It also recalls the various winds and rains encountered along the way: Kākalahale, Māhukona of the 'Āpa'apa'a and Kona of the tranquil sea.

Ka Hana Ia A Ke Aloha is a poignant love song describing one's yearning for another. The title literally translates as "That is the way of love."

This mele, written for Queen Victoria's Jubilee in England, expresses Queen Lili'uokalani's and Hawai'i's aloha for the British sovereign.

MELE INOA NO LILI'UOKALANI / *Winona Beamer*
The love of Queen Lili'uokalani lives in our memory.

HULA KA'I NO LILI'UOKALANI / *Gerald Alama*
"O Lili'uokalani, we dance in your honor!"

LANAKILA KE KA'AHŪ ALI'I / *Traditional*
Riding through the O'ahu countryside in her royal locomotive, the Queen feels the heartbeat of her people. "We love to greet you!" they exclaim.

KEOLAOKALANI / *Queen Lili'uokalani*
"Wink the eye to catch a sweetheart," went the poem of Keohokālole, mother of Lili'uokalani. The Queen set the lyrics to song.

QUEEN'S PRAYER / *Queen Lili'uokalani*
Kehau Bishaw, Leader—Sung by the School for Girls
Written by the Queen while imprisoned at 'Iolani Palace, this pule reveals her deep compassion as she says "Mui nānā 'ino'ino—Don't look upon their evils, "Akā e huikala"—But forgive them.

SANO'E / *Queen Lili'uokalani*
Two lovers meet. "Listen, Sanoe . . . , can't we stay longer? When can we meet again?" In song, the Queen describes a court romance.

KAULANA NĀ PUA / *Eleanor Prendergast / arr. Leila Hoku Kiaha*
Charlene Kaninau, Leader—Sung by Combined Student Body
This himeni, also known as "Mele 'Ai Pōhaku" and "Mele Aloha 'Āina," is an expression of opposition to annexation of Hawai'i by the United States.

NA ALAKA'I MELE

While music had been an important part of The Schools since its founding in 1887, not until 1920 was the first inter-class song night held. The following year, the George Andrus cup was awarded to the contest winner for the Boys School. By 1922 the Girls School had its own winner's cup, The New England Mothers cup.

In 1967 a new dimension was added to the Song Contest when the boys and girls of each class combined to present a song, and from that year on the Trustees' Charles E. King cup has been presented to the winners of the combined class competition.

A popular addition to the contest came in 1966 when a special program of songs and dances was presented during the interval while the judges' score sheets were being tallied.

The Song Contest is unique — a Kamehameha tradition of half a century. Through it, students gain knowledge of Hawaiian music, cooperate in the preparing and performing of their native songs, and share their talents and heritage with people throughout our Island State.

Over the years, the success of the annual Song Contest has been largely due to the students who have conducted rehearsals and led their classes in performance. Winning directors and their classes are listed below.
