
Someone will be the last to trust Christ for salvation before Christ comes for His Church. Will it be your neighbor? Will it be your friend? Will it be your family? Will it be you?

Men's Summer Study

Greek for the Rest of Us:

Mastering Bible Study without Mastering the Biblical Languages



Duane Nelsen will be teaching a class for men based on the book, Greek for the Rest of Us: Mastering Bible Study without mastering the Biblical Languages.

The book's premise is that you don't have to be a Greek student to understand biblical Greek. If you'd like to learn Greek so you can study your Bible better, but you can't spare two years for college or seminary courses, then *Greek for the Rest of Us* is for you.

This new study begins Saturday, July 2 at and will continue for four to six weeks. Plan to meet in the conference room at 8 a.m. for one hour.

Please purchase the book and read the first section before the first class. (Be sure to order the first edition so you'll be on the same page as everyone else.)

Men of all ages will enjoy working through the material together each week in a casual setting. Instead of memorizing Greek words, there will be interaction and discussion about how to use commentaries and online tools.

Developed by Greek teacher William Mounce, this crash-course on 'baby Greek' will acquaint you with the essentials of the language and deepen your understanding of God's Word. You'll gain a sound knowledge of basic Greek, and you'll learn how to use tools that will add muscle to your Bible studies.

Porter, Larry

Although Larry grew up in Council Bluffs, he was born in Kamas, Utah in 1941, the son of a Mormon

God had plans for Larry and sent a Christian missionary to Utah, who led Larry's father and mother to the Lord.

Larry's mother had grown up in Council Bluffs, Iowa, and the family decided to spend their vacation there. Since the car broke down and Larry's parents had no money to repair it, the family boarded a bus to Council Bluffs and remained there. Larry's father eventually attended Omaha Bible College and pastored small churches in Omaha and Council Bluffs. He also worked another job to help ends meet.

Larry was raised in a fundamentalist, Bible-teaching church and says, "I always thought I was saved as a boy, but my life didn't reflect it."

After high school, Larry served in the army for three years.

While attending college and working part-time for Council Bluffs' Nonpareil newspaper, Larry met a nurse named Ruth. Larry asked her to go bowling for their first date. After arriving at the bowling alley, Larry went to

pay for the shoes and lane, but they wouldn't take his check because his last check had bounced

"I had to go home right away to figure out my check book," Larry said. "My folks had not met Ruth and while I was figuring out my check book, Dad had her corralled in the kitchen.

"I heard Dad ask her, 'If you die tonight, where are you going to spend eternity?"

"With my Savior in heaven," Ruth answered.

"How do you know?"

Ruth shared that Jesus had died for her. Larry's father was satisfied.

By the time Larry figured out

his checking account it was too late for a date and he took Ruth home. When Larry returned home his father said, "You better keep that gal. She's the only one you've ever brought home that I like."

Larry and Ruth were married in 1965 and according to Larry, "Ruth has minded the checkbook ever since."

Larry's father had gone through a rough financial period and Larry noticed that his father's coat was tattered. "Ruth and I decided to give him a nice, warm coat for Christmas that year, but every time I saw him, he was wearing his old tattered coat."

Finally Larry said, "Why don't you wear the coat I gave you?"

Larry's father walked over to the closet and gave Larry the box with the new coat in it. "I don't want this from you," he said. "Your life is just like my old, tattered coat. You don't go to church. You spend more time with your friends than you do with your family, and I'm concerned about your spiritual life."

Larry took the coat back. "I was upset that he would not accept the coat, but even more upset about his discernment of my spiritual condition."

After accepting the position as a sports writer for the Omaha

World Herald, Larry, Ruth, and their three daughters moved to Lincoln in August, 1976. "We began attending Indian Hills but I worked a lot of Sundays. Writer friends came to cover ball games and I'd say, 'Let's go have a beer.' It was easy for me to fall in with unsaved friends."

However, Larry came to church whenever he didn't have to cover a game. "Every time I came to church, Gil said, 'Your life has to reflect the change Jesus made in you.'

"I knew I didn't have a changed life and I began thinking about Matthew 7:22, 23: 'Many will say to Me on that day, "Lord, Lord, did we not prophesy in Your name, and in Your name cast out demons, and in Your name perform many miracles?" And then I will declare to them, "I never knew you; depart from Me, you who practice lawlessness." '

Larry prayed, "Lord, I think I'm saved, but if not, I want to be." Larry repented of his sins and believed Jesus died for him. Larry was born into God's family and there was an immediate change in his life.

After many years of good health, Larry started coughing, which led to a doctor visit. In October, 2015, Larry was diagnosed with Idiopathic Pulmonary Fibrosis. He was told the life expectancy

from diagnosis of IPF to death was two to three years. But a new drug had just been approved that in tests had slowed the progression of the disease. His doctor prescribed it for him

At a recent doctor's visit, tests revealed the disease had not progressed in the past six months.

"I don't know how long it will remain stable," Larry said. "It isn't cured, and one day it might take off again. But I have not spent 5 minutes crying. God has given me a great life and whatever the future holds, I want to finish strong for Him."

"When friends ask how I'm doing, I tell them I'm not worried. God promises peace beyond understanding. When things are going well, it's easy to say that. When you've been given a serious disease, you understand what that peace really means. IPF has opened the door to present the gospel and do some serious witnessing.

"Each of us is going to die and only God knows that day. My concern is for people like me, who attend church, listen to the sermon every week, and are still unmoved. We can hear and hear and hear, but never be changed. I have to ask those folks, 'When will you recognize your need for the Savior?' "

Auditorium Seating Adaptation


