## Washington Gun Violence

#### Gun violence takes a devastating toll on Washington

- From 2005 to 2014, 6,119 people were killed with guns in Washington. 1
- From 2005 to 2014, more people in Washington were killed with guns than the total number of soldiers killed in combat in the Iraq and Afghanistan wars combined.<sup>2</sup>
- Washington is one of the 21 states where more people are killed with guns than in car accidents.<sup>3</sup>

# The burden of gun violence in Washington falls disproportionately on communities of color

While African Americans make up close to 5 percent of the state population, they account for approximately 18 percent of gun-related homicide victims in the state.<sup>4</sup>

While Hispanics make up close to 11 percent of the state population, they account for approximately 21 percent of gun-related homicide victims in the state.<sup>5</sup>

### Gun-related suicides are a substantial problem in Washington

- From 2005 to 2014, a gun-related suicide occurred every 19 hours.<sup>6</sup>
- From 2005 to 2014, 4,639 people in Washington died by a gun-related suicide.<sup>7</sup>

#### Young people are killed with guns in high numbers in Washington

 From 2005 to 2014, 516 people younger than age 21 were killed by gun violence in Washington.<sup>8</sup>



In Washington, a person is killed with a gun every 14 hours.<sup>11</sup>

### From 2006 to 2015 Washington had one of the highest rates of mass shootings in the nation

• From 2006 to 2015, Washington had the 12th-highest rate of mass shootings defined as four or more people fatally shot during a single incident.9

Washington residents strongly support common-sense measures to prevent gun violence

• During 2014, around 60 percent of Washington state voters approved a ballot initiative to expand background checks.<sup>10</sup>
