**DAWURO** - one of many types of single iron bells shaped like a curled up leaf; played with metal beater



GANKOGUI (see Video 13) metal double bell found
throughout West Africa;

played with wooden stick



MBIRA (also known as sansa or kalimba) – a hand held hollow box or board with metal tongues plucked with thumbs; often played inside a large gourd resonator; it may have bottle caps or other metal attached to produce a buzzing sound

### **IDIOPHONES**

(main parts vibrate)



#### **SLIT DRUMS -**

also known as slit gongs are large hollow logs played with large wooden beaters; they are the ancient relatives of the modern wood block or tongue drums.



XYLOPHONE (see Video 17) wooden keys played with mallets; may
have gourd resonators under each key

**SHEKERE** (see Video 3) – a mediumsized calabash gourd which has outer netting with attached seeds or shells

**KPANLOGO** – a barrel-shaped drum carved from one log: found among the Ga peole of Ghana; played with hands and sticks

(membrane vibrates)







**SOGO** – a barrel drum found among the Ewe people of Ghana; played with hands or sticks



**MUSICAL BOW** – a single stringed instrument; played by plucking or hitting the string with a stick; often with an attached gourd resonator



(string(s) vibrates)

**BOWED FIDDLE** (see Video 36) – half gourd covered in leather, onestring, bowed





**ARCHED HARP** - one of many types of stringed harp-like instruments (including the *Kora*) found throughout parts of Africa; plucked
