

The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Mikeitz

“Mikeitz and Chanukah”

In the Stone Chumash, the commentary for each parsha ends with a “Masoretic note” that lists the number of verses in the Sidrah; a mnemonic numerically corresponding to the gematria of a word or phrase that is somehow related to the parsha. Mikeitz is the only parsha in the entire Chumash where the Masoretic note lists a mnemonic for the number of words. Oddly enough, this mnemonic has nothing at all to do with Mikeitz; rather, it is an allusion to Chanukah.

According to Torah Temimah, Parshas Mikeitz almost always falls out on the Shabbos of Chanukah. There are 2025 words in Mikeitz. On each of the eight nights of Chanukah, we light a new *ner* (lamp). *Ner* (nun-reish) has the gematria of 250, and there are eight nights of Chanukah, giving us a total of 2000. Chanukah begins on the twenty-fifth of Kislev. Thus, 2025 is an allusion to the lights and date of Chanukah. Good Shabbos and Chodesh Tov.

Know Your Shul Members-

Drew and Adriana Steinberg

Drew Steinberg was learning at Machon Yaakov in Har Nof when he was introduced to a seminarian at Neve Yerushalaim named Adriana Peljovich. The two were at similar stages in their journeys as baalei teshuva, despite having started from very different points.

Growing up in the tight-knit Cuban Jewish community in Miami, Adriana had always had “a foot in frumkeit.” Her grandparents were Poles who had emigrated to Cuba between the wars, and her parents were Cubans who had

come to Florida, via Puerto Rico, in 1960 in the wake of the Cuban Revolution. Seemingly all their friends had come, too, and they stuck together in a warm, lively society. Adriana’s first language was Spanish.

“Jewish and Hispanic people are very similar,” she says, “in that their values are all about family. They’re very giving of their time and would do anything for anybody. I find them very harmonious; I can’t distinguish one from the other. They’re both so traditional.”

As a young teenager, Adriana attended shiurim with an aunt, and wherever her travels took her, she met the local rabbi. After graduating from University of Michigan with a degree in art history, she moved to Atlanta, where her brother and aunt lived, and began spending Shabbos in the frum community. From there, she took steps to expand what had been “golden moments” of childhood to meet the dimensions of her whole life.

At 33, she went to Israel to learn. A cousin who was learning with Rebbetzin Tzipora Heller told her, “You have to meet her; she’s amazing.” They clicked; Rebbetzin Heller made Adriana feel understood as the adult she had become. Her daughter Chani became Adriana’s closest friend in Israel; Adriana would accompany Chani to give cake and juice to cancer patients at Hadassah Hospital. Today, Adriana helps arrange Rebbetzin Heller’s annual visits to Baltimore, most recently this past week.

A teacher at Neve, Chana Levitan, set Adriana up with Drew.

A native of the D.C. suburbs, Drew was first exposed to Orthodox Judaism around the turn of the millennium, when he moved to Philadelphia to start an internet company with a cousin. His cousin was attending Aish HaTorah events and would invite Drew along.

“My cousin wasn’t really frum at the time, and I had no idea. It was kind of like, ‘Hey, I go to this rabbi on Friday night sometimes. Do you want to come?’

“‘Okay, I’ll check it out.’ I liked Friday night dinner, and I went to a couple of classes, then started learning one-on-one with a teacher who was answering all my skeptical questions. It wasn’t really learning; it was more like ‘what’s-this-all-about’ kind of stuff. I was 35.”

The startup, which offered subscribers online stock analysis tools, was off the ground but needed another round of funding to stay aloft. Then 9/11 happened, and capital for speculative ventures dried up. That was that. Drew moved back to D.C. and returned to his job as an attorney with the Office of the General Counsel of the Immigration and Naturalization Service.

In D.C. he hooked up with Aish downtown, run by Rabbi Aryeh Kaplan, and started attending shiurim given by Rabbi Tzvi Teitelbaum of Mesora D.C. Rabbi Kaplan told him about a Shabbaton in Baltimore with an

outreach organization called Zoos (“To Move”). So it was that Drew found himself in a sukkah with 50 others one Friday night at the home of Yaakov and Batsheva Goldman, and at lunch the next day by Eric and Elaine Gerstenfeld. A close friendship with the Gerstenfelds ensued. Drew not only was a frequent guest for Shabbos, but also traveled to Israel for the first time with the family. He tells a remarkable tale of his first visit to the Kosel:

“We went at night, and as I was walking there through the city, I started to feel this amazing energy, getting stronger and stronger as we got close to it. When we got to the plaza, I felt, ‘I can’t go up to it.’ The energy was almost too strong. Then I got up the nerve, and I was walking down there with Eric, among other people, and this guy stops us and starts asking me questions. He says, ‘Are you married?’ I said no. So he took my hand and started giving me all these brachas. I had no idea what he was saying, and Eric was telling me: success, *parmassah*, finding my *beshert*. He said, ‘You probably don’t know who I am, but I’m the Baba Sali’s grandson.’ Then he said, ‘I’m going to see you back here in a year with your wife.’ I’m like, ‘Okay, whatever.’ So now I’m feeling even more in a twilight zone. I go down to the Kosel, and there was just overwhelming energy—something very hard to describe. And then I remember going into the sheltered part, where you’re moving even closer to where the center was. The energy got stronger, and I had to walk out of there. I was having trouble breathing. My chest was tight, and I was totally overcome. I found one of the friends I had gone down there with, and I said, ‘I can’t stay down here anymore, I gotta go up.’ He walked me up, and then I just started crying, totally crying. It was strange, because none of this happened because of any thought that was going through my head. It wasn’t like I was thinking, ‘Oh my gosh, I can’t believe I’m here.’ It was just totally the energy of the place.

After that trip, Drew knew he wanted to go back and learn full-time. He took a sabbatical from his position as an attorney with the Justice Department’s Board of Immigration Appeals to learn at Machon Yaakov, the sister yeshiva to the better-known Machon Shlomo. After six months he started dating and was set up with Adriana. They hit it off, and after a “tunnel tours” date at the Kosel one night, whom should they meet but the Baba Sali’s grandson, in the same spot. Drew realized that it was almost one year to the day since his first visit to the Kosel! Soon after, he brought Adriana to Baltimore to meet the Gerstenfelds and his parents. Approval secured, they were engaged and got married in D.C. Drew left his job, and the couple went back to Israel for their first year of marriage. Their first child, Noah, was born in Yerushalaim. The couple moved back to D.C. for half a year, then came to Baltimore

to be part of the community and the shul where Drew had come to feel at home.

"When I met Rabbi Goldberger," says Adriana, "he made me feel immediately like I was part of the shul. The Rebbetzin was so authentic and someone I could relate to, and I felt like it was a place where I could contribute." The Steinbergs' next two children, Avi and Gavriella, were born in Baltimore.

After a stint in private practice with an immigration law firm in Baltimore, Drew is back at work for the federal government, this time with the U.S. Court of Appeals for Veterans' Claims. Adriana, who has sold art and advertising, now works out of their home, doing sales and marketing for Yaakov Goldman's company, Brand Launcher; she also organizes Camp Shabbos and helps run the Chanuka carnival for the shul. Noah, 7, and Avi, 6, attend TA and enjoy sports, learning, and building things (as does their dad). Gavi, 3, is in playgroup and cares for a doll named Mitzvah.
