Although your phone comes with some ringtones, you can download additional ringtones directly from your mobile phone provider or from one of the many websites that offer ringtones [source: Beck]. This requires your phone to be connected to the Internet via a wireless connection. There are different types of ringtones, including: Music tones Your phone will play part of a tune every time it rings. Voice tones You'll hear a recorded voice when there's an incoming call. Sound tones You will hear sound effects when the phone rings [source: ATT]. Here's how to get ringtones offered by two of the most popular mobile phone providers. Verizon Press on the Get It Now arrow, which also acts as a navigational arrow on the right side of the handset. The Get IT Now browser will open. Scroll down the navigation arrow list until you see Get Ringtones &gt; Press OK. Select 1. 1 Get ringtones and press OK. Select 1. button to get a new app and press OK. Select True tones and press OK. Now you are connected to a list of available ringtones. Select VZW Tones Deluxe to download tones to your phone [Source: Verizon]. AT&T Go to the AT&T AppCenter home screen and select Categories.Choose Ringtones, Ringtones, Games, Applications.Choose Ringtones.Filter to select the ringtone you want to download. Select Get It and enter the information you will be asked for.

From David Weedmark Using the ability to edit songs on iTunes, you can transform any song into a personal tune for your iPhone. All you have to do is create a copy of your favorite song and then tweak it a little to turn it into a tune your iPhone can use. Ringtones should be 30 seconds or less, so you'll need to choose which part of the song you want to use. Start iTunes. If prompted, sign in with the same Apple ID and password you use for your iPhone. Drag a music file to the iTunes Music library or press Ctrl-O to import it. Find the song in the music library or playlist. Right-click the file name, and then click Get Information. Click the Options tab in the window that opens. Click the check boxes until the start time and stop time of the song and change the time so that the song is 30 seconds or less. If you want to start the song at some point, change the start time to 1:00 and 1:30 a.m. Click OK. Right-click the song again. This time, select Create AAC version to create a copy of your AAC song. If you don't see this option, you'll need to change your iTunes preferences (see next step). Duplicate 30-second version of the song appears in music music below the original. If you don't have the option to create an AAC version of a song, press Ctrl-B to reveal the menu bar on iTunes. Then select Preferences from the Edit menu and click the Import Settings button on the General tab. Click the Import Usage menu, and then click AAC Encoder. Double-click OK to close the Preferences windows. Right-click the original song file - the one that still shows the full time duration - and select Get info again. Mark and delete the start time and stop time, then click OK. This returns the original track file to its normal length. Open Windows Control Panel, select Appearance and Customization, and then click Folder Options. Click the View tab, and then clear the check box next to Hide extensions for known file types. You should be able to see the song file extension to make it a ringtone file. Right-click the 30-second AAC version of your song on iTunes and select Open in Windows Explorer. Right-click the file in Windows Explorer, and then click Rename. Highlight the .mp3 and replace it with a .m4r file extension used for ringtones. Press Enter. Click the menu button in the upper-left corner of iTunes that should say Music and select Tones. Your new ringtone appears on this page, indicating that you have changed the file extension correctly. Connect your iPhone to your computer using its USB cable. Select your iPhone when it appears in the upper-right corner of the iTunes window. Click the Tones tab, and then click the Synchronize Tones button. Click Apply, and then Sync After sync is complete, close iTunes and disconnect the USB cable. Start Settings from the iPhone Home screen. Scroll down and tap Sounds. Scroll down and tap Ringtone. You can now select a custom ringtone from the list of available options. See more apps for iPhone Best iPhone How to reset iPhone games Create ringtone for phone using Apple iTunes or music Step 1: Open and update Apple iTunes or Music Start by running iTunes (MacOS 14 High Sierra or older) or music (MacOS 15 Catalina or later) on your Mac Mac Mac windows desktop or laptop. Make sure you're using the latest version of iTunes or Apple Music. To check MacOS High Sierra or earlier, click iTunes on the app toolbar and select Check for updates from the resulting drop-down menu. If you're using the latest version of Windows 10, click Help on the menu bar under the play buttons and select Check for updates at the bottom of the resulting drop-down list. If you're using MacOS Catalina or later, launch the App Store app and select Updates on the App Store toolbar. Use the Update button to download and install the latest version if necessary. Depending on how old the music is, you may first need to deal with removing digital rights (DRM) protection from your song before using it as a ringtone. Also, make sure your selected ringtone is downloaded to your Mac. A download icon next to your song means it's in the cloud, so if so, click to download it to your hard drive. Step 2: Choose a song Here's the fun part - select the song you want to use as the new iPhone ringtone. Keep in mind that iPhone ringtones are played continuously in 30-second (or less) cycles, so don't choose anything stupid or awkward. After selecting your song, pay attention to the start and stop times for the 30-second track you want to use. Step 3: Add start and stop times One of the least known features of iTunes and Music is the ability to cut out songs and videos, allowing you to select specific start and end times. This chooses a part of a song to use as a melody. First, right-click or click the song you want and select Song Info (Get information in MacOS Catalina or later) from the resulting drop-down list. Then click the Options tab at the top of the window. There must be start and stop fields. Enter the times you want. Remember that the ringtones hang for 30 seconds, so keep it on or below that length. After you do, click OK at the bottom. The interface of iTunes and music differ slightly, but the process of both is the same. Step 4: Create an AAC version of Apple's preferred audio format is AAC because it offers similar sound quality to MP3, but takes up less storage space. iTunes and Music allow you to create an AAC version of each song you select. After you set start and stop times and select the song, go to File > Convert > Convert to AAC version or music Create AAC version. Because the start and stop times are set, creating an AAC version will create a copy of that specific song, from the song. The copy will then automatically appear in the iTunes library, just below the original song cut to your chosen 30 seconds. Before you do anything else, go back to the Original Song Information page and return the start and stop time to their original settings. Step 5: Copy the file and Old Once created, click the AAC version of your song and drag it to the desktop or the recording location you want. This will copy the file to this location. You probably no longer need the abbreviated song on iTunes, so feel free to delete the file. Right-click or click the AAC file on iTunes and select Delete from the library from the drop-down menu as a result. Then click the Delete File button in MacOS High Sierra or earlier, or select Save File or Move to Recycle Bin in MacOS Catalina. Change the extension and set your ringtone step 6: Change the AAC file extension usually use the file extension .m4a, which you may notice when you click on your AAC file. For ringtones, however, iTunes uses the .m4r extension, which is essentially the same as .m4a with a different name. This means you'll need to change the extension from .m4a to .m4r to use the clip as a ringtone. Go to the desktop — or where you saved the file — click the file name and change the extension from .m4a to .m4r. Click the Use .m4r or Yes button in the resulting warning window to confirm the changes. Show file extensions in Windows If you're using Windows, you may find that you can't change the file extension, at least by default. This is probably because your system is set up to hide file extensions. To change this, open Control Panel from the Start menu — you can also search for the Control Panel app in Windows 10 — and select Appearance and Customization. Then, click File Explorer Options. Now click the View button, uncheck the box next to Hide extensions for known file types, and click the Apply button at the bottom of the window. Now you should be able to view and edit the file extension. Step 7: Add a file to your iPhone To add .m4r ringtones to your iPhone, connect your device to your computer using a lightning-fast cable to USB. Then select the iPhone icon in the upper-left corner. Go to the Summary tab and scroll down to Options. Select the check box next to Manually manage music and videos, and then click Apply. Now drag the .m4r file to the Tones tab located under On my device, which will automatically sync a ringtone with your iPhone. If you're having trouble dragging the .m4r file to the Tones tab after you apply the changes, turn off your iPhone and restart iTunes. Then connect your iPhone and try dragging the file back into the window. If you're using MacOS Catalina (or later) and don't have iTunes, open Finder and click your iPhone in sidebar. If this is the first time you have done this since the update, you may need to Click on the trust button and go through the process to open your iPhone to your Mac. Select the General tab, select the check box next to Manually manage music and videos, and then click Apply. There is no Tones tab, so just drag the ringtone ringing your iPhone above the General tab. This will sync your new ringtone to your phone. Step 8: Set a ringtone for iOS 13, go to Settings &gt; Sounds & Haptics &gt; Ringtone, and select a ringtone from the top of the resulting list. For iOS 14, go to Settings &gt; Sounds &gt; Ringtones. Note that you can always set the new ringtone as text, voicemail, or email tone in addition to your notification sound for Facebook posts and tweets. Tone is a tone as far as Apple is concerned, so you can use it as the default sound for any notification or warning. How to create a ringtone using GarageBand You may prefer to make your ringtone in Apple's GarageBand app by cropping part of a song you like, or by creating your own. You can create a ringtone on your Mac using GarageBand and share it with your iCloud Drive so you can open it in GarageBand on your iPhone. To share songs from your Mac in GarageBand for iOS, you need to activate iCloud Drive, so start by setting up iCloud Drive on your Mac and your iPhone. Once it's on your iPhone, export the song as a ringtone from GarageBand or simply create the ringtone directly on your iPhone. Use GarageBand for iOS It's easiest if you have garageband iOS app and song you want to use on your iPhone already. Launch the GarageBand app and find the song you want to use. Note that if you haven't already shortened it to 30 seconds, GarageBand can do it automatically, though it may not be the 30 seconds you intend. Touch and hold the song, then select Share &gt; ringtone. Name the ringtone and tap Export. Tap Use sound as and select Standard ringtone, Standard text, or Set contact. From a song on your Mac Here is a method that you can use with an existing ringtone running MacOS Big Sur and GarageBand 10.3.5 – both the latest available versions. Open GarageBand on your Mac, click Empty Projects, and then click Select. Select the audio microphone icon and click New. Click Browse &gt; Show media browser to reveal your resident ringtones. Select the ringtone you want and drag your selection from the media browser to the workspace. Move the cursor to the lower left or right corner of the song, and you'll see an icon that you can use to click and drag to shorten or extend the song to the specific part you want to use for your ringtone. When you're done selecting sound up to 30 seconds, right-click and select Split in Playhead, then right-click and select Delete to the remainder of the melody so that only the interval of 30 seconds remains. Click Share. From this menu, you can export the song to iTunes or music to the desktop or as garageband for an iOS file. If you select the first one, follow step 7 of the Computer tab above. If you have an iPhone with GarageBand on it, you can import GarageBand for an iOS file and then set it as a ringtone for the previous tab. Section. Track using GarageBand loops You can also build your own song from the chains available in GarageBand. Here's how. Create an empty project, and then click Select, click the microphone button, and then click New. In the upper-right corner, click the Loop icon in the middle (it looks like a loop). Now you can view the available loops by dragging them into the tracking box in blocks. Arrange them as you want, keeping the same line played over and over again, or adding to other contours of individual songs to create more complex songs. After you're done, click Share, then click Song to Music. Then you can export the song as a m4a file, and at this point, you can change the m4r extension and copy it to your iPhone.
