Michelle D. Simpson

Michelle Simpson was raised in Bowie Maryland and has been a resident of Hampton since 1984. Michelle Simpson is the wife of Elder Thomas C. Simpson, III for 20 years. (Pastor, of Spirit of Life Ministries) She is also the mother of Carnai 18, Sharnell 17 and Thomas Micah 14.

Her education began as an Elementary major at the University of Maryland Baltimore County (UMBC) and the University of Nevada Las Vegas. (UNLV) Michelle believes that a foundation of education is just the beginning of doors that can be opened to anyone. After working for Federal Express for 13 years, she resigned and founded Inspiring Minds Youth Development Center in Hampton. Michelle Simpson is also the President and Founder of the Women's Christian Networking Ministries founded in 1997.

Some of her accomplishments are as follows; Co-Chairman of the steering committee for special events for the City of Hampton Neighborhood Month, Served on the City of Hampton 40 Developmental Assets Core Team, Board member and events coordinator of Colonial Acres Neighborhood Association and Pregnancy Prevention Trainer for Alternatives, Inc; just to name a few. She is also the recipient of the Alpha Phi Alpha Delta Lambda Community Service Award, and the National NUSA Notable Award.

Pastor William L. Lee

It is Reverend William L. Lee's finesse as a communicator and skill as an educator that have enabled him to make prodigious strides against the barriers of race, religion and socioeconomic status. His ability to provide a well-rounded, objective view of an issue complements a gift for persuasiveness that Rev. Lee brings to complex community issues. He uses the combination of these talents to provide a voice for members of his community that often go unheard.

An ordained minister, Pastor Lee often transcends his traditional pastoral role to work actively on issues affecting the entire Roanoke Valley. On a number of occasions he has served city government by imparting an understanding of the area's diverse citizenry to local legislators. His participation in the citizens' review panel for selecting the Roanoke City Chief of Police is indicative of the community-centered tasks Pastor Lee undertakes to insure that awareness.

William began his career in 1974 as a teacher in Roanoke City's public schools. Though he left this position a year later to pursue a Master of Divinity degree, his commitment to area youths has never diminished. He is past president of the William Fleming High School PTSA; one of many ways Pastor Lee has promoted community involvement in the Roanoke City schools. Through his efforts, improvements have been made to both middle and senior high athletic programs in local schools. He is often invited to speak at high school Baccalaureate and graduation ceremonies and to deliver inspirational speeches at area schools. He has as a Christian minister, shown substantial personal initiative in his focus on the quality of life for Roanoke's youth.

Members of Rev. Lee's congregation at Loudon Avenue Christian Church have benefited from his guidance for the past 26 years. However, his ministry reaches outward from his own denomination to involvement with fellow ministers, as well as neighborhood and civic organizations. Rev. Lee has also been involved with the Fellowship of Christian athletes for nearly two decades.

The Loudon Avenue congregation participates in the Congregational Nursing Program through Carilion Health Systems. Through this program, a nurse is on staff at the church 25 hours per week to provide health education, seminars and information to members of the congregation and the neighborhood at large. Also, a part of William's focus on the well being of fellow citizens is an outreach to persons with HIV and AIDS. He provides counseling and support services to these individuals free of charge.

Rev. Lee also participates with a group of organizations in a community healthcare initiative. This initiative has been working for over one and half years on a plan to put a health clinic in Northwest city.

Rev. Lee supports area veterans as Chaplains of the Department of Veterans Affairs Medical Center. He has served the Salem, Virginia facility for the past 21 years. He is also Chaplain with Hamlar-Curtis Funeral Home.

William serves on the boards of directors for Blue Ridge Community Services, Roanoke Area Ministers, the Congregational Nursing Program (Carilion Health Systems) and Good Samaritan Hospice. He is a member of the Roanoke City school board's long range planning committee. Roanoke City public schools budget advisory committee and the Roanoke City cultural services committee. William is also a charter member of the Roanoke Neighborhood Partnership.

William has published a sermon entitled, "Working Out what is worked In" found in the book *Out of Mighty Waters*. He is the author of two communion meditations, "Look Who's There," and "In Remembrance of Me, Go With Hope." In the collection *At Christ's Table*. Rev. Lee also wrote the *Fellowship of Prayer Meditations for Lenten Season 2000*.

Rev. Lee holds a Bachelor's of Science Degree from Virginia State College and a Masters of Divinity Degree from Duke University. In addition to serving as a pastor and chaplain, Rev. Lee joined the faculty of Duke Divinity School in 1997. William has been an adjunct professor of Religion at Roanoke since January 2000.

William was born in the small town of Nuttsville, Virginia, in Lancaster County, near the Chesapeake Bay. William is the second of three children born to the late Leon Lee and the late Thelma Lee. William is married to the former Dana Barnes and they have two children, Aaron and Sarah.

William H. Brown, Chief of Police Town of Blacksburg

Brown has been with the Town of Blacksburg since 1970. He became Blacksburg Chief of Police in April 1994 and served as Captain of the Blacksburg Police Department's Operations Division from 1986 until that time. He is a Vietnam veteran and holds an A. A. in Administration of Justice from New River Community College, a B. S. in Management of Human Resources from Bluefield College, and is a graduate of the FBI Academy.

Chief Brown was recently elected Second Vice Fresident of the Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police. He is the first African — American police chief to serve on this Executive Board. The Virginia Association of Chiefs of Police is a statewide organization of federal, state, and local police chiefs and law enforcement executives dedicated to improving the professionalism of police agencies in Virginia.

Chief Brown is an expert in police chief and officer assessment and recruiting. He has served on a variety of police hiring boards and is a member of the Association's Strategic Planning Committee. During his 30+ years in law enforcement, Chief Brown has been recognized by many organizations, and is the recipient or numerous service awards.

BIOGRAPHICAL SKETCH DR. La VERNE PARKER DIGGS

Dr. Diggs is currently the Assistant City Manager for the City of Norfolk. In this capacity, along with the City Manager, she is responsible for "setting" organization direction and ensuring proper execution of the City's public policies and service delivery. In this role, she serves as an extension of the City Manager in the management of public services; she provides executive leadership in strategic planning and implementing the goals of the City.

Prior to joining the City of Norfolk, Dr. Diggs held several executive level positions; she worked for the City of Glendale in Arizona as the Director of Organizational Development and Human Resources, and she served as the Assistant Vice President for Operations and Human Resources for California State University at Los Angeles.

Dr. Diggs was born and raised in Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania and left Pittsburgh to pursue opportunities in California where she spent nearly 25 years working in higher education administration. She has served as a speaker, panel member and facilitator for various organizations including Universities and Colleges, The Arizona City and County Management Association and the National Forum for Black Public Administrators.

Dr. Diggs has taught courses in human resources management, public administration, and business writing. She has an earned doctorate degree from the School of Education and Psychology at Pepperdine University; she has a Masters degree in Human Resources and Organization Development and a Bachelor of Science in Public Administration.
