(This is the hardest because they have to manipulate the pencil/pen and remember what the letters are like. Choose letters from a list. Sliding alphabet tiles around. Beetle tiles are great for this. This gives them greater independence, especially if they are slow. Copy a word (moving/choosing from a list of letters)Give them a word. Give them some tiles of the alphabet (beetle times work great for this). At the simplest level, give them only the letters for that word, but scrambled. At harder levels, from their most letters, to the full alphabet. Write lettersShow them a, b, e, f, g and write them down: A, B, E, FSpelling word by image Show them a photo and have them write the word for the photo. For this reason, you can use the following printable worksheets or use the write exercises in MoreSpeech.comEvere them with the correct but encrypted letters. (for apple: elpap, etc.), if they can do it, then for the next testGive them the letters for the word plus some extra useless letters (what therapists call Foils). If they're okay with that, keep adding more foil letters. In the end, give him all the beetle tiles. When you're done, ask (in a very neutral way) if they're sure of the word (almost as if you weren't sure. You don't want them to think they got it right or wrong. You want them to decide.) FraseSame as Spelling the word, but use complex photos (a man throwing a ball, instead of a simple photo of a ball or a man)Worksheets to write a treatment at home The most effective alternative to worksheetsWorksheets are a good place to start, unfortunately, there is no research that worksheets alone are effective (which was confirmed to me by the researcher (Dept head of a Speech Pathology University program). They are better if the caregiver (or therapist) works with the survivor while using them, so that the survivor can work on a demanding without frustration. When the survivor is frustrated, the helper provides cueing. Specific problems:Many survivors are embarrassed by failure in front of someone, especially a family member. But they have to work at a challenging level to be effective. Survivors often don't work well with family (partly because of the above error issue and because of the dynamics of the relationship. (You keep telling me what to do.) Helping is hard to master. It takes a huge patience to provide only the tips/cues the survivor needs. Provide too much and they will get angry (you robbed them of the chance to be corrected). Provide too little, and they feel frustrated... and angry. Language pathologists spend years on these skills. It is difficult to withdraw in a few hours, weeks or even monthsAll, however, research shows that the treatment software is effective when it is a specially designed speech & language software. Survivors often prefer to work independently with treatment software because:They work at their speed and according to their schedule. They can work in private, where no one can see them fail. They automatically get cueing (tips), so it's frustration-free. They gain control over precisely what robbed them of freedom: their discourse and language. Once upon a time there was a speech therapist who realized that his patients needed more therapy than the insurance provided. So she asked her husband, a software engineer, if he could help. So he created an interactive treatment software to use at work. And his patients loved him. Other therapists, too. So they made it available to everyone and he worked full-time creating even more programs. I'm that software engineer. And I keep working on that software today.
