## United Nations: Israel ranks as 18th best place in the world to live

Our very good friends at the United Nations have released their annual Human Development Index (HDI). The index ranks Israel in 18th place among the best countries in the world to live, putting it ahead of Japan, Italy, France and Austria. The HDI, which is published every year, ranks 188 countries according to their average life expectancy, education and Gross National Product per capita.

The HDI is a summary measure of average achievement in key dimensions of human development: a long and healthy life, being well educated and enjoying a decent standard of living.

Israel has a life expectancy at birth of 82.4 years, an average of 12.5 years of education, an adult literacy rate of 97.8% and a Gross National Income per capita of \$30,675.

Between 1980 and 2014, Israel's HDI value increased by 19%. During the same period, Israel's life expectancy at birth increased by 8.3 years, average years of schooling increased by 2.7 years, and GNI per capita more than doubled.

All this human development progress was made during a period of time in which Israel also fought wars in Lebanon, Gaza and on the streets of its cities.

#### **Essence & Identity**

What is the difference between essence and identity? Essence is (seemingly) ever-lasting; identity is changeable. Essence is man's core, the root of being, predictive. Identity is superficial. Essence is man's soul while identity is a temporary dweller. Essence defines; identity mutates. Essence is real. Identity is *impression management* as described by sociologist Erving Goffman in *The Presentation of Self in Everyday Life*.

Jacob, in the Parsha entitled And He Lived, died. Prior to his demise, like a piercing laser that never forgets, Jacob identified the essence of each son. Although nobody wants to be defined by others, there was powerful truth in Jacob's last words. Each son had to face his own essence, no escape. Jacob predicted that which will befall them in the End of Days (49:1) based on their essence.

Some sons were defined by prior actions. Reuben rested with Bilhah, Jacob's concubine (35:2), and lost primogeniture due to lust and all-round disrespect. Simeon and Levi battled unnecessarily with Shechem (34:25), resulting in ultimate dispersal of their progeny. Judah is praised; Zebulun and Issachar were defined by their respective trades. Using the vernacular, Jacob told it like it was and his sons showed no resistance. If he had told them what he thought their identities or assumed identities were, his words would have been diminished.

Perhaps Jacob's sons did not offer resistance because they could not believe how accurately he defined their essence; they were exposed, for better or worse. Their stillness reflects how dumbfounded they were when Joseph revealed the truth about his identity. In *Vayechi* the emotional penetration was sharper. Essence, not identity, was revealed.

People today spend a great deal of money in therapy to search for identity, not essence. Just as there is a difference between character and personality, people intertwine essence and identity. Austrian neurologist, psychiatrist, and Holocaust survivor Victor Frankl wrote in *Man's Search for Meaning* that survival in the concentration camps, aside from external circumstances, depended on something intangible. Stripped of personal, professional, and prestigious identity, this something - call it essence - was the core of strength to facilitate hope and survival from day to day. Prior identities were meaningless for endurance and survival predictors.

People need a starting point to search for their essence, which is usually hidden from self. It may be felt just before sleep or perhaps interacting triggers a sudden recognition of one's core. Is the individual the only one who can recognize it? Apparently not. Jacob knew the essence of all his sons beyond their own self-knowledge. We could say that he was an insightful man, but he also took the time to understand his sons beyond projected identities. Aside from our own insightful parents, or perhaps grandparents, nobody is going to identify our essence. As a sidebar, since gossip is identity driven, and essence transcends identity, those who gossip really do not know their victim.

Over a lifetime, people will have and assume a myriad of identities in all realms of life. We only have one essence. Can we change it? Is it the same as character which can be developed and improved? Jacob was a special father who cared enough to publicly tell his sons who they really are. They never fooled him. His mild rebukes at the time of their misdeeds belied his true feelings and perceptions. He knew the root cause of bad behavior.

Again, can essence be changed? The basic core of a person is constant. Yet, despite previous statements in this essay, essence can be modified with *awareness*. Jacob gave the gift of awareness to his sons and therefore to us. Awareness can facilitate internal changes leading to different actions. Think of all the personalities in *Beresheet*. What was their essence? Their identity? Which one ultimately mattered?

Forget about managing impressions, what is your essence? Not sure? Ask Jacob, or more correctly, Israel. HaShem changed his name because He knew his essence.
