

The Weekly Parsha



Parshas Shoftim By Rabbi Ozer Alport

“Prepare the way for yourself...” (19:3)

A man once traveled from Israel to Europe to collect money for the poverty-stricken yeshivos of Yerushalayim. Try as he might, his heroic efforts at collecting door-to-door in the freezing European winter were largely unsuccessful. Difficult as it was, he was willing to accept Hashem’s decree, but upon hearing that a non-religious agent collecting for Zionist causes had quickly reached his target and was already on his return voyage, he became distraught and frustrated. He approached the Chofetz Chaim for an explanation to help him understand Hashem’s perplexing ways.

The Chofetz Chaim responded by noting that the Gemora in Makkos (10b) rules that signs must be placed along the roads indicating which path accidental murderers should take to arrive at the cities of refuge. Why don’t we find a similar law requiring that signs be posted pointing the way to Yerushalayim to assist those on their way to fulfill the mitzvah of ascending to the Beis HaMikdash on Yom Tov?

The Chofetz Chaim answered that the person on his way to the city of refuge, even if not an intentional murderer, is still not a moral role model to whom we want people to be exposed, as Hashem wouldn’t have caused this to happen to a completely righteous person. We therefore provide directions for him so that he won’t have to stop and interact with innocent people to obtain them.

On the other hand, the Medrash relates (Yalkut Shimoni Shmuel 1 77) that each year Elkanah and his family would ascend to the Mishkan in Shiloh and share his plans with those he encountered, thus encouraging them to join him in the mitzvah. Each time he would take a different path so as to enable all Jews to participate in the mitzvah. There are no signs pointing the way to Yerushalayim so that a person traveling there will be forced to ask the locals for directions, thereby exposing them to the righteous so that they may join them in the performance of mitzvos.

The Chofetz Chaim concluded his words of comfort by suggesting that the representative of the anti-religious causes would act as a negative influence on all those he encountered. Hashem therefore enabled him to quickly obtain the funds he sought so that he would immediately leave, sparing the upright Jews of

Europe from encountering his misleading ideologies. The agent of the yeshivos, on the other hand, was a righteous person representing holy causes. Frustrating and time-consuming as it may be, Hashem specifically wanted his collection efforts to be dragged out to allow as many people as possible to meet him and become inspired from his stories of the pious Jews studying Torah in Yerushalayim.

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Guarding the Gates

The Sforno states that most of Parshas Shoftim deals with commandments directed to the leaders of the nation, because their conduct has a powerful influence on the rest of the people, for good or bad (Artscroll Stone Chumash). The parsha begins with, “Judges (*shoftim*) and officers (*shotrim*) shall you appoint in all your cities... and they shall judge the people with righteous judgment” (Devarim 16:18). Rashi identifies *shoftim* as “judges” who pass judgment, and *shotrim* as “officers” who impose authority over the people, following the order of the judges. Having stated that the officers are not the judges themselves, Rashi explains that Moshe mentions them in this pasuk, which deals with the appointment of judges, because they act as the agents of the judges (Tanchuma 2).

The Shem MiShmuel suggests that this pasuk relates to each and every Jew on a personal level as well; that each individual must appoint “*shoftim* and *shotrim* in all his gates.” Chazal mention that a person’s five senses are his five “gates,” through which all information from the outside world enters his realm of awareness. In particular, the eyes, ears and mouth are the “gates” that lead directly into a person’s soul, and one should be extremely careful to guard these gates.

The eyes are often referred to as “the windows of the soul,” and in his sefer with that very title, R’ Zvi Miller writes, “Today, the forces of *tumah*, impurity, are using the same devious tactic that Bilaam employed. We face an onslaught of immodest clothing and behavior in the streets, at work, in every public place, and even in our own homes. We are bombarded by images so destructive that many of our great rabbis have proclaimed that we are now surrounded by the worst level of *tumah* in history.” Hardly a day goes by where I do not find myself having to avert my eyes to avoid seeing something that I should not. Even in his time, Rabbi Yisrael Salanter dedicated much of his mussar writings to the subject of *shimaras einayim*, to help a Jew guard his eyes, as it says in the Shema: “... and remember all the commandments of Hashem and perform them;

and not explore after your heart and after your eyes after which you stray.” R’ Zvi Miller adds, “Control of our eyes is not just an inner battle between desire and restraint. We master ourselves countless times during the day and therefore, in Hashem’s Eyes, we have the highest status – we become holy!”

Just as one must protect himself from what his eyes see, so too, must one protect his ears from what others say. One who listens to *loshon hora* is as guilty as the one who speaks it. Unfortunately, the modern world knows no bounds as to what is appropriate or acceptable behavior, particularly when it comes to speech. People feel as though it is their right to express themselves in any way they see fit; to say anything, anytime, to anyone, with absolutely no regard for the effect that it may have on others. Although profanity and inappropriate speech have become a regular part of the language, they remain antithetical to Torah values, and one should try to avoid listening to such things at all costs. Protecting one’s ears from improper speech is essential to spiritual growth and stability.

The Chovos HaLevavos says that “the mouth is the quill of the heart,” suggesting that the mouth expresses the contents of the heart. David HaMelech writes, “Which man desires life, who lives days to see good? Guard your tongue from evil” (Tehillim 34:13). The Overview in Sefer Chofetz Chaim states, “*Loshon hora* is a weapon manufactured solely from words, yet the Torah considers the harm those words create to be massive. So sharp a wedge does *loshon hora* drive between a Jew and Hashem that it even deprives him of Divine assistance in a time of need. And the sheer number of Torah directives relating to speech has no direct parallel in any other function.” The importance of guarding one’s mouth from *loshon hora* and other forms of inappropriate or forbidden speech cannot be overstated.

So the Torah commands us to appoint *shoftim* and *shotrim*, not only as leaders for the nation to judge and enforce the laws of the Torah, but also for the individual Jew to judge himself and his own behavior. It is imperative for us to assign “guards” to protect the “gates” to our *neshamah* from the evils of the outside world in which we live. We must all take heed, and be careful as to what comes in through our eyes and ears, and what comes out of our mouths, to help us develop *deveikus Hashem*, grow spiritually, and better connect to our Father in Heaven. A gutten Shabbos.
