"I'M BEGINNING TO SEE THE LIGHT!" [Duke Ellington, 1944]

The Book of Bereishit is a personal favorite, and its opening chapters are written with great majesty.

For a long time I've awaited an opportunity to reflect publicly on the first lesson the Torah teaches us in the Garden of Eden — about taking responsibility for our actions and the consequences arising from the failure to do so. But in rereading the text recently from "The Beginning," I saw something I'd never really thought about before and liked it so much I realized I'd rather share that with you instead.

The very first act of creation comes three sentences in, when HaShem says "Let there be light!" Not only is this the First Utterance, but that entire first day is then devoted to this and nothing else. Each of the other days involves multiple creations — HaShem is the supreme Multi-tasker — but light is first and light is foremost.

This comes as no surprise. Throughout all cultures and languages, light is associated with creativity. We describe great thinkers, inventers and artists as "seeing the light" or seeing something "in a different light," "having a light bulb go on," achieving "enlightenment," finding something "illuminating." The Torah itself is referred to as Torah Ora: Torah is Light.

I'm gaining a new appreciation of what it means to have light signify the creative force. With a single, singular declaration — Let there be light! — HaShem has given us the key to become creators ourselves. He creates through fiat. But we, human beings who are fashioned in His image, create through inspiration by harnessing the power of enlightenment. We call this the "creative process," but it starts with light. From the very Beginning, HaShem has provided us a symbol to illustrate just how limitless our own creative potential is.

Rabbi Shimshon Dovid Pincus z"l, who served for over twenty years as the Chief Rabbi of Ofakim in southern Israel, taught that the decree "Let there be light!" does not pertain exclusively to that First Day. In his view it is a regenerative phenomenon, one that acts as an ongoing source of inspiration. With the dawn of each new day, HaShem re-establishes the world. Every blade of grass, every leaf, every inhabitant on earth has the opportunity for a fresh start.

My wish for all of us in our extraordinary Lincoln Square community is that we learn to see our days — from The Beginning through today and every day we're given — in a creative light. May we recognize them as a priceless gift, a perennial chance to build a better world for ourselves, our loved ones and our planet.

I'm in Kansas City this weekend for my high school's 50th reunion, but my heart is here at LSS, celebrating with the Robinson family, who are beacons of light for so many. Mazal tov to Tova and Tehila, to their older brother and sisters and to their mighty proud parents.
