REGULAR CITY COUNCIL MEETING  
MONDAY, AUGUST 6, 2018**

The Regular Meeting of the Grand Haven City Council was called to order at 7:30 p.m. by Mayor Geri McCaleb in the Council Chambers of City Hall.

**Present:** Council Members Bob Monetza, Josh Brugger, Dennis Scott, Mike Fritz, and Mayor Geri McCaleb.

**Absent:** None.

**INVOCATION/PLEDGE OF ALLEGIANCE**

The invocation was given by Pastor Michael Goers, St. Matthew's Lutheran Church, Spring Lake, and was followed by the Pledge of Allegiance as led by Mayor McCaleb.

**APPOINTMENTS/REAPPOINTMENTS**

**18-214** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Scott**, to appoint Kevin Waters to the Musical Fountain Committee with a term ending June 30, 2022, and Alex Winter as an Ex Officio member of the Musical Fountain Committee with a term ending June 30, 2020. This motion carried unanimously.

**PRESENTATIONS**

Resolution of Appreciation presented to Vester Davis, Jr.

A Resolution of Appreciation was presented to Assistant to the City Manager Vester Davis, Jr. for all he had done for the City of Grand Haven. Council wished him well with the next step in career as City Manager for the City of Stanton.

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Assistant to the City Manager Davis thanked Council, City Manager McGinnis, City employees, and citizens for a world of experiences. It had been a great adventure to work for the City and City Manager McGinnis was a great mentor.

Resolution of Recognition – 15 yrs service award presented to Pat McGinnis.

City Manager McGinnis was presented with a 15-year service award.

City Manager McGinnis said he was honored to serve in Grand Haven and hoped to continue to serve.

Council took a brief recess at 7:45 p.m. to have some celebratory cake.

Council reconvened at 7:58 p.m.

**APPROVAL OF CONSENT AND REGULAR AGENDAS**

**18-215** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Monetza**, to approve the consent and regular agendas, as amended. This motion carried unanimously.

The Resolution of 15-Year Recognition to Pat McGinnis and a resolution to approve a grant from the Home Depot Foundation in the amount of \$24,000 to help support The ReImagine Project were added to the end of the consent agenda.

**GENERAL BUSINESS/CALL TO AUDIENCE**

Mayor McCaleb made a call to the audience, allowing audience members to address Council on any issue.

Ms. Gail Ringelberg, representing owners of the Grand Haven Cottages, thanked the Department of Public Safety, the Department of Public Works, and all the others behind the scenes for another great Coast Guard Festival. She wanted to comment on the underground utilities item from the work session that would be discussed next. Their properties were part of a tif district and had already been paying toward the tif for CBDDA improvements. Sandpiper Condominiums had their utility lines buried for free two years ago. Now the City was talking about asking the owners affected by the Harbor Drive project to pay 1/3 of the cost with a special

assessment. Grand Haven Cottages did not want to be a part of a special assessment and would live with the utility lines above ground.

Mr. Tyler Somers, Burger Boat, thanked the City for allowing his business on the waterfront. He received great response from the public. He wanted to draw business to Grand Haven and hoped to be able to come back next year.

Mayor McCaleb thought it was very nice of Mr. Somers to come to Council to give his thanks.

Mr. Jim Warners, 22 S. Harbor Drive, encouraged the City to bury the power lines. He said almost everyone from the Zephyr he had spoken to were in favor of the project.

Mr. Matt Cibor, 521 Grant, was in favor of burying the utility lines. He also represented someone else who owned three units affected. The timing was perfect to do this and was also a good idea from a safety standpoint.

Mr. Gary VanVolkenburg, 22 S. Harbor Drive, also encouraged Council to move forward with the project. The assessment would be a win for everyone by improving the area and increasing property values.

Main Street Executive Director Sheridan stated the annual downtown sidewalk sales would be held on August 17 and 18. The final call for ArtWalk artists would be August 22.

Another audience member commented that the trees along Harbor were overgrown and unsightly. The City should consider removing them when beautifying the area.

## **CONTINUATION OF WORK SESSION**

### **Underground Placement of Lines – Harbor Drive**

- Pat McGinnis, City Manager

City Manager McGinnis reported the possibility of burying of utility lines and installing snowmelt was initiated by property owners willing to consider a special assessment. Snowmelt was not highly supported but the line burial was. The Board of Light and Power was now on board to share 1/3 of the cost. There was also the possibility of the Coast Guard Festival going in on a portion of the cost. Tonight was not a public hearing but was to obtain council direction on whether to continue with the process.

Council Member Monetza stated Council never approved a 1/3, 1/3, 1/3 plan. They should

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continue with the special assessment structure discussed in February. It was an aesthetic issue and property owners had stated their willingness to a special assessment.

Mayor McCaleb noted Council never agreed to any amount. This project dealt with uncertainties. The City did not even have money for other needed projects such as repaving. This special assessment project was not in the City's budget or even in the five-year plan. She was not opposed to paying the share for City properties affected by the assessment. She would need to see the names and addresses of the affected property owners that were in favor of the project. There needed to be quite a majority to impose a special assessment.

Council Member Scott felt the Board of Light and Power should bury their own lines. He did not want the City to use General Fund or Public Improvement Fund monies.

Council Member Brugger felt that since the first notice was for a 50/50 split, that was the number that should stay. He would also like to have a firm understanding on where property owners stood.

City Manager McGinnis noted that only verbal support had been received and it would irregular to take a poll.

Council Member Fritz stated the \$200,000 for the light pole was already over budget. He agreed the burial would be aesthetic but could not see how the City would be able to pay for it. There were too many major needs in the City.

**North Shore Cross Sections**

- Pat McGinnis, City Manager & Derek Gajdos, DPW Director

Department of Public Works Director Gajdos noted of the three possible options for the North Shore Drive roadway, Option A was the original plan with 10' driving lanes and 5' buffers on either side and was within budget. The 5' buffers were paved shoulders. Since this would be an MDOT project, if they were called bicycle lanes, they would be required to be 10' in width.

City Manager McGinnis asked for council direction if they did not want to move forward with Option A.

After council discussion it was determined to continue with Option A.

**CONSENT AGENDA**

**18-216** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to approve the special work session minutes and regular council meeting minutes of June 18 and July 16, 2018. This motion carried unanimously.

**18-217** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to approve the bills memo in the amount of \$3,316,683.70. This motion carried unanimously. (Attachment A)

**18-218** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to approve a Resolution of Appreciation to Holly Johnson for her unprecedented contribution to our City and to declare August 4, 2018, as “Holly Johnson Day.” This motion carried unanimously. (Attachment B)

**18-219** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to approve a Resolution of Appreciation to Vester Davis, Jr. This motion carried unanimously. (Attachment C)

**18-220** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to designate Human Resources Manager Bonnie Suchecki as the Officer Delegate to attend the MERS 2018 annual meeting. This motion carried unanimously.

**18-221** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to designate Mayor Geri McCaleb as the voting delegate and Mayor Pro-tem Mike Fritz as alternate for the City of Grand Haven at the 2018 Michigan Municipal League Annual Meeting on September 21, 2018. This motion carried unanimously.

**18-222** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to approve the Election Equipment Maintenance Intergovernmental Agreement with Ottawa County, Michigan, in the annual amount of \$1,011.11 per year over the next nine years and authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents. This motion carried unanimously.

**18-223** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to approve a Resolution of 15-Year Recognition to Pat McGinnis. This motion carried unanimously. (Attachment D)

**18-224** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Brugger**, to approve a grant from the Home Depot Foundation in the amount of \$24,000 to help support The ReImagine Project. This motion carried unanimously.

### **PUBLIC HEARING**

The mayor opened the public hearing at 9:05 p.m. regarding the submission of an application to the Michigan State Housing Development Authority for a \$160,000 grant for home purchase and rehabilitation for the City and Township of Grand Haven, City of Ferrysburg, and Spring Lake Township residents.

Spring Lake Township Manager Gordon Gallagher stated Spring Lake Township was proud to be a partner with the City of Grand Haven for housing. The Township was supportive of this application and would also be submitting a letter of support to include with the application. He thanked the City for its efforts.

Neighborhood Development Coordinator Kleyn stated this was an awesome grant and it was a great accomplishment for the City to obtain it. The grant would allow the Housing Department to achieve four projects.

The mayor closed the public hearing at 9:09 p.m.

**18-225** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Monetza**, to authorize the submission of an application to the Michigan State Housing Development Authority for a \$160,000 grant for home purchase and rehabilitation for the City and Township of Grand Haven, City of Ferrysburg, and Spring Lake Township residents and authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents. This motion carried unanimously.

Council Member Brugger thought the partnership was wonderful. If approved, the rehabilitation portion of this grant would help toward housing affordability.

### **NEW BUSINESS**

**18-226** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Monetza**, to award the engineering contract to Abonmarche for the City's 2019 Sanitary Sewer Cured-in-Place Plastic Pipe Rehabilitation Project in the not-to-exceed amount of \$82,010 and

authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents. This motion carried unanimously.

Public Works Director Gajdos reported the engineer came in under the budgeted amount.

Council felt it was a great project and would be a cost savings to not have to tear up the streets.

**18-227** Moved by Council Member **Scott**, seconded by Council Member **Fritz**, to approve the equipment replacement purchase of a fire rescue brush truck in the not-to-exceed amount of \$24,113 from Preferred Jeep Chrysler Dodge, Grand Haven, Michigan, and \$4,667.81 from Hoekstra Equipment, Grand Rapids, Michigan. This motion carried unanimously.

**18-228** Moved by Council Member **Fritz**, seconded by Council Member **Scott**, to approve the equipment replacement purchase of a ¾ ton truck in the not-to-exceed amount of \$23,906 from Preferred Jeep Chrysler Dodge, Grand Haven, Michigan, and \$6,321.80 from Monroe Truck and Auto Accessories, Muskegon, Michigan. This motion carried unanimously.

**18-229** Moved by Council Member **Brugger**, seconded by Council Member **Fritz**, to approve a resolution to release the right of reverter for Lot 9 of Airpark Industrial Plat, also known as 1865 Industrial Park Drive, and authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents. This motion carried unanimously.

City Manager McGinnis reported the right of reverter had never been removed from the deed even though the conditions subsequent to the sale were met.

**18-230** Moved by Council Member **Brugger**, seconded by Council Member **Scott**, to accept a proposal from Grand Valley State University to conduct a study of deer movement in the City of Grand Haven for a cost not to exceed \$5,500 and authorize the Mayor and City Clerk to execute the necessary documents. This motion carried unanimously.

Council was pleased to have the opportunity for some objective information.

Council Members Monetza and Fritz hoped the information was not used to determine where to cull deer in the city.

## **REPORTS BY CITY COUNCIL**

Council Member Brugger was very happy with the Coast Guard Festival this year. His prayers went out to the families of drowning victims from Sunday.

Council Member Monetza felt that the Coast Guard Festival went very well. Sunday was a tragic day and the responders put themselves at great risk to help people who went out in the water when conditions were bad. He hoped people learned a lesson from this tragedy. The responders did the best they could with the rescue efforts.

Council Member Scott said his prayers went out to the drowning victims and to those people who ended up in the hospital. The Coast Guard Festival was a great success and the various City departments did a great job in their efforts. He heard very few negative comments. He noted that a way should be found to drain a puddle that kept forming at the corner of 5<sup>th</sup> Street and Columbus Avenue.

Council Member Fritz thanked the City of Grand Haven staff for contributing toward the Festival with all of their hard work. The Departments of Public Works and Public Safety did a fantastic job. His prayers went out to yesterday's victims and their families.

Mayor McCaleb stated Coast Guard Festival was always a highlight for the year. She thanked the men and women of the Coast Guard for all they did. This year had an extra special meaning honoring the 75<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the sinking of the Escanaba. It was very interesting talking with the families of the crew members of the ship. She received comments from visitors that they were impressed with the look of the community. Her heart went out to the victims from yesterday.

## **REPORT BY CITY MANAGER**

### Sims Power Plant Closure

The discussion of the closure was ongoing. There were two town hall style meetings with a professional facilitator planned for August 15 and 16. Attendance would be limited to City residents and customers of the BLP. He recommended Council direction and the conduct of another opinion be done after the town hall meetings.

Council agreed to wait until after the meetings. Options for the future could then be given. It was suggested that the 2<sup>nd</sup> opinion study should be placed on the agenda for August 20.

### Robbins Road Sewer Tap Fee

Sewer tap fees were expected expenses by developers. The Department of Public Works expected to charge the \$5,000 fee for the property to tie into the sewer system for the Robbins Road development.



Public Works Director Gajdos reported the sewer main ran by the property and included a lateral. The builder had anticipated the fee and now was the time to do it.

Council Members Scott and Fritz felt the fee was a big expense. A special assessment already paid for the line to be there. He was not in favor of charging a fee.

City Manager McGinnis stated it was up to Council on whether to charge the fee. The developer did not ask for a waiver. He felt strongly to keep the fee on the books as it was a revenue source for the sewer system.

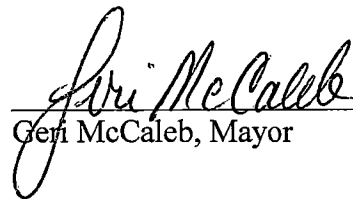
City Manager McGinnis thanked everyone who was a part of the Coast Guard Festival. Sunday was a tragedy

WHEREAS, Holly has advocated for the advancement and development of the youth of Grand Haven, establishing and staffing the Tri-Cities College Access Network, and;

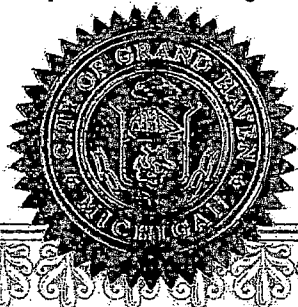

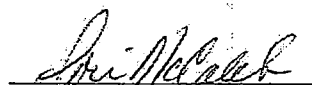
WHEREAS, during her tenure at the Grand Haven Area Community Foundation, assets have grown from \$50 million to over \$120 million (a 140% increase), and;

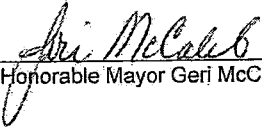
