HOTKE

HE KOA WIWO'OLE AU / Winona Beamer

I am a warrior without fear. For my body is seasoned, ready to do battle for my lord. Kamehameha, my king, I will be victorious!

HE MANONO / Traditional

In the battle of Kuamo'o, which took place in Kona, Hawai'i in 1819, Manono, the wife of Kekuaokalani, died while fighting alongside her husband to maintain the kapu system.

HOLE WAIMEA / Traditional

As the warriors of Waimea prepared for war, they knew they would have to catch the enemy and engage in fierce combat to ensure victory. But they did not feel remorse because they thought of war as sport and knew that when the battle was through, they could return to their loved ones.

HOE PUNA / Traditional

In the battle of Kama'ino, Kamehameha tried to surprise his enemies by launching an attack by land and sea. But he underestimated the strength of his enemies. The combined armies of Keawemauhili, Keoua and Kahekili and the power of the raging sea, vanquished Kamehameha's armada and land forces.

PUA ANA KA MAKANI / Traditional

To seal Kamehameha's treaty with Kaumuali'i for the peaceful entry of Kaua'i into the kingdom of Hawai'i, Ka'ahumanu was sent to Kaua'i to wed Kaumuali'i. In honor of their king's marriage, the people of Kaua'i composed this chant for Ka'ahumanu.

WAIPI'O PAKA'ALANA / Traditional

This chant tells the legend of Ha'inakolo who married Keanini'ulaokalani and left Hawai'i to live with him in the land of Kukuluokahiki. Ha'inakolo grew weary of this foreign land and decided to swim back to Hawai'i. She came ashore at Waipi'o Valley and, famished from her journey, gorged herself on the 'ulei berries she found. But she neglected to thank the gods for this food and was forced to roam the valley like a wild woman. With the help of her husband, she was purged of her madness and returned to Kukuluokahiki.

'AU'A'IA / Keaulumoku

One of Hawai'i's greatest prophets, Keaulumoku, predicted the end of all social, economic, and political institutions of old Hawai'i. He also predicted the end of the Kamehameha dynasty and the gradual death of the Hawaiian race. His prophecies were a warning to the Hawaiian people. "O child, child, child of the changing tide, hold on to all that is dear to you or it will be lost forever."

HE PULE MAMUA O KA LAHA 'ANA O KA PULE A KA HAKU MA HAWAI'I / Hewahewa

Hewahewa was a great priest who worshipped the Hawaiians' traditional deities. But upon hearing that Jesus Christ had risen from the dead to sit at the right hand of God, he realized that here was a greater God than those the Hawaiians knew. This is the first chant to the new God.

NĀ ALAKA'I MELE

While music had been an important part of The Schools since its founding in 1887, not until 1921 was the first inter-class song night held. At that time, the first contest was held among the classes at the School for Boys. A cup in Mr. George Alanson Andrus' name, a music and arithmetic teacher at The Schools, was offered as an incentive in the competition.

A visitor, Mrs. E.G. Scoville, was so impressed with the idea of a song contest that she donated the New England Mother's Cup for the School for Girls competition which commenced in 1922.

It became evident several years following the start of the song contest that students in the lower grades would seldom win against the senior high section. Therefore, in 1927, former trustee Richard H. Trent presented a cup for a Boys Junior Division competition.

In the early period, The Kamehameha School for Girls song contest was held in front of the Assembly Hall, and the boys had their contest in front of the Bishop Museum. After the completion of the Girls School in 1931, song contests were held in the auditorium. Each school retained its separate contest.

Prior to 1935, classes were required to write their own songs, with text in Hawaiian. In contests after 1935, if an original song was used, and it was judged as especially good by the judges, it was submitted for the Albert F. Judd award of \$200.

Classes no longer sing original compositions. Now each class selects its own choice song, and in some instances, students arrange the song for part singing.

In 1952, the first combined Kamehameha School for Girls and Kamehameha School for Boys Senior Division contest was held at Kekuhaupi'o, The Kamehameha Schools newly constructed fieldhouse.

The Junior Division Contest was ruled out in 1956 due to the increased enrollment and the assigning of grades seven and eight to the Preparatory Department. Ninth graders participated in the program then, but not in the contest.

By 1964, the size of the student groups participating and the number of people in the community interested in attending the annual song contest far exceeded the capacity of The Schools fieldhouse. It was at this time the event was moved to the Honolulu International Center, recently renamed the Neal S. Blaisdell Center. It has been filled to capacity each year.

In 1967, a new event was added to the competition. All students in each grade level were combined for the performance of one selection, and an additional trophy was offered by The Schools' Trustees in honor of Charles Edward King, an 1891 graduate of The Kamehameha School for Boys. This trophy is awarded to the winning class in the combined class competition.

Most recent is the Louise Aoe McGregor Award, which honors a member of the first graduating class of The Kamehameha School for Girls in 1897. Since it was first presented in 1972, this award has recognized the student director who has made the most significant contribution to the entire class—in organizational ability, leadership, assistance to others, and persistence, among other factors considered.

The Song Contest is unique—a Kamehameha tradition of more than half a century. Miss Laura Brown, Director of Music at Kamehameha from 1926-1947, stated that "the objectives of the song contest are to build up the repertoire of the best in Hawaiian music for the cultural heritage of any student who attends Kamehameha; to develop leadership, cooperation and good class spirit; and to give the student the use of his singing voice and to give him pleasure in singing as a means of expression."
