

Reflections from Jon Jones



Bring It Into The Light

One of my favorite phrases from support groups like AA is "bring it into the light". Bring it into the light. Whenever I get rattled or upset, experiencing a serious disturbance in my heart, from a spiritual standpoint I am wrestling with the symptoms of a deeper problem. Whatever is going on in that

moment, God's voice in my mind and heart is drowned out by the noise of painful emotions. How can I get back to that centered place of peace and dependence on my loving Father who wants to give me my heart's desire? I bring what is bothering me into the light of his mercy.

I love the imagery from St. Theresa of Ávila as she discusses the complexity of the soul. She says that it is like a castle. We don't really have castles in the United States, so the idea of a mansion resonates with me more. The soul, in other words, is like a huge house with lots of rooms. Some are made for gathering, while others are for more intimate and private purposes. Jesus says that he stands at the door and knocks. Am I going to let him in?

Sometimes there are certain rooms I don't want him to see. My house should be clean for the King, right? He should not see my dirty laundry, whether it be anger, sadness, resentment or something else. As a courteous host I should provide a pleasant home to be in, so I conveniently close that door of my heart and the other one, too, and keep those locked for everyone but me.

But that is not what Jesus wants. In fact, in the Gospels we see that it was the dirty, unkempt places where Jesus was most interested in hanging out. Regularly chastised for hanging out with "sinners and tax collectors", Jesus made quite the effort at getting to know the undesirable people and places in town. My heart and yours are no different to him.

Jesus wants me to bring into the light the secrets and lies that I like to keep stowed away so that I can experience the very thing he was Incarnated to do—to heal the wounded. "But sin is more than a stain," says the Holy Father. "Sin is a wound; it needs to be treated, healed." I experience sin when my interior focus shifts away from my security in God's embrace, and spending time with Jesus brings reconciliation.

I think about Adam and Eve and how things would have turned out differently had they brought their temptation into the light. Instead, they made a decision on their own and immediately were ashamed of their nakedness. When God looked for them, they hid. When He called for them,

they were afraid. They preferred to stay in the dark, hidden in secret.

But, God called them out of the darkness. Sure, there was bad news once they came out, but there was also tenderness and love as they received clothes from their Creator. They did not lose their dignity as imago Dei (image of God), and neither have we. But, they did experience something that they had not up to that point--God's mercy. When we let ourselves be seen by God, when we let His mercy into our lives, into our memories, into our hearts, then we allow ourselves to be touched and cared for by Him. This means that our sin, the secret closets of our hearts, are actually the places where we can encounter most strongly God's tenderness. As St. Ambrose wisely points out, when brought to Jesus, sin does more good than harm because it brings us into contact with our redemption.

Pope Francis has discussed this, saying "the place where my encounter with the mercy of Jesus takes place is my sin. When you feel his merciful embrace, when you let yourself be embraced, when you are moved--that's when life can change, because that's when we try to respond to the immense and unexpected gift of grace, a gift that is so overabundant it may even seem "unfair" in our eyes."

With Advent approaching, and as we think about how we will prepare our hearts for the Incarnation of our Lord, let us enter the light of the confessional. If we do, we will be able to say for ourselves "The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light; those who dwelt in a land of deep darkness, on them has light shone" (Isa 9.2). "The offense did us more good than harm, because it gave Divine Mercy the opportunity to redeem us." --St. Ambrose


Father-Daughter Dance

About Christ the King



On the last Sunday of each liturgical year, the Church celebrates the Solemnity of Our Lord Jesus Christ, King of the Universe, or Christ the King.

Pope Pius XI instituted this feast in 1925 with his encyclical Quas primas ("In the first") to respond to growing secularism and atheism. He recognized that attempting to "thrust Jesus Christ and his holy law" out of public life would result in continuing discord among people and nations. This solemnity reminds us that while governments come and go, Christ reigns as King forever.

During the early twentieth century, in Mexico, Russia, and some parts of Europe, militantly secularistic regimes threatened not just the Catholic Church and its faithful but civilization itself. Pope Pius XI's encyclical gave Catholics hope and—while governments around them crumbled—the assurance that Christ the King shall reign forever.

Jesus Christ "is very truth, and it is from him that truth must be obediently received by all mankind" (Quas primas, 7).

Christ's kingship is rooted in the Church's teaching on the Incarnation. Jesus is fully God and fully man. He is both the divine Lord and the man who suffered and died on the Cross. One person of the Trinity unites himself to human nature and reigns over all creation as the Incarnate Son of God. "From this it follows not only that Christ is to be adored by angels and men, but that to him as man angels and men are subject, and must recognize his empire; by reason of the hypostatic union Christ has power over all creatures" (Quas primas, 13).

The Church calls us to acknowledge Christ's kingship with our whole lives: He must reign in our minds, which should assent with perfect submission and firm belief to revealed truths and to the

doctrines of Christ. He must reign in our wills, which should obey the laws and precepts of God. He must reign in our hearts, which should spurn natural desires and love God above all things, and cleave to him alone. He must reign in our bodies and in our members, which should serve as instruments for the interior sanctification of our souls, or to use the words of the Apostle Paul, 'as instruments of justice unto God.' -Quas primas, 33

Today, religious freedom for many people means that we can believe whatever we want in private, but when we enter the public square or the marketplace, we may not speak of anything that relates to our faith. However, the Church acknowledges the reign of Christ, not only privately, but publicly. This solemnity encourages us the celebrate and live out our faith in public. "Thus by sermons preached at meetings and in churches, by public adoration of the Blessed Sacrament exposed and by solemn processions, men unite in paying homage to Christ, whom God has given them for their King" (Quas primas, 26).

For Christians, when our faith is repeatedly marginalized in public life, we can fall into the habit of compartmentalizing our lives. We love Jesus in our private lives, but we shrink from acknowledging the kingship of Christ in social life. When we celebrate the Solemnity of Christ the King, we declare to the world and remind ourselves that Jesus is the Lord of the Church and of the entire universe.
