Written and produced by Jim Steinman, it was released on Tyler's fifth studio album Faster Than the Speed of Night (1983). Columbia Records released the song as a single on 11 February 1983 in the United Kingdom and on 31 May 1983 in the United States. The song became Tyler's biggest career hit, rising to the top of the UK Singles Chart and the fifth best-selling single in 1983 in the UK. In the United States, the single spent four weeks at the top of the charts and was Billboard's sixth song of the year from 1983. The song was nominated for the Grammy Award for Best Female Pop Vocal Performance. Worldwide, the single has sales of more than 6 million copies[2], and gold was certified by the Recording Industry Association of America (RIAA) for sale of more than 1 million copies after its release, which was upgraded to Platinum in 2001 when the certification threshold changed. [3] In 2015, the British people voted the song the third favourite in the country in a poll conducted for ITV in the 1980s. [4] Background and composition When his contract with RCA Records ended in 1981, Tyler found a new manager in David Aspin and after watching Meat Loaf perform Bat Out of Hell live in The Old Grey Whistle Test, approached Meat Loaf producer Jim Steinman and asked him to be his producer. Tyler visited Steinman in his New York apartment in April 1982 with his manager, where he was presented with two tracks: Have you ever seen rain? and Goin' Through the Motions. He stated that if he hadn't liked the songs Steinman played, he would have rejected Tyler's invitation to cooperate. He returned to his studio apartment weeks later, where Steinman and Rory Dodd presented him with Total Eclipse of the Heart. Steinman also chose a recording band for the song, which included Dold as a performing vocalist (Turn around... abstention). [6] Lying Turn Around, bright eyes had originally appeared in Steinman's 1969 university musical The Dream Engine. [7] Steinman had originally written a song verse melody for the 1980 film A Small Circle of Friends. [8] Total Eclipse of the Heart had to be shortened to play radio. Tyler did not believe that the song was radio-friendly along its entire length; the paragraph was reduced from seven minutes and two seconds to four minutes and 30 seconds. [9] Power ballad[10] became Tyler's highest chart song in several countries; number 1 in the United States, South Africa, Australia, New Zealand, Canada and the United Kingdom. At its peak, it sold 60,000 copies per day and a total of about 6 million copies. It won the Variety Club award in the UK for best single of 1983. Tyler told the Record Mirror that he thinks the song is about someone who wants to love so badly that he's lying there in total darkness. [12] Steinman said in an interview with Playbill about including the song in his 1997 musical Dance of the Vampires: with 'Total Eclipse of the Heart', I tried to come up with a love song and remembered that I wrote it as a vampire love song. Its original title was Vampires in Love because I worked on Nosteratu's musical, another great vampire story. If anyone listens to the words, they're like vampire lines. It's about darkness, the power of darkness and the place of love in the dark... [13] He also told People magazine that he thought Tyler sounded like John Fogerty, and wrote a song to be the showpiece of his voice. [14] Tyler described the song as a challenge [to sing], saying that he [doesn't] like songs that anyone can sing. I like songs that need a lot of energy. After Steinman performed a song for him, he told The Times, All I had was shivering in my spine. ... I couldn't wait to actually get in and record it, according to Meat Loaf, steinman had co-written the song Making Love Out of Nothing at Nothing for Meat Loaf's album Midnight at the Lost and Found; however, Meat Loaf's record label refused to pay Steinman and he wrote separate songs himself. Total Eclipse of the Heart was then given to Bonnie Tyler and Making Love Out of Nothing Air Supply. Tyler has denied the allegation. [17] Meat Loaf was apparently very annoyed that Jim gave it to me, Tyler noted. But Jim said he didn't write it to Meat Loaf, that he didn't finish it until he met me. [18] In an interview with journalist Mick Shortly after Meat Loaf's 2006 album Bat Out of Hell III: The Monster Is Loose, Steinman stated: I didn't write [Total Eclipse of the Heart] for anyone but Bonnie. Steinman believed that CBS expected him to write something similar to it. But he had different ideas. [19] Critical reception Mike DeGagne of AllMusic retroactively described the Total Eclipse of the Heart as one of the finest newest tunes on the radio. Noting the lush instrumentation, he said Tyler's voice produced a perfect desolate-lovemorn effect to suit romantic lyrics. He described Roy Bittan's piano playing as dreamlike and described Tyler's voice as wonderfully stark. [20] Donald A. Guarisco, also of AllMusic, retrospectively criticized Faster Than the Speed of Night and noted the song as an epic ballad that described the entire album as rock at its most melodramatic. [21] Jim Beviglia of American Songwriter said Tyler's cheeky vocals helped legitimize the melodrama contained in the lyrics, and described the song as a rending, chest-beating [and] emotionally exhausting ballad that fits the throes of a turbulent relationship. [14] Music video Holloway Parantola Steps featured in the video Total Eclipse of the Heart as rock music video was directed by Russell Mulcahy[22] and filmed on location at Holloway Sanatorium, a large Victorian Gothic hospital near Virginia Water, Surrey, England. [23] In the video, Bonnie Tyler wears white, dreams or fantasizes about her students at a boys' boarding school. Young men are seen dancing and participating in various school activities and singing in the choir. The video received two nominations at the Billboard Video Music Awards in 1983 for best performance by a woman and the most effective use of symbolism. [24] A long-standing urban legend is that the boy who appears throughout the video and who shakes Tyler's hand at the end is former Italian footballer Gianfranco Zola. In a 2012 interview, Zola confirmed that she would not appear in the video. [25] In March 2020, the first download of the music video on November 15, 2009 had over 670 million views. [26] The second upload, which was a 4K video, premiered on December 26, 2019 and had more than three million views as of June 2020. [27] Live performances After the song's release, Tyler performs Total Eclipse of the Heart at each of his concerts. [28] I sing it much better now than before, he told the Huffington Post. [29] The song was presented on 26 April 2005. Tyler performed a short live performance of this song on a Royal Caribbean cruise during the solar eclipse on August 21, 2017. [83] Total Eclipse of the Heart received significant media attention during the solar eclipse on March 20, 2015. Tyler's version received a 2.14% increase in Spotify streams throughout the day. [84] the effect was during the solar eclipse on August 21, 2017, when Nielsen Music reported record sales growth of 503%. [85] At that time, the song hit number one on the iTunes chart. [86] 16. It was announced on August 17, 2017 that Tyler will perform a song on board MS Oasis in the Suez during a total solar eclipse supported by american dance rock band DNCE. In 2014, the Electric Picnic Festival announced Bonnie Tyler as part of its lineup. [88] Tickets were already sold out, although Irish rugby player Cian Healy won additional tickets to the Irish women's rugby team for a cartoon video posted on Instagram. [89] Other versions of Bonnie Tyler Since the original release in 1983, Tyler has been re-recorded several times for albums and later single releases. His first and most successful re-recording of the song was released in 2003. Tyler recorded a French/English duet version called Si demain... - Karen Antonn. It was number one in France and Belgium. [90] Tyler released the second version of the song in 2004 as a duet with Peter Dinklagehurst on his album For You. [92] The solo version of the recording was released on his studio album Wings the following year. BabyPinkStar recorded the song with Tyler with a punk/electronic remix released as a single in the UK in January 2007. In 2009, Tyler released another version of the song by Welsh choir group Only Men Aloud! In 2011, Tyler re-recorded the song with an EP named after the song, released by Cleopatra Records. [94] His most recent recording of the song appears as a bonus track on his album Rocks and Honey (2013). It originally peaked at 54 UK singles charts in 1994, but reached No 5 after being reprinted in 1995. In the UNITED States, the French version peaked at Number 2 on the Billboard Hot 100 by Bryan Adams' Have You Ever Really Loved a Woman? and it often collected broadcast on AC radio. It enjoyed greater success in Australia, spending four non-conditional weeks at No 2 Hocus Pocus's Here's Johnny! Behind. [96] Elsewhere, the deck rose to number 13 in New Zealand, number 16 in Canada and was in the top 10 from several European countries. [98] [conflicting source] France's first recording total eclipse of the Heart, made with John Springrate from the producer of the Glitter Band, came to the attack and Matt Atken and Matt Atken covered the song, and it was this version that appeared on the album. [99] I just thought it was great. I've worked [with Mike Stock and Matt Atken] since I was a dreamer... we tried and it had a great time... And then about two months later Mike called me unexpectedly saying that the buzz won't die on this track, so we'll record the beginning again... And we'll republi it in early 1995. [99] According to France, his remake total eclipse of the Heart became popular in the UK and US in separate remixes: the slower version was the one that really took hold in the UK, where they initially started fast and then decided to go [with the remix, which started] in the same way as the Bonnie Tyler version [and then] accelerated when the choir came... In the US it was [a remix] that was fast all the time. [99] The single received two French awards at the 1995 HI-NRG Music Awards in single of the year and Best Female Vocal Performance. [100] Critical reception AllMusic journalist Stephen Thomas Erlewine said in his review that French had an unexpected hit single with its dance club, a house-beat cover with Total Eclipse of the Heart. He added that while it was initially treated like a novelty, the version was as effective as its original and deserved success. [101] Larry Flick of Billboard wrote that he makes a fair imitation of Bonnie Tyler in this bouncing hi-NRG/disco interpretation of the pompous power ballad. Great Britain and European players have already warmly embraced this twirler, with odds of up to 50-50 for similar successes here. In 2017, BuzzFeed listed the song at number 26 of the 101 biggest dance songs of the 90s. [103] Robbie Daw of Idolator called it a bolting dance performance. [104] Music & Media commented that bonny tyler's sandpaper song is gone, the edge now comes from the dance context put into the ballad. Needless to say, it is an upbeat paragraph in 1995. [143] The song would have been released as the album's second single, but was canceled due to their conflicts on The Love Tour, although the promo release still reached Number 5 on the Philippine radio chart and No. 55 in the Czech Republic. Their version has undergone three official remixes, as well as a remix by Jim Steinman, which was eventually rejected by the label but has surfaced on the Internet. The song was released as an advertising single in 2007. Sunset Strippers Radio Mix version of the song, which was number 210 on Russia's official top radio hit list on February 26, 2007. The single was number 36 on the Billboard Latin pop songs chart. [149] L'Aura version Italian singer L'Aura covered the song in Italian as Ecilissi del cuore from his third studio album Sei come me in 2010, which was not originally released as a single. A year later, a new version of the song was officially released, now duets with Italian singer Nek as a single that was number 6 on the Italian charts. [150] Parody versions In 2009, a parody of the song and music video was released, which fans and creators call the literal video version, which is a kind of video that replaces the lyrics of the original song with humorous lyrics depicting images from the video. It was listed by Time magazine on 6 May 2009. best viral video. [151] This was also the sixth literal video produced by professional video journalist David A. Scott Jr.; The singer, who re-appeared in this dub, was Scott's friend Felisha Noble using the pseudonymna persephone maewyn. In 2010, Tyler appeared in a MasterCard commercial and made a short parody of the song with his new living Turn Around, Neville. [153] He performed the original song in a similar westpac ad in 2012.
