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- 2. You want to impress your professors, and the way to do that is to take freshman classes and do well.

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2. Many professors post their notes. Still take your own.

If your professor does post notes, don't worry about taking notes when you are having a hard time understanding the professor. Concentrate on what he or she is saying, and then go back to his or her notes later and *make your own notes from those*.

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Remember that there is no way you will be able to win an argument with someone who knows a lot more than you, even if you are actually right.

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
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If the professor asks a question in class, and you know the answer he or she wants contradicts your beliefs:

- 1. Don't offer to answer but talk to the professor later in office hours.
- 2. If you know the professor is open, you can answer, starting with, "I don't agree, but this is the answer you want.

Shortly after class, review your notes, thinking specifically about the things the professor said and what he or she emphasized.




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When you are doing the reading/"homework," try to relate the material to the notes. Is there somewhere the professor talked about this kind of idea/problem? What did the professor say about it.

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
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Don't become a nuisance to the professor. Come when you have good questions.




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This is one reason that homeschool graduates do so well in college. They are already used to learning on their own.



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Your textbook's lack of explanation generally provides a lot of questions that you can go over in office hours.

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

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
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
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But remember that when you get together to study, it's study time, not social time!
