THE PREEMINENCE OF CHRIST

Lesson 2: Praying for Those in the Line of Fire *Colossians 1:9–14*

- I. The catalyst to pray: The positive report about the condition of the Colossian church drove the apostle Paul to his knees to pray for them (*Colossians 1:9a*).
- II. The need to internalize: The apostle prayed that his readers would internalize God's biblical directives and learn how to apply them (*Colossians 1:9b*).
- III. The overflow of doctrine: Paul prayed that the Colossians' assimilation of biblical truth would overflow into lives that pleased the Lord (*Colossians 1:10a*).
- IV. The life that pleases: A life that pleases the Lord is characterized in four specific ways (Colossians 1:10b–14).
 - **A.** Fruitfulness: Such a life will bear Christ-like fruit in every facet of life (*cp. John 15:1–7*) (*Colossians 1:10b*).
 - **B.** Maturity: Such a life will continue to grow deeper in a relationship with God (cp. Philippians 3:10) (Colossians 1:10c).
 - C. Dependence: Such a life will repeatedly appropriate God's power to face all that life throws at us (cp. Philippians 4:13) (Colossians 1:11).
 - **D. Gratitude**: Such a life will persistently give thanks to God by focusing on what Christ has done for us *(Colossians 1:12–14)*.
 - ➤ Gratitude to God the Father will become a persistent theme of our lives (*Colossians 1:12a*).
 - The ultimate basis for our gratitude is what Jesus Christ has done for us (Colossians 1:12b-14).
 - Christ has enabled us to share in heaven's riches (*Colossians 1:12b*).
 - He fitted us for heaven by rescuing us from the dark, rebel kingdom (Colossians 1:13).
 - He was able to rescue and transfer us by redeeming us through His death and resurrection (*Colossians 1:14*).
