JUDGE VANCE: Next up is number 2777, in Re:
Chrysler-Dodge-Jeep EcoDiesel Marketing, Sales Practices, and
Products Liability Litigation.

Mr. Hood.

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MR. HOOD: Thank you again, Your Honor, and may it please the Court. Appreciate this second opportunity to be before you today, and I hope to be extremely brief.

Since filing -- and solely for the purposes of updating the Court about our position, we continue to support -- Plaintiff Warren, rather, continues to support consolidation.

We have since been persuaded, though, by the thoughtful and carefully researched and well-supported responses of a number of the plaintiffs in the case, that the Northern District of Alabama is not the most appropriate court for an MDL in this matter. And we would be and are supportive of the reasons given for siting the MDL in the Northern District of California.

I assume at this point that an MDL will be created. We have no additional grounds to assert in support of centralization other than those that appear in our moving papers.

JUDGE VANCE: All right. Thank you, sir.

MR. HOOD: Thank you.

JUDGE VANCE: Mr. Berman.

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MR. BERMAN: May it please the Court, Steve Berman on behalf of those seeking transfer to the Northern District of California.

JUDGE VANCE: Could you speak up, sir, please?

MR. BERMAN: Sure.

When I was preparing for today, I went and reread the Volkswagen transfer order. This case is an emissions case, just like the Volkswagen case. It involves the California Air Resources Board issuing a notice of violation, just like Volkswagen. And I submit to the panel that the same reasons that animated you sending it to the Northern District of California apply equally in this case as well.

And in this case, we have the California Air Resources Board issuing a notice of violation and indicating in that notice of violation that because of the poor air quality in California, many California residents have suffered as a result of FCA's actions. We think that that makes California the jurisdiction with the greatest nexus.

Also, I would like --

JUDGE VANCE: Do you anticipate discovery from the EPA?

MR. BERMAN: We anticipate coordinating, as we did in Volkswagen, with both the EPA, and more importantly, I think, the California Air Resources Board and the California Attorney

General's Office.

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JUDGE VANCE: Which EPA office are you dealing with? Is it Michigan or is it DC?

MR. BERMAN: I don't know yet, because we haven't dealt with them yet in the case. We haven't got that far.

But I will point out to you that I think it was vitally important in resolution of the Volkswagen case that we were in San Francisco, but because of that, the California Air Resources Board, acting through the California Attorney General, agreed to appear in federal court, where normally they would not do that. They agreed to coordinate with us in reaching resolution, and I think that that will be a very important factor in trying to get this case resolved.

In addition to the -- I would point out that with respect to the other venues suggested, in particular, New York and DC, there's something unusual that's happened here. No plaintiff filed there. Now, usually in these high-profile cases, plaintiffs file everywhere. No one filed in New York; no one filed in DC. Why? Because of what happened in Volkswagen, I think, for the most part, the plaintiffs' bar understood the important nexus that California has with this litigation.

JUDGE VANCE: All right. Thank you.

MR. BERMAN: Thank you.

JUDGE VANCE: Mr. Troutman.

MR. TROUTMAN: Thank you, Your Honors, and may it please the Court. My name is Mark Troutman, and I'm here to advocate on behalf of Mr. Marlatt and the other plaintiffs who have filed in Ohio on behalf -- or in favor of the Southern District of Ohio. Given that we haven't talked much about whether to consolidate the case, I'll go right to the actual location of --JUDGE RENDELL: Is there a case there? MR. TROUTMAN: Excuse me? JUDGE RENDELL: Is there a case there? MR. TROUTMAN: There is, Your Honor, before -- pending before Judge Marbley. It was filed shortly before the order came out for the hearing. JUDGE RENDELL: All right. MR. TROUTMAN: The Court should strongly consider the Southern District of Ohio because Ohio is preeminent in the automobile industry. 70.5 percent of light vehicles are actually manufactured within a 500-mile radius of the court, and --JUDGE VANCE: What does that have to do with the facts of this case? MR. TROUTMAN: It's the same argument we're looking at with volume of vehicles and impact on the local area.

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know, Chrysler is less than three hours away from Columbus,

Ohio. In fact, Chrysler has plants all over the Midwest. All 1 of their plants are in Ohio, Michigan, Indiana, and Illinois, 2 3 so the actual technology going into these vehicles --JUDGE BREYER: Where were most of these cars sold? 4 MR. TROUTMAN: As far as the briefing indicates, the 5 highest number of cars were sold in California, Your Honor. 6 terms of --7 That's true of every product in America. JUDGE VANCE: MR. TROUTMAN: Yeah, that would support every consumer class action ending up in California. 10 In terms of actual marketing, which is key to this 11 12 case, and the representations made by FCA, as we pointed out in 1.3 our briefing, 78 dealerships are in a 100-mile vicinity of 14 Columbus, and this actually exceeds that of some of the other 15 jurisdictions. 16 JUDGE HUVELLE: But where was the manufacturing and 17 design of these devices? Where is the center of gravity? Is 18 it, first of all, in this country? 19 MR. TROUTMAN: We haven't gotten to that point yet, 20 Your Honor. Presumably in Auburn Hills, Michigan, which is a 21 short drive from Columbus, and again, the plants are around the 22 area. 23 JUDGE VANCE: Why not Michigan? Why not Eastern 24 District of Michigan?

MR. TROUTMAN:

Eastern District of Michigan has more

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case -- has more MDL cases than Columbus. Columbus has two right now, one of which is already being resolved and the second of which is in an ongoing negotiation state.

In conclusion, Your Honors -- I see my time is up -- Judge Marbley has been a judge for 20 years, has never had an MDL, and will be our next chief judge and would be very capable of handling a case like this.

JUDGE VANCE: All right. Thank you.

MR. TROUTMAN: Thank you.

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JUDGE VANCE: Mr. Rende? Or Ms. Rende.

MS. RENDE: May it please the Court, Leigh Rende on behalf of the United States, here for the Environmental Protection Agency.

And I'm here in support of centralization and transfer to the Eastern District of Michigan.

JUDGE VANCE: Are you involved in litigation with defendants on these issues?

MS. RENDE: No. As you know, we have not filed a related complaint in this matter. However, we are an interested party, mainly --

JUDGE BREYER: So you file in California --

JUDGE VANCE: So your interest is based on what?

MS. RENDE: Our interest is based on the fact that EPA issued a notice of violation to the defendants, FCA US and FCA NV, relating to the subject vehicles and violations of the

Clean Air Act. Now, the EPA's notice of violation forms the 1 2 basis for the complaints in these matters. Every plaintiff has 3 referenced --JUDGE BREYER: As does CARB. As does CARB. 4 MS. RENDE: As does CARB, correct. 5 JUDGE BREYER: Right, okay. So what -- in Volkswagen, 6 7 as you know, you initially filed -- if I'm right about this. 8 I'm not quite sure I'm right about this, but I think it was initially filed in one district, then transferred to the Northern District of California. Is that correct? 10 11 MS. RENDE: I must confess that I'm not sure where it 12 was initially filed, but --1.3 JUDGE BREYER: Okay. But you can go -- EPA can go 14 anywhere; right? 15 Correct. And we have a history of being MS. RENDE: 16 present in Northern District of California in the VW matter, as 17 you mentioned.

The other reason why we are interested in the Eastern District of Michigan is because of the discovery burden. Given EPA's central role relating to -- relating to regulating the emissions of these particular subject vehicles, it's highly likely that all of the plaintiffs are going to seek discovery from EPA.

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JUDGE VANCE: But if you're a nonparty, you're going to be deposed and produce evidence where you are, not in the

transferee court. Right?

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MS. RENDE: Well, so Eastern District of Michigan is really -- it's convenient, it makes common sense to transfer the case there, and it's capable of handling it.

In terms of common sense -- well, the convenience is obvious in that EPA's main office for regulating air emissions from these vehicles is located in the Eastern District --

JUDGE BREYER: I'm trying to figure out your common sense argument, because maybe common sense would have told you not to transfer the case to San Francisco in Volkswagen. I mean, you go wherever. You go wherever the case is.

MS. RENDE: Correct.

JUDGE BREYER: I'm trying to figure out why the EPA is trying to pick one forum or another to resolve this case.

Especially when CARB, which played a large role in these matters, an extremely large role, isn't going to be in Michigan. And they're not going to be in the District of Columbia.

And why should you pit EPA against CARB? Why this division? Why -- you come out here. This is the government. You come out here and you take a position contrary to a position that your co-environmental agency takes. And I'm trying to figure out, what's so different about this case?

MS. RENDE: Our intent is not to -- our intent is not to go against CARB --

JUDGE BREYER: Well, it looks that way, doesn't it? 1 2 MS. RENDE: Not at all, Your Honor. 3 JUDGE BREYER: Doesn't it appear that maybe you're going to have different standards, that the EPA is rethinking 4 its policy on these issues, and it may be quite different from 5 the policies enunciated by CARB? 6 7 MS. RENDE: Well, what I am focusing today is not to 8 get into a policy or political discussion but really on the recommendation for a venue. And for us, in terms of convenience, Eastern District of Michigan does make the most 10 sense, especially due to the nexus of the actions that caused 11 12 the alleged violations of the Clean Air Act. 1.3 JUDGE VANCE: Do you envision joining this litigation? 14 MS. RENDE: It's currently -- we're currently 15 investigating this matter. As EPA referenced in its notice of 16 violation, the investigation is ongoing. EPA did allege 17 violations of the Clean Air Act, and investigations continue in 18 this matter. 19 JUDGE VANCE: All right. Thank you. 20 MS. RENDE: Thank you. 21 JUDGE VANCE: Mr. Wernke? Wernke? How do you say 22 your name? 2.3 MR. WERNKE: "Wernke," Your Honor. 2.4 JUDGE VANCE: "Wernke"? Okay. 25 MR. WERNKE: Good afternoon, Your Honor. I'm Michael

Wernke of Pomerantz. We represent the plaintiffs in the Pirnik action pending in the Southern District of New York.

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Regardless of where this panel decides to put the MDL, to locate the MDL, the Pirnik action should not be included. The Pirnik action was filed in September of 2015, and up until about a month ago, it went -- it proceeded for a year and a half having absolutely nothing to do with emissions. The plaintiff's allegations were -- survived a motion to dismiss in October, and since October, the parties have been engaged in discovery.

JUDGE VANCE: But didn't you recently add allegations about failure to disclose defeat devices to your complaint?

MR. WERNKE: We did, Your Honor. And the point I'm making here is that up until at that point, about a month ago, we added allegations to the complaint. We amended the complaint.

JUDGE VANCE: So won't that require common discovery with these other plaintiffs?

MR. WERNKE: There could be -- there could be some overlap. First of all, only -- there will only be any -- there will be absolutely zero overlap with the other plaintiffs in these consumer actions unless Judge Furman in the Southern District of New York denies defendants' motion to dismiss. If Judge Furman denies -- grants -- sorry, if Judge Furman denies defendants' motion to dismiss, only then will there be some

overlap.

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And even then, there will be almost no overlap on any issues of law. There will be some overlap on some issues of emissions, but we still have this entire issue of the vehicle safety, recalls, which was the genesis of this litigation originally, that will have absolutely nothing to do with it.

Now, of course, if Judge Furman grants defendants' motion to dismiss, then there's absolutely no overlap.

So for those reasons, in this -- our case -- just to give you a sense of it, to date we have received 600,000 pages of documents from the defendants that have nothing to do with emissions. It all has to do with recalls, regulations having to do with vehicle safety. We have already briefed -- put out a motion for class certification, which we're waiting for defendants to respond to.

So the case is well underway, and from our position, there is no -- given the minimal amount of overlap and the different kinds of claims in a securities case, issues having to do with loss causation, scienter, damages, things of that nature, that it doesn't make sense to be included in the MDL.

JUDGE VANCE: All right. Thank you.

Mr. Slater?

MR. SLATER: Thank you, Your Honor. I'm here on behalf of Robert Bosch LLC, which is one of the defendants in some of the actions.

This is a nationwide matter with potential plaintiffs and potential activity in a variety of locations. The presence of a larger number of cases in California at the moment is a bit of an artifice. The same law firms are bringing multiple cases on behalf of different named plaintiffs within the same district, making it appear that there are more cases, but they're all the same claims.

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JUDGE HUVELLE: Well, but there is, you would agree, a nexus with California, given the California local EPA?

MR. SLATER: There is a nexus to California, but it's not a necessary one or an overwhelming one in terms of the convenience of the parties.

JUDGE VANCE: What connection is there to DC?

MR. SLATER: The EPA is in DC. And then to the extent that we're dealing with defendants from outside the country, there's a significant convenience factor --

JUDGE BREYER: I'm just trying to figure out how you're going to come to terms with the EPA, because you'd say, "Oh, it's easy. They're just down the street." Just down the street, when actually you're going to have to come to terms with CARB as well.

And that is to say that if this case eventually settles, then you're going to have to have these parties in front of you in order to effectuate a settlement, and you know that better than anybody else in light of your experience in

Volkswagen. You can't get a settlement with somebody sitting out there who has a very, very strong -- very, very strong -- interest in the case.

MR. SLATER: Well, as Your Honor knows, there are 49 other states and two districts that are also very actively involved in litigating in Volkswagen, so having the benefit of CARB's proximity doesn't solve all the problems.

JUDGE BREYER: That's a different issue. That's a different issue, and it's one that actually I have to address in Volkswagen, as you know.

MR. SLATER: Yes.

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JUDGE BREYER: But that didn't prevent a settlement of 500,000 vehicles, in which you participated.

MR. SLATER: Yes, Your Honor. But that took place largely outside of court, and the -- most of the activity took place in the eastern half of the United States. So I think the parties go where the activity is.

JUDGE BREYER: Where the settlement master is.

MR. SLATER: Well, in that case of where the settlement master is. But in addition, there weren't a lot of depositions in this case, but all of them took place in the East -- almost half of them took place in the District of Columbia.

Some of the papers in terms of California, just in terms of -- my client spoke to the presence of a facility in

the Northern District. It has absolutely nothing to do with this case and should not be a basis.

We think that there is reason and the Court has flexibility, the panel has flexibility, to assign the case to any district, as has been discussed this morning. There is a reason, including the convenience of the parties, to assign it to the District of Columbia, and that's what we would advocate.

Thank you.

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JUDGE VANCE: Thank you.

MR. MONAHAN: May it please the Court, Bill Monahan for FCA US.

As an update, Your Honors, there's 19 federal actions now in 10 different judicial districts. FCA supports centralization in the SDNY or in the Northern District of California.

As Mr. Slater noted, this is a nationwide litigation. The vehicles at issue were sold in each of the 50 states.

Claims have been brought on behalf of purchasers and lessees in each of the 50 states.

We believe that one of the most important considerations as a result of the nationwide -- the fact that this is nationwide litigation is convenience of the parties, the witnesses, and also nonparties.

FCA NV is headquartered in London. The manufacturer of the engines at issue is located in Italy. Bosch is located

in Germany. Given these international touch points, we believe that the SDNY, which is the largest East Coast transportation hub near both JFK and Newark, would be the most convenient for the parties.

The Northern District of California would also be a

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The Northern District of California would also be a good option, for reasons already discussed. I won't go into them. I would just --

JUDGE VANCE: What is your position on the securities case?

MR. MONAHAN: Your Honor, in about two months, less than two months, our motion to dismiss the emissions claims will be fully briefed before Judge Furman. It will then be decided -- if he grants our motion, that is not an emissions case. If he denies our motion, it is an emissions case. And we would respectfully suggest that the panel refrain from deciding whether or not that case is related until after Judge Furman decides that motion to dismiss.

JUDGE RENDELL: Well, we could not include it and then put it on a conditional transfer order once that's decided.

MR. MONAHAN: Correct, Your Honor.

JUDGE HUVELLE: Has Judge Furman -- that is his only case?

MR. MONAHAN: I'm sorry?

JUDGE HUVELLE: Judge Furman's only case is the one that's been fully briefed. Would he be the judge you're asking

3	Furman. And that is Judge Furman's only case, yes, Your Honor.	
4	Thank you.
