III GET OUT THE VOTE

All of your preparation leads to this point. Remember that high voter turnout means high accountability for our elected officials.

SELF

Review your voter plan as Election Day draws near.

If voting by mail, make sure you've received your ballot. If you haven't received your ballot, call your county clerk's office. Follow all instructions to fill it out properly. Once you send or drop off your ballot, track your ballot on your county's election page, if available.

If you are able, take the day off from work or secure childcare support so that you can be prepared to help out on Election Day.

If you are able to drive them to the polls, help them mail their ballot (check state laws!), or offer other needed assistance, reach out.

- People with low income or who are housing insecure
- People with disabilities who are unable to drive or need other support
- Individuals whose main language is not English
- Older and high-risk individuals
- New citizens or new voters, including young people who are newly eligible to vote
- Individuals in the hospital or residential treatment centers or nursing homes
- Friends with young children who may need childcare to vote in person

Using the Voter Planning Guide you completed in Part I, remind your social media followers about important dates as the election approaches. Talk about your experience voting, the importance of voting, and why you have confidence in our elections.

Offer rides to people who need them in your area if you are still looking for people to help more directly.

Not only will this help ensure everyone in your area has access to vote, you will also get to build new relationships with people and organizations that you can be friend, support, and collaborate with after the election is over.
