The solar calendar, the basis of the Gregorian calendar used around the world, is more than 365 days long. The traditional Chinese calendar that determines the date of Chinese New Year is The Luni Solar, which means that it is based not only on the lunar cycle, but also on the course of the earth around the sun. The month of this Chinese calendar is 28 days, and the normal year lasts from 353 to 355 days [Source: timeanddate.com]. To synchronize the calendar with the sun and seasons, the Chinese add an extra light moon about once every three years [Source: timeanddate.com] Determining the date of the Lunar New Year requires complex calculations. Most often falls on the second new moon after the winter solstice. In the Gregorian calendar, bliss is around December 21. Therefore, Chinese New Year usually occurs in one of the first three weeks of late January or February. Advertising Chinese calendar year follows a 12-year cycle. Each year it is associated with one of 12 animal symbols such as tigers, rabbits and dragons [Source: timeanddate.com]. Every New Year shows the end of the reign of one animal and the beginning of the next. The Chinese calendar was once widely used in Asia, and the Chinese New Year version is celebrated in other Asian countries. In Vietnam, for example, holidays are called Tet. This is a three-day celebration that includes many of the customs that continue in China, such as special food feasts and paying homage to ancestors. Japan and South Korea have long used the Gregorian calendar, but people in those countries incorporate some of the same customs into the New Year's festivities on January 1. Many days of Chinese New Year have special meanings. Let's take a look on the next page. Like many Meso-American calendars, the Tzorquin, or Holy Circular calendar, operated in a 260-day cycle. One theory for the significance of that cycle length is that 260 days correlates with pregnancy [Source: Maya Mystery School]. Another suggests that the calendar represents the length of time corn is grown. However, it is likely based on the Mayans' respect for the numbers 13 and 20. In the Gregorian calendar, there are seven days of the week and any place from 28 to 31 days, depending on the month. The Tzolk'in calendar consists of a 20-day name symbolized with an image called a glyph and 13 numbers called tones. The day is From 1 to 13, names are also specified in order. Advertising Tzolk'in The beginning of the calendar begins with the name of the first day, Imix', and number one. The day continues in order, and the second day is a combination of Ik' and No. 2. All 13 tones are used until the day of the week names and numbers are combined in order. When the calendar reaches the 13th day, it has the numbers B'en and 13, and the number starts with 1, but the day of the week name proceeds with the 14th glyph Ix. By rotating in this way, the two sets form a unique combination of 260 days and numbers. For example, when you reach the end of the day name cycle at 7 Ajaw, the day name starts anew in Imix followed by a number: 8 Imix', 9 Ik', 10 Ak'bal, etc. This content is not compatible with this device. Consider two interlocking gears, placing 13 numbers around a small circular gear that fits inside a large gear on the day of the week indicated by hieroglyphs. If you lock these gears together with the number one and day of the week name Imix', you can get 260 unique days by reaching one gear and rotating the gear until you reach Imix' again. These gears rotate until the final combination clicks into place at 13 Ajaw, marked the end of the year. It's easy to see the importance the Mayans put into the Tzolquin calendar. For example, they believed that your date of birth would determine the characteristics that you would show in your personality - just like those who believe that your astrological signs do today. Holy men also schedule specific events throughout the year based on the Tzorquin calendar. At the beginning of each uninal (20 days), the shaman counts forward to determine when religious and ceremonial events occur. He then chooses the date that will be most prosperous or lucky for the community. Despite its myriad features, the Tzolk'in calendar has not yet been available to measure the year of the sun, the time it takes for the sun to make a complete cycle. For this reason, the Mayans needed a more accurate calendar to keep track of the length of time we consider them year-to-year.
