Root-Related Words

terr-(Latin root)

means "earth" or "land"

my vocabulary word:

territory

(noun) land or water under a State's control



Related words:

- interred (verb, past tense)
 placed in the earth or buried
- 2. terrace (noun) flat earth with sloping sides
- 3. Mediterranean (proper noun) a sea in the middle of two lands
- 4. terrier (noun) a breed of dog who burrows into the earth after game

<u>etymology</u> (noun) — the study of words' origins, often focusing on how Greek and Latin roots contributed to modern words.

root analysis: eteos (Greek root,
meaning 'true') + ology (Greek root,
meaning 'the study of')

Related words: geology (the study of earth), astrology (the study of stars), biology (the study of life), entomology (the study of insects)

- English language was based on new words but mostly on words that existed in other languages
- Mostly we borrowed from Greek and Latin
- that is why so many of our words share roots
- Anytime you see -ology in an English word, you know it must be a word that means the study of something.

Here are four groups of words that are also "cousins" to each other

It's a great skill to be analyze unfamiliar words' roots.

Let's say you come across an unfamiliar word to you. Like...

<u>triskaidekaphobia</u>

This word means the fear of the number 13.

triangle and tricycle, both share the tri root, which must mean three. Deka...hmmm. I know decade is ten years and a decathlon has ten events. The Greeks interchanged c's and k's.

phobia, I know, means fear because I suffer from claustrophobia.

My clues are: three + ten + fear

Root-Related Words

- You will analyze a new word and look for any Greek or Latin roots
- then you will provide three interesting related words that contain the exact same root word somewhere in the word

WHY do this Activity?

- will teach you word analysis skills
- will teach you how to put dictionary definitions into your own words, or how to paraphrase
- will help you better understand how words are created over time

Root-Related Words

- Good dictionaries also share the language of origin
- usually found in [brackets] right after the definition
- Often there are more modern languages cited, but you should focus on the original Latin or Greek root and its meaning

Example – innovative

- It is your job is to find
 3 other words with
 the root 'nov' in them
 that also have
 something to do with
 new.
- Just because nov is in a word doesn't guarantee the word is related
- you have to look for the connection to the idea of new.

<u>innovative</u> (adjective) — a word to describe something that has **new**, original features, or someone that shows original ideas or thinking.

[from Latin *novus*, meaning **new**.]

novice (n) a person who is **new** to a task or idea. Related or not?

November (n) the eleventh month of the calendar. Related or not?

renovate (vt) to improve something so that it seems **new** again. Related or not?

novella (n) a short novel. Related or not?

- identify the language of origin
- Identify the "root" word or words
- find 3 related words that share the same root, identify their parts of speech, and provide a brief definition for them in your own words

Examples

<u>malevolent</u> (adjective) - having or showing a wish to do evil or bad to others.

<u>noun form</u>: *malevolence*

<u>adverb form</u>: *malevolently*

malfunction – (n) a bad movement on something's part.

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You are also learning to explain a word's meanings through paraphrasing, which is a good skill.
