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INTRODUCTION

The *Illinois Register* is the official state document for publishing public notice of rulemaking activity initiated by State governmental agencies. The table of contents is arranged categorically by rulemaking activity and alphabetically by agency within each category.

Rulemaking activity consists of proposed or adopted new rules; amendments to or repealers of existing rules; and rules promulgated by emergency or peremptory action. Executive Orders and Proclamations issued by the Governor; notices of public information required by State Statute; and activities (meeting agendas; Statements of Objection or Recommendation, etc.) of the Joint Committee on Administrative Rules (JCAR), a legislative oversight committee which monitors the rulemaking activities of State Agencies; is also published in the Register.

The Register is a weekly update of the Illinois Administrative Code (a compilation of the rules adopted by State agencies). The most recent edition of the Code, along with the Register, comprise the most current accounting of State agencies' rulemakings.

The *Illinois Register* is the property of the State of Illinois, granted by the authority of the Illinois Administrative Procedure Act [5 ILCS 100/1-1, et seq.].

- 4) <u>Statutory Authority</u>: Implementing the Medical Practice Act of 1987 [225 ILCS 60] and the Patients' Right to Know Act [225 ILCS 61] and authorized by Section 2105-15(7) of the Civil Administrative Code of Illinois (Department of Professional Regulation Law) [20 ILCS 2105/2105-15(7)].
- A Complete Description of the Subjects and Issues Involved: These proposed amendments would add two new sections, which would create a three-tiered approach to licensure for international medical graduates (IMG), whereby an IMG can practice under the supervision of an approved sponsoring entity for a period of two years. Upon successful completion of that two-year supervisory period, there is a location-specific restricted license that requires the IMG to practice independently in an Illinois Health Care Shortage Area for two years. Upon completion of that two-year stint, an IMG would be able to apply for full and unencumbered status as a physician and surgeon in Illinois. The Department is proposing these amendments in order to comport with recent legislative changes made to the Medical Practice Act of 1987 at [225 ILCS 60/15.5].

SUBPART C: GENERAL INFORMATION

Section 1285.345 International Medical Graduate Physician Limited License

- a) "International medical graduate" is defined under Section 2 of the Act as a "medical graduate (i) who has been trained in a country other than the United States; (ii) whose education has been certified by the Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates; (iii) who has passed Step 1, Step 2 Clinical Knowledge, and Step 3 of the United States Medical Licensing Examination; (iv) who maintains an unencumbered license from another country; and (v) who is not licensed to practice medicine in any state or territory of the United States."
- An international medical graduate shall be eligible to apply for a limited license to practice medicine in the State of Illinois. Upon determination of fitness, the Division, in its discretion, may issue a two-year limited license to an international medical graduate in accordance with Section 15.5 of the Act to an applicant who satisfies all of the following criteria:
 - 1) Submits a fully completed application on forms provided by the Division which includes the payment of a \$100 fee;
 - Provides an official transcript and diploma or official transcript and certification of graduation from the medical education program granting the degree and proof of Educational Commission for Foreign Medical Graduates (ECFMG) certification; provided, however, that the Division may waive this requirement at its discretion where the applicant is unable to obtain the required documentation from a non-cooperating country;

- <u>Provides proof of successful completion of the United States medical</u>
 <u>Licensing Examination (USMLE) Steps 1, 2, and 3. Examination scores</u>
 shall be submitted directly to the Division from the testing entity;
- 4) Submits evidence applicant has been engaged in the active practice of medicine in their country of practice in at least 3 of the last 10 years. If the active practice of medicine predates the three years preceding the date of application, the applicant must show evidence of a US clinical experience including, but not limited to, a clinical observership;
- Has entered into an agreement with a sponsoring entity such as a hospital, a critical access teaching hospital, a Federally Qualified Health Center, a State facility, a community health center, or another facility approved by the Division that provides an assessment and evaluation program designed to develop, assess, and evaluate the physician's nonclinical and clinical skills and familiarity with standards appropriate for medical practice in the State of Illinois; and
- <u>6)</u> Submits to a background check process required of applicants generally.
- <u>Upon the issuance of the limited license, an individual may only practice:</u>
 - 1) Within an approved sponsoring entity which must be either a hospital, a critical access teaching hospital, a Federally Qualified Health Center, a State facility, a community health center, or another facility approved by the Division; and
 - <u>Under the supervision and control of an approved sponsoring entity who designates a faculty supervisor who possesses a full and unrestricted physician license that has never been disciplined in the State of Illinois.</u>
- d) An applicant for limited license must file with the Division, a practice agreement between the applicant and the approved sponsoring entity that provides an assessment and evaluation program designed to develop, assess, and evaluated the applicant's familiarity with non-clinical and clinical skills and standards appropriate for medical practice.

- e) A sponsoring entity shall maintain professional responsibility for any act which constitutes the practice of medicine when performed by a limited license holder practicing under their supervision.
- Should either party terminate the practice agreement, it shall be the responsibility of both the limited license holder and the sponsoring entity to notify the Division immediately and submit a written explanation to the Division indicating why the practice agreement was terminated. A limited license holder may only practice within an approved sponsoring entity and under the supervision of a licensed physician in accordance with 1285.345(c).
- <u>A limited license issued under this subsection is valid for two years and may be</u> renewed every two years in accordance with 68 IAC 1285.120 with the exception of the continuing medical education requirement for the first renewal.
- h) A limited license holder shall be entitled to perform only such acts as may be prescribed by and incidental to their practice agreement with a sponsoring entity while under supervision. A limited license holder shall not be entitled to otherwise engage in the practice of medicine in this State unless fully licensed in this State.
- i) All persons licensed under this subsection are subject to the jurisdiction of the Division to the same extent as all other licensees under the Medical Practice Act of 1987.

<u>Section 1285.350 International Medical Graduate Physician Pathway to Full Unrestricted</u> <u>Licensure</u>

a) An individual who successfully obtains a limited license pursuant to 1285.345 and practices under such limited license continuously until its expiration shall be eligible to apply for a two-year restricted license to practice medicine in a designated Illinois Health Professional Shortage Area in Illinois as approved by the Division. This license is restricted in practice location only, and a restricted license holder shall be entitled to practice independently within a designated Illinois Health Professional Shortage Area. After two years of such restricted practice, the individual shall be eligible to apply for a full, unrestricted license to practice medicine.

- b) The Division, in its discretion, may issue a two-year restricted license to practice medicine in a designated Illinois Health Professional Shortage Area so long as the individual maintained a limited license in accordance with 185.345 and provides the Division with:
 - 1) A fully completed application on forms provided by the Division;
 - 2) Proof of successful completion of a two-year supervised work experience at an approved sponsoring entity under supervision for which the limited license was issued, including but not limited to certification of the completion of the sponsoring entity's assessment and evaluation program;
 - 3) Proof of anticipated employment at a designated Illinois Health Professional Shortage Area as approved by the Division; and
 - 4) Payment of a \$230.00 fee.
- <u>An individual who successfully obtains a restricted license pursuant to this Section and practices under such restricted license until its expiration shall be eligible to apply for a full unrestricted license to practice medicine.</u>
- d) The Division, in its discretion, may issue a full unrestricted physician and surgeon license to an individual in accordance with Section 15.5 of the Act who has maintained a restricted license and provides the Division with:
 - 1) A fully completed application on forms provided by the Division; and
 - <u>Proof of two-years' worth of work experience within a designated Illinois Health Professional Shortage Area.</u>
- e) All persons licensed under this subsection are subject to the jurisdiction of the Division to the same extent as all other licensees under the Medical Practice Act of 1987.
- f) Persons applying for licensure under this subsection shall comply with administrative procedures and administrative requirements determined as provided in 225 ILCS 60/21.

 - 3) Tier 3 \$2.40 per member month.
- e) For State Fiscal <u>Year Years</u> 2024 through 2025, there is imposed upon MCO member months an assessment, calculated on base year data, as follows, for the appropriate tier:
 - 1) Tier 1 \$78.90 per member month;
 - 2) Tier 2 \$1.40 per member month; and
 - 3) Tier 3 \$2.40 per member month.
- f) For State Fiscal Year 2020, and for each State Fiscal Year thereafter, the Department may adjust rates or tier parameters or both in order to maximize the revenue generated by the assessment consistent with federal regulations and to meet federal statistical tests necessary for federal financial participation. Any upward adjustment to the Tier 3 rate shall be the minimum necessary to meet federal statistical tests.

Section 125.120 Returns and Payment of Tax

- a) Each person who is required to pay the tax imposed by the RPOT Act shall make a return to the Department on or before the 20th day of each month for the preceding calendar month stating the following:
 - 1) the taxpayer's name;
 - 2) the address of the taxpayer's principal place of business and the address of the principal place of business (if that is a different address) from which the taxpayer is engaged in the business of renting merchandise subject to the RPOT;

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- 3) the total amount of receipts received by the taxpayer during the preceding calendar month from renting merchandise subject to RPOT by the taxpayer;
- 4) the total amount received by the taxpayer during the preceding calendar month from the renting of merchandise on an installment basis subject to the RPOT by the taxpayer;
- 5) deductions allowed by the RPOT Act;
- gross receipts that were received by the taxpayer during the preceding calendar month and upon the basis of which the RPOT is imposed;
- 7) the amount of RPOT due;
- 8) the signature of the taxpayer; and
- 9) any other information as the Department may request on the application form prescribed and furnished by the Department.
- b) Any return or document that is required to be filed under the RPOT Act shall be filed electronically, in the form and manner required by the Department. Any payment required to be made under the RPOT Act shall be paid electronically, in the form and manner required by the Department. The Department shall grant a waiver of the electronic filing or payment requirement under Section 20 of the Act for any taxpayer who petitions the Department and demonstrates undue hardship in complying with the electronic filing or payment requirement. The waiver shall be for a period not to exceed 2 years but may be renewed an unlimited number of times for periods not to exceed 2 years each. [35 ILCS 180/20]

The amount of the quarter-monthly payments shall be credited against the final tax liability of the taxpayer's return for that month. If any quarter-monthly payment is not paid at the time or in the amount required by this subsection, then the taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on the difference between the minimum amount due as a payment and the amount of the quarter-monthly payment actually and timely paid, except insofar as the taxpayer has previously made payments for that month to the Department in excess of the minimum payments previously due as provided in this subsection.

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SUBPART E: RETURNS

Section 130.501 Monthly Tax Returns – When Due – Contents

- a) Except as provided in Section 130.502, 130.510 and 130.2045, on or before the twentieth day of each calendar month, every person engaged in the business of selling tangible personal property at retail in this State during the preceding calendar month shall file a return with the Department for the preceding month, stating the name of the seller, the seller's residence address and the address of the seller's principal place of business, and the address of the principal place of business (if that is a different address) from which the seller engaged in the business of selling tangible personal property at retail in this State. On and after January 1, 2018, except for returns required to be filed prior to January 1, 2023, for motor vehicles, watercraft, aircraft, and trailers that are required to be registered with an agency of this State, with respect to retailers whose annual gross receipts average \$20,000 or more, all returns required to be filed pursuant to the Act shall be filed electronically. On and after January 1, 2023, with respect to retailers whose annual gross receipts average \$20,000 or more, all returns required to be filed pursuant to the Act, including, but not limited to, returns for motor vehicles, watercraft, aircraft, and trailers that are required to be registered with an agency of this State, shall be filed electronically. Retailers who demonstrate that they do not have access to the Internet or demonstrate hardship in filing electronically may petition the Department to waive the electronic filing requirement. [35 ILCS 120/3]
- b) In addition, the return shall disclose the following:
 - Total Receipts for the Month from Sales of Tangible Personal Property and Services. Real estate builders and construction contractors, who are also retailers, and who assume the responsibility for accounting for the tax on building materials they purchase, must include, in total receipts, not only their receipts from "over-the-counter" resales of those materials, but also their cost prices of the materials that they convert into real estate (see Section 130.2075). This may be accomplished in the case of a construction contractor by including the contractor's receipts from construction contracts in total receipts and by deducting those receipts from total receipts only to the extent to which those receipts exceed the cost price to

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the contractor of the tangible personal property that the contractor incorporates into real estate as a construction contractor.

- 2) Deductions Allowed by Law
 The taxpayer should include in the taxpayer's total receipts, but should deduct before computing the amount of the tax:
 - A) taxes collected from sales of the following:
 - i) general merchandise retail sales;
 - ii) general merchandise service sales;
 - iii) food, drugs and medical appliances retail sales;
 - iv) food, drugs and medical appliances service sales;
 - B) receipts from sales of tangible personal property for purposes of resale in any form as tangible personal property (see Subparts B and N);
 - C) receipts from sales that are within the protection of the Commerce Clause of the Constitution of the United States (see Section 130.605);
 - D) cash refunds for returned merchandise (see Section 130.401);
 - E) receipts from the sales of newspapers and magazines (see Section 130.2105);
 - F) State motor fuel taxes collected;
 - G) the exempt receipts or exempt percentage of receipts from sales of gasohol, biodiesel, renewable diesel, and blended fuels as described in Section 130.320;
 - H) receipts from sales of any kind to any corporation, society, association, foundation or institution organized and operated exclusively for charitable, religious or educational purposes or any

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not-for-profit corporation, society, association, foundation, institution or organization that has no compensated officers or employees and that is organized and operated primarily for the recreation of persons 55 years of age and older (see Section 130.2005);

- I) receipts from sales of any kind to a governmental body (see Section 130.2080);
- J) receipts from nontaxable sales of service;
- K) any other deduction allowed by law, such as receipts from isolated or occasional sales (see Section 130.110); federal taxes that are imposed at the level of the retail sale, but not federal excise taxes on manufacturers, etc. (see Section 130.445); and
- L) total of all deductions allowed by law.
- 3) Total receipts that are obtained by subtracting deductions from total receipts.
- 4) The Amount of Tax Due
 - A) An allowance, not to exceed \$1,000 per month beginning on January 1, 2025, is available to reimburse the taxpayer for the expenses incurred in keeping records, preparing and filing returns, remitting the tax and supplying data to the Department on request. The minimum discount, over the entire period of any given calendar year, for any single taxpayer (if the taxpayer incurs that much tax liability) shall be \$5.00 for that calendar year. This allowance is available when the tax is remitted with a return that is filed when due under the Act, but is not available in any case in which the tax is paid late (with or without a return, and whether or not formally assessed by the Department); in the case of retailers who report and pay the tax on a transaction by transaction basis, the discount shall be taken with each tax remittance instead of when the retailer files its periodic return. Retailers required to file returns electronically pursuant to the Act who fail to file their returns electronically may not take the discount allowed to

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reimburse retailers for the expenses incurred in keeping records, preparing and filing returns, remitting the tax and supplying data to the Department on request.

B) Balance of Tax Due

- i) The return should also show the amount of penalty (if any) that is due, the total of the tax and penalty due, and such other reasonable information as the Department may require.
- ii) If a total amount of less than \$1 is payable, refundable or creditable, the amount shall be disregarded if it is less than 50 cents and shall be increased to \$1 if it is 50 cents or more. Any amount that is required to be shown or reported on any return or other document under the Act shall, if the amount is not a whole-dollar amount, be increased to the nearest whole-dollar amount in any case in which the fractional part of a dollar is 50 cents or more, and decreased to the nearest whole-dollar amount when the fractional part of a dollar is less than 50 cents (Section 3 of the Act).
- iii) The Department may require returns to be filed on a quarterly basis. If so required, a return for each calendar quarter shall be filed on or before the twentieth day of the calendar month following the end of such calendar quarter. The taxpayer shall also file a return with the Department for each of the first two months of each calendar quarter, on or before the twentieth day of the following calendar month, stating:
 - *The name of the seller;*
 - The address of the principal place of business from which the seller engages in the business of selling tangible personal property at retail in this State;
 - The total amount of taxable receipts received by the

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seller during the preceding calendar month or quarter from sales of tangible personal property by the seller during the preceding calendar month or quarter, including receipts from charge and time sales, but less all deductions allowed by law;

- *The amount of credit provided in Section 2d of the Act;*
- *The amount of tax due;*
- The amount of penalty due, if any; and
- Such other reasonable information as the Department may require. (Section 3 of the Act)
- c) Returns must be signed by the taxpayer. If a taxpayer fails to sign a return within 30 days after the proper notice and demand for signature by the Department, the return shall be considered valid and any amount shown to be due on the return shall be deemed assessed. (Section 3 of the Act)

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Section 130.535 Payment of the Tax, Including Quarter Monthly Payments in Certain Instances

- a) Except as noted hereinafter, at the same time that a tax return required by the provisions of the Act is filed with the Department, the taxpayer shall pay the tax that is due with such return to the Department.
- b) Before October 1, 2000, if the taxpayer's average monthly tax liability to the Department under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, the Service Use Tax Act, excluding any liability for prepaid sales tax to be remitted in accordance with Section 2d of the Act, was \$10,000 or more during the preceding 4 complete calendar quarters, he shall file a return with the Department each month by the 20th day of the month next following the month during which such tax liability is incurred and shall make payments to the Department on or before the 7th, 15th, 22nd and last day of the month during which such liability is incurred. If the month during which such tax liability is incurred begins on or after January 1, 1988 and prior to January 1,

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1989, each payment shall be in an amount equal to 22.5% of the taxpayer's actual liability for the month or 25% of the taxpayer's liability for the same calendar month of the preceding year. If the month during which such tax liability is incurred begins on or after January 1, 1989, and prior to January 1, 1996, each payment shall be in an amount equal to 22.5% of the taxpayer's actual liability for the month or 25% of the taxpayer's liability for the same calendar month of the preceding year or 100% of the taxpayer's actual liability for the quarter monthly reporting period. If the month during which such tax liability is incurred begins on or after January 1, 1996, each payment shall be in an amount equal to 22.5% of the taxpayer's actual liability for the month or 25% of the taxpayer's liability for the same calendar month of the preceding year. The amount of such payments shall be credited against the final tax liability of the taxpayer's return for that month. Prior to January 1, 1999, if any such payment is not paid at the time or in the amount required in this subsection, then the taxpayer's 2%, 2.1% or 1.75% vendors' discount shall be reduced by 2%, 2.1% or 1.75% of the difference between the minimum amount due as a payment and the amount of such quarter monthly payment actually and timely paid, and the taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on such difference except insofar as the taxpayer has previously made payments for that month to the Department in excess of the minimum payments previously due as provided in this Section. Beginning on and after January 1, 1999, if any such payment is not paid at the time or in the amount required in this subsection, then the taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on the difference between the minimum amount due as a payment and the amount of such quarter monthly payment actually and timely paid, except insofar as the taxpayer has previously made payments for that month to the Department in excess of the minimum payments previously due as provided in this Section.

On and after October 1, 2000, if the taxpayer's average monthly tax liability to the Department under the Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, and the Service Use Tax Act, excluding any liability for prepaid sales tax to be remitted in accordance with Section 2d of the Act, was \$20,000 or more during the preceding 4 complete calendar quarters, he shall file a return with the Department each month by the 20th day of the month next following the month during which such tax liability is incurred and shall make payment to the Department on or before the 7th, 15th, 22nd and last day of the month during which such liability is incurred. (Section 3 of the Act)

c) Before October 1, 2001, without regard to whether a taxpayer is required to make quarter monthly payments as specified above, any taxpayer who is required by

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Section 2d of this Act to collect and remit prepaid taxes and has collected prepaid taxes which average in excess of \$25,000 per month during the preceding 2 complete calendar quarters, shall file a return with the Department as required by Section 2f and shall make payments to the Department on or before the 7th, 15th, 22nd and last day of the month during which such liability is incurred. If the month during which such tax liability is incurred begins on or after January 1, 1987, each payment shall be in an amount equal to 22.5% of the taxpayer's actual liability for the month or 26.25% of the taxpayer's liability for the same calendar month of the preceding year. The amount of such quarter monthly payments shall be credited against the final tax liability of the taxpayer's return for that month filed under this Section or Section 2f, as the case may be. Once applicable, the requirement of the making of quarter monthly payments to the Department pursuant to this paragraph shall continue until such taxpayer's average monthly prepaid tax collections during the preceding 2 complete calendar quarters is \$25,000 or less. If any such quarter monthly payment is not paid at the time or in the amount required, the taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on such difference, except insofar as the taxpayer has previously made payments for that month in excess of the minimum payments previously due. (Section 3 of the Act)

On and after October 1, 2001, without regard to whether a taxpayer is required to make quarter monthly payments as specified above, any taxpayer who is required by Section 2d of the Act to collect and remit prepaid taxes and has collected prepaid taxes that average in excess of \$20,000 per month during the preceding 4 complete calendar quarters shall file a return with the Department as required by Section 2f and shall make payments to the Department on or before the 7th, 15th, 22nd and last day of the month during which the liability is incurred. Each payment shall be in an amount equal to 22.5% of the taxpayer's actual liability for the month or 25% of the taxpayer's liability for the same calendar month of the preceding year. The amount of the quarter monthly payments shall be credited against the final tax liability of the taxpayer's return for that month filed under this Section or Section 2f of the Act, as the case may be. Once applicable, the requirement of the making of quarter monthly payments to the Department pursuant to this paragraph shall continue until the taxpayer's average monthly prepaid tax collections during the preceding 4 complete calendar quarters (excluding the month of highest liability and the month of lowest liability) is less than \$19,000 or until such taxpayer's average monthly liability to the Department as computed for each calendar quarter of the 4 preceding complete calendar quarters is less than \$20,000. If any such quarter monthly payment is not paid at

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the time or in the amount required, the taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on such difference, except insofar as the taxpayer has previously made payments for that month in excess of the minimum payments previously due. (Section 3 of the Act)

- d) If any such payment or deposit provided for herein exceeds the taxpayer's present and probable future liabilities under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act and the Service Use Tax Act, the Department shall, if requested by the taxpayer, issue to the taxpayer a credit memorandum, which may be submitted by the taxpayer to the Department in payment of tax liability subsequently to be remitted by the taxpayer to the Department or be assigned by the taxpayer to a similar taxpayer under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act. If no such request is made, the taxpayer may credit such excess payment against tax liability subsequently to be remitted to the Department under the Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act. If the Department subsequently determines that all or any part of the credit taken was not actually due to the taxpayer, the taxpayer's 2.1% and 1.75% vendor's discount shall be reduced, if necessary, to reflect by 2.1% or 1.75% of the difference between the credit taken and that actually due, and that taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on such difference.
- e) For the purposes of this Section, the phrase "preceding 4 complete calendar quarters" means the preceding 4 complete calendar quarters for which returns would have been filed or should have been filed for the last month of the 4 quarter period since, until then, the making of the required computations for the 4 quarter period would be impossible. For example, the preceding 4 complete calendar quarters with reference to a November 1, 1976, date would actually have ended June 30, 1976, since most returns for the last month of that 4 quarter period would not have to have been filed until July 31, 1976, and the preceding 4 complete calendar quarters with reference to a July 1, 1977, date would actually end March 31, 1977, since most returns for the last month of that 4 quarter period would not have to be filed until April 30, 1977. The calendar quarters are January through March, April through June, July through September and October through December.
- f) Beginning October 1, 1993, a taxpayer who has an average monthly tax liability of \$150,000 or more shall make all payments required by rules of the Department (see 86 Ill. Adm. Code 750 "Payment of Taxes by Electronic Funds Transfer") by

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electronic funds transfer. Beginning October 1, 1994, a taxpayer who has an average monthly tax liability of \$100,000 or more shall make all payments required by rules of the Department by electronic funds transfer. Beginning October 1, 1995, a taxpayer who has an average monthly tax liability of \$50,000 or more shall make all payments required by rules of the Department by electronic funds transfer.

g) Beginning October 1, 2000, a taxpayer who has an annual tax liability of \$200,000 or more shall make all payments required by rules of the Department by electronic funds transfer (see 86 Ill. Adm. Code 750). The term "annual tax liability" shall be the sum of the taxpayer's liabilities under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, and all other State and local occupation and use tax laws administered by the Department, for the immediately preceding calendar year. (Section 3 of the Act)

Section 130.565 Vendor's Discount Cap

- Act, the retailer filing the return under that Section 3 of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the retailer filing the return under that Section shall, at the time of filing such return, pay to the Department the amount of tax imposed by the Act less a discount of 1.75% or \$5 per calendar year, whichever is greater, which is allowed to reimburse the retailer for the expenses incurred in keeping records, preparing and filing returns, remitting the tax and supplying data to the Department on request. Beginning with returns due on or after January 1, 2025, the vendor's discount allowed under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, the Use Tax Act, and the Service Use Tax Act, including any local tax administered by the Department and reported on the same return, shall not exceed \$1,000 per month in the aggregate for returns other than transaction returns filed during the month. [35 ILCS 120/3]
 - The following non-transaction return types are each subject to a separate \$1,000 per month cap:
 - A) Form ST-1, Sales and Use Tax and E911 Surcharge Return (sales and use tax portion of the return). Public Act 103-592 imposed a separate \$1,000 per month vendor's discount cap on the Prepaid Wireless E911 surcharge [50 ILCS 753/15] reported and remitted

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on Schedule B of Form ST-1. The 3% vendor's discount for the Illinois Telecommunications Access Corporation ("ITAC") Assessment [220 ILCS 5/13-703] also reported and remitted on Schedule B of Form ST-1 does not have a cap.

- B) Form ST-70, Aviation Fuel Sales and Use Tax Return.
- C) Form CD-1, Cannabis Dispensary Tax Return ("Step 1: Sales and Use Tax" portion of the return). The "Step 2: Cannabis Purchaser Excise Tax" portion of Form CD-1 is subject to a separate statutory \$1,000 per month vendor's discount cap.
- D) Form LSE-1, Lease Tax Return for Vehicle Leasing Companies.

 For purposes of the vendor's discount cap, Form LSE-1 is

 considered a periodic return subject to a separate \$1,000 per month

 vendor's discount cap. Tax reported on Form LSE-1 is not

 reported on a transaction-by-transaction basis. Instead Form LSE
 1 is filed once per month to report aggregate monthly amounts

 related to numerous, previously filed, transaction returns. In this

 capacity, it functions in the same manner as a periodic return, such

 as Form ST-1.
- Amended periodic returns. If an amended periodic return is filed for a prior period and results in a reduction in the vendor's discount awarded for that prior period, then the amount of any tax refund or credit issued to the taxpayer shall be reduced by the amount of the reduction in the vendor's discount. If an amended periodic return is filed for a prior period and results in an increase in tax due, then the vendor's discount awarded for that period shall be increased only if the additional tax due had been timely paid, and in no event shall the vendor's discount awarded for a given month exceed \$1,000.
- 3) The \$1,000 per month vendor's discount cap is incorporated into the following taxes by reference to Section 3 of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act and therefore creates a separate \$1,000 per month vendor's discount cap on returns filed under each of the following taxes.
 - <u>A)</u> Form ST-201, Rental Purchase Agreement Occupation and Use Tax Return.

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- B) Form ART-1, Automobile Renting Occupation and Use Tax Return.
- <u>C)</u> Form CMFT-1 County Motor Fuel Tax Return.
- <u>D)</u> <u>Form MMFT-1 Municipal Motor Fuel Tax Return.</u>
- Transaction returns. In the case of retailers who report and pay the tax on a transaction by transaction basis, as provided in Section 3 of the Retailers'

 Occupation Tax, such discount shall be taken with each such tax remittance instead of when such retailer files his periodic return, but, beginning with returns due on or after January 1, 2025, the discount allowed under the Retailers'

 Occupation Tax and the Use Tax Act, including any local tax administered by the Department and reported on the same transaction return, shall not exceed \$1,000 per month for all transaction returns filed during the month. [35 ILCS 120/3]
 - All transaction returns filed under the same Illinois Account ID are subject to the \$1,000 per month discount cap, which shall apply to all original returns filed during a given calendar month. This means that the discount taken on all Form ST-556s filed under an Account ID during the month plus the discount taken on all Form ST-556-LSEs filed under the same Account ID during the same month shall not exceed \$1,000 in total.
 - <u>2)</u> For the purposes of uniform administration and to avoid assessing penalties and interest on taxpayers who claim excess vendor discount in error, for transaction returns due on or after January 1, 2025, taxpayers may claim the discount with each tax remittance but shall not reduce tax payments by the amount of any discount claimed. Instead, after the end of each calendar month, the Department shall determine the discount allowed to each taxpayer for that month and shall issue a discount payment to each taxpayer in the amount calculated, not to exceed \$1,000 per Account ID per month for all original transaction returns filed during the month. This process avoids the errors that would result if taxpayers and the Department attempt to track in real time the ongoing monthly discount total and whether the cap has been reached. This is in light of the fact that transaction returns under a given Account ID may be filed using the Department's online filing tool, a third party vendor, or paper returns, or all three during a given month as well as the fact that multiple returns may

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be filed simultaneously or nearly simultaneously – all of which could result in over-claiming a discount, which, in turn, would result in tax assessment, late payment penalties, and interest.

- Amended transaction returns. If an amended transaction return is filed for a prior period which results in a reduction in tax due and therefore a reduction in the vendor's discount awarded for that prior period, then a subsequent discount payment made to the taxpayer following the filing of the amended return shall be reduced to reflect the reduction in the prior discount amount resulting from the amended return. If an amended transaction return is filed for a prior period which results in an increase in tax due, then the vendor's discount awarded for that period shall be increased only if the additional tax due had been timely paid, and in no event shall the vendor's discount awarded for a given month exceed \$1,000.
- <u>No interest paid.</u> No interest is paid on vendor discount payments.

SUBPART O: CLAIMS TO RECOVER ERRONEOUSLY PAID TAX

Section 130.1520 Verified Credit

a) Verified credit. A verified credit is a specific type of credit arising under Section 3 of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, which states:

If any payment provided for in this Section exceeds the taxpayer's liabilities under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act and the Service Use Tax Act, as shown on an original monthly return, the Department shall, if requested by the taxpayer, issue to the taxpayer a credit memorandum no later than 30 days after the date of payment. The credit evidenced by such credit memorandum may be assigned by the taxpayer to a similar taxpayer under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act, in accordance with reasonable rules and regulations to be prescribed by the Department. If no such request is made, the taxpayer may credit such excess payment against tax liability subsequently to be remitted to the Department under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act, in accordance with reasonable rules and regulations prescribed by the

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Department. If the Department subsequently determined that all or any part of the credit taken was not actually due to the taxpayer, the taxpayer's 2.1% and 1.75% vendor's discount shall be reduced, if necessary, to reflect by 2.1% or 1.75% of the difference between the credit taken and that actually due, and that taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on such difference. [35 ILCS 120/3]

- b) Verified credit explanation no interest paid. A verified credit is an amount of tax overpaid in a prior period that may be rolled over and applied to subsequent tax liabilities without the need to comply with the formalities involved in submitting a claim for credit. Since the taxpayer has the immediate use of the verified credit to apply against its liability without the need to file a claim for credit and prove the overpayment, interest is not paid on verified credits. (See also, 86 Ill. Adm. Code 700.230(a)(2)). Verified credits appear on a taxpayer's Statement of Account.
- c) Verified credit How used. A verified credit may be used by a taxpayer in only 3 ways:
 - 1) It can be used to offset liability of the taxpayer that arises under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, or the Service Use Tax Act subsequent to the origination of the verified credit;
 - 2) It can be converted to a credit memorandum no later than 30 days after the date of overpayment, by making a request to the Department using forms prescribed by the Department and available at https://tax.illinois.gov www.tax.illinois.gov. See [35 ILCS 120/6a], for information required to be included. Interest is not paid on verified credits that are converted to credit memoranda in accordance with this subsection (c)(2); and
 - 3) It can be converted to a credit memorandum at any time, starting 30 days after the date of overpayment, by making a request to the Department using forms prescribed by the Department and available at https://tax.illinois.gov-www.tax.illinois.gov, and without regard to the limitations on claims for refund. See also 86 Ill. Adm. Code 150.1401 for information on limitations and procedures. Interest is not paid on verified credits that are converted to credit memoranda in accordance with this subsection (c)(3).

DEPARTMENT OF REVENUE

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A verified credit that is converted to a credit memorandum under this subsection
(d) may be assigned to another taxpayer in the same manner as other credit
memoranda issued to taxpayers by the Department.

SUBPART T: DIRECT PAYMENT PROGRAM

Section 130.2500 Direct Payment Program

- a) Effective July 1, 2001, a Direct Payment Program is established. Applicants who have been approved to participate in the Direct Payment Program will be issued a Direct Pay Permit (permit) by the Department, which participants may provide to retailers. Use of the permit relieves the permit holder from paying Use Tax (including any local occupation tax reimbursements of taxes administered by the Department) to the retailer at the time of purchase of qualifying tangible personal property. By using the permit, the permit holder voluntarily agrees to assume the liabilities of the retailer to report and remit Retailers' Occupation Tax (including any local occupation taxes administered by the Department) directly to the Department as set forth in 130.2510(d) of this Part on those sales.
- b) Beginning July 1, 2001, retailers who are provided with a permit from a permit holder purchasing qualifying tangible personal property are relieved of their obligation to remit the Retailers' Occupation Tax (including any local occupation taxes administered by the Department) incurred on the sale of that qualifying tangible personal property. Retailers who are presented with permits are also relieved of the obligation to collect Use Tax (including any local occupation tax reimbursements of taxes administered by the Department) from the permit holder. Retailers who make sales to permit holders who present their permits must report those sales on their sales and use tax return (Form ST-1). The retailer must show these transactions as exempt sales on Line 16 (Other) of his Form ST-1 Worksheet for Line 2. The exemption must be identified as "direct pay".
- c) Proper use of Direct Pay Permit
 - In order to be relieved of his obligation to pay tax at the time of purchase of qualifying tangible personal property, the permit holder must provide the retailer with a copy of the permit, unless the retailer already has a copy of that permit on file.

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- 2) Once the permit holder uses his permit to be relieved of paying tax to a particular retailer, he must use that permit for all of his purchases of qualifying tangible personal property from that retailer as long as the permit is valid.
- d) Retailers' Discount. Permit holders who make purchases of qualifying tangible personal property and use their permits with retailers who either incur Retailers' Occupation Tax on those sales, or are required to collect Illinois Use Tax on those sales, may take the 1.75%, not to exceed \$1,000 per month beginning on January 1, 2025, retailers' discount attributable to those sales. Retailers who are presented a Direct Pay Permit on purchases of qualifying tangible personal property are not allowed the 1.75% retailers' discount on those sales.

Section 131.160 Certified Service Providers – Obligations – Procedures – Hold Harmless Provisions

- a) A certified service provider (CSP) is an agent of a remote retailer that performs all of a remote retailer's sales tax functions, as outlined in the contract between the Department and the CSP. These functions include the preparation and filing of all required tax returns or amended returns, payment of tax, and resolution of any notices or audits of the remote retailer. These functions do not include remittance of Use Tax by the remote retailer on its own purchases.
- b) The software of a CSP interfaces with a remote retailer's accounting system to:
 - 1) Identify which products are taxable;
 - 2) Apply the appropriate tax rate; and
 - 3) Maintain a record of the transaction
- c) A CSP will provide services necessary to:
 - 1) Set up and integrate the CSP's software with the remote retailer's system;
 - 2) As agent for the remote retailer, prepare and file all required returns or amended returns;
 - 3) As agent for the remote retailer, remit tax to the Department;
 - 4) As agent for the remote retailer, resolve any notices or audits by the Department; and
 - 5) Provide for the protection and confidentiality of tax information consistent with the requirements of Section 11 of ROTA.

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- d) The Department shall send all notices, assessments and other communications regarding the remote retailer's tax functions to the CSP, as agent for the remote retailer. The Department shall not, except as otherwise provided in this subsection, send these communications to the remote retailer. A remote retailer must contact the CSP with whom it has contracted in order to receive copies of the notices, assessments and other communications. In the event that an assessment has been issued to a CSP and the CSP demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Department that its failure to correctly remit tax on a retail sale resulted from its good faith reliance on incorrect or insufficient information provided by a remote retailer, the Department shall withdraw the assessment of the CSP and issue the assessment to the remote retailer, who shall be liable for any resulting tax, penalties and interest due.
- e) A CSP, or the remote retailer that has contracted with the CSP, shall be subject to all the same conditions, restrictions, limitations, penalties and modes of procedure as other retailers under ROTA in cases in which assessments have been issued as provided in subsection (d).
- f) If, for any reason, a CSP ceases to remit tax under the provisions of this Part, it must notify the Department and the remote retailers for whom it provides services of this change. Notification to the Department shall be made electronically as required by the Department and shall include proof that notification has been made to its remote retailers. Until notification is made as required by this subsection (f), CSPs remain liable for tax under the Act and ROTA.
- g) Before acting as a CSP for a remote retailer, a CSP must be certified by the Department. Certification requires that a CSP applicant meet all established evaluation criteria. In addition, the systems of a CSP must have been tested and approved by the Department for properly determining the taxability of items to be sold, the correct rate of tax to apply to a transaction, and the appropriate jurisdictions to which the tax must be remitted.
- h) A CSP that has been certified by the Department shall enter into a contractual relationship with the Department. The contract shall, at a minimum:
 - 1) Provide that the CSP shall be held liable for State and local retailers' occupation taxes administered by the Department if the CSP fails to correctly remit the tax after having been provided with the tax and

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information by a remote retailer to correctly remit those taxes. However, if the CSP demonstrates to the satisfaction of the Department that its failure to correctly remit tax on a retail sale resulted from the CSP's good faith reliance on incorrect or insufficient information provided by the remote retailer, the CSP shall be relieved of liability for the tax on that retail sale, and the remote retailer shall be liable for any resulting tax, penalties and interest due;

- 2) Provide for the responsibilities of the CSP and the remote retailers that contract with the CSP with respect to record keeping and auditing consistent with the requirements imposed under ROTA;
- 3) Provide for the protection and confidentiality of tax information consistent with the requirements of Section 11 of ROTA;
- 4) Provide that the CSP is entitled to compensation equal to 1.75%, not to exceed \$1,000 per month beginning on January 1, 2025, of the tax dollars remitted to the State by a CSP on a timely basis on a return that has been properly and timely filed by the CSP on behalf of a remote retailer, and that a remote retailer using a CSP may not claim the vendor's discount allowed under Section 3 of ROTA;
- Provide that a CSP shall enter into a Tax Remittance Agreement with a remote retailer prior to acting as a CSP for that remote retailer, under which the CSP agrees to remit all State and local retailers' occupation taxes administered by the Department for sales made by the remote retailer. The agreement shall be retained by the CSP in its books and records and shall be provided to the Department upon demand;
- 6) Provide that a CSP shall obtain and provide to the Department, upon request, a Power of Attorney, in the form and manner required by the Department, for each remote retailer with whom it has a Tax Remittance Agreement;
- Provide that a CSP shall obtain and maintain updated information for each remote retailer with which it has a Tax Remittance Agreement. This information shall include the name, post office address, email address, phone number, and FEIN or SSN of the remote retailer. It shall also include the name and address of the person or persons identified by the

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remote retailer who are responsible for filing returns and payment of taxes due under ROTA. This information shall be made available to the Department upon request.

- 8) Provide that a CSP shall file a separate return for each remote retailer with which it has a tax remittance agreement and make payment by electronic means as required by the Department. [35 ILCS 185/5-25]
- i) A CSP that has been certified must electronically register with the Department. Registration shall include an acceptance of responsibility signed by the person or persons of the CSP who will be responsible for filing returns and payment of the taxes due under ROTA. As part of its registration, a CSP must also certify that it has obtained from each remote retailer for whom it acts as agent an acceptance of responsibility signed by the person or persons of the remote retailer who are responsible for filing returns and making payment of taxes under ROTA, that it will keep the information current, and that it will provide the information to the Department upon request.
- j) Once certified, a CSP must notify the Department that it has entered into a Tax Remittance Agreement with a remote retailer within 30 days after execution of the Tax Remittance Agreement. A CSP cannot file returns or pay tax on behalf of a remote retailer until it has notified the Department that it has entered into a Tax Remittance Agreement with a remote retailer. Returns and payment of tax made on behalf of a remote retailer may then be filed by the CSP only for periods beginning with the current reporting period of the remote retailer (monthly, quarterly or annual). The Department shall test the proposed revision to assess whether the revised system of the CAS can properly determine the taxability of items to be sold, the correct tax rate to apply to a transaction, and the appropriate jurisdictions to which the tax shall be remitted. The Department shall recertify revised systems that meet these requirements. If the Department notifies the remote retailer using a CAS that a recertification is necessary, the remote retailer shall be liable for any tax resulting from errors caused by use of a revised system prior to recertification by the Department. SUBPART D: TAX RETURNS

Section 140.401 Monthly Returns When Due – Contents of Returns

- Except as provided in Section 140.405 of this Subpart, on or before the twentieth a) day of each calendar month, every serviceman registered with the Department is required to file a return with the Department covering the preceding month, stating the name of the person filing the return, his residence address, the address of his or her principal place of business and the address of his or her principal place of business in this State (if that is a different address) and each address from which he or she engages in that taxable business as a serviceman. When the serviceman has more than one business registered with the Department under separate registrations, that serviceman shall file separate returns for each separately registered business. On and after January 1, 2018, with respect to servicemen whose annual gross receipts average \$20,000 or more, all returns required to be filed pursuant to the Act shall be filed electronically. Servicemen who demonstrate that they do not have access to the Internet or demonstrate hardship in filing electronically may petition the Department to waive the electronic filing requirement. [35 ILCS 115/9]
- b) Information Required in Taxpayer's Return. A taxpayer's return shall disclose the following:
 - 1) total tax base for the return period;
 - 2) the amount of tax due;
 - 3) the total of the tax and penalty; and

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- 4) other information the Department may require on the tax form.
- After entering his or her State Service Occupation Tax liability on the return, the serviceman may then deduct 1.75%, not to exceed \$1,000 per month beginning on January 1, 2025, of that liability as compensation for acting as a collector of the tax. The minimum discount, over the entire period of any given calendar year, for any single serviceman (if that serviceman has that much tax to remit) shall be \$5.00 for the calendar year. This allowance against the State tax is available only when the tax is remitted with a return that is filed when due under the Act; it is not available in any case in which the tax is paid late. Servicemen required to file returns electronically pursuant to the Act who fail to file their returns electronically may not take the discount allowed to reimburse servicemen for the expenses incurred in keeping records, preparing and filing returns, remitting the tax and supplying data to the Department on request.

SUBPART N: CLAIMS TO RECOVER ERRONEOUSLY PAID TAX

Section 140.1420 Verified Credit

a) Verified credits. A verified credit is a specific type of credit arising under Section 3 of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, which states:

If any payment provided for in this Section exceeds the taxpayer's liabilities under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act and the Service Use Tax Act, as shown on an original monthly return, the Department shall, if requested by the taxpayer, issue to the taxpayer a credit memorandum no later than 30 days after the date of payment. The credit evidenced by such credit memorandum may be assigned by the taxpayer to a similar taxpayer under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act, in accordance with reasonable rules and regulations to be prescribed by the Department. If no such request is made, the taxpayer may credit such excess payment against tax liability subsequently to be remitted to the Department under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act, in accordance with reasonable rules and regulations

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prescribed by the Department. If the Department subsequently determined that all or any part of the credit taken was not actually due to the taxpayer, the taxpayer's 2.1% and 1.75% vendor's discount shall be reduced, if necessary, to reflect by 2.1% or 1.75% of the difference between the credit taken and that actually due, and that taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on such difference. [35 ILCS 120/3]

- b) Verified credit explanation no interest paid. A verified credit is an amount of tax overpaid in a prior period that may be rolled over and applied to subsequent tax liabilities without the need to comply with the formalities involved in submitting a claim for credit. Since the taxpayer has the immediate use of the verified credit to apply against its liability without the need to file a claim for credit and prove the overpayment, interest is not paid on verified credits (See also, 86 Ill. Adm. Code 700.230(a)(2)). Verified credits appear on a taxpayer's Statement of Account.
- c) Verified credit How used. A verified credit may be used by a taxpayer in only 3 ways:
 - 1) It can be used to offset liability of the taxpayer that arises under the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act, or the Service Use Tax Act subsequent to the origination of the verified credit;
 - 2) It can be converted to a credit memorandum no later than 30 days after the date of overpayment, upon request made to the Department upon forms prescribed by the Department. Interest is not paid on verified credits that are converted to credit memoranda in accordance with this subsection (c)(2); and
 - 3) It can be converted to a credit memorandum at any time, starting 30 days after the date of the overpayment, by making a request to the Department using forms prescribed by the Department and available at https://tax.illinois.gov_www.tax.illinois.gov, and without regard to the limitations on claims for refund. See also 86 Ill. Adm. Code 140.1401, for limitations on claims. Interest is not paid on verified credits that are converted to credit memoranda in accordance with this subsection (c)(3).

Section 150.905 Deduction for Collecting Tax

The retailer, in remitting the use tax collected from the purchaser, may deduct 1.75% thereof, not to exceed \$1,000 per month beginning on January 1, 2025, or \$5.00 per calendar year, whichever is greater, as an allowance for the retailer's cost *incurred in collecting the tax, keeping records, preparing and filing returns, remitting the tax and supplying data to the Department on request. In the case of retailers who report and pay the tax on a transaction-by-transaction basis, as provided in Section 9 of the Act, such discount shall be taken with each such tax remittance instead of when such retailer files such periodic return. The discount allowed under this Section is allowed only for returns that are filed in the manner required by the Act. [35 ILCS 105/9] This allowance is available when the tax is remitted with a return that is filed when due under the Act, but is not available in any case in which the tax is paid late (with or without a return, and whether formally assessed by the Department or not). The Department may disallow the discount for retailers whose certificate of registration is revoked at the time the return is filed, but only if the Department's decision to revoke the certificate of registration has become final. [35 ILCS 105/9] Also, this discount for collecting the tax is not allowable when the use tax is remitted directly to the Department by a user.*

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Section 160.135 Serviceman's Return

- a) Every serviceman required or authorized to collect the Service Use Tax must file a return each month by the twentieth day of the month covering the preceding calendar month except when the serviceman is authorized to file tax returns on a quarterly or annual basis as hereinafter provided. The Department has combined the Service Use Tax return form, the Service Occupation Tax return form and the Use Tax return with the Retailers' Occupation Tax return form. On and after January 1, 2018, with respect to servicemen whose annual gross receipts average \$20,000 or more, all returns required to be filed pursuant to the Act shall be filed electronically. Servicemen who demonstrate that they do not have access to the Internet or demonstrate hardship in filing electronically may petition the Department to waive the electronic filing requirement. Beginning on October 1, 2002, a taxpayer who has a tax liability in the amount set forth in subsection (b) of Section 2505-210 of the Department of Revenue Law shall make all payments required by rules of the Department by electronic funds transfer. - b) Where the sale of service is made under a conditional sales contract, or under any other form of sale wherein the payment of the principal sum, or a part thereof, is extended beyond the close of the return period for which the return is filed, the serviceman, in collecting the tax, may collect, for each return period, only the tax applicable to that part of the selling price actually received during such return period.
- c) In the serviceman's regular return, each serviceman shall also include the total amount of Service Use Tax due upon the selling price or cost price of tangible personal property transferred by him as an incident to a sale of service. Such serviceman shall remit the amount of such tax to the Department when filing such

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return.

- d) In general, the provisions of Subpart D of the Service Occupation Tax (86 Ill. Adm. - e) The serviceman who collects the Service Use Tax from a purchaser and who remits, as Service Use Tax, the amount so collected is allowed to deduct the 1.75%, not to exceed \$1,000 per month beginning on January 1, 2025, collection allowance or \$5 per calendar year, whichever is greater, in the same manner as is allowed under 86 Ill. Adm. Code 150.905. Section 160.151 Verified Credit

a) Verified credit. A verified credit is a specific type of credit arising under Section 3 of the Retailers' Occupation Tax Act, which states:

If any payment provided for in this Section exceeds the taxpayer's liabilities under this Act, the use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act and the Service Use Tax Act, as shown on an original monthly return, the Department shall, if requested by the taxpayer, issue to the taxpayer a credit memorandum no later than 30 days after the date of payment. The credit evidenced by such credit memorandum may be assigned by the taxpayer to a similar taxpayer under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act, in accordance with reasonable rules and regulations to be prescribed by the Department. If no such request is made, the taxpayer may credit such excess payment against tax liability subsequently to be remitted to the Department under this Act, the Use Tax Act, the Service Occupation Tax Act or the Service Use Tax Act, in accordance with reasonable rules and regulations prescribed by the Department. If the

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Department subsequently determined that all or any part of the credit taken was not actually due to the taxpayer, the taxpayer's 2.1% and 1.75% vendor's discount shall be reduced, if necessary, to reflect by 2.1% or 1.75% of the difference between the credit taken and that actually due, and that taxpayer shall be liable for penalties and interest on such difference. [35 ILCS 120/3]

- b) Verified credit explanation no interest paid. A verified credit is an amount of tax overpaid in a prior period that may be rolled over and applied to subsequent tax liabilities without the need to comply with the formalities involved in submitting a claim for credit. Since the taxpayer has the immediate use of the verified credit to apply against its liability without the need to file a claim for credit and prove the overpayment, interest is not paid on verified credits (See also, 86 Ill. Adm. Code 700.230(a)(2)). Verified credits appear on a Taxpayer Statement listing a taxpayer's unpaid balance, available credits or returns not filed.
- c) Verified credit How used. A verified credit may be used by a taxpayer in only 3 ways:

Section 180.140 Monthly Tax Returns – When Due – Contents

- a) On or before the twentieth day of each calendar month, every person engaged in the business of renting automobiles in this State during the preceding calendar month shall file a return with the Department for such preceding month, stating the name of the rentor; his residence address and the address of the principal place of business (if that is a different address) from which he engages in the business of renting automobiles in this State. Section 320.5 Purpose and Scope

<u>a)</u> This Part establishes the registration requirements for radiation installations pursuant to Section 24.7 of the Radiation Protection Act of 1990 [420 ILCS 40].

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b) This Part applies to all radiation installations that possess any radiation machines that electronically produce ionizing radiation.

Section 320.10 Registration

- a) For purposes of registration pursuant to this Part, the <u>following definitions shall</u> <u>apply:phrase "radiation installation" shall mean any location or facility where radiation machines are located.</u>
 - 1) "Agency" means the Illinois Emergency Management Agency and Office of Homeland Security. [420 ILCS 40/4(a-2)]
 - "Inoperable radiation machine" means any radiation machine, including particle accelerators, that is not capable of producing radiation due to the absence or failure of components necessary for operation. Radiation machines that are not in operation due only to disconnection from an electrical supply shall be considered operable.
 - "Minimal threat devices" means radiation machines capable of generating or emitting fields of radiation that, during the operation of which, an individual cannot accidently place a body part in the primary beam path and no deliberate exposure or physical injury to an individual has occurred in excess of the applicable limits specified in 32 III. Adm. Code 340.310(a). Examples include, but are not limited to, analytical, cabinet, and baggage/package/project type fluoroscopic units; spectroscopy; facilities with x-ray machines that are incorporated in lead boxes or enclosed in a shielded room, that comply with the requirements of 32 III. Adm. Code 350.3050.
 - 4) "Particle accelerator" shall have the same meaning as provided in 32 III. Adm. Code 310.20.
 - 5) <u>"Radiation installation" means any location or facility where radiation machines are used.</u> [420 ILCS 40/4(g)]
 - <u>(Radiation machine" means any device that produces radiation when in</u>

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use, except those that produce radiation only from radioactive materials. [420 ILCS 40/4(h)]

- b) <u>Radiation Installation Registration</u>
 - Any operator of a radiation installation shall register that radiation installation with the <u>Illinois Emergency Management Agency</u> (Agency). The operator shall register the <u>radiation</u> installation, before <u>itthe</u> <u>installation</u> is placed <u>intoin</u> operation, <u>in a formation a form</u> prescribed by the Agency that shall include the:
 - A) Operator and facility The operator's name;
 - B) <u>Location</u> and confines of the radiation installation; and
 - C) <u>Type The type</u>, manufacturer, model, serial number, and room <u>or</u> area location of all radiation machines possessed; and-
 - <u>D)</u> <u>Telephone number, email address, and Federal Employer</u> Identification Number (FEIN).
 - 2) Radiation machines that are located in a single building or in a group of buildings that are contiguous to one another, and used by the same operator, shall be treated as a single radiation installation unless requested otherwise in writing by the operator and approved by the Agency.
 - 3) Until proper disposal occurs, all inoperable radiation machines shall be included in the registration information required by subsection (b)(1)(C).
 - 4) Out-of-State Radiation Machines.
 - A) Any owner/operator of a radiation machine brought into the State of Illinois for temporary use, not to exceed 180 days in a calendar year, shall provide notice to the Agency at least three business days before the equipment is brought into the State.
 - B) The notice shall include the information in subsection (b)(1)(A) through (D) and:

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- i) Registering state and registration number of the facility, if applicable;
- <u>ii)</u> The exact location where the radiation machine is to be used;
- iii) Nature, duration, and scope of work; and
- <u>iv)</u> Onsite contact in the State including name, telephone number, and email address.
- c) <u>Radiation Installation Classifications</u>
 Radiation installations shall be divided into the following 4 classes:
 - 1) Class A Class A shall include dental offices and veterinary offices with radiation machines used solely for diagnosis; nonmedical business entities that possess open radiography radiation machines used by industrial radiographers or law enforcement personnel, other non-medical registered installations including research/development, academic, industrial, law enforcement, and all other minimal threat devices used in the process of conducting their business, all installations using commercially manufactured cabinet radiographic/fluoroscopic radiation machines with interlocked doors and shielded sufficiently to meet the requirements of 32 Ill. Adm. Code 340.310(a) and radiation machines used as gauges.
 - Class B Class B shall include offices or clinics of persons licensed under the Medical Practice Act of 1987 [225 ILCS 60] or the Podiatric Medical Practice Act of 1987 [225 ILCS 100] with radiation machines used solely for diagnosis and all radiation installations using portable radiographic/fluoroscopic units and particle accelerators installations using spectroscopy radiation machines, noncommercially manufactured cabinet radiographic/fluoroscopic radiation machines, portable radiographic/fluoroscopic units, diffraction radiation machines, noncabinet baggage/package fluoroscopic radiation machines and electronic beam welders. Test booths, bays, or rooms used by manufacturing, assembly or repair facilities for testing radiation machines shall be categorized as Class B radiation installations.

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- 3) Class C Class C shall include installations using open radiography radiation machines which are unique and have potential radiation threat concerns whose operation or use may require the registrant to monitor in accordance with 32 Ill. Adm. Code 340.520. This does not include radiation installations with radiation machines that are specified as another class and closed radiographic/fluoroscopic radiation machines.
- 4) Class D Class D shall include all hospitals and other facilities using mammography, computed tomography (CT), or therapeutic radiation machines.
- 5) Radiation installations for which more than one class is applicable shall be assigned a classification based on the radiation machines' use and associated radiation hazard.

d) Machine Registration Fees

- The operator of a radiation installation shall pay an annual registration fee for each radiation machine registered with the Agency on January 1 of each year. Operators of radiation installations shall annually update their registration no later than December 31 of each year with the status of each radiation machine in their possession Every operator of a radiation installation shall register radiation machines annually on a form prescribed by the Agency.
- The Agency shall bill the operator for the registration fee as soon as practical after January 1. The registration fee shall be due and payable within 60 days after the date of billing. If after 60 days the registration fee is not paid, the Agency may issue an order directing the operator of the installation to cease use of all radiation machines or take other appropriate enforcement action as provided in Section 36 of the Act. Fees collected under this Section are not refundable. [420 ILCS 40/24.7] The fees An annual registration fee for each machine possessed on January 1 of each year shall be submitted with the registration form. This fee, based on the classification type of radiation installation facility and radiation machines possessed, are is listed in this subsection (d)(2) as follows:

- 3) The Agency shall bill the operator for the registration fee as soon as practical after January 1. The registration fee shall be due and payable within 60 days after the date of billing. If after 60 days the registration fee is not paid, the Agency may issue an order directing the operator of the installation to cease use of all radiation machines or take other appropriate enforcement action as provided in Section 36 of the Act. Fees collected under this Section are not refundable. [420 ILCS 40/24.7]
- e) All radiation installations are subject to inspection at all times. The frequency of inspections is based on the associated radiation hazards located at the <u>radiation</u> installation. Class A <u>radiation</u> installations should expect to be inspected approximately once every 5 years. Class B should expect to be inspected approximately once every 2 years. Class C and D <u>radiation</u> installations should expect to be inspected approximately once annually.
- <u>Operators of radiation installations shall comply with all applicable rules in 32 Ill.</u> Adm. Code Chapter II, Subchapters b and d, including the accreditation requirements for radiologic technologists provided in 32 Ill. Adm. Code 401, certification requirements for industrial radiographers provided in 32 Ill. Adm. Code 405, and reporting requirements for any stolen, lost, or missing sources of radiation sources in accordance with 32 Ill. Adm. Code 340.1210.

Section 320.20 Amendments and Changes in Status

a) Operators of radiation installations that have been registered pursuant to Section 320.10 shall notify the Agency within 30 days after the installation of any new,

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used or relocated radiation machines, or the reactivation of any radiation machines.

- b) If any operator discontinues using radiation machines, the operator shall notify the Agency within 30 days after the discontinuance. The notification shall include the date of discontinuance and the disposition of the radiation machines.
- c) Within 30 days after changing the operator of a radiation installation, the new operator shall notify the Agency.
- d) For radiation machines taken possession of as a result of foreclosure, bankruptcy, or other legal proceeding, the operator of the radiation installation shall notify the Agency within 30 days after the change in possession.
- e) To comply with this Section, facilities may use the online registration system located on the Agency's website at https://iemaohs.illinois.gov/ under the heading of Nuclear & Radiation Safety.
- <u>Failure to comply with the requirements in this Section will result in the collection of registration fees for the years that the radiation installation was not properly registered.</u>

- b) Radiation machines while in transit or storage incident to transit.
- <u>Radiation machines provided for temporary use (e.g. demonstration or to replace out-of-service equipment) and notification is provided in accordance with Section 320.10(b)(1)(C).</u>

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<u>d)</u> Radiation machines taken possession by a financial institution as a result of foreclosure, bankruptcy, or other legal proceeding.

Section 320.70 Additional Requirements for Operators of Class D Radiation Installations

- a) Each operator of a Class D radiation installation shall utilize the services of an individual, registered with the Agency pursuant to 32 Ill. Adm. Code 410, to implement and maintain a comprehensive radiation protection program. Activities related to diagnostic radiation producing machines shall be performed by a registered diagnostic imaging specialist (DIS). Activities related to therapeutic radiation machines shall be performed by a registered therapeutic radiological physicist (TRP). Each operator shall ensure that registered individuals:
 - 1) Conduct an annual performance evaluation of all radiation machines <u>and</u> verify their inclusion in the radiation installation registration.
 - 2) Determine and document in a report to the <u>radiation installation</u> facility that the radiation machines evaluated are being maintained and operated in accordance with standards established by the Agency to protect the public health as set forth in 32 Ill. Adm. Code: Chapter II, Subchapters b and d. Noncompliance items shall be readily identified in the report.
 - 3) Establish and oversee the equipment-related quality assurance practices. Specifically, these quality assurance practices shall include as a minimum:
 - A) For therapeutic radiation machines, compliance with the quality assurance requirements specified in 32 Ill. Adm. Code 360.110(d) or 360.120(e).
 - B) For computed tomography machines, compliance with the quality assurance requirements specified in 32 Ill. Adm. Code 360.75.
 - C) For mammography machines, compliance with the quality assurance requirements specified in 32 Ill. Adm. Code 370.100.

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4) Establish and oversee a quality assurance program for the film processors. The program shall include specifications for processor cleaning and maintenance and procedures to ensure the processor is optimized and properly maintained.

AGENCY NOTE: The Agency recommends daily sensitometry and densitometry evaluation for processors used in facilities with heavy workloads. However, the diagnostic imaging specialist or therapeutic radiological physicist is the individual best qualified to determine the appropriate quality assurance program for each processor, based on its workload and conditions of use.

- Users of digital imaging acquisition systems shall follow a quality assurance/quality control protocol for image processing established by the manufacturer for each radiation machine. The program shall include the entire imaging chain from detector to the monitor used for interpretation and:
 - A) The <u>operator of the radiation installation registrant</u> shall include the protocol in its operating and safety procedures. <u>The procedures shall be in writing or electronically available for Agency review.</u>
 - B) The <u>operator of the radiation installation registrant</u> shall document the frequency at which the quality assurance/quality control protocol is performed. Documentation shall include the date and initials of the individual completing the document and shall be maintained at the site where performed for inspection by the Agency.
 - C) The protocol shall include, but not be limited to, the following:
 - i) Cleaning and erasure of all imaging plates <u>used in</u> <u>computed radiography (CR);</u>
 - ii) Quality control phantom analysis <u>including</u>, <u>but not limited</u> to, low contrast detectability, spatial resolution, and artifacts;

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AGENCY NOTE: The phantom analysis can be done either by the facility or DIS. Frequency and pass/fail criteria should be based on recommendations of the manufacturer or as established by the DIS.

- iii) Evaluation of repeat/rejectrepeat/retake x-ray examinations;
- iv) Review of <u>exposure index</u>, <u>deviation index</u>, <u>s-number</u>, <u>or</u> dose index values <u>from clinically acquired radiographic</u> images.
- b) Each operator of a Class D radiation installation shall maintain and have available for review by the Agency:
 - 1) Accurate and thorough radiation machine evaluation reports.
 - 2) Records of quality assurance testing performed.
 - 3) Records of calibrations, maintenance or repair.
 - 4) Records of corrective action taken for items of non-compliance.
 - 5) Records of film processor cleaning and maintenance.
 - 56) Records of digital imaging quality control.
- c) The records and reports required by this Section shall be maintained for a period of at least one inspection cycle.

- 15) <u>Summary and Purpose of Rulemaking</u>: Under Pub. Act 103-0103 (eff. Jun. 27, 2023), the State of Illinois will transition to a structure where health insurance issuers offer qualified health plans ("QHP") in the individual and small group markets through a Statebased Exchange on the Federal Platform ("SBE-FP") by Plan Year 2025 and a full Statebased Exchange ("SBE") by Plan Year 2026.

Part 4500 establishes several requirements, options, and restrictions related to the operation of the Exchange, the Department is promulgating in multiple phases.

Phase 1, completed August 1, 2024, established the general purpose, applicability, and many definitions for Part 4500. It also included a core set of substantive rules, such as standards related to QHP certification, the Navigator grant program, certification of Certified Application Counselors ("CAC") and CAC Organizations, and agents and brokers who assist with QHP enrollments and applications.

Phase 2, the current rulemaking, will adopt federal standards for QHP enrollment, effective dates of coverage, and termination of coverage, as well as eligibility for advance payments of premium tax credits and cost-sharing reductions. While Illinois has an SBE-FP, these standards and processes will continue to be administered by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. As a result, the Department of Insurance is not proposing substantial changes from the basic federal rules in Phase 2.

The adopted rules also incorporate the federal regulatory reporting and public posting requirements for QHP drug formularies under 45 CFR 156.122.

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Phase 2 also includes the method of calculating and paying the State's monthly user fees assessed to QHP issuers under Section 5-21 of the Illinois Health Benefits Exchange Law [215 ILCS 122/5-21]. The monthly user fee will be based on the issuer's enrollment through the Exchange multiplied by 0.5% for 2025 and 2.75% for 2026 onward. The State's user fees must be paid directly to the Department each month and will be adjusted the following month based on changes or corrections to effectuated enrollment. Health insurance issuers will continue to pay any Federal user fees directly to the Federal Government separately from the new State user fee.

The adopted rules also update some existing incorporations by reference of the Code of Federal Regulations and clarify that the date reflects when the Federal Register published the adoption of or an amendment to that CFR section.

Phase 3, a future rulemaking amending this Part to be adopted in 2025, will make further adjustments for the State's transition to a full SBE.

Section 4500.170 QHP Eligibility and Enrollment

- <u>An applicant will be eligible for enrollment in a QHP through the Exchange, including an SADP, if the applicant meets the requirements in 45 CFR 155.305(a) (Apr. 15, 2024) (no later editions or amendments), including all of the following:</u>
 - The applicant is a citizen or national of the United States, or is a noncitizen who is lawfully present in the United States, and is reasonably expected to be a citizen, national, or a non-citizen who is lawfully present for the entire period for which enrollment is sought;
 - 2) The applicant is not incarcerated, other than incarceration pending the disposition of charges; and
 - 3) The applicant meets the applicable residency standard identified in 45 CFR 155.305(a)(3).
- b) For a QHP that is a catastrophic plan, an applicant will be eligible for enrollment if the applicant meets the requirements of subsection (a) and either (see 45 CFR 155.305(h)):
 - 1) has not attained the age of 30 before the beginning of the plan year; or
 - <u>has a certification in effect for any plan year that the applicant is exempt from the requirement to maintain minimum essential coverage under 26 U.S.C. 5000A by reason of:</u>
 - <u>A)</u> 26 U.S.C. 5000A(e)(1) relating to individuals without affordable coverage; or
 - B) 26 U.S.C. 5000A(e)(5) relating to individuals with hardships.

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- <u>Upon receipt of an application, the Exchange will determine whether an applicant</u> is eligible for Medicaid or CHIP as provided in 45 CFR 155.305(c) and (d).
- d) The Exchange will accept a QHP selection from an applicant determined eligible for enrollment in a QHP. The Exchange will notify the QHP issuer of the applicant's selected QHP and transmit the information necessary to enable the issuer to enroll the applicant.
- e) The Exchange will accept enrollment of a qualified individual in a QHP only during the annual open enrollment period or a special enrollment period as described in Section 4500.180.
- An applicant has the right to appeal an eligibility determination as provided in 45 CFR 155, Subpart F (as those provisions of the Code of Federal Regulations were in effect on August 1, 2024) (no later editions or amendments).
- g) For plan years when the Illinois Exchange is a State-based Exchange on the Federal Platform, the Illinois Exchange will rely on HHS to perform all eligibility and enrollment functions, including related appeals.

Section 4500.180 Annual Open Enrollment and Special Enrollment Periods

- c) If the qualified individual or enrollee experiences a triggering event for a special enrollment period, the qualified individual may enroll in a QHP and an enrollee may change QHPs as provided in 45 CFR 155.420.
- d) For QHP selections received during a special enrollment period for a plan year when Illinois operates a State-based Exchange on the Federal Platform, coverage must be effective as provided in 45 CFR 155.420(b)(1), (b)(2), (b)(4), and (b)(5).
- e) An applicant has the right to appeal a determination related to eligibility for an enrollment period as provided in 45 CFR 155, Subpart F.
- f) For plan years when Illinois operates a State-based Exchange on the Federal Platform, the Illinois Exchange will rely on HHS to perform all eligibility and enrollment functions, including related appeals.

Section 4500.190 Eligibility and Special Rules on Advanced Payments of the Premium Tax Credit and Cost-Sharing Reductions

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Section 4500.200 Termination of Coverage and Grace Periods

- <u>At any time upon request, an enrollee may voluntarily terminate coverage or enrollment in a QHP through the Exchange, including an SADP, including as a result of the enrollee obtaining other minimum essential coverage. (see 45 CFR 155.430(b)(1) (April 15, 2024) (no later editions or amendments))</u>
 - At the time of plan selection, an enrollee may remain enrolled in a QHP even if the enrollee becomes eligible for other minimum essential coverage. If the enrollee does not actively elect to remain enrolled in a QHP, the Exchange must terminate enrollment in the QHP upon completion of the process specified in 45 CFR 155.330(e)(2) (April 15, 2024) (no later editions or amendments).
 - An individual, including an enrollee's authorized representative, may report the death of an enrollee to initiate termination of the enrollee's Exchange enrollment.
 - An enrollee may terminate coverage within 10 days of receipt of the QHP contract for the plan year and receive a full refund of the premium paid for the same plan year to the extent provided by 50 Ill. Adm. Code 2007.80(a)(7) or 50 Ill. Adm. Code 4521.110(n), as applicable.
 - 4) An enrollee may retroactively terminate or cancel the enrollee's coverage or enrollment in a QHP under the circumstances described in 45 CFR 155.430(b)(1)(iv).
- b) The Exchange will involuntarily terminate an enrollee's enrollment in a QHP through the Exchange and will permit a QHP issuer to terminate the coverage or enrollment under 45 CFR 155.430(b)(2) in any of the following circumstances:
 - 1) The enrollee is no longer eligible for coverage in a QHP through the Exchange;
 - Premiums have not been paid for the enrollee's coverage and all applicable grace periods have been exhausted, including, but not limited to, the three-month grace period in 45 CFR 156.270(d) and (g), as well as the grace period in Section 357.4 of the Code or 50 Ill. Adm. Code 4521.110(l);

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- The QHP issuer demonstrates to the Exchange that rescission of the enrollee's coverage is appropriate under 45 CFR 147.128 (November 18, 2015) (no later editions or amendments). A rescission also must comply with Section 154 of the Code;
- 4) The QHP terminates or is decertified as described in Section 4500.70;
- 5) The enrollee changes from one QHP to another during an annual open enrollment period or special enrollment period as permitted under Section 4500.180;
- <u>The enrollee had been enrolled in a QHP without the enrollee's knowledge</u> or consent by a third party, including by a third party with no connection with the Exchange; or
- Any other reason for termination of coverage described in 45 CFR 147.106.
- An issuer must not involuntarily terminate dependent coverage of a child before the end of the plan year in which the child attains age 26 on the basis of the child's age, unless otherwise permitted by this Section. (see 45 CFR 155.430(b)(3))
- d) Coverage or enrollment must be terminated consistent with the effective dates in 45 CFR 155.430(d).
- e) For plan years when Illinois operates a State-based Exchange on the Federal Platform, the Illinois Exchange will rely on HHS to permit or initiate terminations of coverage or enrollment and to conduct all appeals related to terminations arising from ineligibility for coverage in a OHP through the Exchange.

Section 4500.210 Plan Formulary Information

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health insurance issuer must submit this information to HHS as provided in 45 CFR 156.122(d)(2).

 - 2) the user fee rate, which is:

 - 1) effectuated enrollment in the issuer's plans through the Exchange as of the end of the current month; and
 - 2) adjustments to one or more prior months' invoices due to changes or errors in effectuated enrollment.
- <u>A QHP issuer must pay the invoice within 30 days of the date the Department issues the invoice.</u>

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- e) A QHP issuer may report an overpayment and request an adjustment or other refund under Section 412 of the Code as implemented by 50 Ill. Adm. Code 2500.120 if the issuer believes it has made an overpayment of its monthly user fee and either:
 - 1) the following month's invoice does not adjust for the overpayment; or
 - 2) the Department does not issue an invoice for the following month.
- The Department will not collect any portion of a user fee that HHS assesses under 45 CFR 156.50(c) and (d) (May 6, 2022) (no later editions or amendments). A QHP issuer must remit directly to HHS any user fee that HHS assesses separately from the user fee collected by the Department under Section 5-21 of the IHBE Law.

Section 810.5 Definitions

Aquatic life – all fish, reptiles, amphibians, mollusks, crustaceans, algae, aquatic plants and aquatic invertebrates, and any other aquatic animals or plants that the Department identifies in administrative rules.

Catch and Release Fishing – means that caughtno harvest of target fish species permitted. Caught fish must be returned to the water immediately unharmed. No harvest permitted of fish species noted as catch and release, or any fish species from waterbodies noted as catch and release fishing only.

Fish Length or Length – means the measurement from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail with the fish laid flat on a ruler, with the mouth of the fish closed and the tail lobes pressed together, except for Paddlefish where the length is measured from the center of the eye to the center of the "V" of the tail fin (eyefork length), and except for Sturgeon species where length is measured from the tip of the snout to the center of the "V" of the tail fin.

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Fishing – taking or attempting to take aquatic life in any waters of the State, by any method, and all other acts such as placing, setting, drawing or using any device commonly used for the taking of aquatic life, whether resulting in taking or not. This also applies to the removal of dead and decaying aquatic life.

Harvest – any aquatic life taken into possession from any waters of the State by any method.

In the aggregate – combination of two or more species or hybrids that in total do not exceed the daily harvest limit.

Protected Slot Length Limit – No harvest of fish within the specified length range. Fish must be immediately released.

Relic Mussel Shell – the shell of a mussel that apparently died of natural causes in the water and contains no meat or soft parts. The shell readily exhibits noticeable sediment, vegetation, algal or mineral stains, discolorations, soiling, weathering or other visual evidence on its interior surface that clearly and unambiguously shows the mussel shell has not been cooked-out or freshly cleaned.

Snagging – the practice of dragging or jerking a hook (or hooks), baited or unbaited, through the water with the intention of hooking a fish on contact anywhere on the body other than the inside of the mouth.

Take – to lure, kill, destroy, capture, gig or spear, trap or ensnare, or attempt to do so.

Water of the State – any water within the jurisdiction of the State of Illinois that is adapted for purposes of navigation or public access.

 - 4) <u>Kaskaskia River, south of Route U.S. 50 bridge to mouth in Randolph County.</u>

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- 5) Big Muddy River, south of State Route 14 highway bridge in Franklin County to mouth in Jackson County.
- 6) Saline River in Gallatin and Saline Counties.
- 7) Ohio River, except:
 - A) Olmstead Locks and Dam downstream to a line perpendicular with the end of the longest lock wall, including the circular cell portion;
 - B) Smithland Dam downstream to a line perpendicular to the end of the outer lock wall; and
 - <u>C)</u> Within 50 yards of the mouth of any tributary or stream.
- 8) Embarras River, except from Route 130 in Coles County upstream to the dam, and except Charleston Side Channel Lake.
- 9) Skillet Fork River.
- Cache River from Route 51 downstream to the Mississippi River via
 Cache Diversion Channel, but not including that portion of the Cache
 River between the Cache Diversion Channel Levee and the Ohio River.
- 11) Wabash River.
- 12) <u>Little Wabash River.</u>
- South Fork of the Sangamon River from State Highway 48 bridge downstream to the Sangamon River in Christian and Sangamon Counties.
- **fe)** Bowfishing for common snapping turtles is not permitted in the following Illinois counties: Randolph, Perry, Franklin, Hamilton, White, Gallatin, Saline, Williamson, Jackson, Union, Johnson, Pope, Hardin, Massac, Pulaski and Alexander.

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- a) Sport fishermen are permitted only one pole and line device to which can be attached no more than two hooks. On the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa, the maximum treble hook size is 5/0; gaffs may not be used to land paddlefish.
- b) Species of Fish and Snagging <u>HarvestCatch</u> Limit

 1)Only <u>fishthe following</u> species <u>listed of fish and harvest limit</u> may be taken by snagging methods and in accordance with daily harvest limits identified for each.

 Fish species permitted to be taken by snagging methods in Illinois waters include:

Asian Carp (no live possession) – no harvest limit

Carp – no harvest limit

Buffalo – no harvest limit

Freshwater Drum – no harvest limit

Salmon (coho and chinook only) – 5 fish in the aggregate daily harvest limit

Paddlefish – 2 <u>fish daily harvest limitper day</u>; the maximum length limit for paddlefish taken from the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa is 33" eye-fork length (EFL) (all paddlefish greater than or equal to 33" EFL must be immediately released back to the Mississippi River); the minimum length limit for paddlefish taken from the Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri is 24-inch EFL (all paddlefish less than or equal to 24-inch EFL must be immediately released back to the Mississippi River)

Bowfin – no harvest limit

Gizzard shad – no harvest limit

Carpsuckers – no harvest limit

Longnose gar – no harvest limit

Shortnose gar – no harvest limit

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Suckers – no harvest limit

No sorting (i.e., catching more fish than is allowed and putting back some in order to keep larger ones) of snagged salmon and paddlefish is permitted, except for paddlefish taken from the Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri where sorting is permitted. Every paddlefish snagged must be included in the daily harvest limit. Every salmon 10 inches in total length or longer snagged must be taken into immediate possession and included in the daily harvest limit. Once the daily limit of salmon or paddlefish has been reached, snagging must cease.

c) Disposition of Snagged Salmon and Paddlefish

- 1) Every Salmon 10 inches in total length or longer snagged must be taken into immediate possession and included in the daily harvest limit.
- Every Paddlefish 33 inches eye-fork length or less landed while fishing on the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa must be taken into immediate possession and included in the daily harvest limit. Every Paddlefish greater than 33 inches eye-fork length must be immediately returned to the water.
- Paddlefish 24 inches eye-fork length or longer landed while fishing on the Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri which are immediately returned to the water do not count toward the daily harvest limit.

 Paddlefish 24 inches eye-fork length or longer landed and not immediately returned to the water are considered taken into possession and must be counted toward the daily harvest limit. Every Paddlefish less than 24 inches eye-fork length must be immediately returned to the water.
- <u>Once the daily harvest limit of Salmon or Paddlefish has been reached, snagging must cease.</u>
- 5) All snagged Salmon and Paddlefish taken into possession must be removed from the area which they are taken and disposed of properly, in accordance with Section 5-5 of the Fish and Aquatic Life Code [515 ILCS 5/5-5].
- de) Waters Open to Snagging and Snagging Season

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- 1) Snagging for fish is permitted from September 15 through December 15 and from March 15 through May 15 within a 300 yard downstream limit below all locks and dams of the Illinois River, except for the area below the Peoria Lock and Dam where snagging is permitted year round within a 300 yard downstream limit.
- 2) Snagging for fish is permitted from September 15 through December 15 and from March 15 through May 15 within a 300 yard downstream limit below all locks and dams of the Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri, except for the Chain of Rocks low water dam at Chouteau Island Madison County, also known as Dam 27 at the Chain of Rocks Madison County where no snagging is permitted. Snagging is permitted from ½ hour before sunrise to ½ hour after sunset daily, March 1 through April 15 within a 500 yard downstream limit below locks and dams on the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa.
- 3) Snagging for fish is permitted year-round within a 100 yard limit upstream or downstream of the dam at Horseshoe Lake in Alexander County.
- 4) Snagging for chinook and coho salmon only is permitted from the following Lake Michigan shoreline areas from October 1 through December 31; however, no snagging is allowed at any time within 200 feet of a moored watercraft or as posted:
 - A) Lincoln Park Lagoon from the Fullerton Avenue Bridge to the southern end of the Lagoon.
 - B) Waukegan Harbor (in North Harbor basin only).
 - C) Winnetka Power Plant discharge area.
 - D) Jackson Harbor (Inner and Outer Harbors).
- d) Disposition of Snagged Salmon and Paddlefish. All snagged salmon and paddlefish must be removed from the area from which they are taken and disposed of properly, in accordance with Article 5, Section 5-5 of the Fish and Aquatic Life Code.

Section 810.35 Statewide Sportfishing (Hook and Line and Other Non-Bowfishing or Non-Snagging Legal Methods Under a Sportfishing License) Regulations – Daily Harvest and Size Limits

- a) Length is measured from the tip of the snout to the end of the tail with the fish laid flat on a ruler, with the mouth of the fish closed and the tail lobes pressed together.
- No fish species may be dressed (filleted or head and tail removed) on any waters to which length or bag limits are applicable. Regardless of where taken, no fish less than the specified minimum length or more than the daily harvest shall be possessed while taking from, or on, any waters to which length or bag limits and/or daily harvest limits apply. While taking from areas designated as "Catch and Release Fishing Only", all catch and release species must be immediately released back into the waters from which taken.
- <u>be</u>) Statewide limits by type of fish:
 - Channel Catfish
 There are no daily harvest or size limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.
 - 2) Largemouth Bass, Smallmouth Bass, Spotted Bass
 - A) Daily harvest limit is 6 bass, either singly or in the aggregate, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
 - B) In streams and rivers (excluding the mainstem of the Mississippi, Ohio, including the Golconda Marina and Wabash Rivers) the daily harvest can contain no more than 3 smallmouth bass.
 - C) In rivers and their tributaries statewide, except for the Mississippi, Ohio, including the Golconda Marina, Wabash and Illinois Rivers, Calumet River, Lake Calumet Connecting Channel, Calumet Sag Channel and navigable portions of the Grand Calumet River and Little Calumet River, all smallmouth bass must be immediately released between April 1 and June 15.

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- D) There is no statewide size limit.
- 3) Muskellunge, Northern Pike and Their Hybrids
 - A) All muskellunge and muskellunge hybrids (tiger muskie) taken must be 36" in total length or longer, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
 - B) No more than one muskellunge or muskellunge hybrid (tiger muskie) may be taken per day, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
 - C) All northern pike taken must be 24" in total length or longer, except in the Mississippi River where there is no size limit.
 - D) No more than 3 northern pike may be taken per day, except as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
- 4) Crappie (White, Black or Hybrid Crappie)
 There are no harvest or size limits except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.
- 5) Bluegill, Redear Sunfish and other Sunfish
 There are no harvest or size limits except in those waters listed under Site
 Specific Regulations.
- Striped Bass (Ocean Rockfish), White Bass, Yellow Bass and Hybrids There are no daily harvest limits or minimum size limits for striped bass (ocean rockfish), white bass, yellow bass and their hybrids, which are less than 17" in total length, except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations. For those fish 17" in total length or longer, the daily limit is 3 fish, either singly or in the aggregate, except in the Mississippi River between Illinois and Missouri where there is a 30 fish daily harvest limit for all striped, white, yellow or hybrid striped bass. In the Mississippi River between Illinois and Iowa, there is a 25 fish daily harvest on striped bass, white bass, yellow bass and their hybrids, either singly or in the aggregate.

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- 7) Trout and Salmon
 Daily harvest limit is 5 trout or salmon, either singly or in the aggregate.
- 8) Walleye, Sauger or their Hybrid
 - A) All walleye, sauger, or their hybrid (saugeye) taken must be 14" in total length or longer, except in the Mississippi River, Wabash River, or as specified under Site Specific Regulations.
 - B) Daily harvest limit is 6 walleye, sauger or their hybrid, either singly or in the aggregate, except in those waters listed under Site Specific Regulations.
- 9) Paddlefish
 Daily harvest limit is 2 paddlefish.
- 10) Injurious Species
 For injurious species, as described in 17 Ill. Adm. Code 805, there are no harvest or size limits. Possession of live specimens, progeny thereof, viable eggs, or gametes is prohibited.
- 11) Alligator Gar Harvest limit is 1 alligator gar per 24 hours.
- cd) The limits established in this Part on the number and size of fish a person may take in a day do not apply to a person fishing in waters wholly within his or her private property. [515 ILCS 5/10-150]

Section 810.45 Site Specific Water Area Regulations

a) Site specific regulations are listed by water area affected. The coverage of the regulation is dictated by the extent of the water area listed and not by the county. In some cases, regulations for a given water area or site may extend beyond the counties listed. The counties listed refer to the location of the dam or outfall for impoundments or mouths of small streams. Since large rivers or streams usually flow through many counties, the term "Multiple" is used rather than listing all counties where the large stream or river flows.

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- b) If a water area is not listed, then <u>Statewide</u> restrictions apply. If a Minimum Length Limit or a Daily Harvest Limit is not listed, then <u>Statewide</u> restrictions apply.
- c) Daily Harvest Limits are an aggregate count of all species listed for each regulation, except as noted otherwise. For species not listed, statewide restrictions apply.
- d) The following subsections explain additional restrictions or special provisions referred to by number in parentheses for water areas listed in this Section.
 - Sport fishermen must not use more than 2 poles and each pole must not have more than 2 hooks or lures attached (Alabama rigs not allowed) while fishing, except that legal size cast nets (in accordance with Section 810.50(a)(2)), shad scoops, and minnow seines may be used to obtain shad, minnows and crayfish to use as bait, provided that they are not sold, and except that bullfrogs may be taken by hand, gig, pitchfork, spear, landing net and hook and line during bullfrog season.
 - 2) Sport fishermen may not use a minnow seine, minnow trap, cast net or shad scoop for bait collecting in the following water areas:

Charleston Lower Channel Lake tailwaters from that portion of the Embarras River from the Charleston Lower Channel Lake Dam downstream to the Route 130 Bridge.

Clinton Lake tailwaters from that portion of Salt creek from the Clinton Dam downstream to the route 10 Bridge.

Cook County Forest Preserve District Waters (except in the Des Plaines River)

Lake Decatur tailwaters from that portion of the Sangamon River from the Lake Decatur Dam downstream to the Route 48 Bridge.

3) All jugs set in a body of water shall be under the immediate supervision of the fisherman. Immediate supervision shall be defined as the fisherman

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being on the water where the jugs are set and readily available to identify jugs to law enforcement officers.

- When using live bait, all live bait in excess of 8" in total length shall be rigged with a quick set rig. The hook shall be immediately set upon the strike. A quick set rig is defined as follows: a live bait rig with up to 2 treble hooks attached anywhere on the live bait; single hooks are prohibited. This subsection (d)(4) does not apply to trotlines, jug lines, etc., if allowed on the lake.
- 5) Sport fishermen may take carp, carpsuckers, buffalo, gar, bowfin and suckers by pitchfork, gigs, bow and arrow or bow and arrow devices.
- 6) The daily harvest limit for yellow perch shall not exceed 15 fish in the combined waters of Lake Michigan, Calumet River, and Chicago River including its North Branch, South Branch and the North Shore Channel.
- 7) It shall be illegal to possess trout during the period of October 1 to 5 a.m. on the third Saturday in October (both dates inclusive) that were caught during that period.
- 8) It shall be illegal to possess trout during the period of March 15 to 5 a.m. on the 1st Saturday in April (both dates inclusive) that were caught during that period.
- 9) Catch and Release Fishing Only means that fish (all identified species) caught must be immediately released alive and in good condition back into the water from which they came.
- 10) The 48 inch total length limit on pure muskellunge applies to that body of water listed as well as any tailwaters as defined below:

Evergreen Lake (McLean County) – including the portion of Six Mile Creek below the Evergreen Lake Dam downstream to its confluence with the Mackinaw River.

Fox Chain O'Lakes (Lake/McHenry Counties) – including the Fox River south of the Wisconsin-Illinois boundary to the Algonquin Dam and the Nippersink Creek upstream to the Wilmot Road Bridge.

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Kinkaid Lake (Jackson County) – including the portion of Kinkaid Creek below the Kinkaid Lake Dam downstream to the Route 149 Bridge.

Lake Shelbyville (Moultrie/Shelby Counties) – including the portion of the Kaskaskia River below the Lake Shelbyville Dam downstream to the State Route 128 Road Bridge near Cowden.

Otter Lake (Macoupin County) – including the portion of Otter Creek below Otter Lake Dam downstream to its confluence with East Otter Creek.

Pierce Lake (Winnebago County) – including the portion of Willow Creek below the Pierce Lake Dam downstream to Forest Hills Road

- It shall be unlawful to enter upon a designated duck hunting area between sunset of the Sunday immediately preceding opening day of regular duck season through the day before regular duck season and Canada goose season as posted at the site, or to fish on such areas during the regular duck season except in areas posted as open to fishing. It shall be unlawful to enter upon areas designated as waterfowl rest areas or refuges from two weeks prior to the start of the regular duck season through the end of duck and Canada goose season.
- 12) It shall be unlawful to trespass upon a designated waterfowl hunting area during the 7 days prior to the regular duck season, or to fish on such areas during the regular duck and Canada goose season except in areas posted as open to fishing. It shall be unlawful to trespass upon areas designated as waterfowl rest areas or refuges from 2 weeks prior to the start of the regular duck season through the end of duck and Canada goose season.
- It shall be unlawful to enter upon areas designated as waterfowl hunting areas during the 10 days prior to the start of the regular duck season, or to fish on such areas during the regular duck season except in areas posted as open to fishing. It shall be unlawful to enter upon areas designated as waterfowl rest areas or refuges from 10 days prior to the start of the regular duck season through the end of duck and Canada goose season.

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e) Fishing regulations, including species of fish, fishing methods and Daily Harvest Limits are listed for each water area. The numbers in parenthesis refer to the corresponding numbered definitions in subsection (d) of this Section. If a water area is not listed or if a specific species is not listed, then statewide restrictions

apply. Check the bulletin boards and regulation signs at the specific site for any

emergency changes to regulations.

Section 810.90 Fishing Tournament Permit

- a) A Fishing Tournament Permit from the Department is required for any fishing tournament event, which includes Hook and Line Fishing Tournaments and Bowfishing Tournaments, that is held in any of the waters listed in Section 810.45 or Section 810.15(d) and in any public owned or Department-managed lake, river or stream in Illinois.
- b) The Fishing Tournament Permit serves as the IDNR Site Activity Permit (17 Ill. Adm. Code 110.4).
- c) Definitions
 - 1) "Fishing Derby" An organized event conducted for children under the age of 16 who are attending primary school, senior citizens (65 years old and older), sport fishermen with disabilities, or other school-sanctioned groups when the principal purpose is education or enjoyment, rather than competition among sport fishermen. Tournament Permits are not required for a fishing derby.
 - 2) "Fishing Tournament" An organized event, other than a fishing derby. An event will be considered a fishing tournament when the following criteria are present:
 - A) the event is sponsored or promoted by an individual or organization;
 - B) participants compete for trophies, cash, prizes, citation or other recognition for participation in the event;
 - C) the event is conducted during a specified time period; and

- D) twenty or more individuals participate in the event or an exemption to Site-Specific or Statewide Regulations is requested.
- d) The Department shall require the director or organizer of a fishing tournament that is occurring at or on a Department site to:
 - agree to indemnify and hold harmless the Department, its officers, employees and agent for any damage to property and persons as a result of the willful and/or negligent acts of the group and/or its members and/or those in attendance. The Department will provide the Release, Waiver and Indemnification form for the group to sign and submit to the Site Superintendent; and
 - 2) the tournament director or organizer shall:
 - A) provide proof of liability insurance of \$1,000,000; or
 - B) require each individual who participates in the event to sign a liability waiver that was attached to the issued permit and turned back in to the Department site office prior to the event.
- e) A copy of the Fishing Tournament Permit must be in the possession of the director or organizer at all times during the event.
- f) Special Length Limit and/or Daily Harvest Limit exemptions are allowed when requested on the Fishing Tournament Permit application, approved by the Department, and stated on the Fishing Tournament Permit. Special Length Limit and Daily Harvest Limit exemptions to Site-Specific Regulations will only be approved for:
 - 1) Special Length Limit and Daily Harvest Limit exemptions to Site-Specific Regulations will only be approved for:
 - <u>1A</u>) catch, hold for weigh-in, and release Black Bass Fishing Tournaments in Lake Michigan (Illinois Portion) for which the Special Minimum Length Limit will be 14 inches and the Daily Harvest Limit will be 3 fish daily;

- 2) Daily Harvest Limit exemptions to Statewide Regulations will only be approved for a common release boat utilized immediately following a catch, hold for weight in, and release tournament.
- g) The statewide Daily Harvest Limit of no more than 6 largemouth, smallmouth or spotted bass (black bass) that may be in possession is applicable while participating in a Hook and Line Fishing Tournament, except:
 - 1) as specified by Site Specific Regulations in Section 810.45;
 - 2) In streams and rivers (excluding the mainstem of the Mississippi, Ohio (including the Golconda Marina) and Wabash Rivers), the daily possession can contain no more than 3 smallmouth bass; and
 - In rivers and streams and their tributaries statewide (excluding the Mississippi, Ohio (including the Golconda Marina), Wabash, and Illinois Rivers, Calumet River, Lake Calumet Connecting Channel, Calumet Sag Channel and navigable portions of the Grand Calumet River and Little Calumet River, all smallmouth bass must be immediately released between April 1 and June 15.
- h) Requests for a Fishing Tournament Permit shall be made on applications provided by the Department of Natural Resources, Division of Fisheries, available on the IDNR and IFishIllinois websites.

 - 3) The criteria and evaluation required for approval of a Site Activity Permit, described in 17 Ill. Adm. Code 110.4.
- j) Appeals of denied permits must be made in writing to the Department within 10 days after receipt of the denial. Any supplemental information requested must be included in the appeal.
- k) Required provisions for holding, handling and releasing caught fish to protect fish health in catch, hold for weigh-in and release Hook and Line Fishing Tournaments:
 - Tournament officials must be able to certify that all boats will be required to possess a livewell (except Muskie Fishing Tournaments) fitted with a functioning aerator and water pump.
 - 2) Individual boats and sport fishermen returning their catches of fish back to a release site must adhere to Daily Harvest Limits for the waterbody or the Special Daily <u>Harvest</u> Limit listed in the Fishing Tournament Permit.

SUBPART I: LIQUID OILFIELD WASTE HANDLING AND DISPOSAL

Section 240.905 Application for Permit to Operate a Liquid Oilfield Waste Transportation System

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- a) No person shall operate a liquid oilfield waste transportation system without a permit from the Department.
- b) Application for a liquid oilfield waste transportation system permit under this Section shall be made on forms prescribed by the Department. The application shall be executed under penalties of perjury, and accompanied by the non-refundable liquid oilfield waste transportation system permit fee of \$150100 and the required bond under Subpart O of this Part.
- c) If the application does not contain all of the required information or documents, the Department shall notify the applicant in writing. The notification shall specify the additional information or documents necessary to process the application, and shall advise the applicant that the application will be deemed denied unless the information or documents are submitted within 60 days following the date of notification.
- d) The application shall include:
 - 1) The name, address, and business and emergency telephone numbers of the proposed liquid oilfield waste hauler.
 - 2) A brief description of the vehicles to be used in the system; specifying whether vehicles will be owned, leased or otherwise arranged for.
- e) The application for a liquid oilfield waste transportation system permit shall be signed as follows:
 - 1) If the system owner is an individual, the application shall be signed by the individual. If the system owner is a partnership, the application shall be signed by a general partner. If the system owner is a corporation, the application shall be signed by an officer of the corporation.
 - In lieu of the signature of the owner or such authorized person, the application may be signed by a person having a power of attorney to sign for such owner or authorized person, provided a certified copy of the power of attorney is on file with the Department or accompanies the application.
 - 3) If the applicant is a corporation, the charter must authorize the corporation

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to engage in the permitted activity, and the corporation must be incorporated or authorized to do business in the State of Illinois.

SUBPART K: PLUGGING OF WELLS

Section 240.1132 Plugging and Temporary Abandonment of Inactive Class II UIC Wells

- a) Any Class II UIC well located on an active lease, equipped with tubing and packer and that has previously established mechanical integrity in accordance with Section 240.760 shall maintain mechanical integrity in accordance with Section 240.760 or shall be plugged in accordance with Section 240.1140 unless the well has been approved for Temporary Abandonment status in accordance with subsection (e).
- b) Any inactive Class II UIC well located on an inactive lease, when the lease has not been in operation for 24 consecutive months, shall be deemed abandoned and not eligible for Temporary Abandonment status pending a hearing held in accordance with Section 240.1610.
- c) Any inactive Class II UIC well located on an active lease, without tubing and packer, and that has previously established mechanical integrity in accordance with Section 240.760 shall be plugged in accordance with Section 240.1140 unless the well is approved for Temporary Abandonment status in accordance with subsection (e).
- d) Any inactive Class II UIC well located on an active lease, equipped with tubing and packer or without tubing and packer, and that has not previously established mechanical integrity in accordance with Section 240.760 shall be plugged in accordance with Section 240.1140 unless the well is approved for Temporary Abandonment status in accordance with subsections (e)(1), (2) and (3) and establishes mechanical integrity as follows:
 - a cast iron plug shall be set within 200 feet above the perforated or open hole interval in the cemented portion of the production casing, but no less than 100 feet below the base of the fresh water, and the casing shall be pressure tested by maintaining a pressure of 300 PSIG (which may vary no more than 5%) for a period of 30 minutes; or

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- 2) install tubing and a packer and conduct a passing internal mechanical integrity test in accordance with Section 240.760.
- e) The permittee shall apply for Temporary Abandonment status by making written application on forms provided by the Department. The Department may place the well on Temporary Abandonment status if the following conditions (which shall be continuing requirements) are met:
 - 1) The well shall:
 - A) have proper bond in effect in accordance with the Act if applicable; and
 - B) not be the subject of any final administrative decision for abandonment.
 - 2) The well shall have an intact, leak free wellhead, or be capped with a valve, be configured to monitor casing or annular pressure, and have injection lines disconnected.
 - 3) The wellhead shall be above ground level.
 - 4) The permittee complies with the requirements of subsection (f).
- f) Prior to the Department placing the well on Temporary Abandonment status, the permittee shall conduct a fluid level test upon the fluid in the well bore, after notice to and under the supervision of a Department representative, using acoustical or wire line measuring methods. If the Department authorizes the permittee to conduct a fluid level test without the presence of a Department representative, the permittee shall report the fluid level test on a form prescribed by the Department.
 - If the fluid level in the wellbore is no higher than 100 feet below the base of the fresh water, the Department may grant Temporary Abandonment status if the conditions in subsections (e)(1) through (3) are met. Unless the permittee elects to satisfy the conditions of subsections (f)(3)(A) or (B), the permittee shall perform additional fluid level tests, as prescribed in this subsection (f), every 2 years or until the well is removed from

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Temporary Abandonment status.

- 2) If the fluid level, as tested, is higher than 100 feet below the base of the fresh water and, at the time of the Temporary Abandonment request, the well is listed in Active status in the Department's records, the permittee may:
 - A) After notice to, and under the supervision of, a Department representative, remove any fluid to a level 100 feet below the base of the fresh water. At least 48 hours, but not more than 96 hours, after the fluid has been removed, the permittee shall measure the fluid level as prescribed in this subsection (f).
 - i) If the fluid level is higher than 100 feet below the base of fresh water, the permittee shall follow the requirements in this subsections (f)(3)(A) or (B); or
 - ii) If the fluid level remains more than 100 feet below the base of fresh water, at least 9, but no longer than 12 months from the date that fluid was removed from the well bore, the permittee shall obtain the fluid level in accordance with subsection (f). If, after the subsequent fluid level test, the fluid level within the wellbore has remained at least 100 feet below the base of fresh water, and the conditions in subsections (e)(1) through (3) continue to be met, the Department shall grant temporary abandonment status for 2 years from the date of the subsequent fluid level test. Thereafter, the permittee shall perform additional fluid level tests, as prescribed in this subsection (f), every 2 years or until the well is removed from Temporary Abandonment status.
 - B) Elect to follow the requirements of subsections (f)(3)(A) or (B).
- 3) If the fluid level, as tested, is higher than 100 feet below the base of the fresh water and, at the time of the Temporary Abandonment request, the well is listed in Temporary Abandonment status in the Department's records, the permittee may, after notice to and under the supervision of, a Department representative:

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- A) set a cast iron plug within 200 feet above the uppermost perforated or open hole interval in the cemented portion of the production casing, but no less than 100 feet below the base of the fresh water, remove any fluid to a level at least 100 feet below the base of the freshwater zone, and monitor the fluid level every 2 years in accordance with this subsection (f); or
- B) set a cast iron plug within 200 feet above the uppermost perforated or open hole interval in the cemented portion of the production casing, but no less than 100 feet below the base of the fresh water, and pressure test the casing by maintaining a pressure of 300 PSIG (which may vary no more than 5%) for a period of 30 minutes. Subsequent pressure tests shall be conducted every 5 years or until the well is removed from Temporary Abandonment status.
- g) If a Temporary Abandonment request is denied, the permittee shall, within 90 days, plug the well or correct the deficiency that caused the denial and secure an approved Temporary Abandonment permit.
- h) Temporary Abandonment status for production wells shall not be terminated until the well has been inspected by an Office well inspector and a Temporary Abandonment termination request is approved by the Department. Temporary Abandonment termination requests shall be on a form prescribed by the Department.
- i) Temporary Abandonment status will be granted every 2 years provided the wells remain in compliance with subsections (e) and (f) and the lease or unit on which the wells are located remains active, except for wells that fulfill the requirements of subsection (f)(3)(B), which will be granted every 5 years.

 - Ontain a statement indicating whether the well or drill hole is located over an underground gas storage field as defined in Section 240.1805(c) or the gas storage rights are owned by someone other than the lessor under the oil and gas lease; the applicant shall submit documentation establishing compliance with Section 240.1820.
 - 4) Be accompanied by the bond required under Subpart O.

- Summary and Purpose of Rulemaking: Senate Bill 3513 eliminates the requirement for licensed attorneys in good standing with the ARDC or Illinois and U.S. court judges or employees of either who have read and understood the version of the Notary Illinois Public Act to complete a course of study at renewal of a notary public commission. 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SUBPART A: NOTARY PUBLIC RECORDS

Section 176.10 Definitions

For purposes of this Section, all words and terms shall have the same meanings as set forth in 5 ILCS 312/1-104:

"Act" means The Illinois Notary Public Act. [5 ILCS 312]

"ARDC" means the Illinois Attorney Registration and Discipline Commission.

"Biometric data" or "biometric identifier" means a retina or iris scan, fingerprint, voiceprint, or scan of hand or face geometry. Biometric identifiers do not include writing samples, written signatures, photographs, human biological samples used for valid scientific testing or screening, demographic data, tattoo descriptions, or physical descriptions such as height, weight, hair color, or eye color. Biometric identifiers do not include donated organs, tissues, or parts as defined in the Illinois Anatomical Gift Act or blood or serum stored on behalf of recipients or potential recipients of living or cadaveric transplants and obtained or stored by a federally designated organ procurement agency. Biometric identifiers do not include biological materials regulated under the Genetic Information Privacy Act. Biometric identifiers do not include information captured from a patient in a health care setting or information collected, used, or stored for health care treatment, payment or operations under the federal Health Insurance Portability and Accountability Act of 1996. Biometric identifiers do not include an X-ray, roentgen process, computed tomography, MRI, PET scan, mammography, or other image or film of the human anatomy used to diagnose, prognose, or treat an illness or other medical condition or to further validate scientific testing or *screening.* [740 ILCS 14/10]

"Biometric information" means any information, regardless of how it is captured, converted, stored, or shared, based on an individual's biometric identifier used to identify an individual. Biometric information does not include information derived from items or procedures excluded under the definition of biometric identifiers. [740 ILCS 14/10]

"Notary public" or "notary" means an individual commissioned to perform notarial acts. [5 ILCS 312/1-104]

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"Personal information" or "personally identifiable information" means either of the following:

An individual's first name or first initial and last name in combination with any one or more of the following data elements, when either the name or the data elements are not encrypted or redacted or are encrypted or redacted but the keys to unencrypt or unredact or otherwise read the name or data elements have been acquired without authorization through the breach of security:

Social Security number;

Driver's license number or State identification card number;

Account number or credit or debit card number, or an account number or credit card number in combination with any required security code, access code, or password that would permit access to an individual's financial account;

Medical information;

Health insurance information;

Unique biometric data means data generated from measurements or technical analysis of human body characteristics used by the owner or licensee to authenticate an individual, such as a fingerprint, retina or iris image, or other unique physical representation or digital representation of biometric data. [815 ILCS 530/5]

User name or email address means information provided in combination with a password or security question and answer that would permit access to an online account when either the user name or email address or password or security question and answer are not encrypted or redacted or are encrypted or redacted but the keys to unencrypt or unredact or otherwise read the data elements have been obtained through the breach of security.

"Personal information" does not include publicly available information that is

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lawfully made available to the general public from federal, State, or local government records. [815 ILCS 530/5]

"Physical location" means real property, non-movable structure, brick and mortar building affixed to a permanent location.

"Secretary" – means the Illinois Secretary of State.

"X.509" means the standard format of a public key certificate derived from the International Telecommunication Union, "Series X: Data Networks, Open System Communications and Security Directory" (https://www.itu.int/rec/T-REC-X.509-201910-I) (2019) (no later editions or amendments included).

SUBPART C: COURSE OF STUDY AND EXAMINATION

Section 176.205 Course of Study and Examination

- a) Beginning January 1, 2024, applicants seeking a commission as either a notary public or an electronic notary public must first successfully complete a course of study and acquire a passing score on the examination, as required by 5 ILCS 312/2-101.5. The applicant will have two2 years from the date of the examination to apply for a notary public or electronic notary public commission. Once the course of study and examination have been successfully completed and the commission has been issued, the certificate or other proof of successful completion of the course of study and examination will remain valid for the duration of the notary's four-year commission.
- b) The Secretary of State may authorize the provision of a course of study for the mandatory training of notaries public and electronic notaries public by qualified third parties subject to this Subpart.
- c) To be accepted by the Secretary, the course of study must be taught by a provider or instructor certified by the Secretary.
- d) The course of study and examination must consist of the instruction and questions identified in Section 176.225.

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e) In accordance with Section 2-101.5(c) of the Act, licensed attorneys in good standing with the ARDC, current Illinois court or federal court judges, or applicants that are employed by a licensed attorney in good standing with the ARDC or an Illinois or federal court who are renewing their Notary Public commission are not required to complete a course of study or pass an examination, if the applicant submits a signed statement using a form designated by the Secretary of State indicating the applicant is a licensed attorney in good standing with the ARDC, current Illinois court or federal judge, or employed by a licensed attorney in good standing with the ARDC or an Illinois or federal court and that applicant has read and understood the version of the Act in effect at the time of application.

SUBPART D: NOTARY PUBLIC APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

Section 176.300 Application for Notary Public and Electronic Notary Public Commissions

- a) Applications for a traditional notary public commission. All individuals applying for a traditional notary public commission shall use the application prescribed by the Secretary of State and shall include, at a minimum, the information required by 5 ILCS 312/2-102.
- b) Remote notarization. *Any notary appointed under subsection (a) shall have the authority to conduct remote notarizations.* [5 ILCS 312/2-102(b)]
- c) Application for electronic notary public commission. *An application for an electronic notary public commission must be filed with the Secretary of State* as required by this Subpart D [5 ILCS 312/2-102(c)]. In addition, an applicant for an electronic notary public commission must provide the following:
 - 1) The notary public commission number assigned to the person by the Secretary of State, unless the applicant is applying for the notary public commission and electronic notary public commission at the same time under 5 ILCS 312/2-101(c);
 - 2) The names of all electronic notarization system providers that the applicant intends to use to perform electronic notarial acts;

- 3) A copy of the electronic signature of the person that is:
 - A) an exact representation of the handwritten signature of the person already on file or currently being filed with the Secretary of State; and
 - B) in a format that <u>identifies the electronic notarization system</u>
 <u>provider that prepared the electronic signature and can be read</u>
 without additional software and be compared for authentication
 purposes to the person's handwritten signature on file or being filed with the Secretary;
- 4) A statement certifying that the applicant:
 - A) Will comply with the standards set forth by Section 176.835 relating to identity proofing and credential analysis;
 - B) Will use a third-party provider who has been certified to act as an electronic notarization system provider in the State of Illinois by the Secretary; and
 - C) Will, upon request by the Secretary, promptly provide any necessary instructions or techniques supplied by a provider that will allow the electronic notary public's digital certificate and electronic seal to be read and authenticated.
- 5) A disclosure of all disciplinary actions, convictions, or administrative actions taken against the applicant;
- 6) One of the forms listed below:
 - A certificate or other proof of successful completion of the course of study required under 5 ILCS 312/2-101.5(a), which indicates successful completion of the course within the <u>two</u>2 years preceding the submission of the application for an electronic notary public commission; <u>or and</u>
 - B) A signed statement in a format designated by the Secretary of State that the applicant:

- i) is a licensed attorney in good standing with the ARDC or a current Illinois court or federal court judge or is employed by a licensed attorney in good standing with the ARDC or an Illinois or federal court; and
- <u>has read and understood the version of the Act that is in</u> effect at the time of application pursuant to 5 ILCS 312/2-101.5(c).
- 7) A statement certifying that the person will comply with the applicable provisions of the Act, including Article VI-A.
- d) A person may not perform an electronic notarial act, unless:
 - 1) The Secretary has approved the applicant's application for an electronic notary public commission; and
 - 2) The Secretary has approved the registration of the proposed electronic notarization system provider.
- e) Incomplete applications. If an application for appointment as a notary public or electronic notary public is incomplete, the Secretary of State will retain the application for at least <u>one-1</u> year from the date of receipt of the application. If the applicant does not complete the application within <u>one-1</u> year from the date of receipt of the application, the Secretary of State may deny the application and mail a notice of denial to the applicant.
- f) Assignment of Commission Number.
 - The Secretary of State will assign a unique commission number to each original commission certificate. The commission number, which will be used to identify the notary public whose name appears on the commission certificate, must remain assigned to the notary public throughout the period of the appointment and must be included on each duplicate or amended commission certificate issued to the notary public by the Secretary of State.

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- 2) If a notary public applies for a subsequent period of appointment, a new number must be assigned.
- A notary public that is also commissioned as an electronic notary public will have the same commission number for both commissions.
- g) After an application for an electronic notary public commission has been approved, the electronic notary public will be required to notify the Office of the Secretary of State, on a form designated by the Secretary, if the electronic notary public elects to add any other electronic notary system provider.

SUBPART G: NOTARIAL ACTS

Section 176.600 Notarial Certificates

- a) Minimum requirements. For a notarial certificate to be sufficient, it must contain the information required under 5 ILCS 312/6-103.
- b) Additional Information. A notarial certificate may contain additional or other information as may be required to satisfy any legal requirements, ethical or legal concerns, or the business needs of the parties to the transaction.
- c) Permanently and Securely Attached. A notarial certificate must be stamped, stapled, grommeted, or otherwise permanently bound to the tangible document in a tamper-evident manner. The use of tape, paper clips, or binder clips is not permitted.
- d) Legible Signature Required. When signing a paper certificate, the notary public shall use a legible, recognizable handwritten signature in blue or black ink that can be attributed to the notary public performing the notarial act by anyone examining or authenticating the signature. If a notary public's preferred signature is not legible and recognizable, the notary public must also legibly print the notary public's name immediately adjacent to the signature. In this chapter, a signature is legible and recognizable if the letters are distinct and easily readable, and the notary public's full name may be clearly discerned by looking at the signature.

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SUBPART I: ELECTRONIC NOTARIZATIONS

Section 176.805 Electronic Notarization System Provider Registration, Information Submitted for Registration, and Confidentiality of Certain Information

- a) Certification Required to Provide Electronic Notarization Systems. No person or entity may provide electronic notarization systems under 5 ILCS 312/6A-101 unless certified as a provider by the Secretary of State. All certified providers must apply for certification on an annual, calendar-year basis, with applications for recertification due in the Secretary's office not later than September 1 of each year. Nothing in this Part is intended to prohibit a governmental entity from developing an internal electronic notarization system that complies with the requirement in this Part for certification.
- b) Who May Provide Electronic Notarization Systems. Without regard to the specific business operations of the provider, all certified system providers under this Section shall be responsible for ensuring that all of the duties and responsibilities of the system provider are carried out in accordance with this Part. System providers may provide these services through their own resources, through a subsidiary, or through contractual relationships with third parties.
- c) The Secretary of State shall be solely responsible for certifying providers that apply for certification with the Secretary. Persons or entities desiring to be certified as providers may apply for certification at any time. An application for certification or recertification as a system provider must include the following information:
 - 1) The legal name of the provider;
 - 2) The type of business organization of the provider;
 - The mailing address, physical address, email address, and website address of the provider;
 - 4) The name and phone number of a contact person for the provider;

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- 5) If the applicant is a business entity, proof that the applicant is in good standing with the Illinois Secretary of State, Business Services Department;
- An attestation that the technology used by the applicant is in compliance with the provisions of this Part and Article VI-A of the Act relating to the performance of electronic notarial acts, with a copy of all manuals and information guides made available to Illinois electronic notaries;
- A certification that the vendor shall comply with the Illinois Notary Public Act and this Part regarding retention and storage and the disposition of documents, the electronic journal, and audio-video recordings if the provider no longer makes its system available to electronic notaries public for any reason;
- 8) Copies of publicly available policy and procedure manuals and training materials that are used for training or usage in Illinois;
- 9) Proof of liability insurance. The provider must maintain general commercial liability or product liability insurance with minimum liability limits of \$1 million per occurrence and \$3 million aggregate total. The Secretary will accept other commercially acceptable insurance arrangements, in the same minimum amounts, if the Secretary determines that they provide an equivalent level of coverage; and
- 10) A declaration that the system complies with the laws of the State of Illinois governing electronic notarial acts.
- d) An electronic notarization system provider may assert a claim that the information provided to the Secretary of State under subsection (b)(7) by an entity applying for certification with the Secretary of State is the provider's confidential, proprietary information and a trade secret of the system provider and is not a public record nor subject to subsection 7(g) of the Freedom of Information Act [5 ILCS 140].
- e) The Secretary of State will certify a system if it meets all of the following requirements:

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- 1) Provides secure access to the system by two-factor verification or another secure means that identifies the electronic notary public accessing the system;
- 2) Takes all reasonable steps to ensure that an electronic notary public using its system is duly commissioned by the Secretary of State and that the commission is in active status;
- 3) Provides for uninterrupted, continuous, and simultaneous audio-video communication between an electronic notary public and a principal;
- 4) Provides audio-video communication with a video resolution and audio quality that ensures that:
 - A) An electronic notary public and a principal can see, hear, and communicate with each other in real time; and
 - B) An electronic notary public can match the appearance of a principal with the credential presented by the principal;
- 5) Provides a secure communication link for audio-video communication that ensures that only the parties to an electronic notarial act and those persons authorized by each party to the electronic notarial act are part of the audio-video communication;
- 6) For systems providing an electronic journal of electronic notarial acts, ensures it complies with the provisions of this Subpart J and 5 ILCS 312/3-107 governing the requirement that an electronic notary public keep an electronic journal for each electronic notarial act;
- 7) Provides for the recording of an electronic notarial act performed by audio-video communication that complies with 5 ILCS 312/6A-104 and that is of sufficient quality to ensure verification of the recorded electronic notarial act;
- 8) Enables an electronic notary public to be satisfied that an electronic document presented for the performance of an electronic notarial act is the same electronic document on which the electronic notarial act was performed;

- 9) Enables an electronic notary public to affix the wording of a notarial certificate required by 5 ILCS 312/6A-105, as applicable, and the electronic official notary seal of the electronic notary public required by 5 ILCS 312/3-101;
- 10) Enables a person viewing an electronic document on which an electronic notarial act was performed to view the electronic signature and electronic seal of the electronic notary public who performed the electronic notarial act;
- Provides a method for determining whether an electronic document on which an electronic notarial act was performed has been altered after the electronic seal of the electronic notary public who performed the electronic notarial act has been affixed to the electronic document and the electronic notarial act was completed;
- 12) Prevents unauthorized access to:
 - A) An audio-video communication between an electronic notary public and a principal;
 - B) The recording of an electronic notarial act required by 5 ILCS 312/6A-104 for an electronic notarial act performed using audio-video communication;
 - C) Any personally identifiable information used in a credential analysis, identity proofing, or any other part of an audio-video communication, including without limitation:
 - i) A method of credential analysis and the output of that analysis;
 - ii) Any credential presented to an electronic notary public;
 - iii) The questions and answers used to conduct a dynamic knowledge-based authentication assessment; and

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- iv) The principal's birthdate, Social Security number, and other personally identifiable information;
- D) The electronic document on which an electronic notarial act was performed; and
- Provides a method of generating a paper copy of the electronic journal or journal entry of an electronic notary public and an electronic document on which an electronic notarial act was performed, including, without limitation, the electronic notarial certificate for the electronic document, the electronic signature and electronic seal of the electronic notary public who performed the electronic notarial act and any other document associated with the electronic document.

<u>14)</u> Submits the following plans:

- A) A cybersecurity plan outlining security, audit, and other procedures to ensure that the electronic notarization system is secure from cyberattacks, intrusion, and compromise of the user data:
- B) A business continuity plan in the case of business interruptions that last longer than two weeks; and
- C) A business termination and succession plan in the case of the termination of business by the electronic notarization system provider.
- f) The Secretary will notify the applicant to be certified or recertified as a system provider in writing whether the application has been approved or denied. Before denying an application due to minor typographical or clerical errors, the Secretary will advise the applicant of the error and give the applicant 10 business days to correct the error.
- g) If an original or amended application to be certified or recertified as a system provider is denied, the applicant may not reapply until 12 months after the date of the denial or the date of the final order of the Secretary upholding the denial if the decision is reviewed in a formal administrative hearing. Before denying an application based on errors, the Secretary of State shall advise the applicant of the error and give the applicant 30 business days to correct the error.

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- h) In deciding whether to grant or deny an application, the Secretary of State will take into consideration the applicant's past performance in Illinois and other jurisdictions, whether the applicant's license or certification has ever been suspended, revoked, denied, canceled, or withdrawn, and whether another state has denied the applicant's application to operate as a provider in that state.
- i) An applicant that has been certified under this Section may at any time submit an amended application seeking certification to provide systems in addition to the systems previously certified for use by the applicant.
- j) If there is any change after a provider's certification that affects the ability of an electronic notary public to comply with this Part when performing an electronic notarial act, the provider must immediately notify the Secretary of State of the change. Upon receiving notice of the change, the Secretary of State will determine whether the provider continues to comply with this Part. If the Secretary of State determines that the provider no longer complies with this Part, a provider shall not allow the use of the system to perform an electronic notarial act in this State.
- k) Services That Must Be Provided. After certification or recertification by the Secretary, providers shall provide the following services and meet the following requirements:
 - 1) The provider shall only allow the use of systems that have been authorized in Illinois under this Section;
 - 2) The provider shall provide a toll-free customer service/question/complaint hotline, online chat feature, or a dedicated email address that is answered, at a minimum, between 9:00 am and 5:00 pm, Central Time, Monday through Friday;
 - 3) The provider must provide a course of training and written instructions for electronic notaries on operation, maintenance, and safeguards against improper operations for use of the system and, if providing electronic journal capability, instruct the electronic notary on maintaining the required journal of notarial acts performed on the system (see Subpart J). The provider must give the Secretary of State copies of all materials used in the course of this training and available to Illinois electronic notaries;

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- 4) Upon an inquiry from the Secretary of State, providers must verify to the Secretary of State within seven7 days whether an Illinois electronic notary has been enrolled in the system and provide the Secretary, upon request, with additional reports including but not limited to records of usage in Illinois;
- 5) The provider must notify the Secretary of State in writing within 10 business days if the provider or the manufacturer becomes unable to provide systems in Illinois or if the provider has been suspended or decertified in any other jurisdiction;
- The Secretary of State may designate the form, format, and method of delivery (e.g., facsimile, electronic transfer, etc.), for any reports, information, or data required to be filed with the Secretary under this Section, including but not limited to, noncompliance report forms, tampering, or certifications;
- 7) Upon an allegation that the system provider failed to comply with a material provision of this Part, the Director of Index will notify the system provider, in writing, of the allegations. Within 30 days after receiving the written notice from the Director, the provider must respond to the allegations in writing, and provide an explanation of any corrective action taken. If the provider fails to correct any noncompliance found, the Secretary will deny, suspend, or revoke the certification. This penalty will be in addition to any private causes of action that may exist for an electronic notary that has been aggrieved by the noncompliance of the provider;
- 8) Upon the request of the Secretary of State, the provider shall, at no cost to the Secretary of State, provide the Secretary with an online demonstration and allow the Secretary of State to ask any relevant questions. The system provider shall also provide to the Secretary a publicly available, detailed description of the system, including complete instructions for operation provided to notaries public.
- 9) Providers must maintain records related to enrolled electronic notaries for 7 years after the electronic notary disenrolls from the system.

- Providers shall, upon request of the Secretary of State, submit information regarding the operation of their platform that includes, but is not limited to, the number of current or previous Illinois electronic notaries registered to the platform and the number and type of electronic notarizations performed on the platform by Illinois notaries.
- Criteria for Certification of Systems. Only systems that have been certified for use in Illinois under this Section may be used by Illinois electronic notaries.
 Certification of a system will be based on whether the system complies with any nationally recognized standards and this Part.
- m) Decertification or Suspension of Providers. The Secretary of State may suspend or decertify a provider from providing electronic notarization systems in Illinois. The Secretary shall provide a written warning, and 1530 days to come into compliance, to a provider regarding any violation of this Section that may lead to suspension or decertification. The provider shall respond in writing to the Secretary describing the course of corrective action. If the Director of the Index Department determines that the course of corrective action does not bring the system provider into full compliance with the Act and this Part, or there are recurring instances of the violations, the Secretary may decertify the provider from providing systems in Illinois or suspend the provider from allowing any new enrollments for 3 months. The following are considered actions warranting decertification or suspension:
 - 1) Failure to provide information, as requested, to the Secretary of State in a timely manner;
 - 2) Failure to maintain liability insurance as required;
 - 3) Failure to comply with the duties and obligations contained in this Part;
 - 4) Failure to provide Illinois electronic notaries with correct information regarding the requirements of this Section;
 - 5) Failure to report enrollments and disenrollments to the Secretary within seven7 days after the enrollment or disenrollment;
 - 6) Failure to inform the Secretary of suspension or decertification from service in another jurisdiction within 30 days;

- 7) Giving any instruction, codes, procedures, technological information, or advice to a notary that results in or could result in the system being circumvented by a user or third party;
- 8) Allowing enrollment by a person that is not commissioned as an electronic notary in Illinois;
- 9) Failure to meet any of the requirements of the Act or this Subpart; and
- 10) Solicitation of an Illinois electronic notary for any service or product other than the system that has been certified.
- 11) Has ceased operation as an electronic notarization system provider in the State of Illinois.
- n) Notification of Decertification or Decision Not to Recertify. When the Secretary decides not to recertify or to decertify a provider or a provider ceases to operate, the Secretary will notify all affected electronic notaries public in writing. The notifications shall be sent not less than 30 days after the decision or, if the provider requests a formal administrative hearing within that 30-day period to review the decision, notification will not be sent until the entry of a final order of the hearing officer upholding the decision.
- o) Applicants Who Are Denied. Applicants whose applications for certification or recertification have been denied and providers that have been suspended or decertified may request an administrative hearing under Subpart K. Decisions not to recertify or to suspend or decertify will not be carried out until at least 30 days after the notice of the decision has been sent to the applicant or provider or, if the applicant or provider requests a hearing within that 30-day period, until the entry of a final order of the hearing officer upholding that decision. The hearings held under this Part shall be conducted in accordance with all the rights, privileges, and procedures set forth in Subpart K. A request for a hearing to contest a decision to deny certification or recertification or to decertify must be made in writing and must be sent to the Office of the Secretary of State, Department of Administrative Hearings, Michael J. Howlett Building, Room 207, Springfield, Illinois 62756, (217) 524-0124.

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- p) Solicitation by Provider. Any solicitation sent from a provider to a potential user must conspicuously and in bold font include the following statements: "(name of provider) is a privately owned entity and is not owned, operated, or endorsed by the Illinois Secretary of State or any other Illinois government agency" and "(name of provider) is not the sole provider authorized by the Secretary of State". The solicitation or any correspondence from the provider may not be attached to or have the appearance of any official correspondence sent by the Illinois Secretary of State, may not state or otherwise indicate that the provider is the sole or only provider in Illinois. A system provider may not use any personal information (including the name, address, telephone number, or email address) provided by a notary to solicit the notary for any service or product other than the certified electronic notarization system.
- q) Publication of Provider Lists. A list of certified electronic notarization system providers, in no particular order, will be published on the Illinois Secretary of State's website (https://www.ilsos.gov/departments/index/notary/home.html) upon certification.

SUBPART J: JOURNAL

Section 176.900 Journal Requirements

- a) Every notary public, whether or not also an electronic notary public, must record each notarial act in a journal at the time of notarization to comply with 5 ILCS 312/3-107 and this Subpart J.
- b) Each journal of a notary public, whether maintained on a tangible medium or in an electronic format, must contain all of the following information in any order:
 - 1) The name of the notary public as it appears on the commission;
 - 2) The notary public's commission number;
 - 3) The notary public's commission expiration date;
 - 4) The notary public's office address of record with the Secretary of State;

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- A statement that, upon the death or adjudication of incompetency of the notary public, the notary public's personal representative or guardian or any other person knowingly in possession of the journal must deliver or mail it to the Secretary of State;
- The meaning of any abbreviated word or symbol used in recording a notarial act in the notarial journal; and
- 7) The signature of the notary public.
- c) If a notary public's name, commission expiration date, or address changes before the notary public stops using the notarial journal, the notary public shall add the new information after the old information and the date on which the information changed.
- d) An electronic journal kept by a notary public or an electronic notary public under 5 ILCS 312/3-107 must comply with the requirements of subsections (a) and (b) and must also:
 - Prohibit the electronic notary public or any other person from deleting a record included in the electronic journal or altering the content or sequence of such a record after the record is entered into the electronic journal except to redact personally identifiable information as required by Section 176.910(d);
 - 2) Be securely backed up by the electronic notary public and the electronic notarization system provider whose electronic notarization system was used by the electronic notary, if applicable; and
 - 3) Omit all personally identifiable information, as defined in Section 176.10.
- e) A notary public shall allow for the inspection of the journal or electronic journal as required by Section 176.950.
- f) Notwithstanding any other subsection of this Part to the contrary, a notary employed by an attorney or law firm is not required to keep a journal of notarizations performed during the notary's employment if the attorney or law firm maintains a copy of the documents notarized. No attorney or law firm shall be required to violate attorney-client privilege by allowing or authorizing

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inspection of any notarizations that are recorded in a notary's journal. Journals of notarizations performed solely within the course of a notary's employment with an attorney or law firm are the property of the employing attorney or firm.

- g) No notary public nor electronic notary public is required to keep or maintain a journal or otherwise record a notarial act or electronic notarial act in a journal if that act is performed by or on behalf of a candidate for public office and includes one or more of the following documents:
 - 1) nominating petitions;
 - 2) petitions of candidacy;
 - <u>3)</u> petitions of nominations;
 - <u>4) nominating papers; or</u>
 - 5) nomination papers. (See 5 ILCS 312/3-107.)
- h) The exemption under subsection (g) applies regardless of whether the notarial act or electronic notarial act is performed on the documents described in subsection (g) before, on, or after the effective date of the amendatory Act of the 103rd General Assembly, and the failure of a notary public or an electronic notary public to keep a journal of or to otherwise record such an act does not affect the validity of the notarial act on that document and is not a violation of the Act. [5 ILCS 312/3-107]

Section 176.980 Revocation, Suspension, and Reprimand

For purposes of this Section, "notary public" includes an electronic notary public and remote notary public.

- a) Revocation. A notary public's commission may be revoked for any of the foregoing acts or omissions:
 - 1) The notary public demonstrates the notary public lacks the honesty, integrity, competence, or reliability to act as a notary public; or

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- 2) The notary public fails to maintain a residence or place of employment in Illinois.
- b) Suspension. A notary public's commission may be suspended for any actions contrary to the Act, other laws of the State of Illinois, and this Part.
- c) Other Remedial Actions. The Secretary of State may deliver a written official warning to cease misconduct, misfeasance, or malfeasance to any notary public whose actions are determined to violate this Part, the Act, or other laws of the State of Illinois.
- d) Before suspending or revoking a notary public's commission, the Secretary of State must inform the notary public of the basis for the suspension or revocation and that the suspension or revocation takes effect on a particular date unless a request for an administrative hearing is filed with the Secretary of State under 5 ILCS 312/7-108(j) and Section 176.990 before that date.
- e) Resignation or expiration of a notary public's commission does not terminate or preclude an inquiry into the notary's conduct by the Secretary of State. Whether the finding would have been grounds for revocation will be made a matter of public record.
- A notary public or an electronic notary public that notarizes one of the documents listed in this subsection (f) by or on behalf of a candidate for public office and does not enter the notarial act or electronic notarial act into a journal does not violate the Act pursuant to 5 ILCS 312/3-107(f) and shall not be subject to discipline provided in this Section:
 - 1) nominating petitions;
 - 2) petitions of candidacy;
 - 3) petitions for nominations;
 - 4) nominating papers; or
 - 5) nomination papers.

WHEREAS, James Earl Carter, Jr., was born on October 1, 1924, to James Earl Carter, Sr., and Lillian Gordy Carter in Plains, Georgia; and,

WHEREAS, growing up in nearby Archery, Georgia, he attended public schools in Plains, attended Georgia Southwestern College and the Georgia Institute of Technology, and received a bachelor of science degree from the United States Naval Academy in 1946; and,

WHEREAS, 1946 also brought him great joy as he married Rosalynn Smith - their marriage spanned 77 years until her passing and led to their four children, 11 grandchildren, and 14 great-grandchildren;

WHEREAS, while in the Navy, he became a submariner, serving in both the Atlantic and Pacific fleets, rising to the rank of lieutenant, and was assigned to the elite nuclear submarine program; and,

WHEREAS, after his father's death, he shifted from active duty to the Naval Reserves as he moved home to manage his family's peanut farm and served his community as a church deacon, Sunday school teacher, and board member of a hospital and library; and,

WHEREAS, with faith guiding a passion for public service, he sought elected office and became a State Senator, Georgia's 76th Governor, and the 39th President of the United States; and,

WHEREAS, under his Presidential leadership, he held a deep commitment to developing foreign policy, leading on nuclear nonproliferation, signing the Panama Canal treaties, mediating the historic 1978 Camp David Accords, the SALT II treaty with the Soviet Union, and the establishment of American diplomatic relations with the People's Republic of China; and,
