Coordinating conjunction is used to create parts of a sentence that are grammatically similar, showing that the elements it connects are similar in importance and structure. These are short, simple conjunctions. The seven coordinating conjunctions are: for, and, neither, but, or, yet, so What are 7 Coordinating Conjunctions: The best way to remember the seven coordinating conjunctions is using the acronym FANBOYS. F -> for A -> and N -> neither B -> but O -> or Y -> still S -> so What are the examples of coordination of conjuncies: Coordinating conjuncies connects words, phrases and clauses of the same kind: two self-employed cats and cows two verbs shout or kicks two adverbs short and simple two ADVERBS quickly, but carefully two independent clauses Dylan writes better numbers, but Britney Spears sells more records. Download Coordinating Conjunction poster With coordinating conjunction, you should remember 3 things: FANBOYS abbreviations: These can be easily remembered as the acronym FANBOYS: For-And-Nor-But-Or-Yet-So. Practice this at home with children by singing the words. You also help them by playing the flashcards matchup game. Download, laminate and cut the flashcards and ask them to match words with their abbreviations. Meaning of different coordinating conjunction with sentences: Download here Coma use with coordinating conjuncies: The comma is inserted before the coordinating combination between two clauses. The comma tells the reader that one clause has been completed and another clause had begun. Example: She went to the grocery store, and she bought some apples. Note: Comma is not used when we connect two words or sentences. Example: She ate cake and chocolate. Can I start a sentence with a coordinating conjunction? Most of the time the teachers tell you that it is wrong to start the sentence with conjunction, but it's not true. You start a sentence with coordinating conjunction, but don't forget to exaggerate exaggeration Let's look at the example below to understand it. The court found him guilty. Ben was screaming with rage. But before Sam listened to his words, he slammed the door shut and stomped away. A fun activity to do at home: A very interesting activity to do with children is to write a composite sentence (A composite sentence consists of two simple sentences, or words accompanied by a comma) on the strip. Cut it and give the kids to assemble. In this way, children learn how the sentence is constructed.
