Participants will be planting honohono seedlings and be given lessons on how to best make keikis from canes that have just flowered. The instructors will be **Mel Waki** and **Calvin Kumano** with assistance from **Jan Takamiya**, **Walter Hiraishi** and **Brad Lau**. A hands-on potting workshop was held prior to the General Membership Meeting on April 12, 2023. More than 30 people attended the workshop which started promptly at 5:30 pm and ended an hour later. The instructors were Melvin Waki and Calvin Kumano with assistance from Walter Hiraishi and Brad Lau. Participants took apart community pots and planted the young seedlings into 2-inch clay pots using New Zealand Sphagnum Moss as the media. Participants also wrote their own labels so the seedlings were properly identified. Everyone went home with three different seedlings (Procatavola Key Lime Stars, Grammatophyllum scriptum and Cattleva labiata). Hopefully, with the cultural instructions given to them, we will see the plants in bloom at future meetings.


# Kunia Orchid Society Sale

## Honolulu Orchid Society (HOS) Judging

# **Orchid Tip of the Month**

# **Orchid Tip of the Month by Scot Mitamura**

May is already here! The last of our rainy season storms should be behind us and our warmer and dryer weather ahead of us. Longer day length, and more days of Trade Wind weather, our orchids will begin to dry much faster. Keep your plants well watered and it's also a good time to fertilize!

This is the beginning of our long growing season for many of our orchids. If you haven't started, this is the prime time to re-pot your HonoHono orchids. The new growths should be emerging from the base of the bloomed stems, as well as the new root system. Cut off the bloomed stems to propagate by cutting them into four inch sections and laying them on top of a tray or pot of potting soil.

New keikis will begin to emerge in a couple of months. Avoid the urge to separate these young plants as they will set back. They are best re-potted next year around this time and their flowering should be the following year. Please grow lots of HonoHonos for our orchid show next year!

Coming out of the rainy season, you want to keep a handle on the slugs and snails. Use any of the commercial baits for control, but for maximum control, you should re-apply within two weeks. This will kill the emerging eggs and the second generation. Many folks forget this second application and are never able to get adequate control of the problem.

After the rains, come the weeds! I consider this my worst pest in my collection. Stay vigilant on them and pull them before they seed, otherwise you will be in a battle all summer long. Spray herbicide or pull weeds on the ground and in your surrounding areas too.

Many of the weed seeds are dispersed into the air, so control of all surrounding areas is essential for control. Orchids that are infested with weeds, should be re-potted. The media is probably old and broken down and clogged by the fine feeder roots of the weeds. It is just a lot simpler to just re-pot, plus we are going into the growing season.

New members bring your questions and/or orchids to our next meeting and the orchid doctor (me) will try to answer your questions. # **Recipe of the Month**

# **Homemade Strawberry Sauce**

With just 4 ingredients, this recipe is a great way to use up extra summer strawberries. It's an incredible topping for cheesecake, chocolate cake, ice cream sundaes, and angel food cake.

This quick and easy recipe for Homemade Strawberry Sauce is a must-have! This is a great way to use up fresh summer strawberries or to keep the ones you have in the fridge from going bad. I include plenty of tips for making your sauce thinner or thicker and glossier, too!

Serves: 8 Prep Time: 5 mins Cook Time: 15 mins Total Time: 20 mins Calories: 51 kcal

#### Ingredients

- 1-pound strawberries, hulled and chopped
- 1/3 cup granulated sugar
- 2 teaspoons lemon juice 1/2 teaspoon vanilla extract

#### Instructions

- 1. Combine strawberries, sugar, lemon juice, and vanilla in a medium-sized pot.
- 2. Cook over medium-low heat for about 15-20 minutes. Stir frequently until the berries release their juices, and the sauce starts to thicken.
- 3. Remove from heat and allow the sauce to cool on the counter or in the refrigerator. The sauce will continue to thicken as it cools.
- 4. Serve over ice cream, on pancakes, or enjoy with any dessert!

#### **Tips for Making Strawberry Sauce**



This homemade strawberry sauce is super simple to whip up. I am going to share a few tips that can help you adjust your sauce to be perfect for whatever you are making.

Add Cornstarch: You can add 1 tablespoon of cornstarch to make a thicker sauce. Just add it in at the same time as the other ingredients and cook as directed. The cornstarch is optional. I love it because it speeds up the process of thickening the sauce and yields a lush, glossy sauce in a matter of minutes. If you leave out the cornstarch, you won't get the same thick sauce and it will take a lot longer to thicken properly (think closer to 20 minutes rather than 5).

<u>Thickening</u>: This sauce will continue to thicken once it's finished cooking as it cools. Keep this in mind while judging whether your sauce is finished or not; when you take it off the stovetop it should be a bit thinner than you want the finished product to be.

<u>Thin Your Sauce</u>: Accidentally cook your sauce too long and make it too thick? No fear, you're not stuck with strawberry jam! Simply add a tablespoon or two more water with the heat on low and cook until the water is nicely combined and the sauce is smooth.

<u>Storing Leftovers</u>: This recipe makes a good amount of homemade strawberry sauce! If you end up with some leftover, here is how to store it.

- In the Refrigerator: Store in an airtight container in the refrigerator for up to 7 days.
- In the Freezer: You can freeze your homemade sauce in a freezer safe container for up to 3 months. Just thaw and enjoy!
