NA ALAKA'I MELE

While music had been an important part of The Schools since its founding in 1887, not until 1920 was the first inter-class song night held. The following year, the George Andrus cup was awarded to the contest winner for the Boys School. By 1922 the Girls School had its own winner's cup, The New England Mothers cup.

In 1967 a new dimension was added to the Song Contest when the boys and girls of each class combined to present a song, and from that year on the Trustees' Charles E. King cup has been presented to the winners of the combined class competition.

A popular addition to the contest came in 1966 when a special program of songs and dances was presented during the interval while the judges' score sheets were being tallied. The Song Contest is unique — a Kamehameha tradition of half a century. Through it, students gain knowledge of Hawaiian music, cooperate in the preparing and performing of their native songs, and share their talents and heritage with people throughout our Island State.

Over the years, the success of the annual Song Contest has been largely due to the students who have conducted rehearsals and led their classes in performance. Winning directors and their classes are listed below.
