The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Ki Savo

"And it will be when you come into the land ... you shall take from the first fruits" (26:1-2)

"Perform this Mitzvah," says the Sifri, "because on its merit you will enter the land."

In fact, comments the Malbim, the Mitzvah of Bikurim only came into effect after Yisrael had captured Eretz Yisrael and distributed it (fourteen years later).

However, the very undertaking to observe it served as an advance merit, enabling them to enter the land and take possession of it. At the same time it also teaches us that the essence of living in Eretz Yisrael is to acknowledge that it is a Divine gift, and to express our gratitude for everything that we receive from Him.

"And the Kohen shall take the basket from your hand" (26:4)

The Rambam, based on a Yerushalmi, rules that, even though the Torah indicates no specific amount, the Chachamim fixed Bikurim as a sixtieth.

The Aliyos Eliyahu, citing Chazal, who say that everything is hinted in the Torah, finds a hint for this in 'Tene' (the basket) referred to by the Torah here.

A 'tene', according to the Mishnah in Keilim, was a basket that contained half a Sa'ah; and the Gemara in Kesubos (111) relates that, in a time of blessing, there wasn't a non-fruit producing tree that did not produce at least two donkey-loads. The Chachamim say that each donkey-load is equivalent to fifteen Sa'ah. It therefore transpires that each one of these trees produced thirty Sa'ah.

Since even one tree is subject to Bikurim, the Torah is clearly speaking about the Bikurim from the produce of one non-fruit-producing tree (thirty Sa'ah). Seeing as a tene is required to carry it, it means that the Bikurim of thirty Sa'ah is half a Sa'ah - one sixtieth. Refer also to Ba'al ha'Turim.

"And the Egyptians did bad to us" (26:6)

If that is what the Pasuk is really trying to say, then it ought to have written "va'yo'rei'u osonu ha'Mitzrim". "va'yorei'u lonu ... " implies that they made us bad. So evil were the Egyptians in their ways that their evil deeds

rubbed off on us and turned us away from serving G-d.

This seems to answer the kasha that the commentaries ask on the Chazal, which cites that Uza, the Angel of Egypt, claimed that Yisrael served idols no less than the Egyptians did, and therefore did not deserve to be saved. It now appears that Uza's argument seems to be a sound one. If that is the case, then why is it that G-d saved Yisrael, even as He drowned the Egyptians?

However, since the Egyptians were directly responsible for the decline of our ancestors, Uza's claim falls away.

"And now, behold, I have brought" (26:10)

"And now" - immediately; "behold" - an expression of joy; "I have brought" - of my own (Medrash).

Performing a Mitzvah requires three conditions: that one performs it without delay, gladly (not with reluctance) and to be willing to pay for it with what one owns (not to wait until he has excess funds). All three are hinted here, says the Divrei Sha'arei Chayim.

"And you shall rejoice with all the good that Hashem your G-d gave to you" (26:11)

When someone receives a gift from the king, it's not so much the value of the gift that excites the recipient, but the fact that it is the king who gave it to him. Very often, the identity of the donor is as meaningful to the recipient as the gift itself.

That explains why, after "and you shall rejoice with all the good", the Torah adds "which Hashem your G-d gave to you" (Tif'eres Shlomoh).

And that is also why we say on Shabbos, "Make us happy with Your salvation," says the Avnei Azel, "not just with our salvation, but with the fact that You, Hashem, are the one Who effects it." That in itself is a singular honor for which we must be especially grateful.

By the same token, it would appear, the Baal Hagadah stresses so forcefully that it was Hashem, and not a malach, saraf or sheliach, who avenged our treatment at the hand of the Egyptians and killed the firstborn.

The Sound of the Shofar

The Overview in the Artscroll Machzor describes the sound of the shofar as "the inarticulate cry of the indelibly stained soul that longs to be cleansed." It is well known that the shofar is blown in order to awaken our soul to do teshuvah, as the Rambam declares, "Wake up, you sleepers, from your sleep, and you slumberers, rouse yourselves from your slumber and return to G-d."

I read a beautiful mashal from the Baal Shem Tov that illustrates how the shofar reconnects us to our Father, the King.

"There was once a king proficient in the magical arts who created an elaborate illusion to provide an enclosure. He surrounded himself within a complex maze of walls and barriers, with the spaces between the walls inhabited by hideous and terrifying apparitions. The king himself could not be seen behind the illusion he had created, yet his subjects longed to gaze upon his shining, noble countenance. The few hardy souls brave enough to scale the formidable walls soon had to beat a hasty retreat in the face of the demonic creatures dwelling within.

Then suddenly, there came a cry from the king's son, whose very being pulsated with a burning love for his father and a deep longing to be with him. He called out bitterly, "My father, my father! Why have you abandoned me?" Determined to see his father, the son took no heed of the dangers within and began scaling the walls, one after another. When the father beheld the intensity of his son's longing for him, he dismantled the illusory set-up. In an instant, the truth became apparent to the son. In reality, there were no walls hiding the king; in fact, the light reflected by the king's countenance shone forth throughout the entire world."

The Baal Shem Tov's mashal relates not only to Rosh Hashana, but to our entire reality in this physical world as well. There may appear to be many barriers between us and Hashem, but the reality is that we ourselves "create" these barriers when we fail to do His will, and this is really just an illusion.

May the sound of the shofar break down any "walls" that we have created, separating us from Hashem, and inspire each of us to find "our way back home." May we all return to our loving Father and King, and may we all be zoche to be sealed for a good life and for peace.

Rambam's Hilchos Teshuvah

Last week we mentioned that when a person creates for himself an "alternative reality," he replaces the "Ultimate Reality of G-d and His Torah." By doing so, he fails to follow "Kol mitzvos she'b'Torah -- all the mitzvos of the Torah," and according to the Rambam, he is

to do teshuvah. Although this "alternative reality" may in some ways overlap the "Ultimate Reality," and may be similar to it, it is simply not the same. It's more like the old "Venn diagrams" from high school math, where the sets may overlap, but they are not exactly the same. What do I mean by this?

At work, I eat my lunch at my desk. I only eat kosher food, wash for bread, make my brachos and eat an appropriate amount. So far, so good. Towards the end of my meal, there is an incoming e-mail, text or phone call that I respond to with an e-mail, text or phone call, and that leads to more responses, and responses to the responses, and so on. Two hours later I look up and ask myself, "Did I bentch?" Although my "alternative reality" may have included many mitzvos from the Torah, it was missing a key elemernt -- Birkas Hamazon. Since I did not fulfill the mitzvah of Birkas Hamazon, which is infinitely more important than an e-mail, then in reality, I failed to fulfill the "Ultimate Reality." Now I need to face the truth -- that what I think is real, meaningful, positive for me and the world, and full of growth and potential, is only a distorted figment of my imagination, since in reality, it is not "Kol mitzvos she'b'Torah."

Teshuvah is about facing the fact that as real as it may seem, our "alternative reality" is in actuality only a substitute for G-d's reality, the "Ultimate Reality."

My Rebbe, Rav Matis Weinberg, notes that no one ever forgets to put on their shirt when they leave their house in the morning. So why is it that people forget that the day is Shabbos, or whether they said a bracha, or when the correct time is to say Krias Shema, or any of the myriads of other mitzvos that we perform on a daily basis? Unfortunately, we don't seem to remember about mitzvos, yet we never seem to forget to put on our shirt. Which should be the more important reality?
