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# A Journal of a Voyage from Whitby to Greenland in the Henrietta

1 March to 1 April 1791 Ms pp. 23 - 27

[On this early voyage Scoresby was not an officer of the Henrietta, but a harpooner. However, he wrote the first and third sections, the cruises to and from the Greenland grounds of this 1791 journal in a quasi-ship's log tabular format with daily 2-hourly entries of the ship's course and progress and records of the ships position by both dead reckoning and celestial observation accompanied by narrative notes of 'Occurrences' aboard ship. This transcription is of the narrative occurrences. The detailed navigation data is quite legible and can be read directly from the accompanying facsimile of the manuscript. Ship's time was set by noon observations of the sun, so it appears from the notes thatthat the times in this log show the day beginning at noon and records two 12 hour periods in 2 hour increments. Where time appears to be relevant to a note I will provide on that basis a transcribed AM or PM time in brackets. Winds at that hour, if stated, are in compass points.]

[Following the one-month voyage from Whitby to Greenland the Henrietta settles in for a nearly four-month stay cruising the West Ice in search of seals and whales. With no long distance sailing underway Scoresby changes his format to primarily a narrative journal of events aboard ship, though still accounts of the business at hand rather than social matters. He continues to report winds, weather and position, along with the hunting activities and ships in company.]
