Safety net funding is available to school districts with a demonstrated capacity for special education funding in excess of state and federal funding otherwise available to the district. This bulletin provides application instructions for special education safety net awards for the 2015–16 school year.

APPLICATION PROCESS

Safety net awards are made by the Special Education State Oversight Committee based on the district's application and information available to the Office of Superintendent of Public Instruction (OSPI). Required forms and instructions are available in Word and Excel documents that can be downloaded from the website at <http://www.k12.wa.us/SpecialEd/Finance-Grants/SafetyNet.aspx>.

Fiscal Application (Worksheet A)

Worksheet A is filed with both the Community Impact applications and High-Need Individual applications. See Worksheet A Line-by-Line Instructions for assistance when completing the financial portion of the application. Worksheet A is pre-populated with (1) budgeted F-195 revenues and expenditures, and (2) Individuals with Disabilities Education Act (IDEA) federal flow-through allocations for Part B 611 and 619. The district's federal restricted indirect rate plus one percent is embedded in Worksheet A. Worksheet A will be populated with 2014–15 Part B 611 and 619 carryover and F-196 year-end data when the data becomes available.

The fiscal components of the Community Impact and High-Need Individual safety net applications are:

- Certification form
- Worksheet A
- The most recent completed monthly detailed expenditure reports for the special education programs showing the budgeted and actual year-to-date expenditures. The reports must sub-total at three separate levels:
 1. Object (i.e. 21-27-5)
 2. Activity (i.e. 21-27)
 3. Program (i.e. 21)
- Special education enrollment exception reports for the 2015–16 school year
- For High-Need Individual applications, Form SPI 1381-Individuals Summary (included in Worksheet A packet)

Community Impact Applications

A Community Impact application consists of a completed Form SPI 1381-Community Impact application. Include Statewide Student Identifier (SSID) numbers for students associated with the community impact factor(s). See Community Impact instructions for more information.

Community Impact applications must be received at OSPI by 5 p.m., Friday, February 12, 2016.

High-Need Individual Applications

Districts requesting safety net awards on behalf of eligible, resident high-need students, must convincingly demonstrate to the State Oversight Committee that the Individualized Education Program (IEP) for the eligible special education student is properly formulated. Costs eligible for consideration in a safety net award must be associated with providing direct special education and related services identified in a properly formulated IEP(s) for the period of funding requested.

- The annualized threshold for a high-need application for 2015–16 is \$27,613.
- Applicants for high-need individual students served in buildings with Title I schoolwide programs that include federal special education funding are required to submit the building's schoolwide cost allocation plan.
- Applicants are required to submit all IEPs in effect for the 2015–16 school year for each high-need individual application to validate and quantify the provision of reimbursable special education services for the period of the funding requested.

See Worksheet C Line-by-Line Instructions regarding items required, submission of program calendars, and assembly of the application. It is the responsibility of the district to ensure that each application is complete when submitted. If the IEP submitted for the student is missing pages, OSPI will not contact the district to obtain the missing pages.

In September of this school year, districts were notified that iGrants Form Package 442 is available to use for correction of issues of identified non-compliance. The IEPs in iGrants Form Package 442 that were submitted for safety net funding in the 2014–15 school year and were not funded as a result of compliance issues must be verified as having been corrected by the ESD prior to submission for safety net funding for the 2015–16 school year. All IEPs previously submitted with safety net applications from the 2014–15 school year that were determined to be non-compliant will be pro-rated from the date of the 442 correction if the correction was not completed and verified prior to the beginning of the 2015–16 school year. Uncorrected IEPs from the 2014–15 school year will not be considered as eligible for safety net funding in 2015–16.

However, as a result of a state regulation change regarding aversive interventions, the 2014–15 safety net IEPs that were determined to be non-compliant **only** as a result of aversive intervention issues may be corrected within 30 calendar days of the effective adoption date of the regulation change without pro-ration.

FINAL AWARD DETERMINATIONS

Applicants are required to complete and submit to OSPI Form SPI 1679 Potential Medicaid Eligible Student Worksheet on or before June 30, 2016, as a condition of potential award.

The Legislature requires that OSPI make award determinations for safety net awards in August of each year. Funding for state safety net awards will be distributed in August apportionment; federal safety net awards are drawn down using iGrants Form Package 269.

CONDITIONS ASSOCIATED WITH FUNDING FOR SAFETY NET

State and federal safety net funding is not an entitlement. Safety net funding is an annual grant application. Safety net awards in prior years do not guarantee future eligibility. The following are conditions associated with safety net awards:

- Capacity for funding is based on legitimate actual expenditures and all available revenues included on Worksheet A, which determines maximum funding capacity; however, maximum funding capacity does not entitle a district to a safety net award.
- Safety net funding will only be awarded for direct special education and related services validated and quantified by a properly formulated IEP, and/or quantifiable community impact factors.
- Safety net awards may be less than the amount of capacity demonstrated on Worksheet A, but in no case may exceed that amount.
- Funding is only provided for resident students (as defined by state law).
- Safety net funding is only available for the excess cost of special education students as required by RCW 28A.150.392, 34 CFR § 300.16, and WAC 392-172A-01075.

STATE OVERSIGHT COMMITTEE MEETING DATES AND APPLICATION DEADLINES

No application for the school year or additional information pertaining to an application shall be accepted after the due date.

High-need individual applications must be received at OSPI by 5 p.m. on the deadline date. Faxed submissions will not be accepted.

The State Oversight Committee approves or disapproves all safety net applications at the committee meetings. OSPI notifies districts in writing of the determination of the committee. To observe the process, applicants may attend the State Oversight Committee meeting on the morning of the second scheduled day of the meeting. Districts should indicate their intent to attend the meeting on Form SPI 1381-Certification. Applications are typically reviewed in alphabetical order. RELATED INFORMATION

Telemedicine

Effective October 1, telemedicine is covered by the Health Care Authority (HCA) as an acceptable mode to deliver school-based health care services. Telemedicine has proven to be a viable option for districts that are unable to obtain qualified related service providers despite ongoing recruitment efforts. Telemedicine services are eligible for Medicaid reimbursement when IEP services are provided by a qualified practitioner to a special education student in a school setting. School districts using telemedicine services should update Health Care Authority Form 12-325 in order to maximize all available revenues for delivering services. In the determination of need for safety net funding, committee members are required by 28A.150.410 to consider that districts demonstrate they are maximizing their eligibility for all revenues, including Medicaid, related to services for special education-eligible students

Educational Interpreters

The requirements for educational interpreters are changing as of the 2016–17 school year. Educational interpreters employed by school districts must have successfully achieved a score of 3.5 on the performance portion of the Education Interpreter Performance Assessment (EIPA) or hold Registry of Interpreters for the Deaf (RID) certification and pass the written assessment of the EIPA by the 2016–17 school year. Beginning in the fall of 2016, districts will be required to demonstrate that educational interpreters included on high-need individual applications meet this standard.

The Center for Childhood Deafness and Hearing Loss's mentorship program is offering a mentorship program from January 2016 to June 2016. The mentorship program involves monthly six-hour Saturday workshops, meeting with a deaf mentor one hour per month via Skype and meeting with an interpreter mentor three hours per month. The EIPA performance test is part of the mentorship program and will be given in the spring. For more information, contact Carol Carrothers at 509-963-1131 or email carolc@cwu.edu.

SPECIAL EDUCATION PROGRAM AUDITS

All safety net applicants are subject to audit by the Office of the State Auditor (SAO) at the request of the State Oversight Committee. The special education program auditors may review and verify data submitted in safety net applications, including certifications made by districts. Program audits may consider whether IEPs are properly formulated, verify student enrollment data, available revenue and legitimate actual expenditures. The results of the auditor's reviews may be considered by the oversight committee in determining, adjusting, or recovering safety net awards.

ADJUSTMENT AND RECOVERY

All safety net awards are subject to adjustment and recovery pursuant to WAC 392-140-630, 392-140-675, and 392-140-685, including situations where the student leaves the district or has a change in services. Audits by the SAO may also affect safety net eligibility and awards. After the end of each school year, state special education revenue (Account 4121) that is not expended in the state special education program (Program 21) is subject to recovery by OSPI through the School Apportionment and Financial Service Office.

Unexpended federal special education funding from 2014–15 may result in a recovery of safety net awards. Safety net awards may be adjusted based upon the percentage of potential Medicaid eligible students billed as calculated by OSPI.

TRAINING
