Title: God's Discipline & Fatherly Love Hebrews 12:5-29

<u>Introduction</u>

We must all suffer one of two things: the pain of discipline or the pain of regret or disappointment. (Jim Rohn)

It's easy to have faith in yourself and have discipline when you're a winner, when you're number one. What you got to have is faith and discipline when you're not a winner. (Vince Lombardi) Because of their size, parents may be difficult to discipline properly. (P. J. O'Rourke) Describe your earthly father in one word.

Why did you choose that word?

What do you think of when you hear the word "discipline"?

• Is it a positive or negative connotation? Why is that?

Parent and Child

Read Heb 12:5-11

- Why does God discipline us? (vs 10)
- What is the desired result of Godly discipline? (vs 11)

How does the book of James (James 1:2-4) say we are to view trials?

- What does James give as the reward for being faithful during trials?
- Why can these good results often only come through discipline and trials?

In Luke 11, Jesus introduces his disciples to the idea of God as Father (Luke 11:2). The in Luke 11:11-13, Jesus compares our Heavenly Father with an earthly father providing for his child. Jesus asks "If a child asks for an egg, the father will not give him a scorpion, will he?" Jesus concludes by reminding us how much greater God is than earthly parents.

- How often do we see God's discipline as the "scorpion" given in place of the "egg" we asked for?
- In the movie, Bruce Almighty, a human (Bruce) assumes the role of God and answers every prayer with "yes". What was the result? Have you ever looked back and seen God's answer of "no" to a prayer as a blessing?
- Have you ever seen your prayer requests as asking for a snake when God wants to give you a fish? (Luke 11)

Warnings and Encouragement

Read Heb 12:12-17

What to do

Heb 12:12 begins with "therefore..." This indicates that our discipline is to produce a righteousness that we are to utilize for a greater good.

• What are we instructed to do? (vs 12-14)

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- These commands are very proactive, indicating we are to be seeking out these acts and relationships. What are some specific ways that Christians can do this?
- vs 15 Can discipline lead to bitterness? (See Eph 6:4)
 - How can we avoid this result—both as the child of God (not to be bitter ourselves) and as the parent with our own children (so as not to cause bitterness)?
- Rom 5:3-5 reiterates the attitude and desired results of trials and the discipline required to persevere. What are those desired results?

What not to do

Esau is mentioned here as a bad example. He traded the short term gain (meal) for long term benefit (inheritance.)

- How do sin and temptation work like that in our lives?
- One method to attain discipline is "remembering what you want." How does having a goal/vision help with discipline?

Mountain of Fear of Mountain of Joy

Read Heb 12:18-29

- What reason does Jesus give to fear God? (Matt 10:28)
- Isaiah (Is 6:1-7) shows us Isaiah's vision of God. What is his reaction to seeing God? (vs 5)
- Ezekiel (Ez 1:1-28) decribes his vision of seeing God in His glory. What is his reaction (vs 28)
- We are to fear God—His wrath (Matt 10:28), His punishment (Ex 32:33-35; Prov 22:3; Is 13:11) and His judgment (Phil 2:12).
 - Job's friends incorrectly determined Job's trials were a punishment from God. How are we to know the difference between trials for discipline and those as punishment? Can we ever know?
 - o What does it mean to "work out your salvation with fear and trembling"? (Phil 2:12-13)

Heb 12:22-29 begins to describe heaven.

- What are descriptions given?
- What is our reaction to be? (vs 28)
- How can this vision help us with the endurance, discipline and perseverance needed to "run the race that is set before us" [Heb 12:1]?
