A	"Adopt A Social Worke	r" (helping one social worker with case load needs)
B	Bears and Bunnies	(collecting cuddly stuffed animals for victimized children)
\mathbf{C}	Classes	(offering parenting, stress reduction, anger management, etc.)
D	Declarations (voti	ng proclamations regarding family violence, Internet use, creating sanctuary, etc.)
\mathbf{E}	Escort	(volunteering to walk with children or victims through the legal process)
F	Father Support	(providing dad groups, classes, etc. and diaper changing tables in the men's room)
G	Groups for Recovery	(sponsoring AA, Alanon, Parents Anonymous, Sex Addicts Anonymous, etc.)
H	"Homework Central"	(providing after-school care and tutoring programs)
I	Interfaith Cooperation	(coordinating prevention education and advocacy with other religious groups)
J	Justice	(promoting appropriate response to abusers, rather than vengeance)
K	"Kids' Camps"	(sponsoring camps for abused and other special needs children)
L	Library of Resources	(building a user-friendly collection of materials and appropriate referrals)
M	Mentoring	(pairing members with new parents, children, etc.)
N	No Negligence	(creating and implementing child protective policies)
0	"One Church, One Child	1" (adopting a child as an entire congregation)
P	Parent Support Groups	(providing child-age-specific groups for parents, especially single parents)
Q	Quality Day Care	(supporting appropriate child care, especially for infants and toddlers)
R	Respite Care	(giving parents and other caregivers a break)
S	Safe House	(providing a protective setting for troubled youth or families at risk of violence)
T	Two Adult Rule	(having two non-related adults present at every child/youth activity)
U	Unified Efforts	(working with CPS and other community organizations to address abuse)
V	Voices for the Voiceless	(speaking publicly on issues that concern children's well-being)
W	Worship	(praying, preaching, and/or hosting a Children's Sabbath service)
X	X-tended Counseling Beyond Pre-Marital (providing at least three sessions in first year of marriage)	
Y	Youth Training	(teaching youth safety skills and how to help friends with abuse problems)
Z	Zero Tolerance	(forbidding any behavior that demeans another)
