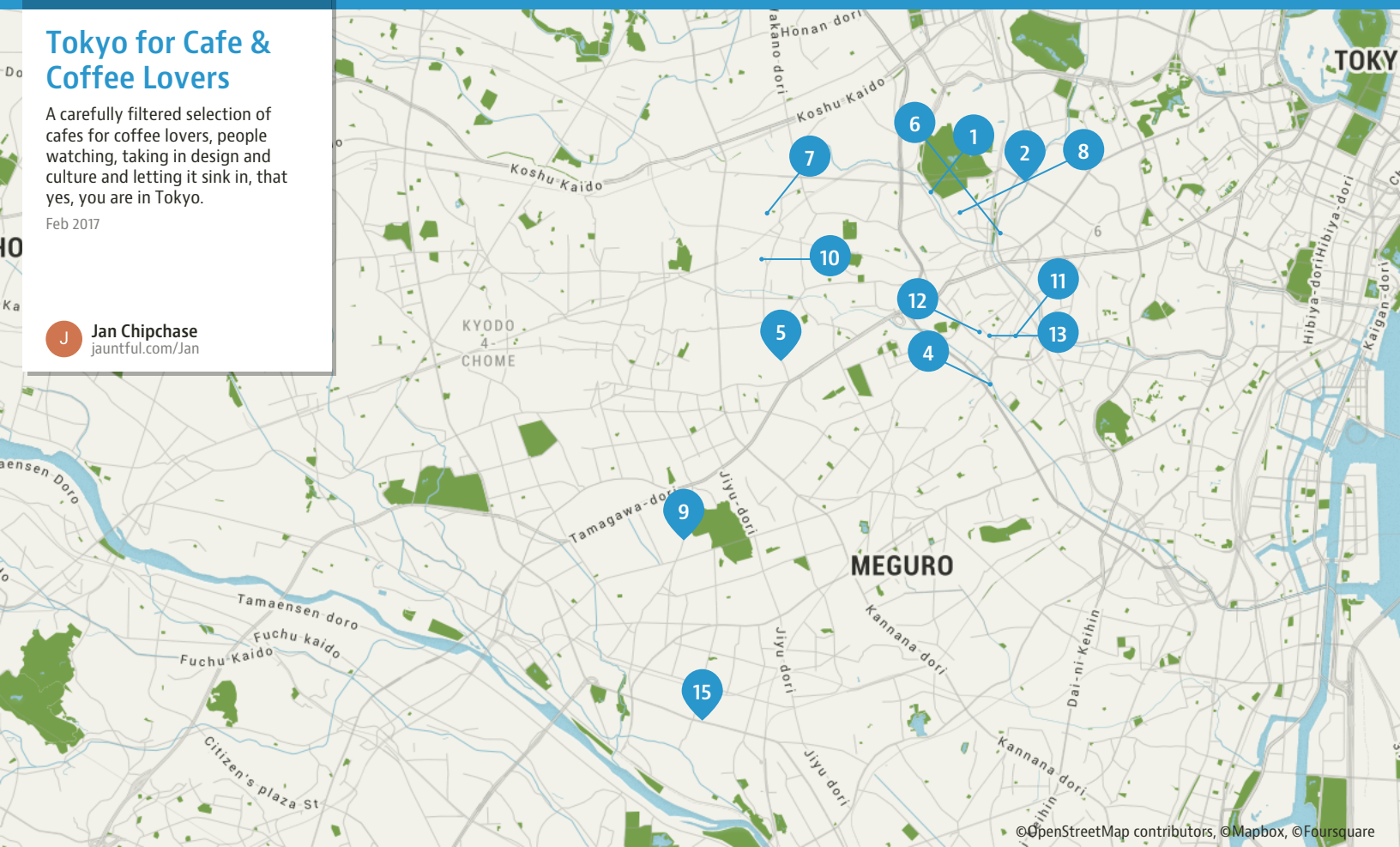


Tokyo for Cafe & Coffee Lovers
