

Inspiration for the week

Jesus is not the king of prestige or grandeur but the king who brings light to darkness, hope to despair, sinners to mercy, and new life out of death. God dances on, around, in and through all of the silliness and ugliness of the world bringing all of creation to the eternal dance of new life and hope. Whether we accept it now or hope that we one day do, Christ is king of the universe. Christ is the alpha and the omega, the beginning and the end. Every human being, even those who scorned and rejected him and failed to see him in the least of our brothers and sisters will look upon him. Only those who understand truth will understand that we are on this awesome universal journey to Christ. It is a journey of surprises but also a journey of enlightenment when we will one day see and experience with the deepest joy our being in Christ. We will be restless until we are all one day together united in Christ our King.



SAINT OF THE WEEK

St. Francesco Antonio Fasani (1681 – 1742) lived his whole life as a loving, devout, and atoning man. He entered the Conventual Franciscans in 1695, and 10 years later taught philosophy to younger friars, served as guardian of his friary, and eventually became provincial minister. When his term of office ended, St. Francesco became master of novices and finally pastor in his hometown of Lucera.

Known throughout his various ministries as being loving, devout, and penitential, he was also a well-known confessor and preacher. St. Francesco was a loyal friend of the poor and worked tirelessly to find ways to support them. He was a mystic with such a profound prayer life and supernatural gifts that he was known to levitate during prayer. He was canonized in 1986 by Pope John Paul II.



NOTES FROM THE PASTOR... Fr. Roy Horning

This weekend, the Church ends the liturgical year with the celebration of the Feast of Christ the King. The feast was instituted by Pope Pius XI in 1925 to counteract atheism and secularism, this feast honors Christ's sovereignty over all persons, families, nations, and the whole universe. The feast affirms and celebrates the messianic kingship of Jesus Christ, who redeemed creation and humanity by the blood of the Cross. Historically, it duplicates the historical celebration of His kingship feast, the Ascension of Lord, which celebrates Jesus' exaltation and crowning with heavenly glory during the Easter Season. Pope Pius XI chose the last Sunday of Ordinary Time to highlight the eschatological (the last things) thrust of the feast. It is interesting that even back in 1925 the Church saw the challenges that modernity, with its many lies and mistaken ideas, would pose to people of faith. These are the challenges that we continue to face today.

The well-known sportswriter and author, Mitch Albom, wrote a column in the Detroit Free Press last weekend that was very insightful about how technology has accelerated the trend of secularism. Last weekend, I pointed out the role technology has played in influencing all of us with worldly ideas that are counter to our faith. Likewise, Mitch Albom pointed out how the digital world has shaped and transformed the landscape of ideas, especially people's view of religion. He noted how the internet and social media have given people a platform to express their belief systems to anyone and everyone who will read or listen their post or podcast. Religious affiliation was relatively constant between 1937 and 1999, averaging 73% to 70%. Yet, in this century it has dropped to 47% in just 21 short years, coinciding with the age of the internet. He pointed out, "Yet despite this continuing drop in belief, there has been no matching drop in opinion. On the contrary. It feels like *everybody* has a point of view, everybody has a finger to point. Everybody has blame to assign." This is classic scapegoating of a perceived villain. He accurately notes that even though people are shedding religion, they are acting more righteous than ever.

It is the classic modern replay of the infamous moment in the Garden of Eden, when Adam and Eve chose to decide right and wrong apart from God. When confronted; Adam blamed Eve, Eve blamed the serpent, and God was having no part of their scapegoating. We have freedom and reason; we are responsible for the decisions we make in this world. Just like our original parents we can blame the internet, social media, politicians, or this group or another for all our problems; but the fact remains we are the ones who decide to make moral decisions apart from God and scapegoat (blame) others for all that is wrong in the world. History offers many examples; Nero blamed the burning of Rome on the Christians, Hitler blamed the Jews, and the list goes on and on. Jesus Christ blamed nobody for his suffering and the fallacy of scapegoating. Through his free acceptance of the Cross he shows that the truth of the human condition, and alienation from God comes from the original sin and it's effect on the human heart. Through his blood we are healed and reconciled to God the Father. True life is found only in right relationship with God, and this is what Christ has restored. God is our hope and our strength in good times and in times of trial.

Mitch Albom ended his column by posing a very practical question. "In our most dire moments, in the operating rooms, the burning buildings, or the echoes of flying bullets, the digital community offers no comfort, and our politics offer no protection. Who do we cry out to for help then? Twitter?" The Feast of Christ the King is the Church's answer to all the problems of our lives and our world. Our Blessed Mother has stated over and over in her apparitions over the past 180 years that we will only find peace in her Son. Jesus is the way, and the truth, and the life. The saints attest to this in their lives. The challenge to us is: will we believe the One who created us, who redeemed us, who loves us unconditionally, who has promised us salvation if we trust in Him? Will we accept his Kingship over our lives and the eternal life he promises, or will we follow the ways of the world? Let us echo the words of Joshua in the Old Testament as Israel entered the promised land, "As for me and my house, we will serve the Lord." Have a blessed feast of Christ the King, with all the joy and assurances of faith that come in Him!


