name" field.

Now, in the "conversions" section you will have three types of conversions to target: "website", "app" and "messenger". Select the "website" conversion and click on the "please select a conversion event" box to show a list of conversion events. Now select the conversion event that you want to optimize your remarketing ads for. This will depend on the conversion event that you selected during your pixel set up.

In the "offer" section you will have the option to set up offers to drive more conversions on your target destination by turning on the "offer" option. You will simply need to select from which page you will be promoting an offer and to click on "create offer".

You then will be able to enter your "offer title", your "offer details", an "end date" and "end time" for your offer. You will also be able to select whether to let your customers to redeem your offer "online", "in store" or "both".

You will also be able to generate redemption codes for your offer, to specify how many codes you will give away, and to enter your offer terms and conditions. Once you finalize configuring your offer you will have to simply click on "create". For this example we are going to focus on the remarketing campaign set up, so we are going to set this up as our offer.

Now move to the “audience” section. Here you will have the option to either “create new audience” or “use a saved audience”. In this case, you will have to make use of your custom audiences because you are going to create a remarketing campaign, so you will simply have to click on the “add custom audiences or lookalike audiences” on the “create new” tab and then to select your custom audience from the custom audience list that will appear.

You can click on “exclude” to select custom audiences to exclude from a campaign as well. Additionally, you can further refine whom to retarget to on your custom audience by adjusting the rest of your audience settings.

Start by selecting a location or series of locations in the “locations” section. You can further refine your target location by going to the “locations” menu and selecting whether to target “everyone in this location”, “people who live in this location”, “people recently in this location” or “people traveling to this location”.

In the “age” section you can select a base age and a top age to target. In the “gender” section you can select to either target “men”, “women” or “all”. And in the “languages” field you can type a specific language that you might want to target.

In the “detailed targeting” section you can “include” or “exclude” people based on “demographics”, “interests”, and “behaviors”. In the “connections” section you can reach out to Facebook users according to the type of connection that they have with your page, such as “people who like your page” or “friends of people who like your page”.

If you would like to target this same audience set up in a future remarketing campaign, you can simply click on the “save audience” button. Now in the

“placements” section you can select “automatic placements” or “edit placements”.

Selecting “Automatic placements” will serve your ads to all possible types of users on all types of devices across multiple networks which include third party networks. That is why we recommend you to select “edit placements” so you can select your own ad placements.

Our recommendation for you is to select “all devices” and to deselect the “audience network” as well as the “messenger” as placements.

Now in the “budget and schedule” section you have to set up your budget format, amount and schedule. You can either select a “daily budget” if you want to spend a specific amount on a daily basis, or you can select “lifetime budget” if you want to spread a specific amount of money across your campaign’s lifetime.

In the “schedule” section you can select the “run my ad set continuously starting today” option to run your ad until you decide to stop it, or you can select the “set a start date and an end date” option to schedule how long to run your new ad set.

Our recommendation here is to set a “daily budget” of \$5 up \$30 if you can afford it, and then start increasing your daily amount until you find a sweet spot where you get good return on investment relative to your remarketing objective.

Now, when it comes to scheduling a remarketing campaign for the first time the best approach is to test it out for 14 to 30 days. You can select “run my ad set continuously starting today” in the “schedule” section to test out your remarketing campaign for a period of time and then stop it manually, or you can

select “set a start and end date” and use the calendar option to schedule specific start and end times.

Once you are done here simply click on “continue”. In the following section you will have to edit your ad creative. Enter your ad name in the “ad name” box and select your Facebook page in the “identity” section.

Now in the “format” section you will have to select the format of your ad. The “carousel” format allows you to insert 2 or more images and videos on your ad. The “single image” format will allow you to introduce a single image on your ad. The “single video” format will allow you to use a single video on your ad. Finally, you can select the “slideshow” format to create a looping video ad composed with up to 10 images.

For this campaign we are going to select the “single image” format. We are going to scroll down to the “images” section and click on the “browse library” to select an image for our ad. As you can see here, you will be able to select an image from your library, from a collection of stock images or to “upload images” from your computer.

In our case we are going to simply select the image from our library that best reflects our offer. Once you make your selection click on “done”. Now move to the “Links” section. In this section you will insert your URLs, your ad copy, your headline, your ad text and your calls to action.

Start by entering your landing page’s URL in the “website URL” field. Now, in the “headline” field you have to enter an attention-grabbing headline for your remarketing ad. In our case, we are going to simply enter the name of our business. In the “text” field you will have to enter an inviting “call to action”

text related to the content or your offers in the placements that you are tracking on your website.

In the “call to action” menu you can select a working call to action button for your remarketing ad from the vast selection of call to action buttons available. In our case, we are going to select the “no button” option.

Finally, in the “news feed link description” you will have to add a very short but inviting description of your site.

You can check the “ad preview” section on the right-hand side to see how your ad is going to look on different placements, such as desktop and mobile feeds. Once you are done here simply click on the “confirm” button and wait for your remarketing ad to be approved.

Chapter 11: Remarketing To Your Existing Customers



Alright folks! Let's create a remarketing campaign that you can use to reach your existing customers. Start on the Facebook ads manager dashboard and click on the tools hamburger menu icon in the top left corner. Now click on the "audiences" shortcut link in the "assets" section of the tools menu to go to the "audiences"

page.

Now click on the "create audience" drop-down menu and then click on the "custom audience" option. Now select the "customer file" option. This option will allow you to use a customer file to match your existing customers that are registered on Facebook, and to create a custom audience from the matches for remarketing.

You will be given three options to create a custom audience from a customer file. First, you will have the option to "add customers from your own file or copy and paste data", to "import from MailChimp" or to add a "customer file with lifetime value".

To create a remarketing campaign to reach your existing customers you will need to use your own customer file, so click on the "add customers from your

own file or copy and paste data” option. First, you will be asked to “add a customer list”. To do this you can either “add a new file” or “copy and paste” the customer data.

In this chapter we are going show you how to upload a customer data file to create your customer file audience. When selecting this option we recommend you to use the “download file template” button, to open the file template after it downloads and then to edit the data on the template according to your own customer data.

In our case, you can see how we are going to add a single test customer for this custom audience. We start by clearing all the placeholder data in the template that we are not going to edit over. Now, we are only going to use 5 pieces of customer data for our customer file: our customer’s email, first and last names, country of residence and gender, so we clear all the attributes that we are not going to use.

We then edit the placeholder information and enter our own, and then save. Once saved, you can click on the “upload file” button to upload your saved file from your computer. Once uploaded simply click on “next”.

Now make sure that the correct data is marked green, then click on “upload and create”. Wait for your file to load and click on “done”. Awesome! Now your customer file audience is saved. Let’s now show you how to create the remarketing campaign to reach these existing customers. Start by clicking on the “create ad” button located in the left-hand corner.

Now select your remarketing objective on the “campaign” page. For this example we are going to select the “conversions” objective to retarget our existing customer file audience. Once you have selected your objective you will

simply have to scroll down and name your new remarketing campaign in the “campaign name” field, and then to click on the “conversion” shortcut under the “ad set” section in the left-hand menu.

Start by naming your new ad set in the “ad set name” field.

Now, in the “conversions” section select the “website” option and click on the “please select a conversion event” box to select the conversion event that you want to optimize your remarketing campaign for.

Now select whether to activate or not activate an offer on your ad set in the “offer” section and move to the “audience” section. Click on the “add custom audiences or lookalike audiences” box and on the “create new” tab select your customer file audience from the list.

Now, you won’t need to adjust additional audience targeting options in the “audience” section in cases where you are using an existing customer file audience because your audience is already very precisely targeted, and your remarketing campaign will only target people in your customer file that are also registered on Facebook or that can be reached on the audience network.

In light of that, you will simply have to proceed by scrolling down to the “placements” section. Because your target audience is pretty much defined already, our recommendation is to select the “automatic” placements option in order to reach people in your customer file wherever possible.

Now in the “budget and schedule” section you should set a “daily budget” of \$5 up to \$30, and to select the “run my ad set continuously starting today” option in the “schedule” section to run your ad continuously for 14 straight days under your watch, so you can optimize your remarketing campaigns right after according to your results.

Once done here simply click on “continue”. Now you will have to edit your ad creative. Enter your ad name in the “ad name” box and select your Facebook page in the “identity” section.

Now in the “format” section you will have to select the format of your ad. For this example campaign we are not going to select an image for our ad because we are going to allow Facebook to pull a specific image from our landing page, so we scroll down past the “images” section.

Remember that once in the “Links” section you will have to insert your URLs, your ad copy, your headline, your ad text and your calls to action. Starting in the “website URL” field, enter the specific page where you want your retargeted leads to convert.

In our case, we are going to enter the URL of a page where we reviewed an affiliate product in order to get our retargeted leads to convert by following the affiliate links in our review. This is an effective strategy because they are already familiar with our content and affiliate offers.

Once again, we are going to use the “headline” field to enter the name of our business, which will help our retargeted leads to recall our brand. Then In the “text” field you have to enter copy that is descriptive of the contents on your landing page.

In the “call to action” menu you can select the call to action that best fits your offer or destination content. In our case, we are going to select the “learn more” call to action.

Finally, in the “news feed link description” you can add a brief line of copy with niche keywords that can trigger an emotional response from your leads.

We recommend you to check the “ad preview” section on the right-hand side to see how your new remarketing ad will look on your target placements. Finally, remember to click on the “confirm” button and to wait for your remarketing ad to be approved. You will get your existing customers coming back on a more regular basis to your site this way!

Chapter 12: Remarketing To App Users



Hey there again my dear friends ! Let's now create a remarketing campaign that you can use to reach your Facebook App users. Start on the Facebook ads manager dashboard and click on the tools menu in the top left corner and click on the “audiences” shortcut link in the “assets” section of the tools menu to go to the “audiences” page.

Now click on the “create audience” drop-down menu and then click on the “custom audience” option. Now select the “app activity” option. This option will allow you to create and retarget a list of people who have launched your apps or games on Facebook.

Now it is time to create your new app user custom audience. Start by selecting whom to either include, people who meet “any” of your retargeting criteria or people who meet “all” your retargeting criteria.

Now select the app that you want to retarget users of. After selecting your app you have to select your app user retargeting criteria in the menu below. There are several app user retargeting criteria available.

You can retarget “anyone who opened the app” and select how many days after opening your app should targets remain in this audience. You can retarget “most active users” and then select the top percentile of active users to target, as well as to select how many days after being active users should remain in this audience.

You can retarget “users by purchase amount” and then select the top percentile of users that have spent the most money on your app as targets, as well as how many days after spending money on your app should targets remain in this audience.

Lastly, you can retarget “users by segment” by targeting segments of app users that you can define by actions taken, demographics, devices used and more. Remember that you can click on “include more” to include additional retargeting criteria, or on “exclude” to add criteria that excludes visitors from being retargeted if they meet your excluding criteria.

Now name your new app user audience in the “audience name” box and click on “create audience”. You can now start remarketing to your app users by clicking on “create an ad using the audience”.

Now select your remarketing objective in the “campaign” page. For this example we are going to select the “traffic” objective. Now name your new remarketing campaign in the “campaign name” field, and then click on the “ad set” section shortcut in the left-hand menu.

Start by naming your new ad set in the “ad set name” field. Now select the “website” option in the “conversion section”. Now select whether to activate or not activate an offer in your ad set in the “offer” section and move to the “audience” section. As you can see, our new app user audience is already selected in the “custom audiences” section because we opted to create an ad with this audience after we set it up.

Remember that you can adjust additional audience targeting options in the “audience” section to better refine your target audience. In our case, we are only going to enter the “English” language in the “languages” section to target English speakers among our app users because we are going to send them to our website.

Now in the “placements” section we recommend you to select the “automatic” placements option in order to reach your app users in all placements.

Now in the “budget and schedule” section we recommend you to set a “daily budget” of \$5 up \$30 and to select the “run my ad set continuously starting today” option in the “schedule” section to run your ad continuously for 14 straight days.

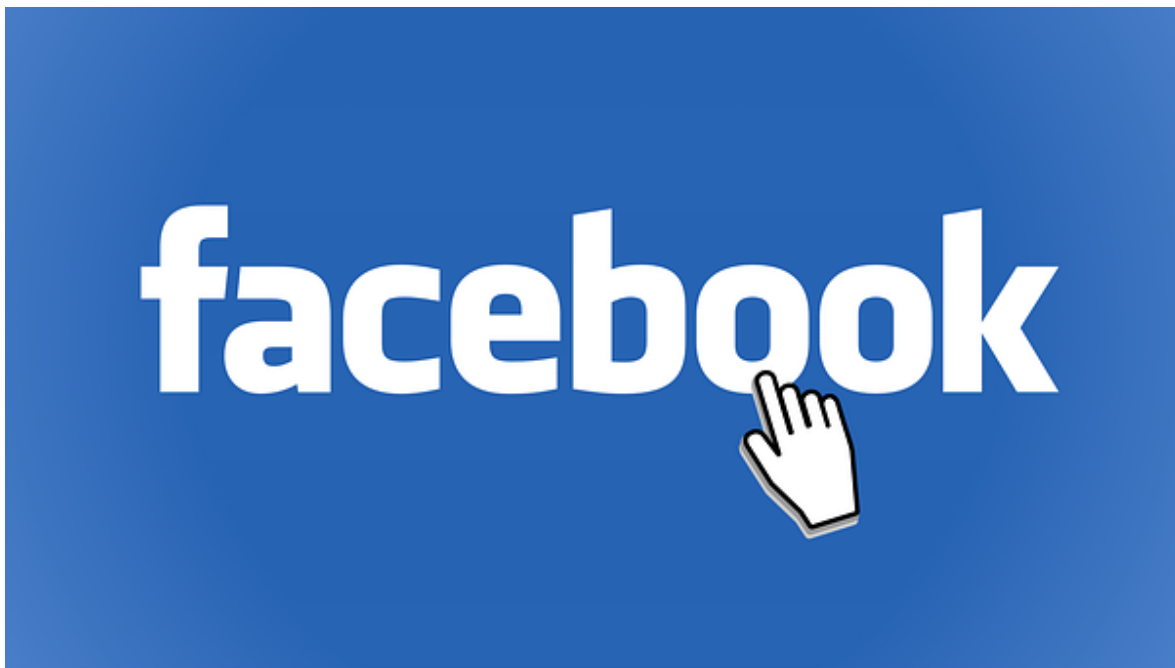
Now click on “continue” and proceed to edit your ad creative. Enter your ad name in the “ad name” box and select whether to create a new ad or to use an existing post. If you decide to create a new ad, you will have to select your format, your ad images or videos, to edit your links, your copy, and your calls to action.

In our example case, we are going to select the “use existing post” option to use one of our posts with clickable URLs already in place to send app users to our

website. We will simply have to select our Facebook page in the “identity” section and then to select our promoted post on the “creative” section.

Remember to check the “ad preview” section to see how your new remarketing ad will look on your target placements, and then to click on the “confirm” button and to wait for your remarketing ad to be approved. And that is it! Your app users will now be reengaged the right way.

Chapter 13: Remarketing To Engagement Audiences



Hey there everyone! Let's now show you how to remarket to people who have engaged with your business on Facebook. Start on the Facebook ads manager dashboard and click on the tools menu, then click on the “audiences” shortcut link in the “assets” section to go to the “audiences” page.

Now click on the “create audience” drop-down menu and then click on the “custom audience” option. Now select the “engagement” option. This option will allow you to create and retarget a list of people who have engaged with your content on Facebook or on Instagram.

Now, there are several engagement activities that you can target. You can target “video” engagement to create a list of people who have spent time watching your videos on Facebook or Instagram. You can target “lead form”

engagement to create a list of people who have opened or completed a form in your lead ads on Facebook or Instagram.

You can target “full screen” engagement to create a list of people who have opened your collection ads or canvas on Facebook. You can target “Facebook page” engagement to create a list of people who have interacted with your Facebook business page.

You can target “Instagram business profile” engagement to create a list of people who have interacted with your Instagram business profile, and you can target “event” engagement to remarket to people who have interacted with your events on Facebook.

The type of engagement that you select will depend entirely on what type of interactions you want to track and target. In this chapter we are going to show you how to remarket to engagement audiences that have interacted with your Facebook pages by selecting the “Facebook page” option.

After selecting this objective, select whom to include in this remarketing audience, either people who meet “any” of your retargeting criteria or people who meet “all” your retargeting criteria. Now select the Facebook page that you want to remarket people on below.

Now it is time to select your retargeting criteria. As you can see, there are extensive retargeting criteria for Facebook page engagement. You can remarket to “everyone who engaged with your page”, “anyone who visited your page”, “people who engaged with any post or ad”, “people who clicked any call-to-action button”, “people who sent a message to your page” and to “people who saved your page or any post”.

For this example we are going to select the “everyone who engaged with your page” criteria. Remember that you can click on “include” more to add more additional retargeting criteria and on “exclude” to add excluding criteria.

Lastly, enter your new engagement audience name in the “audience name” box and click on “create audience”. You can now start remarketing to your new engagement audience by clicking on “create an ad using the audience”.

Select your remarketing objective in the “campaign” page. Once again, we are going to select the “traffic” objective to get more people to our website, where they can check our affiliate content. Name your new remarketing campaign in the “campaign name” field after selecting your objective and click on the “ad set” section shortcut in the left-hand menu.

Now name your new ad set in the “ad set name” field. Select the “website” option in the “conversion section”. Now select whether to activate or not activate an offer on your ad set in the “offer” section and move to the “audience” section. You’ll notice that your engagement audience is already selected in the “custom audiences” section because you already opted to create an ad with this audience after setting it up.

However, you can always adjust additional audience targeting options in the “audience” section to better refine your target audience. In our case, we are only going to click on “edit locations” to target high-spending English speaking locations and to enter the “English” language in the “languages” section to target English speakers.

Now in the “placements” section we recommend you to select the “edit placements” option and to deselect the “audience network” in order to only retarget engaged users where they are most likely to hang out.

Now in the “budget and schedule” section we recommend you to set a “daily budget” of \$5 up to \$30 and to select the “run my ad set continuously starting today” option in the “schedule” section to run your ad continuously for 30 straight days.

Now click on “continue” and proceed to edit your ad creative. Enter your ad name in the “ad name” box and select whether to create a new ad or to use an existing post. If you decide to create a new ad, you will have to start from scratch by selecting your ad format, your ad images or videos, to edit your links, your copy, and your calls to action.

In our example case, we are going to select the “use existing post” option to use one of our posts with clickable URLs already in place to engaged users on our website. We will simply have to select our Facebook page on the “identity” section and then to select our promoted post on the “creative” section.

Remember to check the “ad preview” section to see how your new remarketing ad will look on your target placements, and then to click on the “confirm” button and to wait for your remarketing ad to be approved. And that is it! Your engaged users will now be offered a new way to reconnect with your business online!

Chapter 14: Remarketing To Users Who Never Open Your Emails



Hey there folks! Let's create a remarketing campaign that you can use to reach subscribers that never open your emails. Now, the curious thing about this strategy is that it will require you to first create a customer list with the email addresses of the people who do not open your emails. To do so you will need to export a customer file from your Email Marketing service.

In this chapter we are going to show you how to use MailChimp to export a customer file with the email addresses of people who don't open your emails. You will simply have to log in to your Mailchimp account. Then click on the "lists" tab.

Now go to your list of mailing lists and select the one where you would like to get your non-opening contacts from. Then click on the drop-down menu button corresponding to this list and click on "manage contacts".

On the following page click on the "manage contacts" menu and then click on "view contacts". Now click on the "create a segment" tab. Select "all" in the "contacts match" menu, then go to the "conditions" section below. From left to right, start by selecting the "campaign activity" option from the "subscriber data" menu, then select the "did not open" option on the next menu, and then select "all of the last 5 campaigns" option from the "aggregate campaigns"

menu.

Now click on the “preview segment” button. On the following page, click on the “export segment” button, and then click on the “export as csv” button corresponding to your exported segment. Now you will simply have to decompress your new customer file and go to Facebook.

Once on Facebook go to the ads manager dashboard and click on the tools menu icon. Now click on the “audiences” shortcut link in the “assets” section of the tools menu to go to the “audiences” page.

Now click on the “create audience” drop-down menu and then click on the “custom audience” option. Now select the “customer file” option. This option will allow you to use your newly created customer file to match your non-opening leads with their Facebook accounts.

So click on the “add customers from your own file or copy and paste data” option to get started. You will now be asked to “add a customer list”. You can either “add a new file” or “copy and paste” the customer data.

Because you will be using the customer file that you just created on MailChimp you will simply have to click on the “upload file” button to upload that file from your computer. Once uploaded simply click on “next”.

Now make sure that the “email” identifier is marked green. You can select other identifiers in your customer list to be added in your customer data map, but we recommend against doing so because this might alter your remarketing results.

Once done here click on “upload and create”. Wait for your file to load and click on “done”. Awesome! Now you will be ready to show your non-opening customers all that they have been missing out on!

Chapter 15: Using Content Series To Remarket To Hard-To-Get



Hey there my friends! One of the harshest, inevitable facts of doing online marketing is that, on average, only 2% to 5% of leads convert. That means that over 90% of your leads might not convert at all.

And that is the problem right there with cold advertising: you have to be willing to sacrifice a good chunk of your marketing budget on a non-converting 90% in order to reach the qualified 5%.

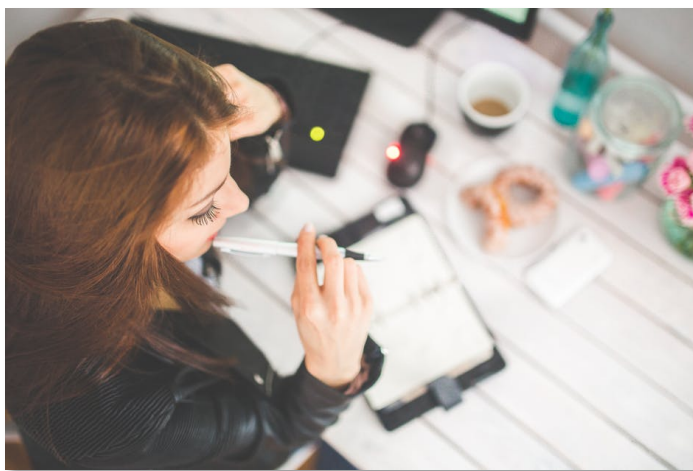
Hopefully by now you know how to take care of non-converted leads with remarketing, and we are glad to tell you that we are about to teach you an incredibly effective strategy that will boost your Facebook remarketing performance.

This strategy is the creation of content series. Content series are a linear series of content that are distributed as episodic content. Content series work well because they allow you to capture the attention of uninterested leads in incremental steps.

Content series work on any niche and with any type of content, and you will simply have to pull data from your finished remarketing campaigns to know who to retarget to with a content series.

Getting Started

You have to start by devising a funnel to deliver your content in incremental steps until you are able to deliver a conversion. Normally, these funnels are separated into three stages: attention, consideration, and conversion.



In the “attention” stage you will simply have to target a non-converting lead with a remarketing ad offering them access to a non-gated piece of long-form content, which you can do with a clickable single-image or single-video Facebook ad. This will capture the attention of your non-converting lead with brand recall.

In the “consideration” stage you will have to retarget a non-converting lead with a second piece of premium content that is divided into two parts. The one that you will give access to in this second stage is the first part of the content.

You can gauge the interest of the non-converting lead in this stage by setting up a conversion event through your remarketing pixel in the page where this content is served to your non-converting leads.

Finally, in the “conversion” stage you can include an opt-in form at the end of the page where the first part of the content is as well as to set up a remarketing ad with an opt-in form to retarget leads that do not convert on that page in order to get this lead to convert.

It will work because this final piece of content is a gated piece of content that the non-converting lead can access by opting in with their email address.

An example of this would be if you had an eBook for sale, and you see that there are people that visit the sales page for that eBook on a very regular basis, yet they don't buy it, and they don't even opt-in to your email list to receive updates for the eBook in question.

What you have to do then is to create a content series that closely mimics the content of the eBook to make non-converting leads to think that you are releasing the material periodically for free, then ask them for their email addresses before they can access the last part of the content series, and then start remarketing to them right to their email addresses.

Release content three times a week, on Tuesdays, on Thursdays or on Fridays. Finally on Saturday, release the final piece of content, but make it half the content that you have already published.

Once leads reach the final part, send them to a landing page where a summary of the remaining content is presented in bullet-list format. Then send them to a whitepaper landing page after they sign up and send them the rest of the content through email once they sign up.

In any case, here is a summary list of the elements worth relying on when setting up a content series the right way:

- ✓ A blog post dedicated to a piece of content related to the product that hard-to-get leads are interested in. This section needs to be delivered on a three-part basis.
- ✓ A landing page where to send them to once the final piece of content is delivered. Remember that this landing page summarizes the final aspects of the content in bullet-list format.
- ✓ A whitepaper landing page to offer them a freebie with the remaining content in exchange for their email address.

Chapter 16: Additional Facebook Remarketing Tips And Tricks



Hey there good friends! If there is one thing that we have learned throughout the years is to always keep on learning and experimenting.

The only caveat of trying and experimenting is that you have to fail a lot along the way in order to find what works and what doesn't.

The good thing is that you discover lots of high-level tricks that you wouldn't have been able to find anywhere else otherwise. Here are some of the best tips and tricks that have worked for us over the years!

Remarket To Specific Landing Page Visitors

If there is one constant that you see across Facebook remarketing campaigns is that they tend to target website visitors too broadly.

While it is a good thing to set up a remarketing campaign to reach all website visitors, it is also a good practice to remarket to specific visitors on specific pages.

For example, you can create remarketing campaigns to remarket to visitors of your sales pages. Now, it won't be enough to retarget them with ads but to retarget them with highly targeted ads that are relevant to the people visiting a specific sales page.

Remember To Exclude Converters

You have to always be on the lookout for those leads who have already taken an action, such as people that have read a piece of content, people that have clicked through certain affiliate links and people who have purchased certain products.

Once you identify those converters you will have to exclude them from the campaigns where you were originally retargeting them on and to ad them to a different campaign with a different objective to drive a different type of conversion from them, which leads us to our following tip.

Add A Re-Engagement Stage To Your Remarketing Funnel

The beautiful thing about Facebook remarketing is that it doesn't have to end after you have converted leads, however, you will see lots of marketers

neglecting leads after they have converted, thinking that they will come back on their own.

The truth is that very rarely will they come back on their own unless they are brand ambassadors or repeat customers. That is why you have to add “re-engagement” as the last stage in your remarketing funnel.

What this means is that you will have to retarget leads with different remarketing campaigns after converting them on a previous campaign!

Always Split Test Your Remarketing Ads

We recommend you to create different variations of the same ad under the same campaign to track how they perform when targeted at the same audiences.

This will allow you to optimize your remarketing ads based on what works best and to drive more conversions from that effort!

Do's

Track Efficiently

Depending on your content management system platform and your marketing objective, you will leave a lot on the table if you don't set up an efficient tracking system as well as an efficient tracking strategy after you install your tracking pixel on your website. Using plugins to manage custom audiences and setting up individual retargeting pixels for each website that you will be remarketing from are great starting points.

Segment Your Remarketing Audiences

Segmenting audiences into specific landing page visitors, blog readers, and people who have abandoned your shopping carts, to give you a few examples, is a great way to avoid remarketing to everyone the same way.

Exclude Converters

Remember to exclude people that have converted from your campaigns after they have completed the target actions..

Set Up A Remarketing Funnel

You have to set up a remarketing funnel to move your targets from one step of the customer journey to the other by setting up different remarketing campaigns with different objectives. That way you would be moving your customers from awareness, to consideration, to purchase efficiently.

Match Offers With Qualifying Audiences

You have to match the right type of audience with the right type of remarketing offer. For example, you can retarget visitors that have spent some time reading your material with a free eBook, but you shouldn't retarget them with a sale.

Bid Less For Non-Converters

Non-converters are always going to be a valuable asset as long as they keep coming back, but make sure to not overbid on them.

Keep An Eye On Your Ad Frequency

The highest ad frequency on Facebook remarketing campaigns should be kept at 1 to 3 views, up to 10 views maximum, as that is when the click-through costs will increase!

Split Test

Make sure to test out two or more variations of the same adverts, each one with different assets, and then look at the results to see which variation performs better, then keep optimizing it accordingly.

Review Your Placements

Some audiences respond better to remarketing on certain environments and on certain devices, so make sure to check how well your remarketing materials perform on desktop and mobile, as well as whether they perform better on the newsfeed or on the right-hand column.

Limit Your Ad Appearance

Place a cap on your daily budget to avoid showing your ads to the same people the entire day, or else you will risk your targets getting blind to your remarketing efforts!

Don'ts

Don't Sell Past The Sale

There is no use to keep retargeting people that have converted with a sale with the same offer. Instead, move them to a different campaign where you retarget them with an incentive or an upsell.

Don't Target All Visitors The Same

All your website visitors are different. Some will land on your site by accident, some will be repeat readers, some will be simple researchers, and some will be potential customers in need of a little push to make their final purchasing decision, so target them accordingly!

Don't Overestimate Daily Performance

Daily performance is not an indicator of remarketing success, as there are many factors that can contribute to or affect your remarketing efforts, and some leads can take days or weeks before they engage with your remarketing or convert, so make sure to analyze your performance over time instead.

Don't Ignore High Selling Seasons

You have to prepare season-specific remarketing material to retarget people during national festivities, the holidays, and worldwide spending sprees such as “Black Friday”.

Don't Be Repetitive

Don't show the exact same adverts to the same people all the time, as this will cause your remarketing to lose value.

Don't Ask For Useless Lead Info

Don't ask for useless personal information such as phone numbers or addresses to your targets in the consideration stage if it doesn't make sense to your offer. For example, only ask for a first name and email address to people whom you are offering a free eBook to.

Don't Stop Your Campaigns To Early

We've seen many marketers stop their campaigns when they don't see a sale on the first day. Keep in mind that, like we said before, most targets can take days, even weeks, before acting on your remarketing, so be persistent

Don't Rely On External Analytic Tools

Most external analytic tools such as Google Analytics will give you unreliable data about your Facebook Remarketing, so it's ok to always check your metrics using the ads manager.

Don't Retarget Highly Niche Audiences

Highly niche audiences are not likely to respond to remarketing because the people in such audiences are already the only ones looking after the niche offer in question. In fact, Facebook won't allow you to retarget certain audiences when they're too narrow, so take that into consideration.

Don't Overuse Static Ads

It has been found that remarketing campaigns work best when they serve a combination of dynamic ads such as video ads and carousel ads with static, single image ads, so take your time with your ad creatives!

Can You Start Remarketing On Facebook Right Away?

Facebook remarketing will only work when you already have regular website visitors, leads subscribed to your lists, or existing customers, to name a few. That is why it is called remarketing. Your best bet would be to first concentrate on engaging people and nurturing leads before getting into remarketing.

How Many People Should There Be On A Custom Audience To Increase Delivery?

While the minimum number of matched contacts that you need to target on a custom audience is 20, the effective number of matches to increase delivery is 100 contacts, and even with 100 contacts you will be reaching minimum delivery, so make sure to first reach over 100 people with your marketing efforts before remarketing to them.

What Are Some Of The Fastest Results That You Can See With Facebook Remarketing?

Recovering and reengaging lost audiences, transforming top-of-the-funnel traffic into engagement and actual conversions, remarketing to people who have been on your website and getting sales from it, upselling to people who have made recent purchases and reengaging product advocates are some of the fastest results that we have seen from Facebook remarketing.

Will Facebook Remarketing Work For You If You Don't' Install The Facebook Pixel On Your Website?

Yes! The Facebook pixel is used to retarget people the classic way, which is by tracking them from your website to Facebook and then showing them ads there. However, there are Facebook Remarketing setups that do not rely on the Facebook pixel such as custom audiences created from a customer file, or custom audiences that retarget people who have engaged with your business on Facebook.

Is The Facebook Remarketing Pixel A Cookie?

Although Facebook pixels and cookies serve a similar purpose, they are different. A pixel is an HTML element that is stored on a confirmation page and that tracks conversions on the page, whereas a cookie is a server-based file that

generates a unique ID for every user that visits a website in order to identify and track that user on the web. Pixels in general are more precise than cookies, and they do not expire.

What Is The Benefit Of Using Third Party Facebook Remarketing Platforms?

The main benefit would be that third-party Facebook Remarketing platforms can provide you with custom remarketing configurations that will allow you to simplify your Facebook remarketing workflow.

When Is It Wise To Stop Ads On Third Party Remarketing Platforms To Go Back To Facebook?

There are going to be times when third party remarketing platforms will feel limited to you because they have to go through the Facebook Ad Exchange in order to bid for ad placements, and also because they don't have access to all of Facebook ads inventory.

So the wise thing is to use third party remarketing platforms for convenience, and to go directly to Facebook to set up the more complex remarketing campaigns.

Should You Stop Retargeting Website Visitors To Focus On Nurturing Existing Leads?

Only if you are not getting new website visitors, which is unlikely. What you have to do is to exclude website visitors that do not convert after 30 days of visiting your website, or to retarget them with different incentives depending on the pages they spend the most time on and the actions they take on your website.

What Is The Benefit Of Remarketing To Engaged Customers?

The main benefit of remarketing to the people that are already likely to keep acting on your Remarketing ads is to keep a good “relevance score”. The “relevance score” is a metric that dictates how relevant your adverts are. The higher your relevance score is, the less that you will pay for your ads, and the most that they will be shown to your target audience.

Engaged customers sooner or later convert into brand loyalists, and they will keep interacting with your ads and your promoted posts, which will keep your relevance score in good standing. So make sure to create custom audiences to retarget your existing customers!

Should You Keep Your Remarketing Campaigns Running Until You Exhaust Your Budget If You Set A Lifetime Budget?

You will know that it is time to stop your remarketing campaigns when you have reached your remarketing goal, as there is no point in keeping your retargeting ads running after that, which is the easiest way to fatigue your audience.
