First, make sure you're ready to vote. A simple voter plan looks like this:

Voting rolls are regularly purged, so please double check that your registration is up to date and your polling location hasn't changed. To check on the specific dates for your area and details of your own registration, use the official website www.vote.gov.

PERSONAL CONNECTIONS

Who do you know? Chances are good there are lots of people you'd feel comfortable talking to about voting. Think of friends from your workplace, playdate groups, book clubs, the gym, your neighbors, etc., and add a few to your list. Try to also include people who may be less likely to vote.

Who might need to register or update their registration?

- > Voters between the ages of 18 and 29
- > Voters who have recently moved
- > New citizens
- > Voters who haven't voted in recent election cycles

After choosing a few friends, craft a simple message to send. Here are some tips:

- > Relax. Sending a message might feel a little weird, but you're simply reminding someone to vote, so don't worry. They are your friends, and you're providing a public service to increase civic engagement.
- > Start simple. "Hey, I noticed you moved," or "I know you are a new student," or "Just wanted to check in as this year has been wild..."
- > Be friendly and helpful. "Have you registered to vote? Here's a <u>link</u> with more info if you haven't had a chance. Let me know if you have any problems. I'm volunteering an hour each week to help people get registered and am happy to help."

SOCIAL MEDIA

COMMUNITY

Organize a voter registration activity in your community. Make sure to check your state laws regarding voter registration drives. You can call your local elections office if you have questions. Choose one of the ideas below, or come up with your own. Be sure to share MWEG's Voter Checklist at your event.

- > Call your favorite restaurant and offer to co-host a voter registration drive. Hospitality employees, especially in the restaurant industry, have barriers to voting and may need help making their voter plan in time.
- > Are you an employer? What about anyone in your immediate famztily or social circle? Small and mid-sized businesses may not have thought about holding a voter registration event, so give them a call and offer to help run one.
- > Do you live near a university? Check in with their student clubs and reach out to see if they have promoted voter registration. Offer to co-host an event with them.
- > Host a virtual event or prepare an email with helpful information and links (with nonpartisan reputable sources) that employers or friends can forward.
